Homecoming Slated Nov. 7-8

Plans for Homecoming '75, set for the weekend of November 7-8, continue to take shape, with activities planned for all alumni and current students. Dr. James Carr, homecoming chairman, said that most of the festivities are in final arrangements stages and that all alumni are being encouraged to make plans to be on campus.

The silver anniversary reunion of the class of 1950 will highlight the annual celebration.

"Annie Get Your Gun" will be presented four nights, Wednesday through Saturday, with Miss Pam Paul of Hurst, Tex., playing the role of Annie Oakley, and Tom Lawson of Southhaven, Miss., as Frank Butler. Top supporting rules will be filled by Debbie Jackson of Manheim, Pa., as Dolly Tate and Richard Paine of Springfield, Vt., as Charlie Davenport. The production will be under the direction of Larry Menefee, assistant professor of speech.

Mort Utley of Phoenix, Ariz., will speak at the Black and Gold Banquet at 5:30 on Friday night when Jim Bill McInteer of Nashville, Tenn., will serve as emcee. The Distinguished Alumnus will also be announced. Alumni are invited to the complimentary continental breakfast at Hammon Student Center from 7:30 to 9 a.m. Saturday. Alumni Chapel will begin at 9:30 in the Heritage Auditorium.

The Homecoming Parade will begin at 11 a.m. through downtown Searcy and activities at Alumni Field will get underway at 1:40 p.m. Bison footballers will meet Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference foe Southern State College at 2 p.m. in the 17th annual Homecoming Game. The two teams tied for the 1972 AIC title.

During the final presentation of "Annie Get Your Gun" on Saturday night, a variety show, Blackouts of '75, will be presented in Rhodes Memorial Field House.

In addition to the silver anniversary activities of the class of 1950, other classes will be honored. They include the classes of 1925, 1930, 1935, 1940, 1945, 1950, 1955, 1960, 1965 and 1970. Many organizational and club activities will be announced at registration.

A message center will be placed in the Heritage Building for the convenience of alumni and guests, Dr. Carr said.

Faculty Members Receive Promotions

Five members of the Harding College faculty were promoted in their respective departments and Leslie Burke, who retired in 1974, was named professor emeritus by President Clifton L. Ganus during the pre-session conference at Camp Tahkodah.

Two were named to the rank of professor, Dr. Neale T. Pryor of the Bible department and Dr. John H. Ryan of the department of speech.

Dr. Josephine Cleveland was advanced to associate professor of English and Thomas M. Howard was named assistant professor of political science. Richard Johnson was designated instructor in health, physical education and recreation

Burke retired after 30 years at Harding. He was a professor of Greek, and Hebrew and chairman of the department of Biblical languages.

Dr. Pryor, a Harding alumnus, joined the faculty in 1962. He holds the doctorate from New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary. Dr. Ryan, also an alumnus, received the doctorate at the University of Missouri. He has taught at Harding since 1961.

Mrs. Cleveland, who joined the faculty in 1966, recently completed the doctorate at Ole Miss.

Howard, currently on leave from the college for graduate study, joined the faculty in '1972 and Johnson, who completed the M.Ed., during the past summer, has been a member of the faculty since 1969.

Long-Time Trustee Member Succumbs

J. A. Thompson, 90, a member of the Board of Trustees since 1936, died Sept. 16 at his home in Searcy. A native of Missouri, he was an evangelist, a retired business man and teacher. His daughter and daughter-in-law, Dr. Eva Thompson and Mrs. Elaine Thompson, are members of the home economics faculty of the college.

The nonagenarian had attended services of the College Church of Christ on Sunday, where he has served as an elder for 40 years, and, as was his custom, had stood at the front door of the building to shake hands with the worshipers less than 24 hours before his death. He had recently been outlining a sermon to be preached at the Downtown Church of Christ in Searcy, and had penned the words at the end, "Blessed are those who die in the Lord."

Mr. Thompson was born August 24, 1885, the oldest of seven children. At age 18, he took a teacher's examination and taught at Lawndale, Missouri, where he met and married in 1910 Miss Birdie Martin, who survives him.

After 11 years of teaching, the Thompsons opened retail establishments at Elijah. In 1926 they moved to Bakersfield where he operated a cotton gin and general merchandise store. While living at Bakersfield he conducted his first gospel meeting and during the years he held numerous meetings and preached for many congregations.

In 1936 the family moved to Searcy

where he continued to operate businesses and preach. He was elected to the Board of Trustees during that year and was also selected to serve as an elder at the College Church. He was active in the benevolent program of the church. Other survivors include Jim Thompson and Guy Thompson, both of Searcy, Another son, Pat, preceded him in death. Also surviving are six grandchildren and 10 great grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at the College Church on Sept. 17, by Jim S. Woodroof, minister of the congregation, and Dr. George S. Benson. Burial was in Oak Lawn Cemetery in Searcy. The family has requested that memorials be made to Southern Christian Home in Morrilton.

A new book, Struggles of the Kingdom, by James S. Woodroof, minister of the College Church of Christ in Searcy, and John Payne, a minister in Oak Ridge, Tenn., has been released. The narrative tells of the struggles through which a body of believers in Christchurch, New Zealand, developed from birth to maturity. Based on a criteria of Christian character, financial need and academic ability, the fund was established in memory of Duane E. Priest, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. Earl Priest of Memphis. Duane was a premedical student at Harding in 1967-69. He and his wife Cecilia were involved in a tragic accident in which Duane was fatally injured.

Younger, who has achieved membership in Alpha Chi national honor scholarship society, was the *Petit Jean* yearbook honor student last spring and received the Ganus Award of \$100 cash for academic excellence. He is a member of Lambda Sigma men's club and is active in intramural athletics. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert K. Younger of Route 3, Effingham.
