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Economics Team Wins Second National Championship

Harding University's Economics Team defeated colleges and universities from 10 regions to win the 1980-81 national "Students in Free Enterprise" championship at the Sheraton Centre Hotel in New York City July 19-21, over Findlay College, Findlay, Ohio (2nd) and Lawrence Institute of Technology, Southfield, Mich. (3rd).

The Harding team received a first place trophy and a check for \$1,500 for the University's general fund. The championship climaxed a year-long contest involving nearly 200 colleges and more than 6,000 students.

Members of the Harding Economics Team are Walt Buce of Dallas, Texas, Susan Collins of Atlanta, Ga., Sally Florence of Columbus, Ohio, David Garver of Galveston, Texas, Paul Holliman of Bartlesville, Okla. and Phyllis Osborn of Knoxville, Tenn. The faculty sponsor is Dr. Don Diffine, associate professor of economics and director of the Belden Center for Private Enterprise Education.

"The competition was tougher this year," Diffine said, "but I feel that our team was stronger, as well. I think this victory, along with our past record, firmly establishes the Harding University Belden Center as one of the premier organizations in the country that is effectively emphasizing the concept of freedom applied to the market."

Co-sponsored by National Leadership Institute in Austin and the Rotary Club of Dallas, the competition began at a September 1980 orientation meeting in Dallas

for a five-state league hosted by the Southwestern Life Insurance Company.

The program theme was "Creative Capitalism." Project goals were to offer solutions to problems confronting the American economic system. The participating institutions were challenged through formal intercollegiate competition to design and implement free enterprise programs fitted to their particular campuses and communities.

At the national finals, Harding students made formal presentations before 12 nationally known business leaders and educators who served as judges. Entitled "Free Enterprise — The Great American Bargain," the Harding entry included an annotated report and a 12 x 15-foot multimedia display that elaborated on a variety of 60 projects and programs which have been presented by team members to civic, professional and educational groups in the Mid-South during the past year.

The national championship is the second for Harding after a finish as co-winner of the 1979-80 competition with New Mexico State University. The team's record now includes two national titles, a second place in the nation and five regional championships.

The regional champions competing in the national finals were Alfred University (N.Y.), Baylor University (Texas), California State - Bakersfield, Lubbock Christian College (Texas), State University of New York and Western Michigan University, in addition to the three top-ranking teams.

Teacher Education Program Receives Full NCATE Approval

Harding's Teacher Education Program has been granted the maximum seven-year accreditation by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE). The announcement was made by Lyn Gubser, NCATE director.

Accreditation applies to the University's bachelor's degree programs for elementary, secondary, special education and K-12 teachers. The approval will be valid through September 1, 1988, in keeping with new NCATE requirements for re-examination at least every seven years.

Harding will be visited by a two to four member interim evaluation team during the fifth year of accreditation. If the examiners find that the Teacher Education Program has maintained NCATE standards, accreditation of the program may automatically be renewed and the 1988 re-evaluation may be foregone.

The Teacher Education Program, which has been in existence since 1961 and has been fully accredited since 1966, was examined by the NCATE evaluation team in March.

Dr. Bobby Coker, dean of the School of Education, submitted to the examiners an institutional self-study based on recent alumni surveys. The report was validated by

the evaluation team and was presented, along with the team's own written report and Coker's response, to the National Council.

"We're very pleased with the reaccreditation," Coker said. "We feel that it attests to the quality of our program and to the quality of our graduates."

"It's a very important step for our students," he added. "Through the accreditation, it is possible for our graduates to obtain certification in most states."

According to Coker, the NCATE evaluation team members were complimentary of the Teacher Education Program, of the campus and of the School of Education's self-study report.

"They cited two major strengths in our program," he said. "They could have cited any number of strengths, but they chose our library resources and our emphasis on multi-cultural education — that is, understanding students' individual differences."

"They expressed concern that our required Bible courses might take away from our general education program, but we feel that we have a very strong program."

alumni at 7:30-9 a.m. Alumni chapel will start at 9:30 and will feature a program planned by the class of 1956. During the chapel period, alumni will have the opportunity to vote on proposed amendments to the Alumni Association constitution.

