President's Corner

ANOTHER SCHOOL YEAR HAS BE-GUN and it is good to be back on the

Harding campus. An absence of two years has made me appreciate it more than ever, and it is good to be back in the harness again.

May I spend just a few minutes telling you some of the things we accomplished in 1950-51 and a few of the things we hope to do this year?

We spent more time finding "lost" alumni than in any other activity last year. It was a profitable undertaking. Names in the "active" file were increased from 2400 to 3,167, but there are still many names in the "inactive" file far too many. If you know of a former student who is not receiving the **Alumni News** and other communications from the Alumni Office, why not write his name and address on a card and mail it to us? During the past year many of you helped us find the "lost" and we appreciate your assistance.

The Alumni Office carried on several valuable studies during the year. A survey revealed that a very large per cent (29.5) of Harding graduates have received advanced degrees from 36 colleges and universities in 20 states. There were 140 graduates with Master's degrees; 13 with Doctor of Philosophy degrees; two lawyers; five medical doctors; and two dentists. Graduates of Harding, at the time of the study were employed in 67 different occupations, with 34.4 per cent in the teaching profession; 15.2 per cent housewives; 12.3 per cent ministers; and 3.6 per cent missionaries. Similar studies are planned for former students who did not graduate, so if questionnaires come your way, please fill them out and return them. This information is useful to the college in many ways.

Through your generosity the project to raise money to buy furniture for the Alumni Office was completely successful. You who've been on the campus recently have seen how well your money was spent, and all of you know that you are welcome to make this office your headquarters every time you visit the college. Please come often.

Last year was successful in chapter organization activities. Nine new chapters were set up and officers elected. They are: Wichita, Memphis, Tulsa, Dallas-Fort Worth, Fort Smith, Florence, Birmingham, and Oklahoma City. We hope to do much more of this sort of work this year.

The chapter organizations and many other alumni did a commendable job in directing new students to Harding. Alumni cooperation with the college in student recruitment is one reason why Harding was able to keep up its enrollment at a time when the majority of schools are having decreases of 10 per cent or more. In the college there are 614 students—only one less than last year. Keep up the good work!

Be sure to read the financial report in this issue of the **News.** You will notice that 455 alumni gave a total of \$6,323.83. This is a decided increase over past years and I hope it is the beginning of generous, annual giving to Harding College. Now that the new buildings are becoming a reality all our efforts must go toward making available to Harding the funds needed to operate this fine new plant for maximum service. The responsibility for helping Harding grow and develop rests upon our shoulders as alumni. This is not just a responsibility, but an opportunity for service to Harding and the students attending now; service to Harding and the function and we must be sure that the ideals and goals of Harding College are passed on to our children and our children's children.
