Alumni Day, Graduation Bring Many Activities

Alumni Day

Set aside May 29-30 for Harding and keep this appointment with your classmates. Wednesday, May 29, is Alumni Day. Chapel will be at 10 a.m. and Clifford Cronin will be chairman. He is a member of the class of '38 who will celebrate their twenty-fifth anniversary this year. Clifford is coming from a great distance at considerable sacrific feeling that is the least he can do for his class anniversary.

There are good reasons why we should achieve a much broader participation of alumni in the present effort than ever before.

First, it would show that the people who know Harding best are proud of their alma mater and are willing to put their money where their mouth is. Any college needs this kind of support.

Second, the confidence shown in the college by its alumni would demonstrate to other interested givers (foundations, industries, philanthropists) that the college is worthy of their support. "Outside" money is increasingly difficult to get unless it can be demonstrated that the alumni are doing their share, according to their ability.

Third, it would help Harding to increase the percentage of alumni givers to the point that we could win a \$5,000 prize given annually by the U. S. Steel Company for the largest increase in percentage of alumni giving to their institution.

Fourth, it would do us good as individuals to begin to share our prosperity with the school that helped us to get our start . . . For where your treasure is there shall your heart be also.

In addition to the reasons mentioned above, each of us has other bases for making this a 100% participation program. Whatever your reasons may be the goal is one which will enrich the future of Christian education.

Morris Plans Work in Germany

Robert L. Morris ('52) and his wife, the former Barbara Cash (BS'49) and their three sons will leave June 13 to do mission work in Karlsruhe, Germany. The Brainerd Church of Christ in Chattanooga, Tenn. will furnish \$200 of the family's monthly support. He is still seeking the needed balance and also several hundred dollars toward his travel fund goal.

Graduation Speakers Named

The graduating class of '63 has honored another alumnus and faculty member, Dr. Clark Stevens (BA '49), by inviting him to give the baccalaureate address. On a year leave of absence, Dr. Clark is doing post doctoral research in marine biology at the University of Miami. Senator John McClellan, senior senator from Arkansas, will give the commencement address. Well known for his work as chairman of the committee investigating corruption and crime in both labor and management, he is respected and honored as few others in public life.

Twenty-two Hold Ph.D.'s

A casual look at the Harding faculty will reveal a high degree of excellence among its members. Out of seventy-four faculty members listed for 1962-63, fortytwo are Harding graduates. Of the sixtynine who have masters degrees or above, forty are Harding graduates. Twenty-two of the seventy-four have doctors degrees, and eleven of these are Harding graduates. Twenty-two of those holding the masters degree have taken at least a year's graduate work beyond the masters.

Ninety-three percent of the faculty have at least masters and 30 percent hold doctors degrees. With at least five of the current faculty nearing completion of requirements for doctors degrees and with the addition of three Ph.D. men for 1963-64, Harding's faculty will continue to excel. Add to this academic strength a strong Christian influence, and one begins to understand why the name of Harding stands identified with the best in higher education.


Bill Lynn proposed that the Memphis Chapter attempt to enlist the 100 percent support of Memphis alumni for the Greater Harding Program.