"We'll be voting on additions and revisions for the constitution," Crouch said. "The changes basically entail wording that will be more appropriate to Harding as a university and to what the Alumni Association is today." Winfred Wright, immediate past president of the Association, chaired the committee which proposed the amendments. A majority vote of the alumni present will be necessary to approve the proposals.

The Homecoming parade is scheduled for 11 a.m., and the Homecoming game will begin at 2 p.m., when gridiron competition will take place between the Bisons and the University of Arkansas - Monticello Boll Weevils. Many alumni receptions and reunions will be held following the game.

Concluding the eventful weekend will be the Blackout '81 variety show, with entertainment provided by campus personalities.

Alumni are encouraged to make early arrangements for Homecoming weekend, in order to find lodging near the campus. Local hotels are already taking reservations, Crouch said. The team cited weakness in the curriculum lab, Coker said. "We were aware of this problem, and we've been working on it. We will continue to work on the curriculum lab and bring it to a level at which it meets and surpasses the NCATE standards."

In the past 15 years, Harding University has trained more than 2,800 elementary and high school teachers, many of whom have remained in Arkansas to teach in the public schools.

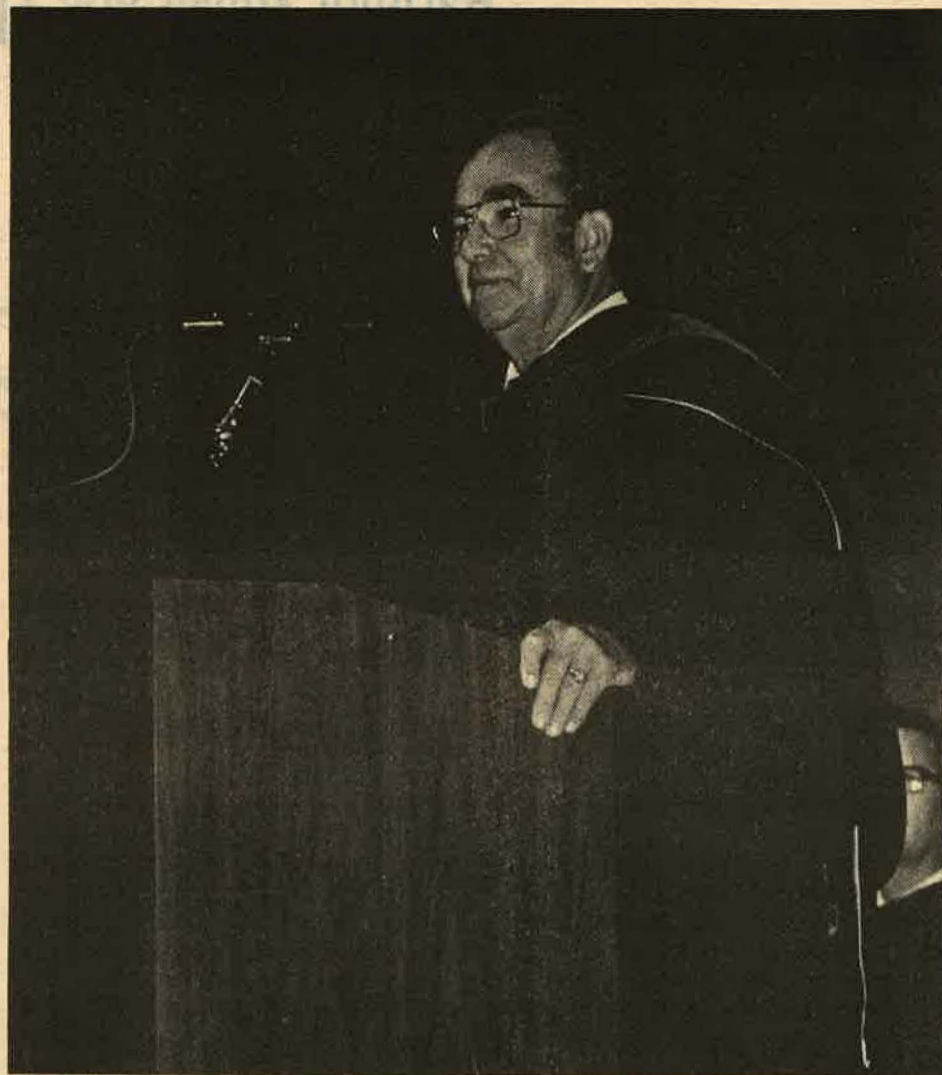
"This is a program we've been working to develop for some time," Carr said. "We feel there are many individuals in our area who would like to take night classes, and we are working to meet that need."

