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

Thanksgiving Speakers Announced

Beginning Sunday, November 25, and continuing through Thursday, the 29th, the annual Thanksgiving lectureship program will be in progress. The program this year is one of the best in recent years. Some of the outstanding preachers and speakers of the brotherhood will be present to deliver the message closest to their hearts. They are all men of great experience and for the most part well known to Christians everywhere.

Brother G. C. Brewer and Brother E. W. McMillan, both from Memphis, are too well known to need any introduction at Harding. Both have been faithful servants of the Lord for many years and have served as ministers of some of the largest congregations of the church in America. Harding is fortunate to be able to present to its visitors these great and inspirational men.

Brother John Allen Hudson, who was for seven years minister for the Southwest congregation in Los Angeles and at one time missionary to Australia and New Zealand, and who is now located with the 49th and Flora congregation in Kansas City, is another speaker of wide experience in preaching the gospel.

Brother John Bannister of Oklahoma City, Brother O. P. Baird of Atlanta, Georgia, and Brother Lowell Davis of Omaha, Nebraska, all former students of Harding College and men of outstanding ability with years of experience in the Lord's service, will return 'this Thanksgiving to be our speakers. Brother Davis is expecting soon to return to China where he was a missionary for many years.

Brother Cecil Hill, a graduate of Abi-

lene Christian College and the minister of the church in Longview, Texas, will be here again this year. Those present last year will remember the splendid lessons Brother Hill gave.

Brother Otis Gatewood of Lubbock, Texas is another of the widely known speakers on the program. He has done great work for the Lord wherever he has gone. He established the church in Salt Lake City against great opposition and now plans to go to Germany with a group of workers to give the gospel of the Prince of Peace to those people. May the Lord bless him and his fellow laborers in that work.

Brother T. H. Etheridge, Dean of Sul Ross State Teachers College, Alpine, Texas, will be new to most of us at Harding. He is an excellent speaker and a faithful Christian. He received his Doctor of Philosophy degree from the University of Texas and has been engaged in educational work for a long time. This experience makes Dr. Etheridge unusually valuable as a lecturer at Harding.

No definite subjects have been assigned. Each speaker is at liberty to speak on any subject that is on his heart. This should make the meeting more inspirational and beneficial to all of us. Plan to be with us and enjoy the good things found here.

Word has been received that two more regional gatherings are being planned. Alumni in Memphis are meeting in the near future. Wade Ruby, '31, Alumni Councilman for District III, and Professor of English at George Pepperdine College, announces that he is planning a Harding meeting in California twice a year.

Benson Speaks to Federal Committee

Dr. George S. Benson spoke before the House Executive Expenditures Committee in Washington, D. C., October 18, on the "Full Employment Bill." Dr. Benson said that he approved the part of the bill that provided for co-operative planning, and that while he was in sympathy with the idea of full employment, he was opposed to some of the proposals contained in the measure. He reported to the committee that his views had the endorsement of officers of the Arkansas Farm Bureau and other organizations.

Benson stated: "I believe that if Congress passed a bill stating that our government has the responsibility of providing a job, for everybody able to work and de-

siring to work, it would be resented by a majority of our citizens. It would be received as a direct, personal insult by every independent, self-reliant individual in this country." He said that the bill would guarantee that even though a man is a lazy, untrustworthy drunkard most of the time, a job would always be waiting for him. Dr. Benson cited the self-reliance of Harding students as proof that this is still the best solution to the problem of finding employment.

Complete government control of production and consumption would finally result, Benson said, if such a measure as the "Full Employment Bill' were adopted.

News Story

OPENING: Students from 31 states and Canada were welcomed by Dr. George S. Benson, president of Harding College, at the opening chapel of the 1945-46 school year on September 19. Other speeches were made by Dr. L. C. Sears, Prof. F. W. Mattox, and Prof. B. F. Rhodes. With more than 450 students enrolled in the various departments of the school, Harding has the largest enrollment in its history.

The annual president's reception for the faculty came Friday afternoon, September 21. Honorable mention was given to the three father-son combinations on the faculty. The following Saturday night the annual faculty-student reception was conducted.

RELIGION: Many Harding students worked in various mission programs and evangelistic efforts during the summer. Under the direction of Dr. Benson and Prof. Mattox, the voluntary class in personal evangelism has outlined a program of personal work for Searcy.

IOURNALISTIC: Under the editorship of Emmett Smith and the business management of Laura Lee Arms, the Bison was enlarged from a four-page weekly to a sixpage weekly. A large press club is assisting them in this effort. An increased variety on the editorial page and better campus coverage is now possible.

Contracts have been let for the 1945-46 Petit Jean. Photographic work by a local photographer is well underway and the cover design has been submitted. Last spring the senior class chose Bessie Mae Ledbetter, editor and Bill Smith, business manager. Other staff appointments were recently made.

DEBATE: With several debaters returning from last year as a nucleus, Dr. Frank Rhodes, is preparing his teams for the various tournaments they will enter. Last year's teams won three consecutive outstanding tournaments; however, some of the men who participated in these wins are not debating this year. The first contest will probably be the Mid-South Tournament, December 7-8.

DRAMATICS: "Smilin' Through" will be the first lyceum of the year, according to an announcement by Miss Vivian Robbins, director. To be produced November 29, this play will be a featured event on the alumni homecoming program. Eta Omega chapter of Alpha Psi Omega plans to assist the Campus Players in presenting the second lyceum.

MUSICAL: Over 165 students are reporting to Mrs. Florence Jewell for choral work. The large chorus meets twice a week and one night each is devoted to men's and women's glee clubs. Preparation is being made for several local programs. William Nations, Orel Herren, Evan Ulrey, and Paul Clark were recently selected for a male quartet. Doris Johnson, Lynn Hefton, Pat Halbert, Virginia Cranford, Mildred Lanier, and Geraldine Young comprise the sextette. Claude Lewis, Bob Collins, James Willett, and Virgil Lawyer are members of a quartet which will sing religious songs in surrounding communities. ATHLETIC: An active intramural program is being conducted by Hugh Rhodes, physical education director. Softball has been completed and touch football is in progress. The senior class was outstanding in both. An enthusiastic faculty team is participating in all the contests. The faculty recently defeated the sophomores in touch football 27-0. R. Beeson, speech on "Struggles of Harding" by L. C. Sears, "Harding Now" by Bill Smith, "A Vision for Harding" by Charles J. Merryman, "Future of Harding" by President George S. At the time of going to press, a large number were expected to attend the dinner. Vote on Proposed Amendment

In accordance with the announcement in the Summer Reflector, a ballot is given below, which you are requested to fill out and mail at once to the Executive Secretary. As explained previously, this amendment is to correct a purely technical error, but we are interested in receiving as many ballots as possible. For convenience text of the proposed amendment is reprinted below. Please mark on your envelope "Ballot" so that it may be opened in harmony with constitutional regulations.

"AMENDMENT I. Article VI. Para graph 4, is hereby changed to read as follows: 'In order to institute this exe-

cutive council, District II and IV shall each elect a member to serve one year and in the spring of 1946 shall elect a member to serve two years. District I and III shall elect in 1945 a member to serve two years. The East Section of District V shall elect in 1945 one member to serve two years. The West Section shall elect in 1945 one member to serve one year and in the spring of 1946 shall elect one member to serve two years.

This amendment hereby approves the election held in the spring of 1945 as the first election on the basis stated above in this amendment."
