CCP Graduates 12 in Beta Class

The Beta Class, the second of the Harding Christian Communications Program, completed two years of study and training for the ministry in graduation exercises July 30 at the College's Main Auditorium.

The 12 graduates bring to 39 the total of graduates of the Alpha and Beta classes in the preacher-training program.

In fulfilling the program's degree requirements, the Beta Class members undertook assigned field work under elderships of congregations within driving distance of Searcy and participated in both domestic and international campaign efforts in addition to completing 40 Bible courses in the classroom.

In the past two years the graduating students have been instrumental in 61 baptisms and 202 restorations. The campaign efforts have taken the group to eight states and two foreign countries.

Program Director Ed Sanders introduced Will Ed Warren, instructor in Bible, who addressed the group.

"Remember your commitment," Warren urged. "We will not be walking with you but our spirits will be with you and through the coming years our prayers will be with each of you."

Warren emphasized the commitment each graduate makes as he enters the ministry.

"Be committed to the call and the message of Christ, be committed to the church, to the Book, the oracles of God, be committed to the growth of the inner man and most of all, be committed to the person of Jesus Christ.

"It is important that Jesus must be the Lord of your life," he said.

Following the address, Dr. Jerry Jones, chairman of the Bible Department, presented the graduation certificates and an award was given to John Rozzell, the class representative for 1976-77.

The Beta Class also made a presentation to the Christian Communications Program in the form of a Certificate of Deposit of \$1,100. The students requested that the money be used as a scholarship fund for use by succeeding classes of the program.

Sanders indicated the graduates will serve the brotherhood in various areas. While most will work primarily in a pulpit minister's position, others plan to commit themselves to youth ministry, missionary work and campaign team work. The Christian Communications Program, the only preacher training program located on a college campus, exists to train men for all phases of ministerial work.

Sociology Department Receives \$5,000 Grant

The Department of Sociology and Social Work at Harding College has received a Title I Grant from the United States Government in the amount of \$5,000 to support a series of Mental Health Workshops during the coming school year.

The grant, authorized by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, was announced by Hugh Mills, Arkansas state Title I administrator and dean of the University of Arkansas Division of Continuing Education, through which the money is channeled.

The workshops will be primarily designed for anyone dealing with problem children and more especially for social workers, foster parents, police personnel, school teachers or volunteer workers in child-care programs.

Dr. Bill Verkler, chairman of Harding's Department of Sociology and Social Work, will coordinate the implementation of the grant in cooperation with the Mental Health Association in White County. According to Dr. Verkler, the workshop series will begin in early September.

Ground-breaking Indicates Graduate School Growth

Ground-breaking ceremonies for a new classroom building at the Harding Graduate School of Religion in Memphis, were held July 15, with President Clifton L. Ganus presiding over the festivities. Others contributing their efforts were Harold Hazelip, dean of the Graduate School, James Moffett, minister of Raleigh Church of Christ and co-chairman of the fund-raising campaign, and Chairman Roy Sawyer and Jack Goode of the Board of Trustees.

The new classroom building will be located at the east end of the E. H. Ijams Administration Building and will form the southeast corner of the campus quadrangle. The single level facility will include 10,900 square feet of area and is scheduled for completion by January 1, 1978.

To maintain the Graduate School's level of service to the brotherhood and to reach its goal for the future, the school has begun a \$5,000,000 campus development project. Sufficient funds have already been pledged to insure the building of the new classroom facility.

The Graduate School's rapid growth has created an immediate crisis in the space available for classroom use. The projected new classroom structure will relieve the current shortage of classroom space. The building will be constructed at an estimated cost of \$400,000 and will contain five classrooms, a lounge for students, and an auditorium that can be converted into three more classrooms — one of which will contain modern audio visual equipment to be used in the training of students in ministerial skills. Students will then be able to preach, and with the help of a teacher, review their effort.

The operation of a graduate program is an expensive process for any educational institution, especially a private college. The Harding Graduate School of Religion is no exception to the rule. A student who pays his expenses as outlined in the Graduate School's catalog pays approximately 60 per cent of the cost of his graduate education. The present enrollment requires that the Harding Graduate School of Religion secure at least \$300,000 each year to supplement expenses.



Reading Skills Study Rates Harding Academy Above National Average

missions role.

An Arkansas Education Department reading study in 43 schools shows that Harding Academy students rank first in average reading skills in the eighth and eleventh grades and fifth at the fourth grade level, Superintendent Ed Higginbotham said.

The study was conducted by Ben Lever of Pine Bluff, supervisor of the Education Department's federally financed needs assessment division. He said 38 public schools and five private schools participated. The study was made during the 1976-77 school year involving 9,000 students selected on a stratified random sampling basis.