Summer Enrollment Reaches Record High

Summer enrollment at Harding reached a record high this year, as a total of 956 students (without duplication) participated in the intersession and two regular summer school sessions. The figure represents a 14 percent increase over the 1980 summer enrollment.

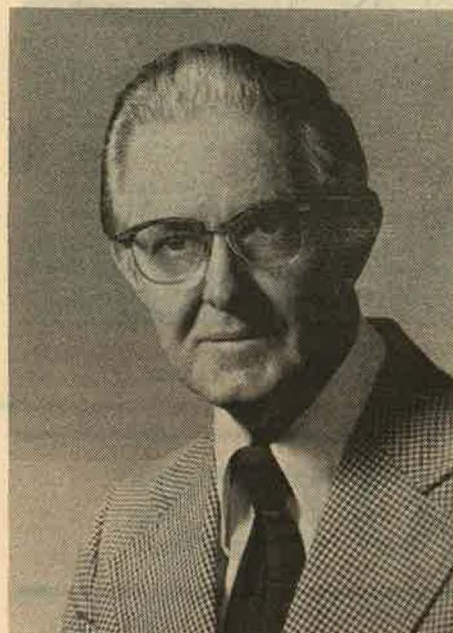
According to Virgil Beckett, registrar, the intersession showed the greatest growth, with an increase of 120 enrollees, or 40 percent, over last year.

In addition to the 519 intersession students, 554 enrolled during the first regular summer session and 500 during the second session. A total of 6,519 academic credits were earned during the summer.

The student body included 413 seniors, 101 of whom were candidates for August graduation. Also, there were 186 juniors, 137 sophomores, 90 freshmen, 104 graduates and 26 post-graduate and special students enrolled.

Development Council Serves as 'Eyes and Ears' of Harding

"The answer is YES — now what is the question?"

The above statement was made by former Board Chairman Richard Burt, but it aptly describes a group of people who are one of Harding University's most valuable assets - the President's Development Council.

"Yes" is perhaps their favorite term, because they are always ready and willing to contribute their time, efforts, talents and, yes, their money, to the development of the Harding program.

President Clifton L. Ganus organized the Council shortly after his inauguration in 1965 and he has often described its members as "the eyes and ears of Harding."

Now made up of 351 men and women from across the United States, they tell the story of Harding and its work in their home communities, to their business associates and to young people who might be interested in Christian education.

"The good which has been accomplished by Council members is beyond measure," Ganus said. "Through their influence they have created opportunities which otherwise would not have been available to us."

One of the more fundamental areas of Council involvement is that of identifying individuals who will be able to help the institution in a financial way.

According to Floyd Daniel, vice president for development, the Council is a "formal vehicle to get capable people involved in the work of Harding and Christian education.

"The national image of Harding and its work has grown through the influence and leadership of the Council members," he said.

At the Council's first meeting in August 1965, the original goal was set for 100 members. Within five years that figure was met and school officials realized that as Harding expanded its area of influence geographically, many more capable people were ready to serve.

"We look to the Council for leadership and that is why it is patterned, in a great measure, to our Board of Trustees," Daniel explained. "It is especially significant that eight of our present trustees have previously served as members of the Council."

Not to be overlooked is the fact that the spouse of the Council member is considered a full partner in Council activities. Two times each year, usually in the fall and spring, the group meets for a full weekend of meetings, briefings and consultations.

"The spouse is as active and informed as the Council member," Daniel said, "and is usually just as enthusiastic."

According to Daniel, "It is my feeling that in the 16 years since the Council was formed, Harding has enjoyed its greatest

growth in students, assets and influence in Christian education."

Comments of Council members indicate a variety of reasons for participation. Albert Duke of Magnolia, Ark. is one of the charter members of the Council, and he recalls the early years of the program.

