College Hires 20 New Faculty Members

Twenty new teachers and one new administrative officer have been added to the college faculty for the 1968-69 school year, with the greatest number of new faces seen in the divisions of natural sciences and humanities.

Five teachers are in each of those divisions, with three each in the social sciences and education and two each in the fine arts and religion. Fifteen of the additions are Harding alumni.

The new administrative officer is Fred Alexander, former registrar and director of admissions at Michigan Christian College. The Abilene Christian graduate is involved in student recruiting, primarily with junior college students.

Among the new teachers in the natural sciences are Dr. Carroll Smith and James Mackey, who were announced in last month's HARDING magazine. Mackey is completing his dissertation for the Ph.D. in physics.

Ronald Doran is an instructor in biology who holds the M.S. from the University of South Carolina. He is a Harding graduate of 1966.

Home Ec Instructors

Mrs. Phyllis Blacksten and Miss Sharen Deacon, both Harding alumnae, are instructors in home economics. Mrs. Blacksten, the former Phyllis Argo, who was graduated in 1966, holds the M.S. in dietetics from the University of Washington. A graduate of 1967, Miss Deacon received the M.S. in child development from Ohio State University.

Humanities division teachers include Dr. Dorothy Wright, whose appointment also has been announced already. She is an assistant professor of French.

Three new speech department personnel are Larry Menefee, instructor, Terry Eyman, associate instructor, and Miss Linda Schmidt, associate instructor. Menefee, who has the M.A. from Southern Illinois University and who has taught in David Lipscomb and Freed-Hardeman colleges, will direct the drama program. He will be assisted by Eyman, who received the B.A. from Harding in 1967. Miss Schmidt also is a 1967 graduate of the college.

Jewells Join Faculty

Mrs. Alice Jewell, who holds the M.A. in the classics from Indiana University, is an instructor in English.

Fred Jewell joins his wife on the faculty as an instructor in history.

He too received his graduate degrees (the M.A.T. and the M.A.) at Indiana University and has taught there since 1965.

Also in the social science division are two additions to the department of psychology-sociology. Kelly Randolph, an alumnus who holds the M.A. from Eastern New Mexico University, is instructor in psychology. Delmer Odell, a Harding graduate of 1966, is instructor in sociology. He holds the M.A. from the University of Alabama and has done other graduate work at the University of Kentucky.

Two in Education

Two new teachers of education are Bobby Coker, announced earlier, and Miss Betty Work. Coker, a Harding graduate of 1956, is completing his doctoral dissertation from the University of Arkansas. Miss Work, instructor in education, is a candidate for the M.A. at Michigan State University. She is a Harding graduate of 1963.

Miss Paulette Park, who received her M.A.T. this summer at Harding, is instructor in physical education.

Both instructors in music are Harding alumni. Clifton Ganus III, who holds the M.M.E. from North Texas State University, was graduated in 1966. Harding Burton completed his Bachelor of Music degree at Memphis State University, where he also has done graduate work.

New Bible teachers are Joe Cannon and Jim Howard. Alumnus Cannon is visiting professor of missions while on leave from his work in Okinawa. Howard, a Harding graduate of 1962, holds the rank of instructor. He has the M.R.E. and Th.M. degrees from the Harding Graduate School of Religion and has completed all doctoral work except the dissertation from Baylor University.

Six Teachers Earn Promotions in Rank

Six new promotions were announced at the annual pre-school faculty conference at Camp Tahkodah Sept. 5-6 as new and returning administrators and teachers met to prepare for the 1968-69 school year.

Promoted to the rank of full professor were Dr. Bob Gilliam, chairman of the department of psychology and sociology and director of testing and counseling, and Dr. Richard Walker, director of the Speech Clinic. Both were formerly associate professors.

Four faculty members were promoted from instructor to assistant professor. They are Mrs. Jo Cleveland in English, Richard Indermill in psychology, Dr. Jere Yates in Bible and Bob Camp in economics.

Senior Day Activities Scheduled

Harding's annual Senior Day for all high school seniors and their sponsors has been scheduled for Nov. 2. Included in the activities are a program by the music department, opportunities to learn more about the departmental offerings at the college, the annual homecoming football game, a free meal in either of Harding's cafeterias and lodging at reduced rates for those from as far away as 250 miles (\$2.60 per person, three to a room).

The program will begin with registration in the administration building at 8:30 a.m. A general assembly in the auditorium will be followed by departmental meetings, including education, physical education, art, music, English, journalism, speech, biology, home economics, math, physical science, Bible, foreign languages,

business and economics, history and social science and psychology-sociology.

The seniors will be guests of the college for lunch.

In the afternoon, the annual homecoming activities will begin with a parade at 1:15. The Bisons meet Northwood Institute at 2:30 at Alumni Field.

Academy Team Third in Nation In FBLA Contest

Harding Academy's Parliamentary Procedure Team, representing the state of Arkansas, captured third place in the nation in a contest at the national convention of the Future Business Leaders of America Aug. 13 in Washington, D. C.

