What Will You Do With Your Summer ?

If you are a student or teacher you have three or four months of vacation. What shall you do? Will the summer pass without a definite accomplishment? Or will it bring you one more step toward your ultimate goal?

You would like to travel? Where would you go? Summer repels from crowded cities and their sultry pavements and perspiring throngs. It allures to the mountains, to the coolness of deep-shaded glens, to the clear green depths where the bass dart swift as a shadow, to the lakes and the streams, and the high silent peaks.

But travel costs! As a student you must wait till you have finished your training and have entered your profession; as a teacher, till you have taken your degree and have advanced to a successful position. In the meantime what?

Why not combine the most delightful of travel experiences with the acquisition of further training? A summer session at Harding offers you both. It gives you one-third of a year's credit toward your degree, or courses that will renew your certificate and broaden your training. But it also affords opportunities for vacation outings, mountain climbs, fishing, boating, swimming—all that would make your summer travel delightful. Harding is surrounded by spots of rare beauty; these are yours for the summer.

WHY GO TO SUMMER SCHOOL?

Students working toward a degree or preparing for professional schools of medicine, dentistry, pharmacy, engineering or law can pursue their regular work at Harding during the summer session. It is a waste of time and money to neglect the summer school. A student who takes four years to finish the work for his degree could easily finish it in three by doing some summer work. It costs less and saves a year. That year conservatively estimated should be worth \$1,600. Taking into consideration the cost of the summer sessions, the fact that six weeks are left after the session for vacation or work, and the increased earning power of the student after he has taken his degree, it has been carefully estimated that the three-year course with the summer terms saves the student in actual cash approximately \$1,000 over the four-year plan. Is it worth saving?

