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Dr. R. T. Clark, Alumni Vice President, Points Out the Merits of Harding As a Christian School

A little over one year has past now since my family and I made the good decision to return to Harding College

as an addition to the staff. Until that time, my wife (Charline Bergner Clark) and I had been alumni like all the rest of you scattered throughout the United States with just a trickle or two of news reaching us about the curent status of

our Alma Mater. We had not actually had close, first-hand, contact with our college except for Alumni Bulletins in over 25 years. We had managed to stay in the academic field since our graduation from Harding and did know that the school had been quite successful in keeping up with the developments in education. Therefore, we were almost prepared when our son, Robert, came home from his high school in Norman, Oklahoma one day and announced that he had decided to enroll at Harding College. This came as a mild shock to us because, like so many other boys, he had received his share of scholarship offers from various universities interested in his potential as an athlete. Upon this announcement I set out as any other college administrator to find out why there should be such an attraction at Harding College. Some of you will face this sort of situation one of these days and might be interested in some of the things that would immediately come to your attention should you try to compare your former Alma Mater with any other educational institution with which you may have had contact since your graduation.

In the first place, the student body is one of the best academically, morally, and socially of which I have had contact. Two years ago it was my privilege to select and teach honor students under a Massachusetts Institute of Technology academic plan of excellence. I have found at Harding College the same percentage of top academic students as those I had previously hand-picked under the MIT program. To illustrate, in just one field of science alone last year, we had three students upon graduation who received graduate scholarships of more than \$2,200 per year plus all school expenses to pursue their studies toward their doctorate degrees. A couple of large mid-western universities have gone as far as to tell us that standing offers of scholarships are available to Harding students in the sciences who would like to have scholarships in order to continue their advanced studies. One of our students who is just a junior has been approached by universities toward graduate studies with large scholarship offers after he graduates. This situation holds not only for the sciences but for other departments at the college. Harding will always continue to maintain an excellent teacher-student ratio-one in which the top teaching professors start out with the freshmen students and follow them on through to their graduation.

In order for private colleges to survive in future competition between academic institutions, a long range plan of de-

velopmental education must be followed that will match in excellence anything that the large universities can offer. If this can be done, the small private college can not only survive but will be looked upon with considerable favor by universities that are already too crowded. Also, a progressive private school can keep top-rated teachers instead of having their better staff members leave for other places. Harding College has foreseen all of this and has taken immediate steps to meet the challenge facing them in the future. Perhaps the biggest hurdle to reach for a college is to initiate a research program comparable to that of the university. From an academic and technical standpoint, research is a must. Without the research program. young Ph.D. teachers will not accept positions in our colleges but will go to large institutions that will allow them time to carry on research and teaching. Without our young teachers coming in to replace the professors that retire, our colleges could only expect academic trouble ahead. Harding College has not only foreseen this problem but has done something about it. We have over \$150,000 worth of specialized equipment in the areas of biophysics, biochemistry, physiology, and physical education that will more than match any large university in the South. The equipment is such that the University of Arkansas at Favetteville plans to bring a class of graduate students to Harding College to take advantage of our facilities by their own instructors. This equipment not only is available in our research program but is also set aside for demonstrations and teaching to our own undergraduate students who are pointing toward professional careers.

An important item connected with our research is that Harding has the prestige of support at the national level through the National Institutes of Health. The results of the research accomplished at Harding College has already been presented before two National Society meetings and one International Meeting in Tokyo, Japan. We have the cooperative support of the Medical School at the University of Arkansas and University of Oklahoma Medical School. We have had as many as 11 distinguished visitors from California who have come to the campus at Searcy specifically to be subjects in our research on problems in aging. This particular research problem has allowed us to get our foot in the door, and now we have had on-site visitors from the Aerospace Center in San Antonio who are considering a reseach project in anti-motion sickness drugs for use in space flight that will be carried out on a cooperative basis between Harding College and the Department of Pharmacology, University of Arkansas Medical School. Then, this month we will have a visit from the National Aeronautics Space Agency at Houston, Texas in relation to the research in physical fitness for space flight.

In other areas of interest, research projects are being initiated in fresh water biology, embryology, and microbiology. The departments of English, music and speech are preparing projects in research and hope to get started in the near future. What does all this indicate? It means that our staff members can carry on their work at Harding College on an equal basis with any university, a going research program will enrich the teaching to the students, increase the prestige of the college, enable us to obtain and keep top-flight instructors, and train our undergraduate students for careers ahead. We even use our top undergraduate students in research, thereby training them in every possible way for competition in the business world.

Probably the most important field of development that I have found at Harding College has been that of the moral and social nature. It seems to me that the students here in the four years gradually develop the personality that

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will allow them to take a well-respected place in any community. A good college academic education is of very little value if the student goes out into the world with an unstable, narrow attitude toward life in general. As far as I am concerned, a graduate of Harding College has just about all of the basic principles that an employer looks for in their employees.

The above points are some of the things that I have found since becoming a staff member of Harding College. My family and I are happy to be a member of the staff because we know that we are a part of an institution that every alumni can point to with pride. I cannot begin to tell you all the good points about the school in just an editorial. Give me an hour's opportunity on a personal basis and I will be glad to expand in several more directions.

Did you know that to meet a highly technical requirement such as even a research program requires backing from alumni? Even one dollar contribution from alumni is worth a tremendous amount in all of our efforts to gain national support. The reason for this is that most foundations and other agencies hesitate to help any school that does not have alumni support. In other words, if 85% of our alumni would just write us a letter with just a small contribution, we would have one of our greatest assets toward knocking on a door of a foundation for support on a large scale. In any institution, the important point is the number of alumni backers that are interested in the college. If you want to help us out in our efforts to keep Christian education on a firm basis, please drop us a note of encouragement and we can all generate a little more enthusiasm toward the problems ahead.
