Alumni dinner attended by 323

The Alumni dinner on June 3 was attended by 323 to climax a day and a half of reunions and activities for alumni returning to the campus. In addition to taking part in the usual alumni programs, class reunion luncheon, alumni chapel, alumni-varsity softball game and alumni dinner, visitors to the campus attended Harding's 35th year celebration and dedication ceremonies for seven new buildings. Commencement exercises added 70 graduates to the Alumni files.

Dr. Carroll Cannon, '39, was master of ceremonies for the class reunion luncheon held in the Banquet Hall of the Rendezvous. Fifty-three members of the '29, '34, '39 and '49 classes were back to retell humorous happenings of bygone years. Jack Smart, '29, took the speaker's stand first to relate incidents from the campus when Harding was at Morrilton. Class groups sat together as much as possible. Individual class lists with present addresses were given those attending. Robbie Jean Ruby and Billy Howell, current students, entertained with musical selections.

Dr. Joseph E. Pryor, '37, and president of the Alumni Association, presided over the Alumni chapel which was held at 3 p.m. on Alumni Day. Jack Smart, '29, was principal speaker and all agreed he could have continued relating incidents for two hours without boring his responsive audience.

October date set for complete survey, Dr. J. W. Sears is preparing forms

Alumni will have an opportunity in October to help improve Harding's services by filling in a questionaire being prepared by Dr. Jack Wood Sears, '40. This questionaire will be mailed to all graduates of Harding College.

"It is proposed to make an objective evaluation of the influence Harding College has exerted upon her students by making a careful study of her products, the Harding graduates," said Dr. Sears, who will direct the survey. He has studied questionaire surveys for several years preparing this particular study.

After the chapel program, alumni met the varsity on the softball field for a disappointingly lop-sided score. The varsity represented the best of this year and the alumni represented some of the best of many years gone by. "That was the trouble," said Dr. Cliff Ganus, '47, "Too many years."

At the Alumni dinner immediately following commencement exercises the 1954 graduates and two honorary graduates were welcomed to the alumni ranks. The two becoming honorary alumni were Honorable Wilbur Mills, congressman and commencement speaker, and Dr. C. L. Ganus, Sr., president of the Board of Trustees. President Pryor stepped down from the presiding chair to present the new graduates. He was their class sponsor. Mrs. E. G. Baggett, '50, first vice-president, welcomed the new alumni.

New officers were announced by the committee appointed to count the ballots. Thednal Garner, '43, chairman, read the report. New officers are Dr. Joseph E. Pryor, '37, (Searcy) president, Charles Pitner, '37, (Searcy), Ordis Copeland, '46, (Little Rock) and Emmett Smith, '46, (Paragould) vicepresidents. A. S. Croom, Harding business manager, will continue as treasurer ex-officio.

Dr. George S. Benson, '25, college president, gave a short talk on the need for alumni to support Harding. Dr. C. L. Ganus, Sr., '54, made brief comments.

Kenneth Davis, '42, sang two selections accompanied by Glenn Fulbright.

The traditional strawberry shortcake closed the 1954 Alumni dinner. The survey will cover four main objectives: (1) What alumni are like, (2) What problems alumni encountered when they left Harding, (3) How Harding could have helped them more, and (4) How Harding graduates compare with those from other schools.

The survey will be handled on an impersonal basis. The questionaire will be unsigned. Included will be a personal data sheet to be handled separately from the questionaire. This data is for the Alumni office files and will be signed. There will be included two return envelopes, one for the questionaire and one for the personal data sheet.

Further explanations concerning the questionaire will be sent graduates in October, when the survey will be made. If all the questionaires are not returned within a month of the first mailing, reminders will be sent. All graduates are urged to complete the questionaires and return them at the first mailing.

Dr. Sears explained: "This is an opportunity to do a great service to Harding College and those she serves. Although Harding was admitted to the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools in 1954, thereby receiving the stamp of approval of this great accrediting association upon its academic program, its physical plant and its educational facilities, the college looks upon such achievement as only a stepping-stone to greater service. It is expected that from the information of this survey the administration and faculty will be able to gain some indication of the direction the college should take in its future development. A full report of the study will be mailed to each graduate."

President's Corner

As I sit down to write this quarterly message for the Alumni Bulletin, a

heavy cloud is moving in from the southwest which I hope will bring rain to many of you as well as to us here in Searcy. Within the last two weeks we have had three days in which the thermometer rose above 110 degrees Fahrenheit. However, in 1930 and 1936 there were hotter days here in Arkansas.

Since the word thermometer has been mentioned, it reminds me of the use that is made of thermometers or models of thermometers in civic drives. If it were possible for us to construct a thermometer indicating the enthusiasm that the alumni of Harding have for their Alma Mater, would the indicator reach nearly to the boiling point or would it be just barely above the freezing point? Or suppose we should construct a thermometer indicating your interest in Christian education, where would the indicator be? It is really encouraging to see the zeal that many of you have for Christian education and the loyalty and devotion you manifest toward your Alma Mater.

Science Not Enough

Today we are living in what I believe to be the greatest age so far in the history of man. Too often we look only at the dark clouds - the threat of atomic and thermonuclear war, the evidence of moral and spiritual collapse in some segments of society and the possibility of economic collapse - and fail to see the brilliant sun that shines so bright in many places. The possibilities are so great today and the means for achieving these possibilities are also great. Men are turning away from the mechanistic philosophy of the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries because they have seen that even though science has unlocked the door to many of the secrets of the universe and is turning the key in still other locks, science cannot tell man how to use the great forces that have been unleashed nor how to live life so that it has meaning and purpose. But Christ can give meaning and purpose to life and His philosophy and example show us how we ought to use whatever we have regardless of how great or how small it may be.

Christian Education Great Influence

This is where Christian education and Harding College enter the story. Since I enrolled as a freshman in the fall of 1933, I have been very closely associated with Harding as a student, a teacher in preparation or a teacher. I have seen hundreds of students whose lives have been enriched by the concept of Christian service which they developed here. Graduates by the score have made outstanding records in leading graduate and professional schools of the nation meanwhile strengthening the cause of Christ where they were. Almost a hundred alumni are teaching in Christian colleges, high schools and elementary schools and a large number are engaged in preaching the gospel at home and abroad. Also of great significance is the grass roots leadership that alumni have given the church and the community where they reside.

Harding's Main Purpose

The central objective that Harding has had since her beginning remains the central objective. It is to provide a college education in a Christian environment where each student will study the Bible along with the regular liberal arts courses. The examples in living that the teachers set before the students are a powerful influence and the many sterling Christian characters in the faculty present a mighty voice for righteousness. I am looking forward to the great days ahead when I believe that we shall do an even better job in achieving our purpose. There will always be problems to solve and difficulties to overcome, but with the dedication of the faculty to the objectives of Harding College and the continued improvement in the quality of work being done, I am optimistic for the future.

In closing let me express my appreciation for the privilege of serving you two more years.