The five-member team placed behind Kentucky and Iowa after advancing to the final performance test, taken by only five teams. About 25 states were represented in the contest.

The Academy team consisted of Leon Blue, Debbie Ganus, Mona Lee Moore, Stephen Tucker and Allen Gould. They had won the right to represent Arkansas at the state FBLA convention in March.

The national contest required a written test of every team member, with the five teams scoring highest on the questions about parliamentary procedure then taking performance tests involving mock situations.

Accompanying the team to Washington were Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Welch and Mr. and Mrs. Wilt Martin. Mrs. Welch and Martin are faculty members.

Workers' Workshop Draws Record 1,400

A record total of 1,400 persons from 19 states attended Harding's sixth annual Christian Workers' Workshop Aug. 5-8. The theme of study was "Stewardship: A Way of Life."

The peak attendance, surpassing last year's attendance of 900, came on Wednesday night of the workshop at the keynote speeches of Paul Faulkner and Wyatt Sawyer. Faulkner, of Irving, Tex., spoke to the adults in the Bible teachers division and the Leadership Forum, and Sawyer, of Dallas, spoke to the Youth Forum students.

Workshop director Dr. Joe Hacker Jr., chairman of Harding's Bible department, attributed the success of the workshop to "the outstanding staff" of teachers. "They provided the real highlights of the workshop," he said.

More than 30 persons taught in the workshop's three sections, which covered a broad range of topics for Bible school teachers, church leaders and young people.

Music Building Revitalized

A summer's work has revitalized Harding's Music Building, which now features carpeting, air conditioning and other sound-treatment qualities, plus seven new pianos.

"We're overjoyed!" was the reaction of Dr. Erle T. Moore, music department chairman, concerning the improvements, which were ready for the opening of school.

"Next to the Recording Studio, this is the best thing that has happened to our physical plant in 20 years," he said. "The possibilities for our increased effectiveness are tremendous, and we're deeply grateful that the administration has taken these steps."

The Music Building, built in 1952, suffered from a lack of any sound-proof facilities until the adjoining Recording Studio was completed in 1966. But the problem remained for the rest of the building, where classes and practice rooms are located.

Both the carpeting and the airconditioning now help reduce noise in the building. In addition, the ceilings on the first floor have been lowered with acoustical tile, helping prevent sound from rising to the second floor.

Six of the new pianos are for student practice, and the seventh is a grand piano for teaching. Three additional band instruments also have been purchased.

Only the large studio which was

formerly the band room has not been carpeted, because of renovation and additions in that area which will begin sometime this fall. More information on the construction will be given in a future Bulletin.

Other campus improvements made during the summer include carpeting of the halls and reception room in West Hall, new lounge furniture for the Student Center and air-conditioning of the auditorium of the Academy Building.

Music Camp Grows

Performances by the Belles and Beaux, the Band and the entire camp chorus put the final touches on the college's seventh annual Tahkodah Music Camp at the closing concert Sept. 3.

The 1968 session was the largest in the camp's history, with 103 campers and staff members in attendance. Director Kenneth Davis Jr. told the outdoor audience for the final concert that the camp had been "one of our finest."

The Bisons' 1968 schedule includes two September contests, the first a home game on the 21st against Centenary College of Shreveport, La., and the next a tussle with Millsaps College on the 28th at Jackson, Miss.

Harding suffered through a 3-7 season last year, failing to win a single conference game. In a season abundant with "almosts" the Bisons' inability to offer a scoring attack by air loomed as a major difficulty. Quarterbacks Don Dixon and Jerry Copeland threw for more than 1,100 yards but accounted for only one touchdown.

Wayne, Ind., a consistent point-getter, and junior Larry Headley are the other returning lettermen.

Top prospects are freshman Bill Slicer of Kennett, Mo., junior George Saunders of Bell, Calif., and sophomore Skip Cain of Lakewood, Ohio.

Freshmen will have to help out in the offensive line, which was hit hard by graduation. Returning are junior David Litzkow and senior Bob Lemmon at guards, senior Kieth Williams at tackle and sophomores John Manning and Harvey Howard at ends. Due to the new offensive alignment, recruiting was slanted with an eye toward receivers. Top prospects include ends Jimmy Isbell, Jim Gardner, Ronnie Peacock and Hugh Bozeman and backs Roy McCormack, Dave Demek, Terry Brumley and Stan Dunham.

The only starter returning from the defensive front wall is All-American honorable mention guard Don Sinquefield, but he should get help from his brother Richard Sinquefield, junior Jim Duncan, sophomore Bob Lendman and senior Carl Carlson. The secondary has experienced halfbacks Ron Rubio and David Treadwell and linebacker Mike Payne, plus lettermen Charles Caffey, Eugene Johnson, Ken Merritt and Curtis Booker.

Recruits who should give a boost to the line include center Larry James and tackles Mike Sawyer and Jerry Cook.
