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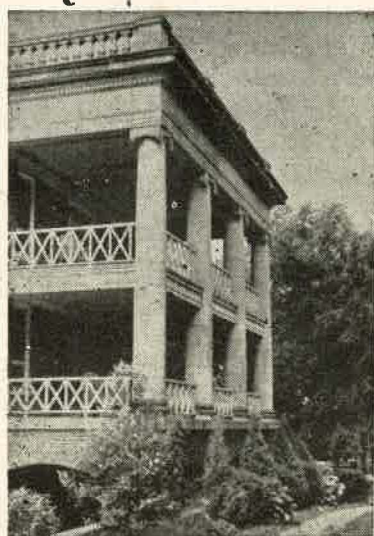

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## ALUMNI DAY--MAY 31

An interesting and a challenging departure from the usual Homecoming is the Alumni Day program which is to be initiated this spring.

Alumni Day — May 31 — is all the name implies. The day's program will be conducted this year under the responsible leadership of the class of 1929 which is celebrating its 15th anniversary this spring. The classes of 1934 and 1939, which will be celebrating their 10th and 5th anniversaries respectively, will also share in the responsibility for planning the day's activities. These three classes under the direction of Leonard Kirk, Vice-President of the Association and Vice-President of the class of 1929, will assume the lead throughout the day. All classes will be expected to cooperate when called upon, and will join the others in the various programs.

## Pryor Becomes Chemistry Head

If you were at Harding on June 3, 1937, chances are that you attended the commencement exercises and saw Joseph E. Pryor receive the B. A. and B. S. degrees with majors in mathematics and chemistry. He was also recognized for having been honor student for four years and president of the Alpha Honor Society for two years.

That fall he entered the Louisiana State University and, except for vacations spent on the Harding campus, he was away until March 13 when he returned to head the Chemistry Department.

At Louisiana State, Mr. Pryor continued his fine scholastic record and from 1937 to 1939 he was a teaching fellow in mathematics, until he was granted the M. A. degree in mathematics in June, 1939. His master's thesis was "Polygons of Maximum Area Inscribed in an Ellipse". His two years, 1939-41, as a teaching fellow in chemistry were followed by his being an assistant in chemistry in the summer of 1941.

Having the highest scholastic record among thirty graduate students in chemistry, he was selected as the Charles Edward Coates Research Fellow in chemistry for 1941-42. In May 1943, he was graduated with the Ph. D. degree in physical chemistry. His dissertation was entitled "Zeta Potentials". His grade point average for all his graduate work was 2.85, approximate.

At the annual meeting of the Louisiana Academy of Sciences in

April, 1941, at Lake Charles, Dr. Pryor presented a paper on "Maximum Polygons: A Necessary and Sufficient Condition". In the summer of 1942 he was the representative from the Natural Sciences on the Graduate Student Council.

From 1942 until he returned to Harding this spring, Dr. Pryor was instructor in mathematics at Louisiana State, teaching four classes and covering all levels through calculus.

During his undergraduate work at Harding, Dr. Pryor was an athletic enthusiast and for three years was a member of the varsity five in basketball. His interest in publications was manifested by his having held the offices of circulation manager, and editor of the college paper, *The Bison*, and editor of the yearbook, *The Petit Jean*.

Other evidence that he participated in extra-curricular as well as curricular work is shown by his having been a member of the T. N. T. Social Club, the Campus Players, and a representative in *Who's Who Among American Colleges and Universities*.

Two honorary mathematics fraternities, Kappa Mu Epsilon and Pi Mu Epsilon, list Dr. Pryor as a member. In the field of chemistry he was a member of the honorary fraternity Phi Lambda Upsilon, serving the Alpha Mu chapter as secretary in 1941-42, and of the professional fraternity, Alpha Chi Sigma in 1942 and the scientific research society, Sigma Xi, in

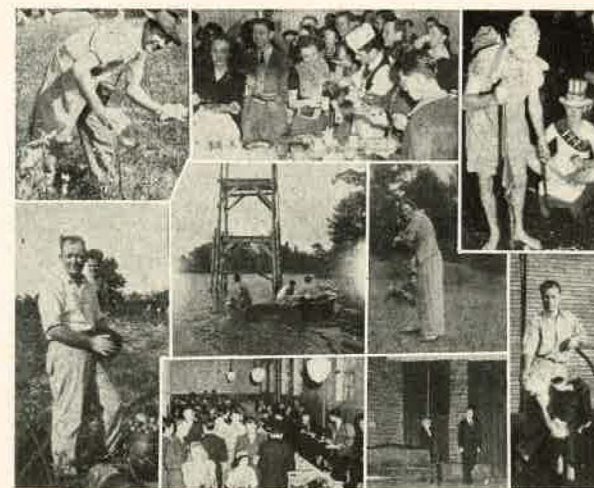
**CLASS OF '34** — There was "Pinky" Berryhill, Milton Peebles