"There was a great deal of personal response financially since we were just getting started," he said. "Then the scope of our work expanded and we made referrals of individuals in our home areas who might be able to help. All along the way we've worked closely with the development staff to assist them wherever we can.

"A key part of the program has been the effective way that Dr. Ganus has kept us informed about the activities and developments on campus. He is always available to give us an update on what's happening and then we can pass it on to those we know."

Interestingly enough, Duke's three sons, Jim, Steve and Tim, also are members of the Development Council.

Claude Collins of Atlanta, Ga., a member since 1979, sees the Council from another perspective. "One of the biggest roles the Council can play, other than financial, is assisting in the placement of Harding graduates. It was my privilege to assist a spring graduate to locate here in Atlanta, and I think this is one way we can build up the church in

our area.

"We can be not only the eyes and ears of Harding, but the legs as well."

During the spring, Collins was instrumental in coordinating the entire American Studies Program tour which took 50 Harding students to visit business operations in Atlanta.

"It was my opportunity to contribute," he said.

From another perspective, Dan Russell of Shreveport, La. is a former member of the Council who was elected to the University Board of Trustees in 1973.

"Being exposed to Christian education was a tremendous experience for me," Russell said. "I saw what Harding was really striving for in the educating and training of young people.

"I'm convinced that 'seeing is believing' and involvement in the Council provided an excellent way to bring to the campus interested people who wanted to become involved."

Yes, getting involved seems to be a key element in the success and growth of the Council. Although alumni are in obvious number on the Council, it is not a prerequisite for membership. Interest in young people, their training and education, and the willingness to step forward to become involved characterize members of the Council.

Telling the story of Harding, that's what it's all about.

Howard Returns from Guatemalan Mission Work

After three years of work among the Mayan Indians in Western Guatemala, Tonya Howard has returned to the United States.

A 1974 Harding graduate in Bible, Tonya completed nursing studies at Memphis State University and worked in Memphis area hospitals before moving to the sometimes mystic and pagan world of the Mayans.

"Looking back," Tonya said, "it has been a tremendous growing experience for sure! I've learned a lot about myself as well as the needs of others."

After adjusting to the culture differences, learning Spanish and the Quiche Indian languages, Tonya worked with the Clinica Christiana under the direction of Dr. Richard Rheinbolt, a 1965 Harding alumnus.

Now back in Memphis, Tonya's immediate plans call for a return to nursing school, this time at the University of Texas Health Science Center in San Antonio for master's work and licensure as a family nurse practitioner.

In Guatemala, Tonya's primary responsibility was the operation of the base and mobile medical clinics, outside the city of Quezaltenango. She functioned as the primary medical person and learned to diagnose and treat the common diseases found among the Indian people of the 8,000-foot highland plateau area.

In addition to the daily administration of the clinic, Tonya participated in

activities such as the "adobe stove project," the nutrition centers and home gardens.

"The adobe stove was used as an alternative to the open fire which is in most native homes," she explained. "It was much safer for the families and children to use in their cooking and heating."

She explained that the nutrition centers involved the providing of approximately 500 meals a week for native women and children. The home garden project included basic instruction in the raising of food for family use.

"So much progress has been made," she said. "The development of trust, that we were there to help them, was very

important. The people have come to appreciate what we are trying to do.

"I think my greatest feeling of accomplishment comes from knowing that we treated not only the physical ailments of the people, but we also attempted to meet their needs which were spiritual and psychological as well."

Her biggest difficulty, according to Tonya, was not having enough time to do everything she wanted to do. "Through my work in the clinic I was more the 'connecting link' and I would like to have been more involved in the evangelistic side of the work."

The Clinica Christiana is one of three groups in the Guatemala area. In addition to Dr. Rheinbolt and his wife, the

former Karen Faye Wear, other Harding graduates in the mission field are Pat Hile and his wife, the former Carol Bonnell, Dr. Robert Clark and his wife, the former Doris Bush, and Roger and Maribeth McKown. Other Harding students and alumni have participated in short term visits.

Tonya, with a little more time on her hands as she prepared to start her graduate study, is undecided about her future plans in the mission field. "I haven't really decided," she said, "but I am keeping my options open."

