# Fall Term Opens September 17th

When Harding College opens September 17th, upper classmen are likely to see the largest enrollment of freshmen students the school has ever had. The total enrollment, from reservations received so far, is expected to exceed that of any previous year.

The abundance of money in the country may be one factor in producing the increased enrollment. Another undoubtedly is the fact that Harding College has become increasingly better known throughout the nation, and students are entering from states as far distant as Massachusetts, Vermont, California, Florida, Washington, and even from Canada.

But perhaps the most important factor, young people are realizing more and more the value of advanced education. This was amply illustrated in the recent war. College trained men were able to fill places of responsibility and trust in the armed forces and in industrial plants which were beyond the reach of other men. As the war closes and the war industries stop and the armed forces are demobilized, young people will face a competition for jobs which we have not seen since the depression years. Those who manage now to secure advanced training will undoubtedly have a great advantage. It is perhaps this

view of the future which more than anything is inspiring young people to get their college training now.

Placement and diagnostic tests will be given all freshmen students on September 17 and 18. These are for the purpose of advising those beginning their college work about the courses they should take and about the field of work for which they might best prepare.

Registration of upper classmen will be held on September 17 and 18. The registration of freshmen will be completed on September 19.

The opening chapel will be held September 19 at 10:00 a. m. Class work begins September 20 at 8:00 a. m. Visitors and old students are always invited and welcome at this opening chapel service.

On September 21 at 8:00 p.m. is the President's annual reception for faculty members. This is always an enjoyable opportunity for new teachers and old to become acquainted as they enter the year's work together.

On September 22 at 8:00 p. m., the annual faculty-student reception gives opportunity for students and teachers to become acquainted with each other and to lay the foundation for the friendly interest and cooperation which has through the

# New Council Speaks

The new constitution of the Alumni Association, which was adopted in 1944, provided for the creation of an executive council for the purpose of formulating policies and discussing plans for the association.

The policies of the Association, however, are to be representative of the views of the entire body of the alumni. Thus it is most essential that a member of the council be able to keep in contact with each alumnus in his district. This can be accomplished only through the cooperative effort of all concerned.

"How may I help?" you ask. First of all, see to it that your councilman has your correct address and the addresses of any friends who are not receiving the Alumni Bulletin. Then if you are able to do so, make it a point to attend the annual spring meeting of the Association, both for the thrill of meeting old friends, and for the opportunity of having a part in molding the policies of the school through the influence of the Alumni Association. However, if you find it impractical to attend these meetings personally, remember that the council member in your district is your representative, and through your contacts and suggestions to him you still may play an important part in the business transactions of the Association.

## **Proposed Amendment**

In accordance with the procedure for making amendments provided in Article VIII of the Constitution, the proposed amendment printed below, initiated in the regular business meeting during commencement week, is submitted to the Association.

This amendment is made necessary by the fact that the Constitution stated that members of the Alumni Council were to be elected in 1944, but according to the procedure prescribed for their election, no members could be elected before 1945. These were elected the past spring, and this amendment changes the Constitution to approve what was done. Text of the proposed amendment follows:

"AMENDMENT I. Article VI. Paragraph 4, is hereby changed to read as follows: 'In order to institute this executive council, District II and IV shall each elect a member to serve one year and in the spring of 1946 shall elect a member to serve two years. District I and III shall elect in 1945 a member to serve two years. The East Section of District V shall elect in 1945 one member to serve two years. The West Section shall elect in 1945 one member to serve one year and in the spring of 1946 shall elect one member to serve two years.'

This amendment hereby approves the election held in the spring of 1945 as the first election on the basis stated above in this amendment."

Amendments are to be published three months in advance of voting on them. Consequently, ballots will be printed in the fall issue of the Reflector. This amendment involves the correction of a purely technical error; however, we solicit the interest of members in this matter when the ballots are published.
