

Hedrick. James Acton Hedrick was born in Howe, Texas, May 13, 1917. After graduating from the Howe High School he enrolled at North Texas State University where he received the B.A. degree in 1940, the M.A. degree in 1947 and the Ed.D. degree in 1954. Dr. Hedrick became a Certified Public Accountant in 1961. During World War II Dr. Hedrick was commissioned an officer in the Signal Corps and was promoted to the rank of Captain.

Dr. Hedrick joined the faculty at Harding in 1952 after four years of teaching at Arkansas Tech. He is a member of Phi Delta Kappa, the American Accounting Association, and other

Near the foothills of the Ozarks, Midst of hill and plain; Stands our glorious Alma Mater Harding is her name.


Christian standard is her motto; Christian life is stressed; And in every branch of learning. Each one does his best.



DAILY Bible study for all students is a privilege of Christian education.




MINISTER Joe Black works with the college congregation where Harding students and faculty members worship during the school year.



SERVING West Side, this congregation strives under the work of Carl Mick, minister, to carry out Christ's mission to teach His word.






### OUR AMERICAN WAY Past, Present, and Future Form Basis for Harding's Education



"Where American and Christian ideals go hand in hand" is a vital role which Harding strives to fulfill in training students to take their place as adult Christians and citizens in the community.



**GENTLY** rolling in, the fog dissolves the beautiful Harding campus into shimmering, misty moonlight with merely a hint of a building visible.




Our school — that part of our priceless heritage which was definitely made possible by the sacrifices of alumni and friends of Harding has a physical plant valued at approximately 12 million dollars. The beautiful campus serves this institution of learning well. However, it is not static. A two million dollar campaign for a "Greater Harding" is in its second year. Construction is well along on a multi-purpose Alumni-American Heritage Center and plans are being made for the building of a new science hall. The music department is expanding into a new, well-equipped recording studio. Harding is moving forward.

Scenes of the past which enrich Harding's history include the move from Morrilton to Searcy in 1934 to the Galloway College campus. The heritage has moved forward until the present — 1965. It is growing and will continue to grow only as long as it is supported by those who realize the good that Harding does, can, and will accomplish in the development of Christians and citizens. 


SCHOOL history tells of Arkansas Christian College as Harding's parentcollege; its original administration building is located at Morrilton, Arkansas.

#### IN MEMORIAM



Dh. L. M. Ghaves 1895-1964.

Dr. Lloyd Myers Graves, M.D., served 23 years on the Board of Trustees of Harding College, the last 10 years as Chairman of the Board. During his time of leadership the College has made significant advances in physical facilities and academic standing.

Born in Copiah County, Mississippi, in 1895, he attended Burritt College before enrolling in Vanderbilt University from which he received the M.D. degree. He became the first full-time health officer of Shelby County, Tennessee, in 1926, and was named superintendent of health for Memphis in 1928. The city and county health departments merged in 1942 and Dr. Graves, as the first and only director, lead Memphis to national recognition as a clean and healthy city. He died of a heart attack in Nashville on December 3, 1964, at the age of 69 while attending a meeting of the Tennessee Public Health Association.


# Nev Buildings Hold Heritage for Future Success


Our parents, not only bring us into the world, but also provide the opportunities for us to live, to grow, to learn, to succeed and eventually to be parents ourselves.

## Basic appreciation for life found in humanities and arts





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#### NATURAL SCIENCE

### Expansion, research key to secrets of natural sciences

Preparing outstanding students for graduate and professional study is a major objective of the Division of Natural Science. The strong academic program is re-enforced by the team research program in life sciences under the direction of Dr. R. T. Clark who was invited to Tokyo, Japan, in September to present a paper before the International Congress of Sports Medicine. Dr. Jack Wood Sears, chairman of the division, was an American Chemical Society tour speaker in November. Mr. Don England in chemistry, Mr. Kenneth Perrin in mathematics and Mr. William Rushton in biology have been on leave this year working on the doctorate in the respective areas. New faculty members are Mr. Bryce Roberson in biology and Mr. Robert Smith in chemistry. 
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## ACADEMIC LIFE Academic life encourages students to excellence



#### GRADUATE SCHOOL Graduate school furthers interest in education

Preparation of superior elementary and secondary teachers is the objective of the graduate program in Searcy leading to the Master of Arts in Teaching degree. Emphasis is placed on strengthening the student's knowledge in his teaching field since those entering the program must meet certification requirements or meet these requirements through undergraduate make-up. English and humanities, social studies, and natural science are the three areas besides education in which graduate work is currently offered. Dr. W. K. Summitt, Chairman of the Department of Education and Psychology, serves as Chairman of the Graduate Council.

Three years of graduate study in Bible, religion, and religious education are offered at the Harding College Graduate School of Bible and Religion, 1000 Cherry Road at Park Avenue, Memphis, Tennessee. Degrees offered are the Master of Arts, the Master of Religious Education and the Master of Theology. Emphasis is placed upon teaching the Bible and closely related subjects at an advanced academic level. An outstanding faculty has been assembled, a new library building was dedicated December 1, 1964, and two modern apartment buildings have been completed this year. Dr. W. B. West, Jr. serves as the capable Dean of the Graduate School of Bible and Religion. **PUTTING** experience into application is one of the excellent characteristics found by Cledic Jackson and Francis Whiteman in Harding's graduate study.


