Growing Interests, Facilities Create New Drama Major

One famous line from Shakespeare's "As You Like It" says, "All the world's a stage." At Harding, the stage is a world — of opportunity, fun and education.

While some students decide on a career in drama, many others choose to use stage productions as extracurricular activities.

"We have a good program for people to be involved in continually if they want to participate," explained Charles Parker, drama director. "Last fall, we had 14 one-act plays and several interpreters theatres in addition to "The Sound of Music" and "The Rainmaker," he continued. This spring more than a dozen productions have been staged, including George Bernard Shaw's "Arms and the Man" and a folk play entitled "Master Pierre Patelin."

Looking back over plays of recent years — such as Shakespeare's "Othello," Neil Simon's "Star Spangled Girl" and a variety of musicals: "Annie Get Your Gun," "1776," "My Fair Lady," "Brigadoon," and "Fiddler on the Roof" — Parker feels that it is the wide spectrum of offerings that involves students from many other fields of study. More than 100 participated in last fall's musical production.

Facilities for the drama program have increased recently with the completion of the George S. Benson Auditorium. The 80 by 66-foot fanshaped stage with orchestra pit will be used for major productions while the Administration Auditorium and

the 175-seat Little Theatre will continue to be used for the smaller plays.

For those who work on the sets, makeup and properties or for those who actually appear in the cast, the long hours spent in preparation seem worthwhile, according to Parker. "One advantage," he related, "is the good camaraderie which develops while working together. That's not to say that there aren't problems, but in our productions, the major focus is on interpersonal relationships."

Parker thinks that producing quality entertainment is also a main consideration at Harding. "Here, we have strong commitments as Christians to produce plays that glorify God," he explained. A strong tradition has developed to produce above-average plays, and I think that the people who have attended have been very well satisfied," he said. Judges at the annual American College Theatre festival seem to agree with him. Harding productions have received high marks each time they have entered the contest. Last year, the university's entry represented Arkansas at the regional festival in Fort Worth. And this year's play, "The Rainmaker," received awards in the state contest, including best scene design, best acting award and best properties.

Beginning next fall, a new drama major will be instituted. Although the stage is a major emphasis, Parker points out that the broadbased curriculum requiring 65 academic hours covers other related areas in speech, English and art. "With a drama major, we feel that our graduates should be able to do more than just act. They should be able to stage a play by themselves, know all the aspects of technical theatre, how to budget and manage a production, how to build a set, make costumes and direct."

These abilities, Parker feels, will allow the students to respond to the increased interest in drama across the country whether they teach, work with community theatre programs or pursue further professional experience.




