# Distinguished Teachers Honored, 357 Graduate

Dr. Josephine Cleveland, professor of English, Dr. Dorothy Wright, professor of French, and John T. McKinney; assistant professor of Bible and Biblical languages, received \$1,000 cash awards as Distinguished Teachers for 1981 during Harding University's commencement ceremonies May 10, when 357 graduates received diplomas at Benson Auditorium.

Cleveland also received the Distinguished Teacher Award in 1972 and Wright in 1973. It was the first such honor for McKinney.

Cleveland joined the faculty in 1966 after receiving the master's degree from Michigan State. She completed the doctorate at the University of Mississippi in 1965

Wright, whose husband, Winfred, is chairman of the department of modern foreign languages, holds the doctorate from the University of Toulouse in France. The Wrights joined the faculty in 1968.

McKinney, who holds the master's from Abilene Christian University, is a former missionary in Switzerland who joined the faculty in 1974.

Texas Senator Ed Howard of Texarkana spoke to the graduates. Harding President Clifton L. Ganus Jr. conferred the degrees,

The Duane Priest Memorial Scholarship Award, made to a premedical student, was given to Jeffry McKinzie of Chester, Va.

Richard Teixeira of Auburn, Ind. received a gold watch with the M.E. Berryhill outstanding senior athlete award. For the highest grade point average of the year, \$100 checks were presented to Michael Ishmael of Tulsa, Okla. and Catherine Davis of Morrilton, Ark. The awards were made by the Ganus family.

Presented for the first time was the Russell L. Simmons memorial award, a journalism scholarship. Recipients were Steve Awtrey of St. Louis and James Brandon Bradley of Memphis.

The Mort Utley Awards were made to Debbie Ann Hooten of Amarillo, Texas and Roy Kirkland of Ward, Ark.

AIC commissioner Harry T. Hall presented the University with the All-Sports Award for highest number of points received from the eight competitive intercollegiate sports. Hall also presented to Ganus the conference championship trophies in cross country, track, golf and tennis.

## Record Budget Adopted for Fiscal '81-'82

A record budget of \$18,516,034 has been approved by the Harding University Board of Trustees for the 1981-82 fiscal year, according to President Clifton L. Ganus Jr.

The total represents a \$2,058,569 increase over the 1980-81 budget and covers the Searcy undergraduate and Academy programs and the Graduate School of

Religion in Memphis.

Of the total, \$8.2 million is represented by financial aid which will be available to the more than 3,000 students expected this fall. The funds include federal, state and institutional plans in the forms of grants, loans, scholarships and work programs.

"At this time we are not sure as to what

especially in the area of Guaranteed Student Loans," Lott R. Tucker, vice president for finance, said. "Be we believe that the necessary financial aid will be available to complete the programs of our returning students and to provide for those who will be entering Harding for the first time.

Tucker indicated Harding-sponsored scholarship funds available would exceed \$900,000 for the coming year. These funds cover academic, athletic, departmental, endowed, missionary, orphan and foreign scholarships.

Cost increases in tuition, fees and room and board will be slightly more than 12 percent, or approximately \$245 per student per semester.

Ganus announced good progress is being made on the construction of the J. E. Mabee Business Center since the official ground-breaking March 20.

In addition, Tucker said approximately \$80,000 of energy conservation work is being done in the form of repiping and insulating pipes in the campus' steam tunnels.

"Half of the campus was reworked last year and we are completing the project this summer with the assistance of a matching grant from the Department of Energy," he said.

Harding continues to expand its energysaving use of its JC80 computer program to offset rapidly-rising utility costs. "The computer program has paid for itself and more in savings," Tucker said. "We are now investigating ways to meet the energy needs, especially during peak periods of power usage. We have made significant advancement in the energy area."

# 58th Annual Bible Lectureship To Focus on Love October 14-17

The 58th Annual Harding University Bible Lectureship has been scheduled for Oct. 14-17 and will focus on the theme "Love One Another."