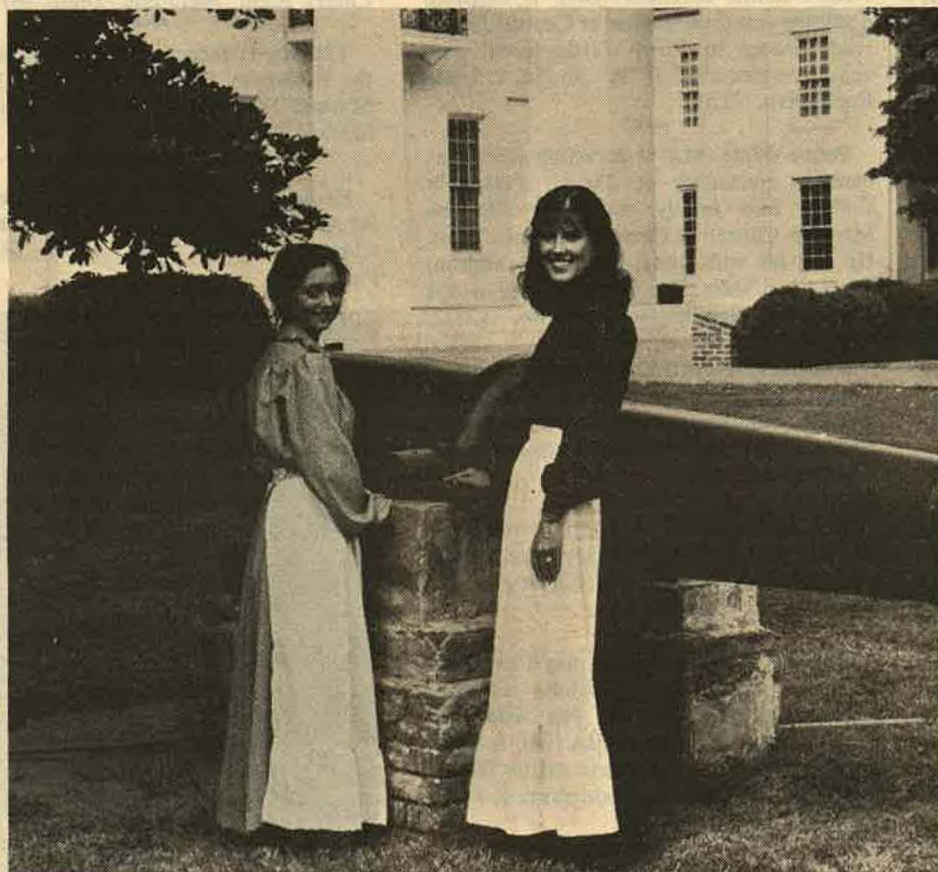

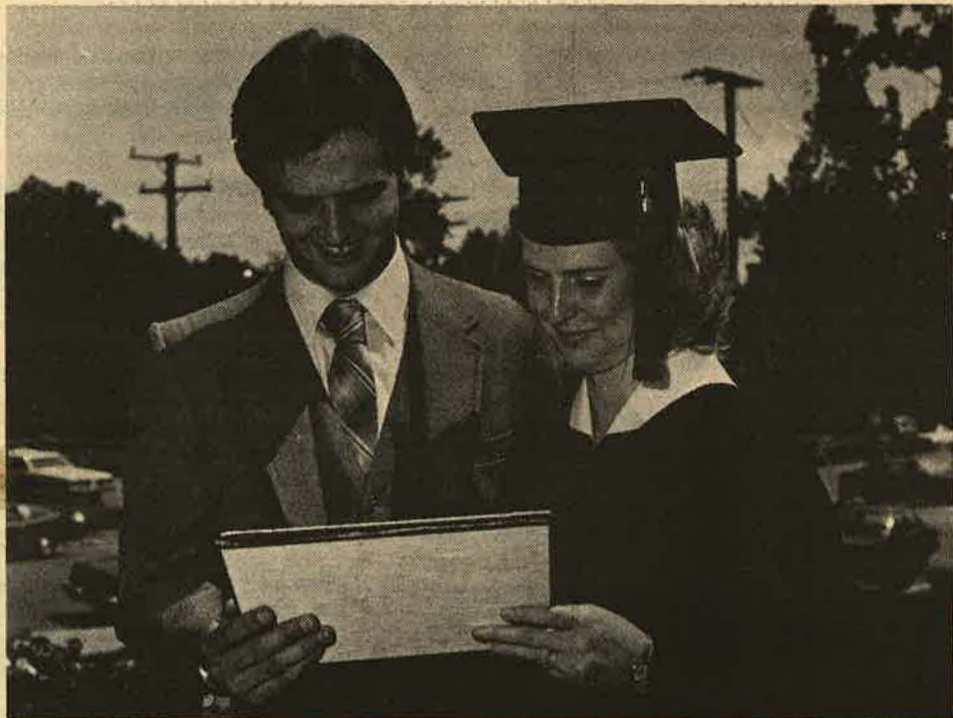

Benson Revisits China After 45-Year Absence

Dr. George S. Benson, president emeritus of Harding University, as a guest of Dr. J. D. Patterson, recently revisited China after an absence of 45 years.

The two men were in the People's Republic of China for three weeks. While touring Buddhist temples filled with large Buddha images in Peking, Nanking and Shanghai, the visitors were told, "The people are given religious freedom, but the government believes that Buddhism serves their interest best."

Benson reported that the changes observed after 45 years were quite remarkable in some areas, while in other areas there appeared to be no change at all. "The most readily observed changes," Benson reflected, "were in the way the girls dressed and combed their hair . . . Girls working in offices and, in fact, in many public places was also a decided change," Benson commented.

Benson lived in China for 11 years before becoming president of Harding in 1936. He was the first Church of Christ missionary in China and was driven out by Communists. During his stay, Benson opened three schools, Canton English School and Canton Bible School, to which the College Church of Christ holds the deed, and the School of the Poor, for the children of the coolies. On his return to China, Benson found none of these structures still in existence.

changed since 1936, Benson said. Patterson commented, "The most important message I have for American people on my return is 'Thank God you live in America.'"

Both men were amazed at the tremendous growth of American tourism in China. Last year it topped two million, and it is expected to surpass that mark this year.

