Is Harding gaining her long-range objectives? We have heard for years the claim that we are pursuing excellence in all areas, academic, spiritual, etc.

I believe our alumni reveal that such goals are being attained. Our recent lectureship produced evidence of the fine spiritual training at Harding. We had lectures on nearly every phase of Christian living. Those who presented the lessons did their job well. The men in science gave their lectures from a background of scholarly research done at some of the most widely recognized universities in America.

Those who spoke on various problems facing our nation were men and women who work in the areas of the problem being discussed. In no sense aid those who attended go home feeling they had been exposed to a vast mass of "pooled ignorance."

When representatives from Harding such as President Cliff Ganus, Dr. Joe Pryor, Jimmy Allen, and others of us make speeches about Harding, we reserve a good portion of our time just to inform people on the latest accomplishments of the students and faculty. The All-American yearbooks, the winning finance team, the overseas trips of the music and dramatic groups, athletic teams that rank nationally, winners in debate and public address, winners of scholarships and fellowships; all reveal that we are succeeding in attaining the goals of excellence set for Harding many years ago.


In recognition of the achievements made, the college is accredited by a superior accrediting organization, has received the rating of being one of the best teacher certification schools in our land, and is now recognized as superior by many learned societies.

A few weeks ago, a young man applied for entrance for the coming spring semester as a transfer student. He had consulted the head of a medical school in a neighboring state and had been told, "You need to transfer to Harding to finish your pre-med program to be assured of gaining entrance to our medical school."

A young man at Harding was thinking of entering a large university to gain his law degree. Somehow he felt that if he changed to another undergraduate institution his chances of getting into that large university later would be enhanced. The head of the law school surprised him by saying, "No, you stay at Harding and gain your degree in political science. This will better prepare you for our program than to change to the school you have in mind."

What about the future? Evidence indicates we will continue to achieve superior records. For example, we now require that all entering freshmen take the ACT tests. In November 572 students took the test and named Harding as their first, second, or third choice. One hundred sixty-three of the cards revealed scores of over 100 points on the composite. We grant academic scholarships to those who score this high and who have 'B' average high school transcripts. This is ample evidence of the fine academic potential of our incoming students.

Yes, I am optimistic as I look to the future. We continue to set high standards and goals hard to achieve. But, we meet our standards and achieve our goals. I feel sure God is with us. We need your prayers and your support.

Ronnie Brown who recently set a school record scoring 47 points in the Bisons' 97-93 victory over Arkansas Tech is also leading the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference with a 21.3 points per game scoring average. He is the only player in the conference with a game average above 20 points.

The 6-ft. Pocahontas sophomore has scored 384 points this year — 139 field goals and 106 free throws. He is the fastest man on the squad and plays the corner spot.


