David Underwood, President of the Memphis Chapter, presided at the dinner which was prepared by the staff of the Harding Academy Cafeteria.

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
















CHORUS DRAWS CROWDS IN FIVE STATES

The spring tour of the A Cappella Chorus extended 1500 miles into five states, with appearances at Clarksdale, Vicksburg and Jackson, Miss., New Orleans, La., Pensacola, Fla., Mobile, Montgomery, Tuscaloosa, Huntsville, Decatur, Tuscumbia and Florence, Ala., and Memphis, Tenn.

Extending from March 31 to April 10, the trip included opportunities for sight-seeing, recreation and visits to historical shrines. Christian hospitality was abundant everywhere, so some naturally brought home evidence of plenty of southern fried chicken, baked ham, pecan pies, fluffy cocoanut cake and other irresistable southern goodies.

The chorus gave 18 performances, including one TV program, and were received with enthusiasm by a total of 7000 people who came out to greet them.

In every audience alumni were giving their support to the chorus and expressing keen interest in activities of Harding. Some brought prospective students from other places. Many of the hospitable homes were those of Harding alumni who were anxious to be with today's Harding students for even a short while.

Progress of the church was evident everywhere the chorus appeared. Nearly every place had a new or enlarged building as tangible evidence of growth.

Interest in Christian education was quite evident. Appearances at Christian schools at New Orleans, Montgomery and Florence revealed a growth in interest at all academic levels.

In commenting on this phase, Buford Tucker, alumni executive secretary who accompanied the group, said, "One is made glad to be a part of a Christian institution of higher learning, knowing that those who go out from the school are made stronger in the faith for having attended and that they are leaving far better equipped to meet the problems of life."

ALUMNUS FEATURED IN ARKANSAS GAZETTE

F. D. Thomas (BS'47), who is currently teaching physical science at Jacksonville High Shcool, was featured recently in one of Ernie Dean's Arkansas Traveler columns in the Arkansas Gazette.

The thing that attracted Dean's attention to Thomas was the fact that he is a spelunker — one who explores caves and studies their contents.

Thomas, who is not married, is a native of Searcy and has quite a collection of Indian objects at the home of his mother. He has hunted for such things since he was a boy, and in spite of the size of his collection, he is sure he has given away as much as he has kept.

Explored Many Caves

He has been in most of the known caves of Arkansas and Missouri and has been in two of the nation's most famous — Mammoth Cave of Kentucky and Carlsbad Caverns of New Mexico. His interest goes far beyond simple curiosity and into the realm of historical evidence of his many underground findings.

The discovery that has topped all others for thrills to date is a huge clay bowl he found in a large cave in the Arkansas Ozarks at a location he is keeping secret to avoid attracting curiosity hunters. The bowl, after careful cleaning, was found to be in almost perfect condition. It has not been submitted to experts in Indian pottery yet but Thomas believes it to be Osage work.

Many Indian Tools

In addition to the bowl, he has also turned up a pounding stone and a grinding stone nearby. Also among findings in the same cave, which he is exploring with full permission of the owner, are stone awls and scraping tools.

Thomas is highly enthusiastic about the scenic beauty of the mountains of Arkansas and takes his students on frequent tours to give them first hand experience they would not otherwise get. His love of the beauties of nature naturally takes him into other areas — particularly the areas that only the avid naturalists search for, in short, the difficult places.

He is now working on a master's degree in science at the University of Arkansas — that is when he can leave his explorations and his teaching,