Keynote lectures will include "The Value of Love" - Hugo McCord of Oklahoma City, Okla.; "The Virtues of Love" - Jimmy Allen of Searcy and "The Victory of Love" - Batsell Barrett Baxter of Nashville, Tenn.

Jimmy Adcox of Jonesboro, Ark. will speak during Thursday's chapel period on "Love and Sex." Friday's chapel will feature Joe Glenn of Little Rock, who will speak on "Love and Discipline."

The Lectureship program will begin on Wednesday evening with a concert by the Harding University Chorale, under the direction of Cliff Ganus III. The following three days will hold a full schedule of lectures, classes and special events for Lectureship guests.

Fifteen Bible teachers and preachers from Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana will present day lectures dealing with love in the home, in the church and in society. An additional 11 guest speakers will teach daily

classes on topics ranging from Bible schools to Christian homes.

Special events scheduled during the week will include a coffee hosted for visiting women by the Associated Women for Harding, the 20th Century Christian Dinner, the Dr. Jack P. Lewis Tour Reunion Dinner and the Preachers, Elders and Deacons Dinner. Musical programs will be presented by the Harding Academy Chorus, under the direction of Craig Jones, and by the A Cappella Chorus, which is directed by Dr. Kenneth Davis. A guest appearance will be made by the Joyful Noise Singers, a Little Rock group composed of Harding alumni.

A display area will be set up in the American Heritage lobby. Space will be available for both commercial and non-commercial exhibits, including the latest church-related publications. Display space may be reserved through Neale Pryor before Oct. 1.

He is a 1959 graduate of Abilene Christian University (Texas) and served from 1960-63 in the U.S. Army.



Forty-six degrees were awarded during commencement exercises at the Harding Graduate School of Religion in Memphis May 16. It was the school's 23rd graduating class since the founding of the Memphis campus in 1958.

# Alumni Aid in Enlisting Teachers For African Educational Mission

Veteran missionaries Patti and Rees Bryant, both 1952 Harding graduates, have announced plans to return to the African mission field in December as a part of a new educational program of the Plateau State in

Currently residing in Searcy in full time work with the African Christian Hospitals Foundation, the Bryants are recruiting other Christian teachers for the mission work.

C. D. Damen, chairman of Teacher Service Commission of the Plateau State in Nigeria, contacted Bryant recently, advising of the effort to find 81 teachers of religious knowledge (Bible), as well as teachers in other academic disciplines in the secondary schools. The Plateau State government will provide round trip tickets to Nigeria plus a salary for beginning teachers of \$6,300. Minimum contracts are for two years.

"We think this is an excellent opportunity for teachers to do missionary work," Bryant said. He further explained, "Mr. Damen wants Americans who have at least a B.A. in Bible. Those who serve will be teaching Bible to hundreds of eager young Nigerians on a day-to-day basis. Relationships will form with their students. Then the teachers will be able to go out and visit the families and the villages from which the students come and plant churches among various

ethnic groups."

Bryant met with the chairman and other Nigerian ministers of education in Boston to discuss the proposal. He has developed some material with more detailed information and questions for interested persons. Several couples in Searcy are making plans to join the group. Dr. Lewis L. Moore has been named director of counseling at Harding, according to President Clifton L. Ganus Jr.



## Summer Enrollment Peaks, **Special Classes Offered**

Summer enrollment at Harding has reached a record high this year. A total of 550 students have registered for classes during the first summer session, according to Virgil Beckett, registrar.

During the May intersession, 513 students completed two-week short-courses, earning a total of 1,605 credit hours. That enrollment exceeds last year's figure, 370, by nearly 13 percent.

Regular 1980 summer sessions accomodated a total of 989 students, 481 during the first session and 508 during the second. Pre-registration figures indicate

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Benson, president of the National Education Program and president emeritus of Harding University, was presented the Alger Medal by Woodrow W. Clements, chairman and chief executive officer of Dr.

Pepper Company. The Horatio Alger Award was conceived in 1947 by Dr. Kenneth V. Beebe of the American Schools and Colleges Association to encourage young people to realize that success in the country can be achieved by any man or woman.

