George Tipps Named Annual Fund Chairman

George Tipps, a well-known minister and a member of the President's Development Council, has been named Harding's Annual Fund Chairman by President Clifton L. Ganus.

Serving in this capacity Tipps will direct Harding's annual giving solicitations among alumni and friends of the college.

In making the announcement of Tipps' selection Dr. Ganus commented, "We are delighted that he has agreed to serve as national chairman of our Annual Fund Campaign. I have known him for almost thirty years and I appreciate his ability and dedication to the work of Harding College.

"His enthusiasm and drive will certainly influence us all to do a more effective job. I hope that all our alumni and friends will lend him the support and assistance needed to make his assignment a successful one."

former Claire Camp, attended Harding in 1944-45. Their eldest daughter, Sheri, graduated from Harding in 1969 and their daughter, Beverly, is presently a sophomore. Both were members of the Harding Belles and Beaux. David, the youngest child, is a senior in high school.

An astute businessman, Tipps helped form a corporation which developed a workable device to assist in the control of air pollution. Early in the 1960's he began concentration on the development of a project conceived ten years earlier concerning the removal of grain dust from the air during loading operations at grain elevators.

In 1969 he joined in formed a corporation for the research and development of a device to control air pollution created in greain elevators. This type of air pollution represents a sizeable loss to the grain industry and has been determined by research to be a hazard to human health.

The corporation has developed and patented a prototype, which will remove virtually all the grain dust normally lost during the critical unloading process.

Ganus, Searcy, "The Role of Christian Education in Training Preachers;" H. A. (Buster) Dobbs, Houston, "The Lord's Supper;" Leonard Mullins, Dallas, "Instrumental Music;" J. D. Bales, Searcy, "The Holy Spirit;" Joe Hacker, Searcy, "The Divine Imperative: Evangelism;" and theme lectures by Joe Barnett, Lubbock, and Jimmy Allen, Searcy.

Commenting on the 1971 forum Dr. Hacker, chairman of the Bible department, noted that the forum will attempt to present solutions to some of the problems faced by the local preacher. "In selecting this theme we tried to peer into the needs of the local minister and select a topic that would be particularly relevant today," added Hacker. "A wide variety of forum topics and speakers were chosen to serve the various interests of the visiting ministers. Two New Faculty Members Added to Teaching Roster

Two faculty members were added for the spring semester and one will leave for graduate study, according to Dr. J. E. Pryor, dean of the college. New teachers are Lewis L. Moore, instructor in sociology, and Michael Van Plummer, instructor in biological science. William L. Culp, instructor in sociology, will have leave of absence for the spring and summer terms to complete a master's at the University of Arkansas.

Moore, a native of Corning, is a 1969 graduate of Harding and received the MAT in August, 1970. He has been attending Memphis State University working toward a doctorate. Mrs. Moore, the former Carolyn Sue Jackson, is employed at Hodge Auto Supply in Searcy.

Plummer received a BS in biology at Harding in 1967 and accepted a NASA grant for graduate work in zoology at Utah State University where he received a master's in 1969. A letterman in football and baseball, the former Bison earned All-AIC honors in baseball as a pitcher and once pitched two consecutive no-hitters. He was named the 1967 AIC Scholar Athlete. A native of Massillon, Ohio, he is married to the former Sharon Lisle of Canyon, Tex., a former Harding coed, and they have a three-month-old daughter, Melissa.

Pat Garner, Phil Reagan Selected for Leading Roles

A veteran of the Harding stage and a newcomer, both senior speech majors, have been cast for leading roles in the speech department production of "Becket" scheduled for March 18-20. Phil Reagan of Memphis, named best actor for 1970, will play the role of Thomas Becket and the role of Henry II will be portrayed by Pat Garner of Longview, Tex., a varsity debater.

Author Jean Anouilh explained the play in the introduction to the story:

"Becket" is a drama of friendship between two men, between the king and his friend, his companion in pleasure and in work whom he could not cease to love though he became his worst enemy the night he was named archbishop.

Four Outstanding Alumni Listed In Honor Publication

Four graduates of Harding College have been selected for the 1970 edition of Outstanding Young Men of America.

They are Dr. Neale T. Pryor of Searcy, Dr. Jack Rhodes of Beeville, Tex., Robley T. Barber of Malvern and Mike O'Neal of Antlers, Okla.