"Reading comprehension was tested in the fourth, eighth and eleventh grade levels," Higginbotham said. "This is the first time the Academy has ever been involved in such a study."

Higginbotham indicated Harding students recorded an average score in the eighth grade of 82.8 as compared to an average score of 70.5 for the United States and a 65.0 for Arkansas.

At the eleventh grade level Harding students averaged 80.6 against a U.S. level of 78.1 and an Arkansas average of 64.7. On the fourth grade level Harding students ranked fifth with a 75.8 average against a top average of 82.5. The U.S. average for the fourth grade level was 73.8 and the Arkansas average was 62.2.

Lever, in a letter to Higginbotham said, "Please allow me to commend you for the excellent job that is being done by you and your staff, as well as your students."

The study also concluded that reading skills of students in private schools are better than those students in public school, that reading skills of females are better than those of males, and that reading skills of students in schools with 500 to 1,500 students are better than those of students in districts smaller and larger than that.

Lever said the average scores in the Southeast were lower than the average scores in the other regions of the country and that the Arkansas average was lower than the Southeast average.

The other states in the region are Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia and West Virginia.



Summer Term Shows Record Enrollment


Harding College summer school and special sessions' enrollment totaled 696 for 1977, according to Registrar Virgil Beckett.

Enrollment for the two Summer School sessions was 593, down from the 673 students last year. However, 103 additional students enrolled in the special Intersession May 16-June 1, giving a combined summer total that exceeds the record of 676 set in 1975.

The class breakdown showed that the largest group of students were seniors, who totaled 251. Also, there were 127 freshmen, 67 sophomores, 78 juniors and 70 post-graduate and special course enrollees.

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

1977 Football Preseason Outlook

Losing 19 seniors from an AIC cochampionship team could be depressing but good spring drills and a profitable recruiting season have enabled Bison coach John Prock to develop an optimistic outlook for 1977.

"We'll need time to put the puzzle back together again," the dean of the AIC grid mentors said. "Replacing that many people and that much leadership is more than an overnight task. But we have some people who can tackle the job. We just need a little time for some of the boys to get some game experience."

Only seven seniors return from last year's crop, and at least six of them are expected to start.

In the backfield, spring training produced a neck-to-neck battle for the all-important quarterback spot with senior Steve Peeples of Sylvan Hills and junior Cam Prock of Searcy vying for the starter's role. According to Prock, both had good spring workouts and showed the ability to move the ball.

Whoever earns starting rights at the man-under post will be able to call on one of the finest ball-carriers in the conference, senior fullback Allen Grieb of Oklahoma City (6-1, 205). Already fifth on the college's all-time rushing charts, Grieb has accounted for 1,559 career yards, mostly up the middle where the traffic is thickest.

Filling NAIA All-America honorable mention Joe David Smith's tailback

Paul Orr of Trumann. Dupriest (5-11, 205) has the heft for a power running game, and Orr (5-8, 170) has the quick speed to be an outside threat.

Prock plans to keep the offensive with two tight ends, and the pro set. Occasionally the Bisons might resort to the shotgun alignment to aid the passing game. Junior Max Ellzev of Osceola stepped in at wide receiver last an outstanding pass catcher.

Finding replacements for the heavily depleted offensive line will carry top priority for the Bison staff. Only junior guard Kerry Fortner (5-11, 230) of North Little Rock and junior tight end Gail Gregg of Columbiana, Ohio return.

New faces in the blocking wall are junior center Bob Graham (6-1, 215) of Dallas, Tex.; junior guard Jeff Earnhart (6-0, 200) of Cahokia, Ill.; sophomore tackle John Reves (6-3, 210) of Anson, Tex. and sophomore tight ends Greg Cothren (6-2, 200) of Meridianville, Ala. and transfer David Bangs (6-1, 180) of Mountain View.

Defensively, the Bisons have experience back in linebackers Mike Graul, a 5-10, 195-1b. senior from Cahokia, Ill. and Tim Towns, a 5-11, 210-lb. junior from Bethany, Okla.

Up front co-captain Gary Brown (6-

post has fallen to a pair of juniors, 0, 220) of Chamblee, Ga. will anchor Curtis Dupriest of Searcy and John the defensive line from his end position. Also returning is noseguard-tackle Carl Kuwitzky (6-4, 220) of Norman, Okla. Experienced lettermen expected to step into defensive starting berths are tackle Robert Goldstein, a growing 6-2, formations of last year, the power I, 225-lb. sophomore from Norcross, Ga., and junior Bobby Rogers, a quick 5-11, 190-lb. athlete from Forrest City who will play end in the 5-2 formation or the third linebacker in a 4-3 set-up.

Only senior halfback Lanny Dauksch year and quickly established himself as of Tamaroa, Ill. returns from last year's outstanding secondary.