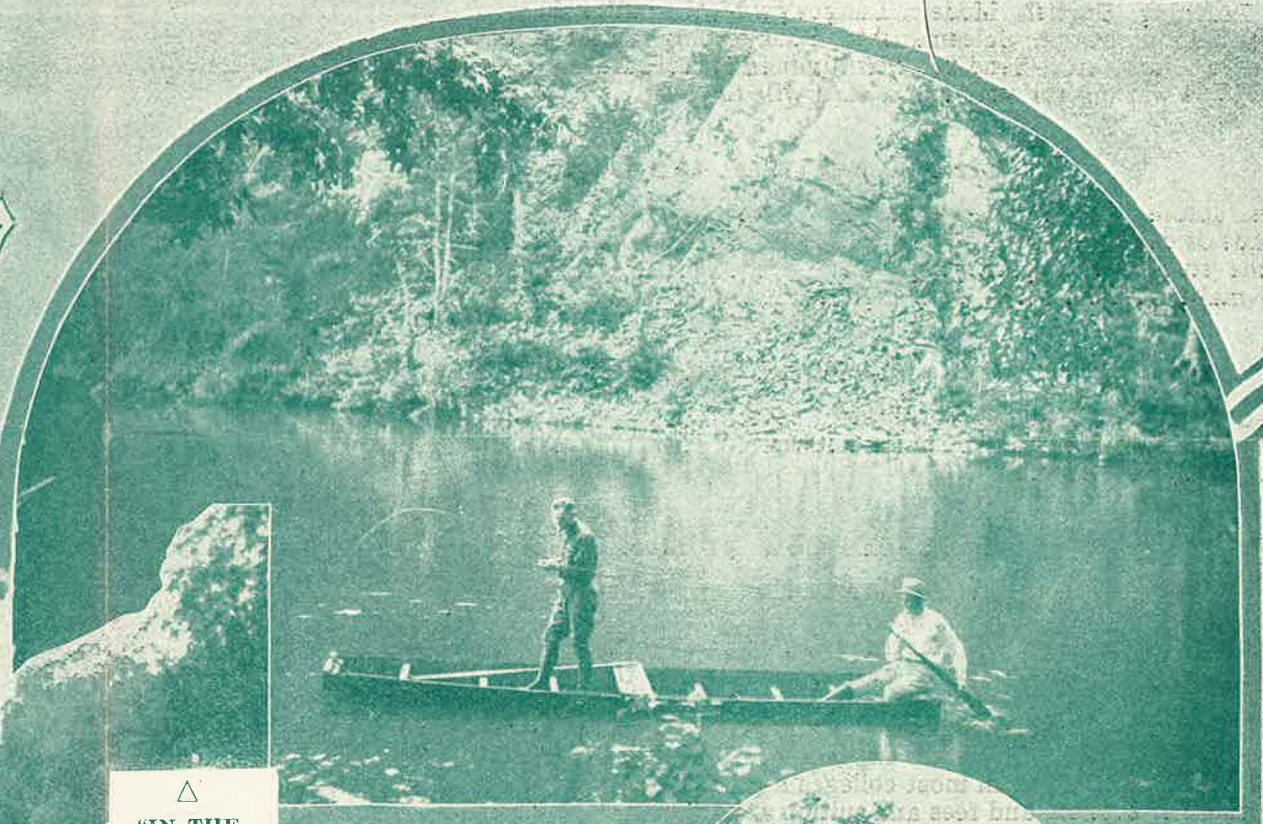
OPPORTUNITIES FOR TEACHERS

The summer quarter offers an excellent opportunity for teachers who need more professional training or work for the renewal of their certificates. Courses in methods are offered under the head of the education department and expert training in primary methods under one of the most successful primary teachers in the state.