Dr. Pryor, an associate professor of Bible here, received the BA in English at Harding in 1956. He holds the MTh degree from Harding Graduate School and the ThD from New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary. Dr. Pryor was named Outstanding Young Teacher at Harding in 1966 and received the Distinguished Teacher Award in 1970.

Dr. Rhodes received the B.A. from Harding in 1961. He spent a summer in Ecuador helping to develop a basketball program in the schools and wrote a book "Basic Basketball," which was translated into Spanish. He received the Ph.D. from North Texas State University in 1970 and is coaching basketball and teaching science and chemistry at A. C. Jones High School in Beeville, Tex.

Barber, vice president of International Land Development Corporation in Malvern, received the BA at Harding in 1967. He was a member of the business team which won the national championship in 1966 and is a member of the President's Development Council.

O'Neal received the B.A. in 1968. He passed the CPA exam on his first attempt and received the Gold Medal Award of the Oklahoma Society of CPAs for writing the best paper in Oklahoma among those taking the test for the first time. He served two years in Da Nang, South Vietnam as an ensign in the Navy and is now associated with Touche, Ross and Company Accountants in Memphis.

The outstanding men, nominated by the Alumni Association, are among 5,000 selected for the publication.


A Cappella Plans Spring Tour

The spring tour of the A Cappella chorus will be climaxed with participation in the annual Christian College Choral Festival set for April 3 on the campus of Michigan Christian College at Rochester. At least eight Christian colleges are expected to participate in the Festival, according to Ed Ritchie, MCC director.

The Festival was started several years ago and has grown in number and participation each year. The choruses assemble for group and class instruction and rehearsals. A concert of individual and combined choruses culminates the festival.

Dr. Kenneth Davis, Harding's chorus director, said the tour will begin March 26 and that the group of about 45 will make appearances through the Carolinas and along the East Coast enroute to the Festival. The itinerary has not been completed for specific tour dates.

Next year's fall and spring tours for the A Cappella group will be to the Southwestern states and Dr. Davis has asked that groups wishing to sponsor the chorus contact him through the music department of the college.

Prejudice, Bigotry Fail To Stop Chappie James

It is a long road from Alcaniz Street in Pensacola, Fla., to the Pentagon in Washington, D. C., and doubly long for a black man, but Brigadier General Daniel James, Jr., travelled the road for more than a quarter of a century.

The fifty-one year old general visited the Harding campus as a guest of the American Studies program. During his two-day visit Jan. 7 and 8 he spoke four times and on each occasion received a rousing standing ovation.

Gen. James is a noted and outspoken pro-American spokesman and serves as deputy assistant Secretary of Defense for Public Affairs. He is the first military man to hold this high post in the Department of Defense and is only the second Negro in the Air Force to achieve the rank of general.

The road to the top has been long and filled with personal achievements for the Florida native. He considers his success as an officer and a Negro a tribute to the American system.

He is the seventeenth of seventeen children and learned at an early age what it meant to be the object of bigotry and prejudice in the South. He fought back, not with clinched fists, but with determination to succeed. "I can remember my mother's words, 'If they call you dirty, make sure you are clean; if they call you ignorant, be smart; if they call you weak, be strong and if they call you a coward, be brave.' This was her philosophy," commented the one-star general.

His yearn to fly was born at an early age as he watched aerial maneuvers at the naval air base in Pensacola. After receiving the Bachelor of Science degree from Tuskegee Institute in 1942 he completed civilian pilot training and became a civilian instructor pilot, teaching Army Corps cadets. In 1943 he was commissioned in the Army Air Corps and began his rise through the ranks.

During World War II Gen. James served in the all-Negro 99th Pursuit Squadron that flew combat missions in the European theatre. He flew 101 combat missions in a six-month tour in the Korean War and just recently returned from Vietnam where he flew 78 combat sorties over North Vietnam.

While in Vietnam he served as Vice Wing Commander to Colonel Robin Olds and the aerial duo was known affectionately to their men as "Black Man and Robin." He led a fight in the Bolo MIG sweep in which seven Communist MIG 21's were destroyed, the highest total kill of any mission during the Vietnam War.

Gen. James is often asked how he managed to cram his massive six-foot, four-inch 230-pound body into the *Continued on page 4*

My Street is Dark ...