In his acceptance, the 83 year old Benson said, "Today I am striving to preserve in the hearts of our American youth a genuine faith in the fundamental principles upon which America was built and which brought her to first place among the countries of the world. I believe these fundamental principles to be: faith in God, faith in Constitutional government and faith in private enterprise.'

In addition to the awards ceremony, Dr. Benson participated in a program on free enterprise for more than 1,000 Hershey high school students and at a seminar for more than 300 teachers.

It was also announced that Dr. Benson would be included in the Horatio Alger Memorial Program which means his name will be engraved on a memorial plaque housed in the headquarter offices. A special continuing Horatio Alger Library Section will be made available in his honor to the Harding University Library.

"Chris' vast experience and talent in music will be a great asset to Harding's Time of Day program, and his past accomplishments should be very beneficial in his recruitment efforts for Harding University," McGaha said. "We feel very fortunate to acquire the services of a person of Chris' caliber."

Dell, a native of Freeport, Ill., will receive the B.A. degree from Harding in August, with a major in psychology and minors in Bible and music.

# Kindergarten Program To Start at Academy

Beginning in the fall, Harding Academy will operate a kindergarten and day care program for five-year-olds at the Academy's new facilities.

The program, available for full or half-day sessions, will be accredited by the Arkansas Department of Education with emphasis on academic development, Academy Superintendent Ed Higginbotham said.

Harding has operated a morning kindergarten in recent years as a part of the University's department of home economics. The department will no longer sponsor the kindergarten, but will continue to operate the child development lab in the Olen Hendrix building.

Higginbotham said that the kindergarten will offer concentrated training in reading, with a strong emphasis on phonics, and mathematics. Other classes will include science, social studies, music, art, physical education and environmental education. A daily Bible class will be held for all participants in the program.

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## Harding's Alumni Office Seeks Out Lost Alumni

The most attractive and most informative newsletters and bulletins are almost totally worthless if they fail to reach the persons for whom they are intended. In fact, correct addresses are essential to any alumni program.

Unfortunately, many alumni never realize how important a correct address can be. Consequently many alumni unknowingly end up on our "lost alumni" list. For anyone working in the alumni field, finding the "lost" alumnus is one of the greatest challenges.

In the Harding Alumni Office a secretary and two student workers spend almost all of their time trying to maintain accurate records on the 20,000 Harding alumni. Because of their efforts, we have accurate mailing addresses on 16,777 of these alumni.

Our search begins as soon as the first piece of mail is returned by the Post Office. Since it costs money to have undeliverable mail returned from the Post Office and since we do not want additional pieces of mail going to the wrong address, the alumnus' name is immediately removed from the active mailing list and the task of finding that individual begins.

Tracers (form postcards) are used and sent by first class mail. The first tracer goes to the parents' address, which is in the alumnus' master computer file.

About 30 per cent of the tracers are returned and contain the new addresses of the missing alumnus. Often these tracers will even contain additional information about the alumnus.

Other tracers are returned to us as undeliverable and some are not returned at all. The task of finding these "lost" alumni then becomes a bit more difficult. We next check the alumnus' personal file. Each Harding alumnus has a personal file in addition to the computerized information that is

maintained. The file includes clippings from newspapers on weddings, births and even job promotions. It also contains questionnaires that have been completed by the alumnus.

From this file we find the individual to whom the next tracer will be sent. Often this is another relative or possibly a former roommate, or a member of the same social club, or in some cases just a close personal friend.

If this second tracer is returned as undeliverable or is not returned to us, then we resort to our last means of locating the "lost" alumnus. We use the printed word in tracing lost alumni. Periodically the Harding Bulletin publishes a list of "lost alumni," urging readers to contact the Alumni Office if they know of a correct address for any of the individuals.

Last year we made 6,929 address changes. That is corrections on approximately 36 percent of our mailing list. Less than half of those address changes resulted from alumni informing us of the change. Because of the volume of address changes, our list is obviously never completely up-to-date, but this does not mean that we ever give up trying to keep our list of lost amluni down to an absolute minimum. We strive for the highest accuracy possible at all times.

