## 'Preacher' Roe ('39) in Arkansas Hall of Fame

Elwin "Preacher" Roe, a student at Harding from 1935 to 1938, was inducted into Arkansas' sports Hall of Fame at the annual January meet.

Before coming to Harding, Elwin attended Viola High School where he starred in both basketball and baseball. At Harding, Roe was an avid sports participant. For three years he was named to the All-AIC baseball squad. He also received honorable mention All-AIC on the cage squad.

Signing with the St. Louis Cardinals, Roe gave up college. He pitched at Rochester in '39 and '40 and had 7-4 and 5-8 seasons respectively. Pittsburg latched on to the lefty ace and he had 13-11 and 14-13 seasons with the Pirates before playing with the Brooklyn Dodgers.

At Brooklyn "Preacher" had the best season of his career. In 1950 he had a 19-11 record and in 1951 he was named top pitcher in the national league with a 22-3 mark,

Roe, with a lifetime record of 127-84, retired in 1954 after winning eleven in two consecutive seasons. He appeared in three world series with the Dodgers, in '49, '52 and '53.

Now a supermarket owner "Preacher" lives in West Plains, Mo. He was inducted with two others, Frank Broyles, Arkansas football coach and Tommy Freeman, world welter weight boxing champion in 1931.

## **Alumna Finds Peace Corps Interesting**

**Evelyn McLaury**, (BA'61), a returned Peace Corps Volunteer, has a large collection of pictures to help her remember her two years in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia. These photos, as well as a variety of native artifacts, aid Evelyn in relating her experiences to Americans, including her sixth grade students in Commerce City, Colorado, a suburb of Denver.

Evelyn taught at the Teacher Training Institute of Addis Ababa. Not more than ten per cent of Ethiopia's population has the opportunity to attend school, so the Institute trains native teachers to help alleviate the teacher shortage. The students at the Institute were of the grade equivalent to American eleventh and twelfth grade high school students, but their ages ranged from 18 to 30. Of 500 students. only 24 were girls. They were taught by a staff composed of Peace Corps Volunteers, British, Indian, and Ethiopian teachers, which gave them diversified (and sometimes conflicting) viewpoints on teaching. After two years of training, the trainees were sent to the remote villages of the provinces where they often had no books. supplies, or modern facilities. An added problem is the existence of 70 dialects, and the children might not know either the official language, Amharic, nor the second language, English.

Main cultural differences were noticed by Evelyn and the other Americans. For example, the Ethiopian calendar is seven years behind ours. It has thirteen months, twelve of which have thirty days each; the last has five days except in leap year, when it has six.

Food is always interesting, and Evelyn enjoyed Ethiopia's national food, injura and wat. It is eaten by dipping pieces of injura, a large bread-like pancake, into the wat. The wat is a mixture of meat, lentils, or vegetables, seasoned with 27 spices.

Religious holidays are a colorful part of Ethiopian life. At one time the Coptic church was strong enough that few Moslems were in Ethiopia, though most of Africa was predominately Moslem, Now, Moslems and members of other religious groups are found in Ethiopia. The state religion is still Coptic, a mixture of Judaism, Christianity, and Paganism. Emperor Haile Selassie I (his name means "the power of the Trinity") is considered to be the head of the church. He bears the title "elect of God, defender of the faith, direct descendant of King Solomon and the Queen of Sheba." He also considers himself the "father and unifier of Africa." Africa Hall, Haile Selassie's gift to the continent, is the meeting place of the Organization of African Unity. It is a modern, elaborate structure in Addis Ababa.

During her stay in Ethiopia, Evelyn was able to travel down the Eastern Coast of Africa. She visited and photographed areas of South and East Africa, including Victoria Falls, on the Rhodesian border. She visited missions in Salisbury and Bulawayo, Rhodesia, Johannesburg and Capetown, South Africa, and Lusaka and Ndola, Zambia. She visited **Ed Crookshank**, Harding Alumnus, in Zambia. On her way back to the states, she visited a few European countries, including Germany, where she visited **Irene Johnson**, former Harding teacher.

Evelyn's travels convinced her that people going overseas should go beyond "tourism" or they will miss a valuable education.

## **Fire Hits Dormitory at Morrilton**

A ravaging fire swept a girls' dormitory on the Southern Christian Home campus at Morrilton December 20. The building was termed a total loss with \$60,000 to \$75,000 in estimated loss, according to Olen Fullerton, superintendent. No one was injured.

The fire was discovered by a 14-year-old resident of Southern Christian Home when he went to the dorm to take a gift to his sister. The 16 girls had gone downtown with their housemother, Mrs. Lummie Greer, and her three children, to do their holiday shopping. No one was in the building when the fire started.

Fullerton said some of the furniture in the building was made of metal and could possibly be salvaged. Some of the girls had clothes in the laundry at the time, also. Otherwise nothing was recovered. Morrilton firemen battled the blaze about two hours.

The home, which serves 170 children, resumed normal schedule despite the tragedy. Immediate help came from Morrilton with many residents offering to house the girls. However, there was sufficient space on the campus to make room for the children.

The Morrilton Kiwanis Club raised \$1,000 during its noon luncheon meeting before the flames were quenched. The chorus from the home presented the program on schedule, although two chorus members were residents of the burning dorm.

## McInteer Sermons Chosen For Book

A volume in the "Great Preachers of Today" series has recently been published by the Biblical Research Press in Abilene, Tex. It is "Sermons of Jim Bill McInteer." McInteer (BA'42) is minister of the West End Church of Christ in Nashville, Tenn.

Included are 30 of McInteer's sermons, with titles such as "'B' Grade Is Not So Bad," "The Strangest Five Verses in the Bible," "God's Latest Manuscript," "Asleep at the Top of the Mast," "By the Waters of Beerlahairok," and "Jesus' Autobiography."

McInteer is noted for his journalistic activities and for his contributions to education as well as for his ministry. He serves on the editorial council of "20th Century Christian" magazine and is business manager for "20th Century Christian" and "Power for Today." He is an editor for the Christian Family Book Club and is author of Tiny Tots Bible Reader which has sold more than 10,000 copies.

McInteer is a member of Harding's Board of Trustees and serves on the advisory board of Pepperdine College, He received the Distinguished Alumnus Award in 1964 from Harding. He has been preaching for the West End congregation in Nashville for the last eight years.