EDITOR'S NOTE: A Pensacola 1970 high school senior addressed his graduating class and depicted a rather black, dark existence for the United States, but as he concluded he offered a ray of hope and made a plea for unity. Brig. Gen. Daniel James, Jr., followed the student to the speaker's rostrum and delivered a stirring soliloquy. He delivered this soliloquy to a meeting of Harding's American Studies program. Printed below are excerpts from that soliloquy.

My street is dark. I live on a dark street. I live on Alcaniz Street in this town. My street is dark because there are no street lights. The street lights stop where the white population stops — four blocks up the street. My road is bumpy. My road is bumpy because it is unpaved. The pavement stops four blocks up the street where the white population stops. I am dark. I am black. I was born that

But I am not without hope because I am blessed with strong parents who would say to me "Do not ever indulge in the dubious luxury of despair. You take advantage of whatever is offered you here, no matter how meager, and you improve on it and you eliminate one by one all of the reasons why they say you are not ready. And do not ever, whatever the provocation, do not ever turn your back on your God, or your nation, or that flag, and you contribute to the welfare of that nation and you prosper in proportion to what you contribute. People will recognize you for what you are.

"You have a responsibility. The responsibility of improving your nation and handing that heritage to your children in better shape than you received it yourself. Work within the system to solve the ills that exist in your nation. There are ills, but do not cure the disease by killing the patient. Stay within the rules second-class citizen. You should come over here and join us, over here where everybody prospers, on this side. You should be disgusted."

I say I am not disgusted. I am a citizen of the United States of America, and I am no second-class citizen either and no man here is, unless he thinks like one and reasons like one and performs like one. All is not equal yet, but you must assess the progress that the fair-minded people have made.

Americans have been trying to make sure that there is equal justice and opportunity for all and you can too, if you try. You have to remember that it is our nation and when you go around shouting "freedom now" you must remember that we must have a place to be free and this happens to be mine right here, the United States.

If she has ills, I will hold her hand until she puts them right, and anybody from the outside who comes in and tries to take her over and turn her around from me gets a bloody nose because I am a fighting man and this Black Panther fights for his country. So why wouldn't you fight for her? There are a lot of people who run away and hide. Nobody dislikes war more than warriors because we have been there several times over. We do not promote wars; we fight them to end them. But you start one, brother, you have a fight on your hands from warriors because we believe this country is worth saving. We have a long way to go. Along the way we are in need of a lot of things. We are not in need of anything more in this nation than we are in need of unity. There are so many people pulling in so many directions now because of so many reasons. The one thing that you must remember is that several nations fell under the surge of the Nazis because they had been so skillfully divided among themselves by the seeds of hate and distrust that had been sown among them mutual distrust — that they were pushovers and could be taken without a shot being fired.

So I say to you, we have to furbish up the strongest weapon we have ever had in this country. It is not a physical weapon; it is a psychological one. And the name of the weapon is unity. Unity in the principles of democracy. Stop finding so many ways to hate each other because of race, creed, religion, social strata, or section of the block. Stop giving excuses if you find the urge to step on another man, because of some tradition that really was not fair to him. Equality means just that, and to practice it and to have it you have to live. One man's rights stop where another man's rights begin, but equality of opportunity has to be guaranteed for all of the citizens of this nation all of the time, and it is your responsibility.

I say to the young black people, who have been hurt so many occasions along the way as I was, have faith, try the system and assess the program. There are many people who are reaching out to help you right now, reaching with their hands outstretched in friendship, or down in help to pull you up. Many of those hands are white and they find it difficult to grasp if the hand is balled tightly into a fist. And it works both ways.

There are many beautiful parks in this town — and benches along the waterfront. These benches are labeled "colored and white"; to make sure that I do not make a mistake and sit on the wrong one, they are painted black and white. Even the rest room doors are labeled colored and white. The water fountains — colored and white. I walked past three very modern, very fine schools everyday to go to mine — to get my sub-standard education in a sub-standard building.

Two-thirds of the world is hungry? Yes, I am hungry! I am hungry for knowledge, understanding, equal opportunity, and a chance to prepare myself to meet life and a little bit of love and dignity.

and excel and perform." Perform. That is the name of the game and it is all we ever knew on Alcaniz Street.

It was up to people like us, unfair though the system was, to play by the rules. We were taught love of country, fear of God, love and brotherhood to mankind and fairness, the ingredients that are taught in the kind of institution like my home.

