## Harding to Host 22nd World Missions Workshop

More than 1,500 Christian college students are expected to attend the World Missions Workshop Oct. 23-25, as it returns to the Harding University campus, where it originated in 1959. The program will reflect the theme "Where in the World?"

The workshop is designed to motivate students toward world evangelism, both in foreign and in domestic locations, according to co-directors Dr. Don Shackelford and Dr. Carl Mitchell, both of Harding's Bible department.

"The purpose of the workshop is to make students aware of the opportunities in mission work and to help them make intelligent choices on where they want to work. Every year young people make decisions about mission work after this workshop," Shackelford said.

Four keynote addresses will be featured during the weekend, including "Where in the World Are You Going?" by Bob Brown, former missionary in Venezuela; "Where in the World Are the Lost?" by Keith Robinson, former missionary in Italy and present editor of *Alternative* magazine;





"Where in the World Are We Doing Our Father's Business?" by Landon Saunders, founder of the Heartbeat outreach program, and "Where in the World is the Money?" by Parker Henderson, a teacher at the preacher training school in Trinidad.

Also on the schedule are multi-media presentations, panel discussions and question-answer sessions on six major

mission fields, North America, Latin America, Europe, Asia, Africa and Oceania. Guest missionaries will lead sessions concerning the geographical areas in which they have served.

Eight guest instructors will conduct classes dealing with mass media evangelism, cross-cultural communications, medical and vocational missions and other aspects of missionary work.

A special program is to be held on Saturday night, in honor of four of the most experienced and most influential missionaries who will be present at the workshop, Barney Morehead, George S. Benson, J. C. Shewmaker and Dow Merritt.

A Sunday sunrise service will be held, when Jim Woodroof, preacher for the A & M church in College Station, Texas, will speak on "Where in the World do we Go from Here?"

Other special events during the weekend will include devotionals and group sharing periods, a dramatic presentation, performances by Harding musical groups and a

showing of the film "Could I?" have also been scheduled.

Exhibits of various mission fields will answer the question "Where in the World is God Working Today?" Special times will be set aside for students to tour the display areas.

The program for the 22nd Annual World Missions Workshop has been developed by Harding's World Evangelism Forum. ## Advertising Major To Be Offered

An advertising major has been developed and approved by the faculty at Harding, according to Dr. Joseph E. Pryor, vice president for academic affairs.

Advertising is the 39th major offered in Harding's bachelor of arts degree program. It is the fourth offered within the journalism department, joining public relations, mass media and journalism, which has three different areas of emphasis.

"Several students have inquired about an advertising major in the past," said Dr. Heber Taylor, chairman of the journalism department. "Advertising recently has been one of the growing areas of mass communication and journalism, and we expect the field to have a steady clientele."

The 66-hour advertising curriculum will require studies in the fields of art, business, journalism, management, marketing, psychology and speech, with electives including economics and sociology courses.

## Homecoming Planned Oct. 30-31, 'Shenandoah' to Highlight Events

A lively schedule of alumni activities is being planned for Homecoming '81 weekend Oct. 30-31, according to David Crouch, Homecoming coordinator. Highlights will include alumni reunions, Homecoming football competition against the University of Arkansas-Monticello and the staging of the Homecoming musical "Shenandoah."

"Shenandoah" will be presented on Friday and Saturday nights, according to Charles Parker, assistant professor of speech. Parker will direct the play.

A touching story of Civil War times in Virginia's Shenandoah Valley, the production is written for one female and two male leads among a cast of 36.

The original musical features 15 song titles, including "We Make a Beautiful Pair," "Violets and Silverbells," "The Only Home I Know," "Freedom" and "Raise the Flag of Dixie." Assistant music instructor Steve Campbell will be music coordinator for the production.

"Shenandoah" is based on the screenplay by James Lee Barr, who, along with Peter

Udell and Philip Rose, also authored the book *Shenandoah*.

Other Homecoming festivities will include 50 and 25-year reunions honoring the classes of 1931 and 1956, respectively. Reunions are also being planned for the classes of '36, '46, '66, '71 and '76.

The Distinguished Alumnus of 1981 will be honored during the Black and Gold Banquet Friday night. Traditional events such as Alumni Chapel, Blackout variety show, an alumni breakfast and a chili supper will also be held.

## Bible, Humanities to be Offered On Florence Campus this Fall

Harding's summer International Studies students have returned from Florence, but the branch campus will not long be deserted. Eighteen enrollees plan to study in the Italian setting during the fall.

Dr. Bobby Coker, dean of the School of Education, and L. V. Pfeifer, associate professor of Bible, will compose the faculty for the fall semester. Gianfranco Sciotti, business consultant for the program, will continue to teach Italian to the study-tourists.