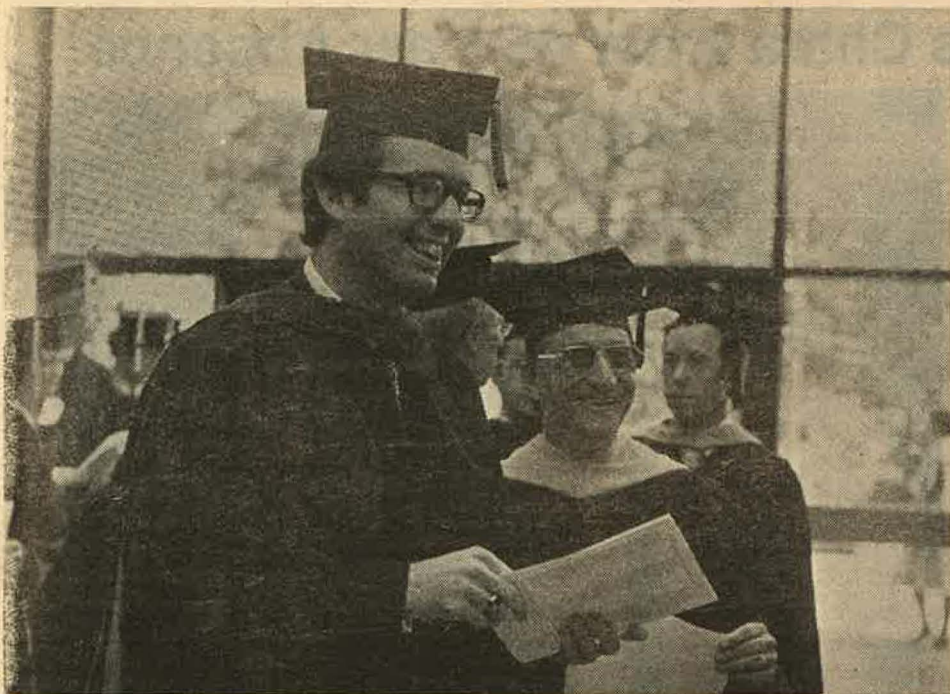