People would say to us, "Why are you working so hard? Why are you so in love with that system, that flag and that white folk's government? What is in it for you, black man? Don't you know that you are not even a citizen here? How long are you going to take this? You should be disgusted with this. You are a I tell them to have faith in their white brother and I ask the white brother "Don't you make me a liar, because I am telling them you are going to give them a fair deal. They deserve it. All minorities, all Americans deserve it."

Show that unity to the world and no one will stand against us. No one would dare.

Students Teach Saturday Bible Hour Classes

"Train up a child in the way he should go" has gained new meaning this fall for a group of students at Harding College involved in a program of teaching. The members of Les Bonnes de Christe, women's mission group, have been teaching Searcy children who have had little or no background in Bible training.

Executing a program known as the Saturday Bible Hour, the women have taught a six-month series of organized lessons for the 60 to 100 students who have been in attendance for the classes.

Ellen Kramer, a junior science major from Lima, Peru, explained the program. Campaigns Northeast, an evangelistic group active in summer mission work, conducted a similar program last year. When the group decided not to re-sponsor the program, the ladies were contacted and "we decided to try it," according to Miss Kramer.

Enlisting the help of volunteers, 40 college students canvassed Searcy to explain the program and seek enrolees. "We had 160 who showed interest, but only about 100 came to the first meeting," she said.

Student coordinators worked with the elders of the West Side Church of Christ and the West Side facilities were offered for the project. Each Saturday about ten men take their cars to specified points to collect the children, who range in age from five years through junior high. The group assembles in the auditorium for a short devotional before going to the classes. At the end of the hour, the cars return the children to their homes.


Bill Jordan, who entered Harding last fall after 20 years in the Air Force, has served as a coordinator for the work. "These students have amazed me," Jordan said. "At first I was skeptical because I thought it might be somewhat of a baby-sitting service. But far from that, the teachers have been well prepared, they have worked very hard and they have had something to offer."

"We hope we've helped these children," one of the teachers said. "That's been our goal. But mostly they've helped us. They've shown us a real reason to want to teach others, and they've shown us that only in giving do we receive."

The program hasn't ended with the sixty minutes on Saturday. Many of the children have been attending other Bible studies at the church, especially on Wednesday nights. And some of the parents have been studying at home with the teachers and other collegians.

Continued from page 3 cockpit of a jet fighter. Smilingly he replies, "I don't get in \rightarrow I just strap

it on!" The life of Daniel James, Jr., has been the story of a "man with a challenge." As a youth his challenge was that of obtaining an education. He was taught at home through the seventh grade by his mother. "My mother was disgusted at the sub-standard quality of education that Negro children were receiving in the segregated public schools. She opened her own school for the Negro kids in the neighborhood."

As his father told him, "You must play by the rules no matter how unfair they may be and you must take advantage of every opportunity, no matter how meager it is."

The challenges of integration and preserving the American system were the next challenge confronting the young officer. Chappie, as his friends call him, was a member of the old segregated Army Air Corps while stationed in Kentucky. Chappie was troubled by the supposedly double standard that existed on the base. He participated in one of the first "sit-ins" to integrate the base facilities. More than a hundred of the young radicals were arrested, but later the charges were dropped. Several months later a presidential edict banned segregation in the armed services. As a "warrior" for his country Gen. James has labelled himself as the original "Black Panther." Early in his career as an officer he adopted the black panther as his insignia and wore the symbol on his helmet as he prowled the skies over Korea and North Vietnam. His combat record in Vietnam won him the Distinguished Flying Cross. As Chappie says, "I am a different breed of cat. This Black Panther fights *for* his country." His motto is to "build a nation, not tear it down."

The latest challenge to confront the formidable Gen. James has, through his efforts, became a challenge to the entire nation. His present assignment is to serve as liaison officer between the families of American prisoners of war in Southeast Asia and the government of North Vietnam.

At the general's swearing in ceremony Secretary of Defense Melvin Laird charged him to keep the POW situation in front of the American public. The general readily accepted his new challenge and began to try the North Vietnam government in the court of world opinion.

