## President's Corner

LET ME EXTEND to each and every one of you a most cordial invitation to attend the lectureship pro-

gram on the campus November 16-19. The theme is "Biblical Prophecy" and a number of capable men will discuss the various aspects of this important subject. An informal get-together for alumni and ex-students will be held in the Emerald Room of Ganus Student Center Thursday morning from 8 to 8:50. For those who are still athletically inclined there will be the traditional alumni-student basketball game in Rhodes Memorial Field House Wednesday, 4:15 p.m.

We are in the midst of what promises to be one of the best school years in the history of Harding. At the college level some 620 students have been enrolled. The freshmen appear to be unusually serious-minded and interested in their school work.

Already on the campus there have been the first threeact play by the Campus Players, "Mr. Pim Passes By," and the first program in the lyceum series, personality sketches by Cornelia Stabler, nationally known monologist. Freedom Forum XIV is now history and portraits for the 1954 PETIT JEAN have been made.

During the fall meeting by the college church, Billy Norris, '35, evangelist for this congregation and also for the meeting, spoke each morning in chapel. It is certainly encouraging to see the students almost fill the large church auditorium each Wednesday evening for the mid-week service. The presence in the graduate school of George Gurganus, '39, and Joe Cannon, '47, both home on leave from evangelistic work in Japan, has stimulated interest in carrying the gospel to foreign conutries.

Many of you may be interested in the new 16-millimeter technicolor film on Harding College-17 minutes in lengththat was filmed last spring showing the new buildings and other facilities on the campus and depicting student life at Harding. Neil B. Cope, '34, wrote the script and directed the shooting of the picture. The premiere showing was given in chapel recently. Alumni chapters or individuals may schedule this film by writing Neil B. Cope, Public Relations Office.

With the major building program completed efforts are being intensified in making the academic program of Harding College the best possible. A restudy of the curriculum is being made and in-service training of the faculty in improved counselling techniques is in progress. Faculty members are continuing their graduate study during the summer and on leaves during the regular year. Under the direction of Annie May Alston, '39, head librarian, the collection and services of the library are rapidly but systematically being developed. Of even greater significance is the constant study and attention being given to implementing the spiritual aims of the college-to maintaining a Christian environment and to teaching each student the Bible as God's revealed will. The administration is deeply conscious of its responsibility in directing these efforts.

The Nominating Committee appointed last spring has submitted its list of nominees which appears elsewhere in the bulletin. Let me urge that each of you submit additional nominations-one for president and two for vicepresident. This may be done any time before February 1. The final ballot will have added to the list submitted by the committee the name of the high person for president and the two high for vice-president.

I have had several letters from alumni stating that they eagerly look forward to receiving each alumni bulletin and reading the whereabouts and activities of classmates and friends. Some are very punctual in supplying us with information regarding changes in address and some send in news reports to be included in the bulletin.