The personnel of the Alumni Office have a vital interest in the aims of Harding and in the alumni as individuals. The record-keeping process itself demands attention to detail. It cannot be over emphasized that an accurate list of addresses just doesn't happen. It is the result of much hard work and patience by a very dedicated staff.

Obviously, you are not a missing alumnus—because you received this Harding Bulletin. Hopefully this explanation of how we search for lost alumni will impress upon you the importance of letting us know the next time you move. By doing so, you will help us to maintain an accurate mailing list and keep your name off the missing list. We don't like to have any vanishing alumni.

Honorees will be nominated by the respective heads of each division, but nominee suggestions will be welcomed.

All candidates must meet the following qualifications: (1) Must be an active supporter of Harding (2) Life must be consistent with the ideals of Harding (3) Must have achieved a degree of excellence and recognition in his or her chosen field of

activity and (4) Must strive to advance academically and spiritually to serve God.



A graduate of Harding, Browning returned to gain certification and in 1976 was offered the high school principal's job after then-principal David Burnley became superintendent.

Today he is still following in Burnley's footsteps.

"I like being associated with the students," the Judsonia native stated. "I enjoy seeing one of them achieve a goal in life. It makes you feel like you possibly helped."

Although he's still getting his feet wet, Browning says he does have a goal to establish a Community Education Program at the high school next year. An Educational Linkage Program whereby students are allowed to work outside the classroom for nine weeks a semester will begin in January.

Asked if he was aware he was being considered for the job, Browning said he

With a whirlwind finish in the spring sports, Harding University captured the 1980-81 Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference All-Sports Championship for the

Harding won its first All-Sports title for its overall performance during the 1975-76

In a ceremony at the Harding graduation exercises May 10, AIC Commissioner Harry

Hall presented the prestigious conference · trophy to President Clifton Ganus Jr.

Bison athletic teams won outright titles in cross country, track, golf and tennis, as well as a second place in swimming. The Bisons finished with 66.5 points; Southern Arkansas University was the runner-up with 57 points, and Ouachita Baptist University was third with 50.

In addition to the four conference





In its first appearance in the NAIA national golf competition, Harding's golf team placed 16th in a 33-team field and Brent Taylor earned All-America honors June 2-6 in Huntsville, Texas.

Coach Phil Watkins' team, with championship trophies from the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference and NAIA District 17, battled a week of rain and thunderstorms in the 54-hole tournament.

"Our kids played exceptionally well," Watkins said. "They had to play under the worst of conditions, stopping and starting because of the rain and still we finished higher than any other AIC team."

Taylor, the 1981 AIC and District 17 individual champion, placed fifth in the national standings with three-round totals of 74-75-72 for a 221. The Bartlesville, Oklasenior is the first Bison golfer ever to attain All-America honors.

"Brent shot remarkable golf, especially when you consider the playing conditions," Watkins explained. "There were times he'd only get to play a couple of holes, have to come in for 30 minutes to an hour because of the rain and then have to go back out and start all over again. All of the players did a great job."

Sophomore Hubie Smith of Memphis had a 237 total on rounds of 82-76-79. Phil Garnett, a senior from Hereford, Texas, had 82-83-82 for a 247, followed by North Little Rock junior David Padgett with 83-86-85-254 and Collin LaFollette of Carthage, Texas with 91-91-93-275.

Harding totaled 958, behind NAIA national champion Sam Houston University.

The most outstanding performance at the national meet capped Harding's most successful golf season. The Bisons successfully defended its AIC title, won the district for the first time and placed nationally.

Taylor, Smith and Padgett earned All-AIC and All-District 17 honors, in addition to Taylor's All-American achievement. Watkins was selected "Golf Coach of the Year" by both AIC and District 17 coaches.

## Bison Gridders See Improvement In '81

Harding University football has a single goal in mind for 1981 — improvement.

Coming off a 3-8 season last year, Bison head coach John Prock is committed to making Harding a more competitive unit and he is hopeful the 26 returning lettermen will provide the necessary nucleus to do it.