Chappie has a special interest in the treatment of American POW's and especially those staying in the "Hanoi Hilton." Discussing the recent list of POW's released by the Hanoi government, he remarked, "I know personally or have flown with nearly every name on that list. This is a personal matter for me." The tall, slightly graying general poses a striking picture in his blue uniform bedecked with ribbons and medals befitting any officer. He describes his promotion to brigadier general as "being able to make a larger contribution to the Air Force and to make a stronger America."



Yes, the road from Alcaniz Street to the Pentagon is a long one, but "Chappie" James proved the road was there and it could be travelled.

Summer Seminar Will Offer Course In World Missions

Harding's 1971 World Evangelism Seminar will be conducted June 7-11, announced Dr. Joe Hacker, chairman of the Bible department.

A one week concentrated course will be available for elders, preachers, missionaries, prospective missionaries and others interested in learning about mission methods. This five-day session will be a non-credit program.

An additional five week course is being planned in the college's regular summer school program for those who are interested in specific academic instruction in missionary principles and methods.

The World Evangelism Seminar will feature missionaries who have recently returned from the mission field. Included on the program are Dale Randolph from Greece, Evertt Huffard from Jerusalem, Don Shackelford from Italy, Jim Woodruff from New Zealand, Jim Waldron from Pakistan and John Bechloff from East Africa.


Commenting on the 1971 seminar Dr. Hacker noted, "We are attempting to combine the practical with the theoretical in our approach to motivation and training of missionaries. This concentrated course presented by experienced men from a variety of mission fields is designed to meet the contemporary needs of elders, missionaries and prospective missionaries."

The daily schedule will include nine classes, lectures and group discussions directed by the twenty-five speakers on the seminar program.

Unpredictable Fluctuating Market Confronts Emory Business Team

An unpredictable and fluctuating market was the first problem to confront Harding's entry in the 1971 Emory Intercollegiate Game and Conference.


Competition in the national business game began Jan. 25 and from the start Hardings' six-member team has been trying to outguess the seven other teams in the sporting goods industry.

Team members on the 1971 team are Rodney Waller, Suzanne Holland, Mike Cole, Dennie Reeve, Bob White and Ron Wages.

David Burks, assistant professor of business administration and the team's faculty advisor, described the first rounds of the competition as "completely unique." He said, "Never in my association with the Emory competition has the industry been so erratic. Hopefully the trend will not continue and the industry will assume more of the characteristics of an actual business setting.

"We still have a long time left in the competition and there is still a considerable amount of work to be done before the final judging in March," added the veteran advisor of four Emory teams.

The products to be theoretically manufactured and sold by the team's simulated company are golf clubs and



metal tennis racquets. The forty participating teams are divided into five groups of eight teams in each industry. The five industries will not actively compete against each other.

Managerial decisions are made for each business quarter and sent to the Emory Business School via TWX communications network. The decisions are immediately consolidated and processed through the main computer facility on the Emory campus. The results of all the firms are relayed back to the school via TWX. Two decisions are made per week in this manner, thus permitting the teams a full three years of simulated production in just six weeks of competition. Thus far the team members have made decisions for only one week of the contest.

Burks commented on this year's game. "Competition this year is the most realistic and challenging of any year to date. Changes in the basic program and the addition of new areas in which decisions must be made should

United States. A larger audience with a greater variety of mission interests is expected to attend the conference which will be held in different regions of the country each year.



Bison Cagers Attempt To Bolster Record


Freshman Freddie Dixon's 32 points propelled Harding to an impressive 84-68 victory over Arkansas College January 29 to give the Bisons their fourth win in 16 starts, raising hopes for an improved finish.

The Bisons have been outstanding on occasions but somewhat unpredictable at other times. Coach Jess Bucy's squad defeated College of the Ozarks 98-84 in early January, then dropped four straight before downing Arkansas College.

Backcourt ace Bill Chism, the 6-2 junior, has been setting a fast scoring pace for the Bisons. He has poured in 289 points for an 18.1 average and has hit 27 or over on four occasions. The talented redhead has a .498 percentage on field goals and .780 (71 of 91) from the free throw line.

Senior co-captain Dana Zartman is carrying a 14.1 average and has connected on .534 from the field. Lester Busby, 6-5 junior, owns a 13.1.

As a team, Harding has a .477 percentage on field goals and .639 on free throws. The Bisons are averaging 73.9 points a game.



Following an opening indoor victory in December, miler Tim Geary won fourth place in the NAIA Indoor Track and Field Meet in Kansas City, January 23.