Coker, who directed a special Harding International Studies tour in Italy in 1972, will teach classes in human growth and development and Western heritage.

Pfeifer, a former missionary in Italy, will guide courses in the Biblical world and archeology and the life and writings of the apostle Paul.

Students may also earn credits in pre-arranged independent studies during their stay abroad.

In addition to local sightseeing trips in Florence, the group will make an extended tour of Greece, visiting the historical cities of Athens, Corinth, Mycena and Delphi.

Florence is the ideal setting to serve as the center for the branch campus, according to Elizabeth Mason, professor of art, who led the International Studies art tour during the summer.

"I won't try to limit Florence to the visual arts," she said. "It was the center of the Renaissance. Everything was there — the artists, the writers, the musicians . . . We systematically covered the entire city several times in our tours, visiting the museums, the libraries and the cathedrals.

"One of the most impressive things for the students was the Cologne Cathedral (in West Germany). It was the first thing they saw. They climbed the tower - about 485 feet up - and it was a real thrill for them. It was their first experience, and nothing else seemed to compare to it."

During the study tour there was no formal lecturing. Students spent their time seeing the many sights and gathering materials for research papers which would be written after their return home. "Each student was allowed to study the aspect of art which most interested him," Mrs. Mason said. Interests did vary among the group, which included underclassmen, art teachers and professionals.

In addition to the art students, there was a business class on the Florence campus during the summer. Led by David Tucker,

assistant professor of economics, the group visited 12 different cities to learn about various business operations.

"It's a learning experience in more ways than one," Mrs. Mason said of the trip. "When you're in Florence, you learn how to read and to communicate in another language; you learn to deal with people, to adjust to their culture and fend for yourself; you learn to eat new foods; you learn how spoiled we are with all of our American conveniences, and you learn to live without some of them for a while.

"It's a great experience," she concluded, "one I'd recommend for everyone."

## McAnulty to Serve Second Year As Visiting Professor of Missions

Dale McAnulty, a missionary in Lille, France for 15 years, will serve a second year as visiting professor of Bible and missions during Harding's 1981-82 academic year.

The employment of a missionary as a full-time faculty member is a feature of the Bible department's *MISSION-PREPARE* program, which now is in its 14th year. The role of the visiting missionary is to teach Bible and missions classes and to share his field experiences with both the liberal arts and the Christian Communications Program (CCP) students who are preparing for mission work.

"Ours is a very valuable program," McAnulty said, "because the visiting missionary has the opportunity to share some of his experiences with the students as he teaches. There are many good theories and lessons to be learned from books, but many things must be learned by practice."

McAnulty termed the past year at Harding "very satisfying," and added, "I'll have an advantage during the next year, in that I am already familiar with my teaching routine. I plan to spend more time talking and working with the students who show interest in missions and helping them work in that direction."

McAnulty spent six years as a local minister in Denver, Colo. and Calera, Okla. before beginning his missionary efforts. His extensive overseas work has included

## Parks to Join CCP Staff As Special Representative

Bobby Parks has been named a special representative for Harding's Christian Communications Program and will join the staff Aug. 25, according to President Clifton L. Ganus.

Parks, a 1980 honor graduate of the two-year CCP program, will work specifically in the areas of student recruitment and development.

"We feel the addition of Bobby to the CCP staff will be extremely important," said Dr. Jerry Jones, chairman of the Bible department. "We've needed someone full time in the areas of recruitment and fund raising and Bobby has the talent and ability to do the job."

Parks preached 2 1/2 years for the Pleasant Valley Church of Christ in Van Buren, Ark. before enrolling in the CCP for specialized preacher training. He had previously attended Westark Community College and Oklahoma State University.

A 49-year-old native of Van Buren, Parks is married to the former Carole Corrotto and they have two married daughters.

The Christian Communications Program is a two-year preacher-training program for students 21 years of age or older. Since it

started in 1974, more than 100 men have received preparation and have assumed positions as youth ministers, personal evangelism directors, prison evangelists, campaign workers, foreign missionaries and pulpit evangelists.

## Students, Parents Attend Early Orientation Session

A total of 270 students and 107 parents attended early orientation June 21-23, according to Dr. Jimmy Carr, director of the summer session.

The orientation program gave freshmen and transfer students the opportunity to visit Harding and to preview campus life by staying in the dormitories and dining in the cafeterias. During the session, Eddie Campbell, dean of men, and Patty Barrett, acting dean of women, welcomed the students and introduced to them the opportunities, the services and the rules and regulations of Harding.

Dr. Ted Altman, vice president for student affairs, spoke on "The Uniqueness of Harding." Student Association President Greg York of Louisville, Ky. provided "A Look at Harding." Various aspects of campus life were explained by other speakers, including Lott Tucker, vice president for finance; Ike Hamilton, director of housing, and Dr. Gary Elliott, chairman of the English department.

