Class of '30 to celebrate twenty-fifth anniversary

On Alumni Day this year the class of 1930 will have the place of honor as they celebrate their twenty-fifth anniversary. This class will have charge of the Alumni Chapel at 10:00 with Vice-President J. D. Fenn serving as chairman.

The class dates back to Morrilton days when the students lived in Jenny Hill Hall and Scroggin Hall and used the two benches under the vine covered trellis near the irregularly shaped fishpond on the west side of the campus.

In checking through the Petit Jean of this year, we found that Mrs. J. O. Garrett sponsored the class of '30 and the group dedicated their year book to George W. Kieffer. George Kieffer, Jr., is now a junior at Harding.

President's Corner

GREETINGS to alumni everywhere! It is a wonderful spring day here in Searcy and the Harding campus is really beautiful. Perhaps many of you will have feel-

ings of nostalgia as you reflect upon your days at Harding in the years gone by. Another school year is rapidly drawing to a close—As I write this, only two weeks of regular class work remain—then final examinations, Commencement and ALUMNI DAY.

In many ways this has been an outstanding year. The student body has been of unusually high quality and serious purpose. I have observed the students in the classroom, on the athletic field, on club outings, in extra-curricula activities, in the give and take of campus life, and in periods of worship to God. In all of these activities and relationships I would have to give a rating of excellent.

We are expecting a large group of alumni to be on the campus, June 1, to participate in the activities planned for this occasion—alumni chapel, reunions of the classes of 1925, 1930, 1935, 1940, 1945 and 1950, the annual alumni-varsity softball game, a midweek worship program at the college church, and a musical program later in the evening. The class of 1930 will be in charge of chapel, and J. D. Fenn is planning the program. On the following day will be the college commencement exercises and the annual alumni business meeting and luncheon. If at all possible, be here.

Plans for the expansion program at Harding are proceeding according to schedule. These plans call this coming year for a second year of graduate work in Bible and religious education leading to the degree of Master of Religious Education and a year of graduate work in education and supporting fields leading to the degree of Master of Teaching. Dr. Benson is actively engaged in a campaign to raise funds from industry, and he reports the campaign is proceeding according to plan. Dr. W. B. West, Jr., has just begun a financial campaign among members of the church in behalf of the expansion in the offerings in Bible and religious education, and he reports enthusiastic support.

In this connection, let me say that alumni can play a very vital role on behalf of their Alma Mater. People who are able to make appreciable contributions for educational purposes are interested not only in the program of a given institution but also in the support that the alumni and clientele give it. Most Harding alumni are rendering valuable service to fields where financial remuneration is moderate and, therefore, are unable to make sizeable gifts to their Alma Mater. However, a number of small gifts make an appreciable sum and, too, a large percentage of alumni contributors makes it easier for Dr. Benson and cehers to solicit financial aid from those who can give appreciable amounts. So if you have not yet made your contribution to the Alumni Fund this year, please do so now before you forget it.

In closing, I want to express appreciation for the excellent work which Jo Connell has rendered the Alumni Association as Executive Secretary. She has worked with zeal, enthusiasm, and devotion. I regret that she has decided to resign, but her love for teaching first-grade youngsters was too strong. During the current semester while Dr. F. W. Mattox has been on leave, Jo has been rendering double service to Harding by taking over his duties in connection with student recruitment. Also I want to express appreciation to Kay England who has served as secretary to the Alumni Office in a most efficient manner this year while her husband completed his senior year at Harding.

I am hoping that you can be on the Harding campus June 1 and 2, but if that is impossible, my best wishes are herewith extended for a most pleasant and profitable summer. Write the Alumni Office a card or letter, and let us know what you are now doing.
