Bisons Win Fourth NAIA Bowling Title

Harding bowlers made a clean sweep of the NAIA national bowling championships in the 14th annual tournament in Kansas City April 18 and 19.

Not only did Harding become the first team to ever win the national championship four times, but the Bisons captured the singles and doubles crowns as well in the two-day rolloff at the King Louie Plaza Lanes. Gary Beck won the national singles title and combined with Zearl Watson for the doubles championship.

Harding edged by the Oregon College of Education by a 55 pin margin, 16,604 to 16,549. Bryant College (R.I.) was third with 15,511.



The championship was the fourth team title in six years. The Bisons won consecutive championships in 1970-71-72. With Coach Ed Burt at the helm, the Bisons have never finished lower than fourth.

"This is really great," coach Burt stated. "It is something I've dreamed about but never thought would happen. The boys were tremendous and they deserved to win it."

Beck, a hometown Searcy athlete who was making his fourth straight appearance in the national tourney, came from fifth place at the end of the first day's competition to win the national singles title. He rolled a 2,906 total pinfall for a solid 193 average with a high game of 237.

Watson, a 34-year old ex-serviceman from Clarksville, Ark., was runner-up with a 2,883 pinfall and a 192 average.

Working together, Beck-Watson swept the doubles title in a three-game roll-off from Jeff Roberts and Steve Pierce of Rockhurst College (Mo.), 1,201 to 1,121. Beck rolled 169-279-167 and Watson came through with a 175-219-192 to lock up the championship.

Brad Davis, the 1975 Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference and NAIA District 17 champion placed seventh in his second national tournament. The Tulsa, Okla., junior finished with a 2,764 pinfall and a 184.4 average.

Harding Seniors Win Recognition For Science Papers

Two Harding seniors won first and second place honors with presentations of science research papers at the Arkansas Collegiate Academy of Science at Magnolia April 12. Dr. Ed Wilson, associate professor of chemistry, was elected co-sponsor of the Academy during the annual meeting.

Phil Hart, senior general science major from Waldo, won first place in the physical science division with his paper, *A Preliminary Investigation of the Reproductive Cyclization of 2 — Pyridal — O — Hydroyacetophenone*.

Senior chemistry major David Goff of Blockton, Iowa, placed second in the same division with his paper, *Integrated Mixing Chamber-Flow Cell for Fast Reaction Kinetics*.

According to chemistry department chairman Dr. Don England, a Harding student has won first place recognition in the physical science division for six out of previous eight years and second place recognition in three of the previous eight.

Hart, Goff and senior math and history major Blair Hill of Lisbon, Ohio, were in competition with students from the University of Arkansas at Monticello, the University of Central Arkansas, the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville and other Arkansas colleges and universities.

Dr. Wilson joined the Harding physical science department in 1970. He previously instructed chemistry at the University of Alabama and served as a research associate for two years at the University of Virginia at Charlottesville.

Summer School Set For June 9, July 14

Dates and tuition fees for the 1975 summer sessions have been announced by Dr. Joseph E. Pryor, dean of the college.

The first session begins June 9 and concludes with final examinations on July 10-11. Counseling and registration will be held June 9 with classes beginning June 10.

Petit Jean Presents 1975 Awards

Dr. Ted Altman, dean of students, was named recipient of the 1975 *Petit Jean* dedication honors, and Brenda Dimitt of Springdale was named *Petit Jean* queen during the yearbook presentation ceremonies April 28.

Altman, who joined the Harding physical education faculty in 1963 and was appointed dean of students in 1972, was chosen for the honor by nomination of the senior class.

Reading from her dedicatory remarks in the 1975 *Petit Jean*, editor Dianne Garner Kirk said of Altman: "You have the talent to place smiles on troubled faces and to give people hope in their lives when they feel all is lost... Whether in your office or in the community, you have tried to teach the life of Jesus through example."

Elected *Petit Jean* queen by the Harding student body, Miss Dimitt has served as club queen for Lambda Sigma men's social club for three years. A senior elementary education major, she has been a member of Gata women's social club, Big Sisters, International Campaigns, the Student National Education Association and the Student Association.

LaJuana Case, senior art major from Houston, Tex., was chosen by the senior class to receive the Regina Spirit Award, given each year by Regina women's social club to the senior whose lifestyle and ideals best correspond with those for which Harding exists.

The Harding Academy presented their section of the book to high school academy principal Bill Diles. Dorothy Norris of Little Rock served this year as Academy editor.

Dedication ceremonies are sponsored annually by the *Petit Jean* staff during the last week of spring semester classes. Highlights include unveiling the new cover, presenting awards and introducing the current yearbook staff.

Reno Business Team Takes Second Place

Four accounting students participated in the eleventh annual Intercollegiate Business Games sponsored by the University of Nevada at Reno.

The students competed against representatives from 13 other colleges and universities. The 1975 game is the second time Harding has participated. In 1974, a team of students finished second at the industry level.

Team members were seniors Carole Clarke of Cass City, Mich., and Mark McInteer of Nashville, Tenn., and juniors Kurt Simmons of Wills Point, Tex., and David Tucker of Searcy. Gary Bartholomew, assistant professor of business, was advisor.

The 14 teams in the game were divided into two seven-member industry divisions. Each team within an industry competed directly with other teams in the same industry, and indirectly with teams in other industries.

Harding competed directly against the University of Portland, California State College at Stanislaus, the University of Nevada at Reno, San Diego State University, Idaho State University, and Webber State College.

Morgan, McClurg To Head *Bison*

Wayne Morgan of Huntsville, Ala., and Linda McClurg of Verona, Mo., have been named editor and business manager of the 1975-76 *Bison*, Harding's student newspaper.

Morgan, a senior journalism major, has served as assistant editor of the *Bison* and previously attended Freed-Hardeman College in Henderson, Tenn. He is married to the former Janet Hornbaker of Knoxville, Tenn.

A junior elementary education major, Miss McClurg was *Bison* assistant business manager for 1974-75.

Announcement of the appointments were made at the annual *Bison* awards banquet April 21 by Dr. Neil B. Cope, chairman of the department of journalism and *Bison* advisor.

Morgan was voted "Journalist of the Year," with Lesa Schofield of Lakewood,

Ohio, receiving the "Most Improved Journalist" plaque. Randy Kemp of Marcella, Ark., won honors as "Freshman Journalist of the Year," and the "Fifth Column Award," given to the outstanding senior staff member, went to *Bison* editor Mackye Simpson Sandlin of Clinton, Ky.