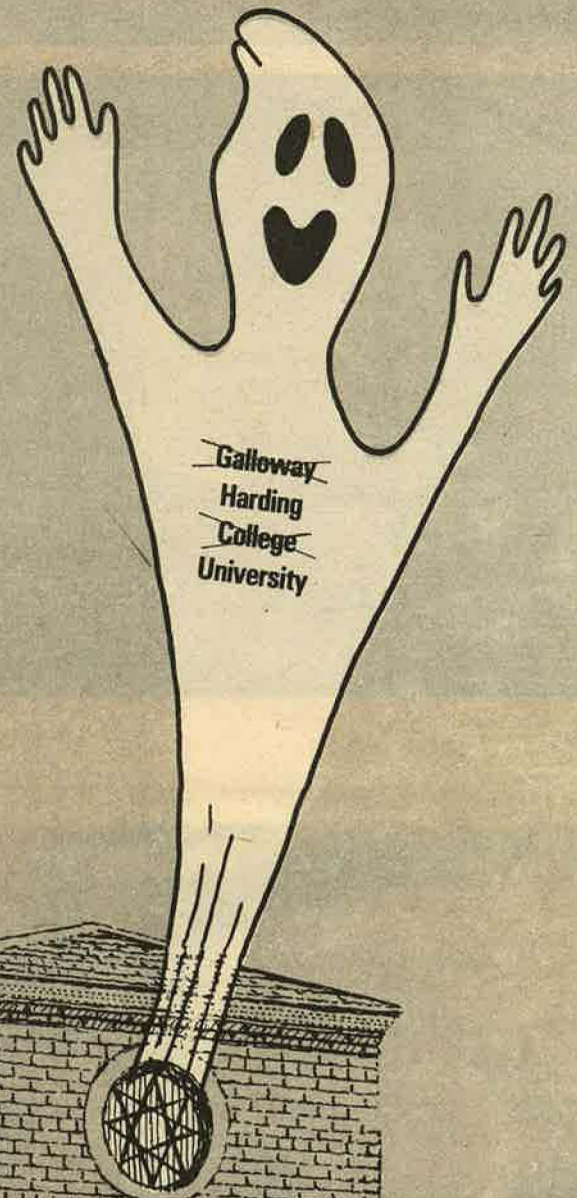

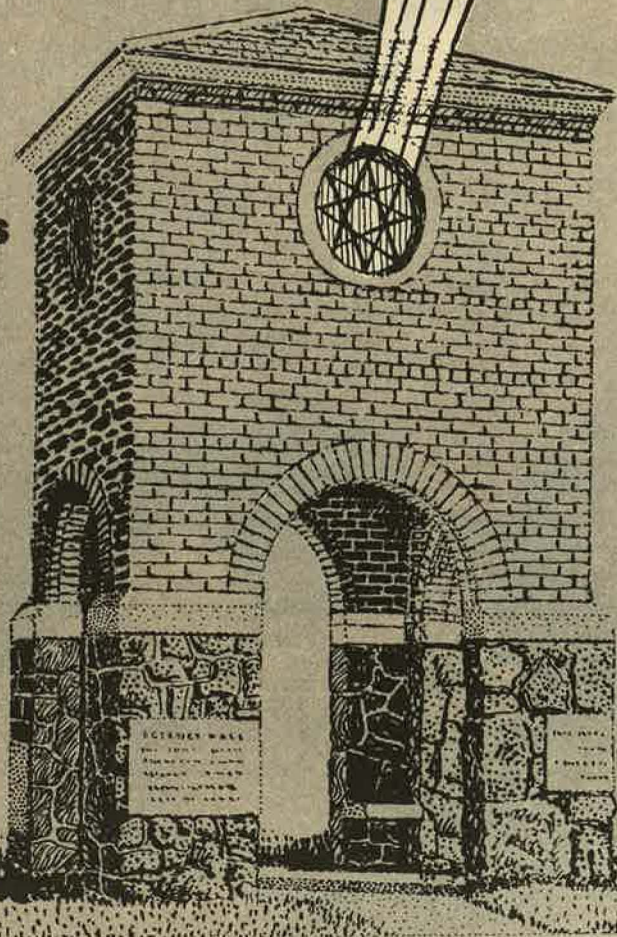