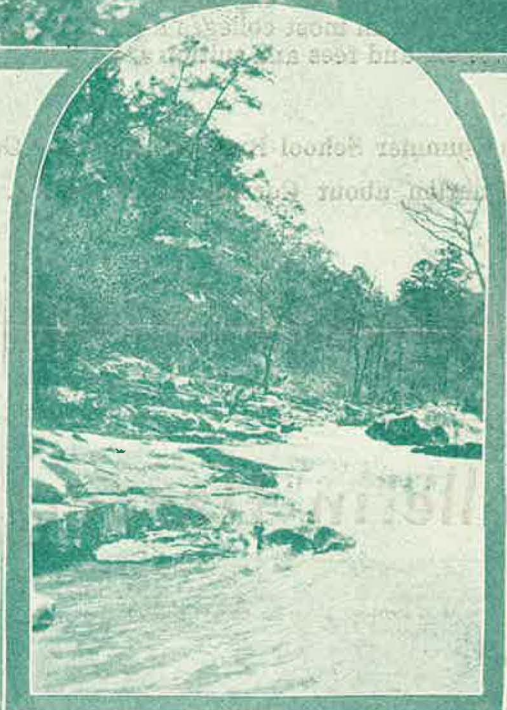
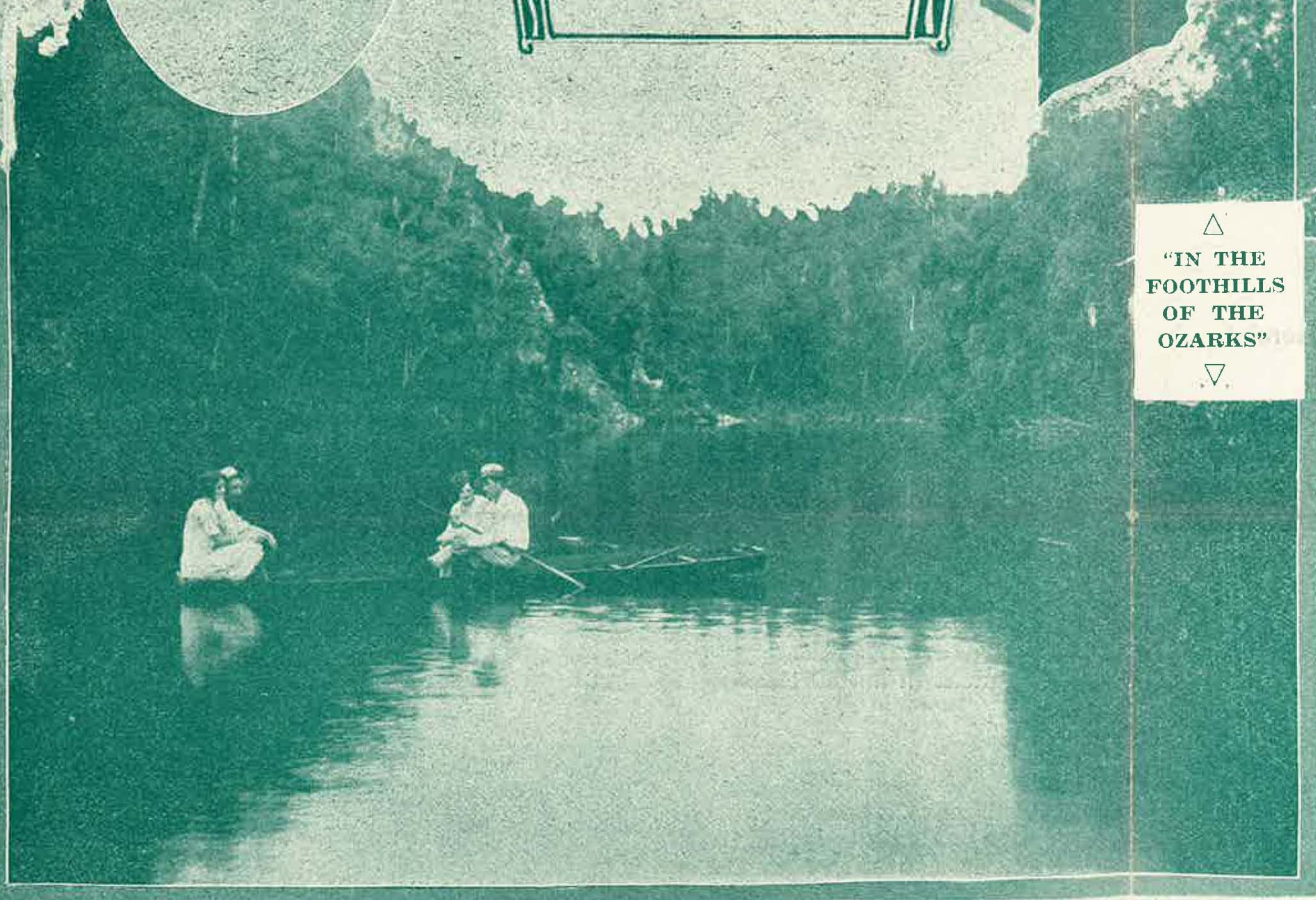
Teachers whose schools are out in March or the first of April could enroll for the regular Spring Quarter and remain through the Summer Quarter. This would give them two-thirds of a year's work toward their degree, and they would lose no time from their teaching.

STRONG FACULTY AND WORK

Instructors in our summer school are not substitutes. They are regular professors and heads of departments. While the summer school provides delightful recreation, it gives the student strong thorough work. The excellent equipment in library and laboratories make possible work of a high standard.

You will find at Harding a delightful personal contact between students and between students and teachers that you miss elsewhere. It will make every day of your summer work an enjoyment to you.

EXPENSES LOW AT HARDING

A comparison of expenses at Harding with other schools will convince you of the reasonableness of the rates. In spite of the tuition charge, which is quite moderate, the rates for board and room are so reasonable as to bring the total cost below that of most public institutions that charge no tuition. Board for the entire quarter is only \$50, an average of a little over twenty cents a meal. Yet our cooperative club plan allows from this amount the best meals we have ever known in college dining halls. Rooms are \$15 for the entire quarter. The total expense for the summer term will fall within \$115. The board and room alone in most colleges and universities will run from \$105 to \$150 for the summer session, and fees and tuition are additional.
