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
A Thousand Days Is A Long Time





Harding College

is a senior liberal arts institution founded in 1924. It is governed by a Board of Trustees who are members of the Church of Christ, but students of all faiths and races are represented in the student body. As a private college, Harding derives its funds from tuition, alumni, friends, corporations, foundations and other sources.

Harding's campus covers more than 100 acres a few blocks from downtown Searcy, a progressive community of almost 10,000 in East Central Arkansas. Located 50 miles northeast of Little Rock, Searcy is the seat of White County, an agricultural area whose economy has become diversified in recent years with the acquisition of several industries.


Twenty-nine major buildings house the college's administrative, teaching, research, recreational and student facilities. All but five of the major red brick structures have been constructed since 1950, the three most recent being two airconditioned dormitories and a \$1.3 million science building. The plant is valued at \$15.5 million.






Of course, the college is more than land and buildings. It is a student body of 1,900. It is a faculty of about 100. It also is a staff of more than 300.

Coming from 48 states and 9 foreign countries, Harding's students live in seven campus dormitories and eat in two cafeterias. Nearly all of them are members of social clubs, which are not nationally affiliated. As it is the college's policy to make education available to as many qualified students as possible, more than 1,300 receive some form of financial aid, whether it be scholarships, loans, grants or work on campus.







A faculty made up of experienced scholars and aspiring young instructors lends a healthy balance to the academic leadership of the college. While personal research and writing are encouraged, the college is primarily a teaching institution. Thus its teachers are committed to close contact with students, both in and outside the formal classroom situation. Department chairmen in every field teach some of the basic courses, giving beginning students access to the most experienced instruction in the college.

A close faculty-student relationship exists at Harding, with each student assigned a faculty advisor in his major field to offer academic guidance. The faculty's interest in students often is expressed in personal as well as academic counseling.
















Harding has many purposes, but above all it is a Christian institution. While most colleges and universities today turn their backs on religious or even moral instruction, Harding reaffirms its dedication to the task of the education of the spirit. Through daily chapel periods and Bible classes required each semester of all students and through exposure to teachers who are Christians, the student is able to formulate philosphies of life consistent with Christian ideals. A religious atmosphere pervades the campus, encouraging Christian service and governing social conduct.

Just as the college is dedicated to spiritual values, so is it convinced that a broad exposure to many fields of knowledge makes the best education for today's world, departmentalized though it be. Within the curriculum of general education requirements a student may concentrate on any of 40 different areas leading to the bachelor's degree. Pre-professional programs in several areas also are available. Yet all students receive a background in the fine arts, the humanities, the natural sciences, the social sciences and religion. From the variety of disciplines come experience stacked upon experiences, ideas upon ideas, until, beginning as a spark, the Harding education bursts into full flame.

















Educational experiences and ideas abound not only in the classroom but also in the everyday activities of college life.







Write to the Admissions Office, Harding College, Searcy, Arkansas 72143, for an application form. Return the completed form along with a billfold-size portrait and a \$15.00 room reservation fee. - 2. Request that your high school forward an official transcript of your work to the office of the Registrar, Harding College, Searcy, Arkansas 72143. You should submit a seven-semester transcript as soon as you complete the first semester of your senior year. College students should have an official transcript sent from each
- 3. Arrange to take the ACT test as soon as possible. Every incoming freshman must take the ACT test. The ACT is given at test centers at high schools and colleges across the nation five times during the year. Information and application blanks may be obtained from high school counselors and principals or directly from the ACT Registration Office, P. O. Box 414, lowa City, lowa 62240. You should request that the ACT program send a copy of your test results to the Director of Admissions, Harding College. If you are transferring from another college and have less than 30 semester hours you should have the ACT program send a copy of your test results to the Director of Admissions, Harding College.
- 4. Health forms are normally sent to incoming students approximately 30 days before the fall registration. Complete your health form, including a physical by your physician and return it to the Admissions Office before coming to the campus for registration.
- 5. You will be admitted as a student to Harding College on the basis of the credentials requested above. Notification of eligibility to enroll will be sent to you after your credentials are studied by the Admissions Committee.