### ALPHA CHI Society recognizes excellent grade achievement

**CEREMONIALLY** being inducted as new Alpha Chi officers, Jimmy Arnold Ken O'Neal, and Regina Dunn accept the responsibility of leadership.

Stimulating the achievement of superior scholarship on the part of her students is a vital function of a college. The Arkansas Eta Chapter of Alpha Chi, a national honor scholarship society, was chartered on the Harding campus in the spring of 1957 to assist the faculty in achieving this goal. The chapter of a national honor society was petitioned by the Alpha Honor Society, a local honor society organized in the winter of 1935. Membership in Alpha Chi is limited to not more than ten per cent of the junior and senior classes. Membership as a junior further requires the attainment of at least 3.70 scholarship average on not fewer than 80 semester hours and membership as a senior further requires at least a 3.50 average on not fewer than 104 semester hours. New members are inducted near the beginning of each semester with an impressive ceremony followed by a dinner. At commencement each spring the chapter presents a key to the graduating senior who has achieved the highest academic average.



CHECKING their watches in order to see if they are still on schedule for the afternoon's many activities, is a custom most Hardingites follow every day.










# Color, pageant, and beauty welcome in spring



Graves, chairman of Harding's Board of Trustees, emphasized the vast problems and opportunities of the day. Congressman Oren Harris was awarded the LLD degree and Jim Bill McInteer was named alumnus of the year.








Second semester activities were highlighted by a skating party and a weiner roast.










## Informal party takes Oege's 'South of Border'

"White elephant" gifts and Christmas carols highlighted a Yuletide party at the home of the club sponsor, Barbara Barnes.



## Student Leaders are recognized for their merits

Selection to membership in Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges is one of the top honors that a junior or senior can receive. Criteria used in selecting students include the student's scholarship, his participation and leadership in academic and extra-curricular activities, his citizenship and services to the college and his promise of future usefulness. Faculty members review a list of nominees submitted by the Student Council and make additional nominations before they make the final selection. To be eligible at Harding College for this honor, a student must have a 2.40 cumulative average. Preference is given to seniors but three juniors - Clifton Ganus III, Dennis Organ and Jim Wilson - merited recognition. Jimmy Arnold, Mary Ethel Bales and Tom Reppart were selected as juniors in 1963-64.

The names of the twenty-three students selected will appear in the 1964-65 edition of Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges. These students also receive special placement service through this organization. They receive a certificate of membership and they are eligible to purchase a membership key.



## Season evolves into a series of crucial plays





## Bison gridders rely on spirit, speed, and desire













# Roundballers utilize fast break, full-court press










### Cross-Country team wins second championship

Bob Camp, never beaten in AIC contests, took first in the shot put, while Harding's mile medley relay team composed of Loverd Peacock, Berkeley Hackett, Dwight Robb, and Gerald Clark took the crown. Jerry Baker, Tommy Bateman, and R. T. Clark took second places in the mile run, high jump, and 880-yard run, respectively. Wendell Harrison won third in the 880-yard run, while Donnie Cox tied with Voss of ASTC for third in the pole vault. ASTC took the all-conference meet with a total score of 48 points. A & M had 32 and Harding had  $221/_2$ .

Assistant football coach, Ted Lloyd took over as assistant coach in the '64 season. He was Academy head coach until September of the 1964 school year.





**PROPELLING** himself into the water in a long, low, powerful racing dive, Jim Horner launches out into the pool to begin a practice series of laps.


National interest in swimming as a competitive sport was greatly enhanced by the success of the youthful United States swimming team in the 1964 Olympic games in Tokyo. Swimming was added last year as the ninth sport in AIC competition. Participation in all "minor" sports on the part of colleges in the conference was greatly stimulated last year when the AIC began giving an All-Sports Trophy. Swimming has played an important role in the intramural program at Harding since Harding has an indoor, heated pool; however, it will take time to build an intercollegiate swimming team. In the first AIC swimming meet last year. Hendrix won most of the events because of the avid interest of their coach in swimming. 

Gone from the 1963 team were such outstanding hard ballers as Steve Smith, twice All-AIC catcher, pitchers Joe Spaulding, Jim Watson and Kim Pate, infielders Hommy Carter and Billy Ray Barden, and outfielders Jerry Mote, Ken Spillman, Joe Burleson and Terry Burton.

The 1964 team was built around four returning lettermen: pitcher Richard Green, short-stop Eddie Miller, first baseman Bernie Cox and infielder Don Samanie. Freshman Mike Plummer rapidly developed into the Bison's most effective pitcher and freshman Steve McAfee's catching ability reminded fans of All-AIC Steve Smith. Other newcomers to the team showing real promise for future years were Pete Henry, Johnny Jeter, Gary Simpson, Jimmy Miller, Rob Barber and Dave Fouss. What the team lacked in pose and finesse was compensated for by enthusiasm and hustle.

Lacking power at the plate, the 1964 Bison nine relied heavily on welcomed walks, daring base running, and dangerous squeeze plays to push runs across. In conference games the team split double headers with Henderson State, Arkansas A & M and Ouachita and lost double headers to ASTC, Tech and Southern State.





## Beginning links season has Bisons as dark horse


















The musical talent of Academy students is tapped through the inspiring chorus and its activities. Academic and special interest clubs are available to students who wish to further a special interest.













Senior Dick Berryhill and junior Phillip Elliott of the Wildcat squad were named to the All-County team.



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
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
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
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
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
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### Remembering the events of the past year.