Participants in the orientation consulted their academic advisers and planned their fall schedules. They also received their Harding mailing addresses and their identification cards. Prospective band members met with Dr. George Baggett, Bison band director, and students interested in campus choral groups conferred with Dr. Kenneth Davis, director of the A Cappella Chorus.

Especially important, Carr emphasized, was the chance for new students to get acquainted with the campus and with future classmates during mixers and devotional periods.

Parents also were given the opportunity to learn more about Harding, as speakers described for them the benefits of Christian education at Harding and outlined institutional policies.

A major advantage of the early orientation, according to Carr, is the more relaxed atmosphere in which new students may learn their way around the campus,

meet their advisers and plan their first-semester classes.

"It is easier to meet the needs of a few hundred students than several thousand at a time," Carr said.

The session was the first of two early orientations scheduled during the summer, the second being July 16-18.

## Music Camp Set Aug. 11-20

More than 150 young musicians are expected to attend the 20th Annual Tahkodah Music Camp Aug. 11-20.

The music workshop is designed for high school graduates interested in either instrumental or vocal music. All sessions will be conducted at Harding's Camp Tahkodah.

Music instruction will be provided by Harding faculty members, including music professors Kenneth Davis, George Baggett and William Holloway, associate music professor Cliff Ganus III and assistant music professor Jeff Hopper.

Many members and prospective members of campus groups such as the Bison band, A Cappella Chorus, Chorale, Belles and Beaux and University Singers will participate in the camp, according to Davis, director of the program.

The workshop schedule includes classes on music fundamentals, vocal and instrumental arranging, musical analysis, voice, song leading and music literature. Daily Bible classes will be held, also.

Students will have access to the camp's recreational facilities, and times will be set aside for swimming, softball and volleyball.

After a week of band and chorus rehearsal, the campers will present a concert at 8 p.m. on Aug. 20.

## Services Held for Board Member

Milton Harvey Peebles of Hope, Ark., an outstanding educator and a member of Harding University's Board of Trustees, died June 25 from a stroke he suffered while recuperating from a recent heart attack.

Peebles, 68, had been a member of the Board since 1950. He served in public relations, special recognition and academic areas.

A native of Smyrna, Tenn., Peebles graduated from Smyrna High School. After attending Peabody and Middle Tennessee State University, he received his degree from Harding in 1934. He earned the master of education degree from East Texas State University in 1956.

Peebles worked with the Saratoga (Ark.) Schools as superintendent for more than 40 years. He was a member of the Hempstead County Board of Education for 10 years and belonged to both the Arkansas and the National Education Associations. He was listed among *Who's Who in the Southwest*.

He also had served as minister of the Walnut St. Church of Christ in Hope since 1963 and had conducted a daily evangelistic radio program in Hope.

Peebles is survived by his wife, the former Nannie Katherine McQuiddy, a 1936 Harding graduate, and their four sons, all Harding alumni. M. H. (Harvey) Jr. (BA '58) is a librarian at Henderson State University in Arkadelphia; Larry (BA '60) is a radiologist in Texarkana; David (BA '66) is on the faculty at Lubbock Christian College

# Nursing School Associates Aid in Medical Missions

Almost since its inception, Harding's nursing program has emphasized medical missions. Both faculty and students have participated in health care visits to parts of Africa and South Central America.

Since 1977, the School of Nursing has provided approximately 12,000 measles vaccinations and 4,000 polio vaccinations for residents of Cameroon and Nigeria, republics of West Africa.

This summer, Nancy Leslie, assistant professor of nursing, arranged for 2,000 doses of measles vaccine to be donated by the Merck, Sharp and Dohme Pharmaceutical Company. The vaccine was carried to Cameroon by a health care team which included David Collier of Elgin, Okla., a 1980 Harding graduate who is now a medical student at the University of Arkansas in Little Rock.

Other summertime medical missionaries are Vickie Keck, assistant professor of nursing, who is working with the Christian Mobile Clinic in Cameroon and with the Nigerian Christian Hospital.

Cathleen Smith, dean of the School of Nursing, and Nancy Clark, assistant professor of nursing, are now in Kusumu, Kenya (East Africa) conducting a workshop on "Health Promotion and Infection Control." The program, designed to train native nurses, is sponsored by the International Nursing Services Association of Atlanta, Ga. Mrs. Clark also worked with a medical team in Panama in March.

Missy Word, a May graduate from Little Rock, spent part of the spring semester working on St. Vincent's Island (West Indies) with a medical evangelism staff from the 6th and Izard Church of Christ in Little Rock.

is Patty Woods, a 1978 graduate, formerly of McRae, Ark. Miss Woods is working full time with the Nigerian Christian Hospital.

