

Commencement Program

Since this is the first post-war Commencement, it is hoped that the largest number in all of Harding's history can, and will plan to be here for the homecoming celebration this spring.

Baccalaureate services will be on Sunday evening, May 26, when Brother Batsell Baxter, of Nashville, Tennessee, will preach the sermon. Official alumni activities will begin on Wednesday, May 29, which is designated as "Alumni Day". Chapel services this year will be under the direction of Mrs. Ruby Lowery Stapleton, '26. The whole class of '26 plans to be here to celebrate its twentieth anniversary. A special request is sent to the classes of '31. '36. and '41, to try to do as well.

Wednesday afternoon the usual Varsity-Alumni softball game will be played. The exes plan to take this game this year. Sidney Roper, '45,

said after the game last year, "We'll come back and beat them next year." All of you alumni help make this intention a reality.

At 6 o'clock the Alpha Honor Society will have its annual dinner. An outstanding national personality is expected to speak at that occasion, although no further announcement can be given right now. This dinner is open to all those who care to reserve plates.

In the evening the commencement play, which is "Spring Fever", by Glenn Hughes, will be presented.

Thursday morning, May 30, graduation exercises will be held. Immediately following this is the Alumni Dinner to which all former students are invited. An established feature of this dinner is STRAW-BERRY SHORTCAKE.

"Spring Fever"

"Spring Fever" is not only the most common malady at Harding: it is also the theme of the last lyceum number to be presented in the college auditorium on the night of May 30. The setting of the play is, appropriately enough, a college campus at commencement time. Zoology professors, rich donors, and a few

Annie Mae Alston is Popular Teacher

Well-known on Harding's campus today and loved for her broad, ready smile and never-failing cheerfulness is Miss Annie Mae Alston, teacher of English and literature.

Born November 26, 1917, in Henning, Tennessee, to Mr. and Mrs. Willis Alston, Annie Mae spent her early life amidst the environs of her birthplace.

From 1935 to 1937 she attended David Lipscomb College. She continued her collegiate work at Harding and received her B. A. degree in 1939. Taking advantage of the Library School of George Peabody College, Annie Mae added in 1940 a B. S. degree in Library Science to her attainments. She is also a member of the Harding Chapter of the Alpha Honor Society.

Her pedagogical experience includes three years of public high school teaching at West Memphis, Arkansas, during which time she was also school librarian.

Turning down a position elsewhere which promised a bigger salary, Annie Mae joined Harding's faculty in 1944.

Others of the Alston family have attended Harding. Jack, a brother, spent two years at Harding when the school was at Morrilton, Ark., and a sister, Margaret, served as assistant physical education instructor prior to her graduation in 1940.

Annie Mae's special likes are talking, reading, drinking coffee, and eating hard apples. Her special passions are her mother and daddy.

California Chapter

Summary of Past Events

Events of the year move past the vision of this year's student body in a way that is familiar to all former students, and yet they present new faces and variations that are evernew. During the winter and spring athletic seasons the Senior Class added the basketball title to its other honors, while the Juniors received the crowns in both volleyball and softball. In individual events, Carter Geer won the cross-country race, with Joe Webb and Ambrose Rea second and third; Ray Traxler won the horseshoe-pitching title; and James Ganus again was top man in ping pong.

The chorus has made a number of trips this year. The two longest jaunts were a three-day trip to Tennessee and Mississippi, and a similar excursion to south Arkansas. On the latter journey the group sang to a crowd of about 500 in Texarkana. More recently the chorus has sung at churches in Judsonia, Calico Rock, Brinkley, and Wynne.

Taking them to Little Rock on April 26, Mrs. Florence Jewell presented the singers as an individual unit and in combination with other singing groups of the state at the State Festival of Music Federation Clubs. For their ability and faithfulness during the year, thirty members of the chorus were recently awarded keys.

Under the combined direction of

Mrs. Florence Jewell and Miss Vivian Robbins, an operetta was presented as one of the lyceum numbers. This production was titled "Hearts and Blossoms", and featured Dorothy Brewer, Robert Webb, Gladys O'Neal, Bill Nations, Gladys Walden, Evan Ulrey, Pat Halbert, and Orel Herren.

On April 4 Miss Vivian Robbins took the play, "High Hearts," to Little Rock as Harding's entry in the State Speech Festival. It received a rating of "good". Two days later at the Festival, Pat Benson received a "superior" rating in memorized poetry, and Mildred Lanier was judged "excellent". Bill Smith also received a mark of "excellent" in oratory.

Bill Smith was voted "the outstanding speaker" at the Youth Congress of the Southern Association of Teachers of Speech, held in Atlanta, Georgia. This year Robert Helsten, Ruth Benson, and Al Stroop have been added to the roster of members of Alpha Psi, national dramatic fraternity.

The annual Junior Senior Banquet was served on March 29 at the Rendezvous. An academic theme was carried out in the decorations. On May 1 the Ju Go Ju Club presented their traditional May Day program. Dot Munger was crowned as Queen, with Gladys Walden and Jewell Hanes serving as Maids.