To improve, a more productive offense is a necessity and spring drills gave new hope in that area. Of number one importance is that junior Kyle Blickenstaff of Boise, Idaho, a well proportioned 6-3, 195 pounder, is settled in at quarterback, where stability is vital.

In recent seasons Harding has suffered from a shortage of quality running backs. Prock appears to be in better condition than last year, with two junior college transfers, Damon White of Dallas, Texas and Tony McCoy of Texarkana, Texas, heading the list of tailback candidates. White is 5-11 and 190 lbs., whereas McCoyis a compact 5-8, 175. Both have speed the Bisons are not used to having available.

Sophomore James Joyce of Huntsville, Ala., stepped into the breach last year at fullback and responded with 442 yards on 91 carries for a solid 4.9 average per carry. Junior Pat Brown of Greenville, Texas was plagued all season with injuries but still finished with 303 yards on 67 carries.

The slot back position went to junior wide receiver Mike Peacock of Searcy, a quick-footed 165 pounder. Last year he caught 16 passes for 132 yards as the Bisons' number two ranked receiver.

Up front there is quality at the tackle spots with seniors Roy Kirkland of Cabot (6-3, 250 lbs.) and Dain Clark of Pavo, Ga., (6-1, 250 lbs.) holding forth. Kirkland gained All-Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference honors last year as a center.

Lettermen Jerry Tucker (5-10, 185 lbs.) of Bethany, Okla., and Tom Martin (6-1, 212 lbs.) of Vincennes, Ind. are manning the guard positions and transfer Brett Frantz, a 6-1, 194 lb. sophomore from Dallas, is lined up at center.

Tight end Durwood Dry of Merritt Island, Fla., and sophomore Don Shumate of Sherwood, Ark. should prove to be quality assets to the passing of Blickenstaff.

A strong 6-2, 212 pounder, Dry led the Bisons with 23 receptions for 265 yards and

two touchdowns last year. Shumate, a good runner at 6-0, 175 lbs. caught 14 for 180 yards in 1980 despite a hand injury which limited his playing time.

Defensively, five starters return for the Bisons. They are Steve Jones, a 6-0, 216 lb. tackle from Creve Coeur, Mo.; Ron Kohlbrand, a 6-3, 205 lb. defensive end from Merritt Island, Fla.; Nicky Valls, a 5-11, 180 lb. cornerback from Corpus Christi, Texas, and safeties Bruce Baldwin of Jacksonville, Ill., and Lafe Caton of Inola, Okla. Baldwin is a 6-2, 195 pounder who pulled in three interceptions last year and Caton is a 5-9, 178 lb. all-purpose defender and returner who was an All-AIC return specialist in 1980.

Top hands at the other positions are cocaptain Klay Bartee (5-11, 200 lbs.) of Dallas, Texas at defensive end and his opposite, Kohlbrand. Charles Cross of Drayton Plains, Mich., at 6-1, 218 lbs., appears set at noseguard and John Tom Thompson, a sophomore in eligiblity after a hardship ruling on the 1980 season, is the top contender at the other tackle spot. Thompson, of Nashville, Tenn., should be a big help with his 6-3, 225 lb. dimensions.

The defensive secondary, where experience is usually the determining factor in winning and losing, will be filled by athletes who have been there.

In addition to Caton and Baldwin, veterans return at the cornerback positions. Valls is a solid defender and will have a tough 5-5, 160 pounder in junior Scott LeDoux of Jennings, La. on the opposite side.

Letterman Randy Buttram of Windermere, Fla., a hard hitter at 5-11, 195 pounds is set for one linebacker slot and sophomore Greg Poston of Memphis, Tenn. is slated for the other. Poston was moved during spring drills from right end and will weigh in at 185 pounds for his 6-0 frame.

In summary, overall team speed should be improved and the offensive unit should be more productive. Defensively, a solid core of veterans return, which should make the Bisons as competitive as ever.

The schedule, which last year included three nationally ranked teams, remains the
