Evan Ulrey, professor of speech and head of the department at Harding College, took over as president of the Alumni Association at the group's annual business meeting graduation day.

As his first official act he presented a present from the Association to retiring president Joseph E. Pryor, professor of physical science and head of the department. Pryor served three successive terms.

Other officers installed were vice presidents, Jimmy Allen (BA'52) of Magnolia, Norman Hughes (BS'54) of Atlanta, Ga., and Wyatt Sawyer (BA'45) of Houston, Tex.

An estimated 350 alumni attended the annual two-day get-together beginning with the Alumni Chapel in the College Auditorium on Wednesday, May 28, and terminating with the Alumni Luncheon and annual business meeting in the College Dining Hall following graduation on Thursday.

The chapel program honored the class of '33, which was celebrating its 25th anniversary. Dr. Joe Pryor (BA, BS '37), retiring president of the Alumni Association, introduced E. C. Price, who emceed the program. Other members of the class were Alton Hollis, Mrs. Geraldine Drake Kissire, and Mrs. Beulah Rogers Evans.

Members of all the five-year classes held a joint luncheon at Roberson's Rendezvous at noon. Seventy-four alumni representing the classes of '28, '33, '38, '43, '48 and '53 attended the luncheon. In the annual Alumni-Varsity softball game that ofternoon the students eked out another victory over the old men.

Following graduation on Thursday, the Alumni Luncheon and annual business meeting were held with Pryor presiding. The invocation was given by Dr. Edwin Hughes (BA '37), a past president of the Association, and the Women's Ensemble, composed of Patsy Parker (BA '58), Carolyn Hightower, Marilyn Davis, Charlene Harris, Delia Beth Stephenson, Betty Clark, and Lois Robertson, sang three numbers.

Dean of Students James H. Atkinson, senior class sponsor, presented the undergraduate class of 1958 for induction into the Association, and Dr. Clifton L. Ganus (BA '43), chairman of the graduate council, presented the graduate class.

Executive-secretary Buford Tucker gave a brief report on alumni activity during the current year. Bill Teague, vice president in charge of development, explained the PAY FOR A DAY plan. Brief remarks were made by Dr. George S. Benson (BA '25) and Pryor.

Clifford Cronin, chairman of the ballot-counting committee, reported the results of the election. Assisting Cronin on the committee were Charles Brooks (BA'48) and Bob Anderson (BA '53).

Upon being installed as the new president, Ulrey spoke briefly on the objectives and work of the Association. Eddie Baggett (BA '50) led the audience in singing the Alma Mater and Dr. Adrian Formby ('44) pronounced the benediction. Attendance at the luncheon was 290.

President's Corner

Another Alumni Day has come and gone. One hundred thirty-eight were added to the Association of

Harding's more than seven thousand graduates and ex-students. These figures when compared with the number of graduates (measured in thousands and tens of thousands) of larger schools are not impressive. However the effectiveness of a school is not ultimately determined by the number of her graduates. By what then? By their quality. By the "one in a thousand or million" who serves in a unique capacity or serves uniquely well in an "ordinary" capacity.

If each Harding graduate is "one in a thousand" in respect to some worthwhile service, we have a distinguished alumni, distinguished not because we seek distinction for itself alone but because we are effective in our work.

Two basic requirements for this kind of service are, first, to put the proper value on selflessness; and, second, to acquire the necessary tools for the job which you want to do. Did your Alma Mater help you to find the "eternal values" and to acquire the tools for making a living? Yes? No? To some extent?

Doubtless no two answers to these questions will be alike, as no two people entering college are identical. They come from different backgrounds, different attitudes, different goals; thus the product of their effort also is different. Why am I a teacher, engineer, manufacturer, preacher, housewife, farmer, doctor? Did I choose service first, and is service my strongest motive. Or did I choose my vocation because it promises more money, more power, or more personal prestige, while the element of service plays second or third or is ruled out entirely?

What about the tools of service? Tools are necessary. Yet, no one can just hand them to us — they can tell where to find them or how to make them; but we must do the rest. Did I acquire the right ones at the right time?

If you are disappointed in either your choice of life work or with your tools, whose fault is it? Your parents'? Yours? Your college's? Does it now matter whose fault it may have been? In any case you as an alumnus of Harding College can help your Alma Mater to do her part more effectively in helping students to make the best choices. How? By improving the job she tries to do in developing in her students the values and helping them acquire the tools which, in whatever occupation they earn their living, will make of them "the greatest" servants. Participate in alumni affairs. It is your privilege to help make Harding the college to which you will want to send your children.

It is a privilege to serve as your alumni president. Thank you for the opportunity. I hope that all working together we can increase the effectiveness of the alumni in serving Harding College.



Rees began work immediately with the training school at Onicha Ngwa, where some 56 natives are preparing to preach. He also will work with congregations in Iboland, strengthening the established ones and helping to start new ones.

A native of Florence, Ala., where he was the first graduate of Mars Hill Bible School, Bryant attended Freed - Hardeman College before transferring to Harding. While in school he served as business manager of the Bison and vice president of his senior class and was selected to Who's Who in American Universities and Colleges.

He has worked with the church in Morrilton and Culbertson Heights in Oklahoma City, Okla. Last summer he toured the South, speaking in the interest of the Nigerian work and raising travel expenses.

Patti is the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. F. W. Mattox, formerly of the Harding College faculty and now at Lubbock Christian College, where Mattox is president.