Excerpts from a recent letter from Miss Woods provide insight into the great need for medical missionaries:

"I left, as scheduled, Feb. 18 to rendezvous in Nashville, Tenn. with the two other nurses that I'd be working with at Nigerian Christian Hospital, Janice Bingham (a former member of the Harding nursing faculty) and Lola

Bowen (a 1978 graduate of the School of Nursing).

"Emergencies don't wait until there's been time to unpack and rest from jet lag, so in less than 24 hours after our arrival I was assisting on two consecutive cesarean sections . . . In a month's time I have been involved with cases of rabies, polio, leprosy, tetanus, hepatitis, tuberculosis, pneumonia, meningitis, all sorts of parasites and obstetrical complications of every type.

"The majority of these diseases or

conditions could be prevented, but are not due to ignorance, superstition and lack of education. We continue to see and try to help those who come. . .

"The number of sick people continues to swell . . . Last week we saw and treated 175 people on Monday alone . . . In addition, there is the routine, ongoing care of 60 plus in-patients, and I was personally involved in emergency surgery four nights this week, between the hours of 9 p.m. and 7 a.m. The task is indeed ominous!

"Janice, Lola and I are now taking turns conducting devotionals every Tuesday and Thursday mornings for the 200 plus women who come to the hospital for prenatal care. Also, we have begun a devotional for female employees, hoping to build rapport and to increase spiritual emphasis with our staff. . .

"Dr. Bob Walker, a senior medical student and former classmate at Harding is just finishing up six weeks with us and will be carrying this newsletter back with him to be mailed in the states to insure its safe delivery.

"The saying is such that one never really appreciates what he has until he doesn't have it anymore. That is true, whether it's referring to hot showers, cheese or the ability to contact by visit, telephone or letter those people who are special to you. The first two avenues are not even possible here, and the third has been out due to a Nigerian postal strike.

"The fourth stanza of the hymn 'Peace Perfect Peace' has taken on new meaning for me since being here: 'Peace, perfect peace with loved ones far away. In Jesus' keeping we are safe and they.'

"I love each of you and am thankful for your continued support and participation in this effort through prayers, correspondence and financial provision."



## Retired Teacher Reflects on Challenge

"Beaten paths are for beaten men," says an old proverb, and Raymond Meadows, recently retired distributive education teacher at Paragould (Ark.) High School, believes it's true. For 31 years he has been trying to get that message across to students and, at the same time, challenge them to live up to their full potential.

Meadows, who retired from teaching May 22, claims that issuing that challenge is what teaching is all about.

"As a teacher, my goal has been to challenge the student to utilize his talents and skills to the maximum," he explained.

"When a person is put in the right situation, he or she can accomplish the unlimited," Meadows added. "Whether it's in school or on the job, people can touch you and motivate you to go on."


Distributive education (DE) can play a part in that, Meadows said. He explained that DE consists of both academic studies and practical experience. Class members study sales, advertising, human relations and management and then put their learning into practice with part-time work.

"I think we need to give students some practical new insights into the way they want to travel," he said. "It doesn't take any more energy to travel in a positive way than it does to travel in a destructive way."

Meadows is proud of what many of his former students have accomplished. "I like to see them grow in their chosen professions," he said. "It's nice to think you might have had a very small fragment of influence on them."

"You want to get them headed in the right direction," he said, "the direction they want to go in, not the direction their parents or someone else wants them to take. That's basically what we as teachers can do."

He illustrated what someone with motivation can accomplish with a story about a boy in his class who wanted to be a jet pilot. "Of course, you try not to shake your head," Meadows said, "but the odds against something like that are pretty great." He noted that years later he was talking to the boy's parents, and the student actually had gone on to be a

jet pilot, serving first in the Air Force and later working for Trans World Airlines.

Meadows taught at Paragould High School for 26 years. Before that, he taught two years at Dell High School, two years at Greene County Tech and one year in junior high school.

"I don't see a place in one's life where he can retire," he explained. "It's work, work, work if you want to get the maximum out of life."

Harding coach Ted Lloyd has been named Area V "Track Coach of the Year" by the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics.

The 47-year-old Lloyd, who was elected "Coach of the Year" in the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference and NAIA District 17, was one of seven coaches to receive the area recognition.

Area V includes the five-state area of Arkansas, Texas, Louisiana, Oklahoma and Mississippi.

Lloyd directed the 1981 Bison track team to the AIC title and enabled Harding to win the coveted All-Sports Trophy for 1980-81.

Southeastern Oklahoma State University of Durant, Okla., will provide the opposition for Bison coach John Prock's squad.


Parents' Night has traditionally been the first Bison home football game each year.


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
