Diplomas Presented to 389 Spring Graduates

Harding University graduated 389 students Sunday in commencement ceremonies at the Benson Auditorium.

Keynoting the event was speaker Jack Shewmaker, president of Wal-Mart Stores, Inc. He challenged the students to recognize that "success and happiness is a journey, not a destination."

Shewmaker was presented a "Distinguished American Citizen Award" by President Clifton L. Ganus.

The Distinguished Teacher Award recipients were Jeff Hopper, assistant professor of music; Dennis Organ, associate professor of English and Mary Shock, assistant professor of social work.

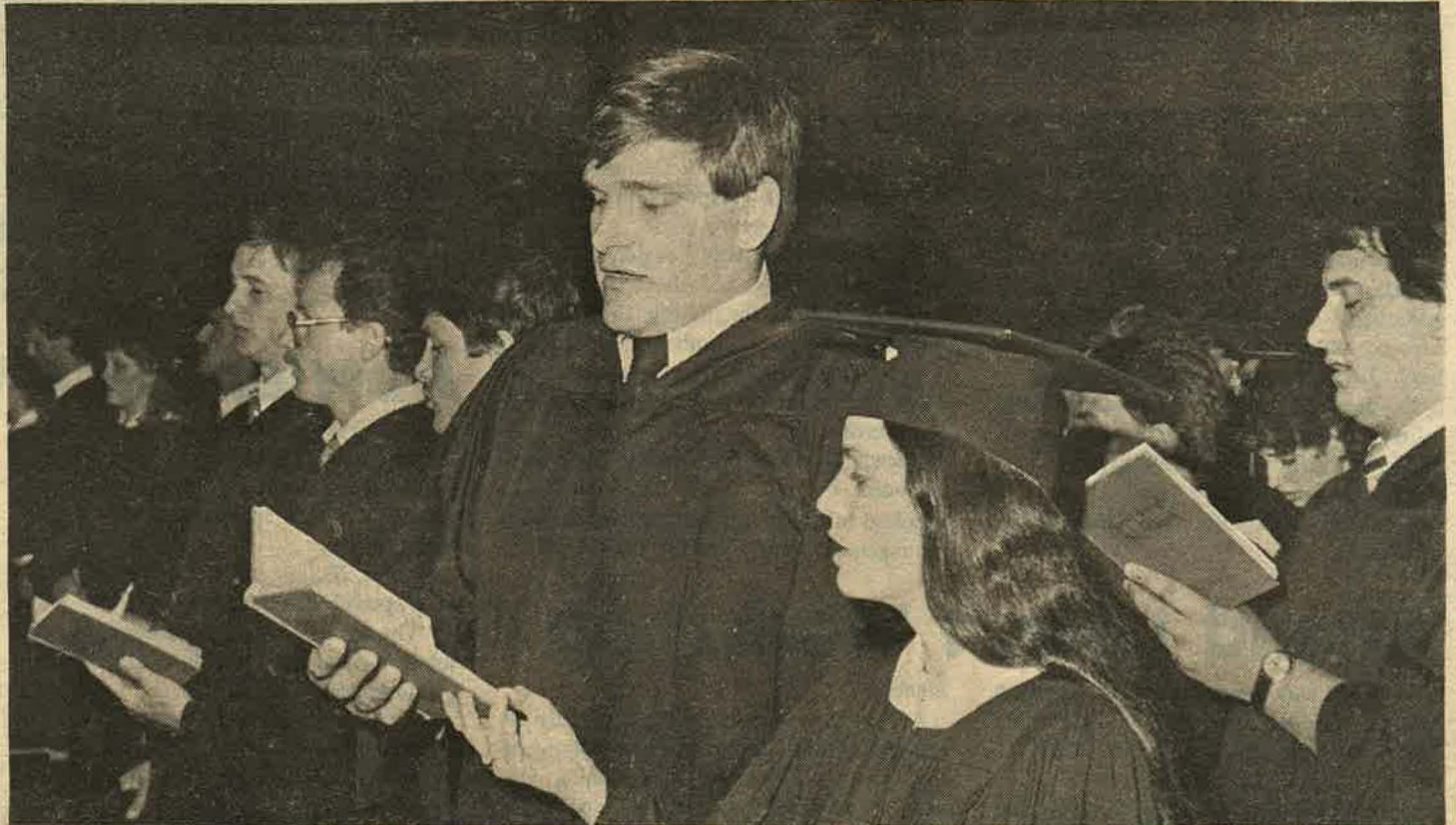

The Ray Kinslow Award for the outstanding science student was given to Dennis Thompson of Carrollton, Texas. The M.E. Berryhill Athletic Award was presented to Marty Ninemire of Salem, Ark. and the Women's Athlete of the Year Award went to Marci Crump of Salado, Texas.

The Duane Priest Premedical Scholarship Award of \$1,500 went to Charles Gary Pittman of Searcy. The Ganus Award of \$100 for the best grade point average for 1983-84 went to Kari Ann Smith of Bloomington, Minn. and David Anthony Smith of Searcy, Ark.

In journalism, the Russell L. Simmons Award for 1984-85 went to Elizabeth Harrell of Oyster Bay, N.Y. The L.O. Sanderson Music Scholarships were awarded to Brian Casey of Newark, Del. and Jay Walls of Columbus, Ohio.

The School of Nursing Head, Heart, Hands Award was presented to co-honorees, Margaret Cook of Tulsa, Okla. and Susan Anne Kehl of Knoxville, Tenn.

Picker Wins \$3,500 in Essay Competition

Bruce Alan Picker, a sophomore at Harding University, was selected as national runner-up in the Second Annual Milton Friedman National Essay Contest Monday night, April 30, in Los Angeles, Calif.

Picker, a native of Searcy, was accompanied to the awards banquet by his sponsoring teacher, David Tucker, assistant professor of economics. Picker was awarded \$3,500 and Tucker received \$1,000.

Theme for this year's contest was "Free Trade OR Fair Trade," with a maximum

essay length of 1,500 words. Picker's essay was a thousand words. The contest is sponsored by the Americanism Educational League, with headquarters in Buena Park, Calif. This year there were approximately 100 entries from U.S. college and university students. The contest is open to those students currently studying the "Free to Choose" film series by Dr. Friedman, with a limit of five entries per instructor.

Picker's essay was built around the idea of the Bill of Rights, and its protection of

free trade without the mention of fair trade. In remarks at the awards dinner, Dr. Friedman, a Nobel Laureate in economics, cited Picker's essay and said, "We cannot have both free trade and fair trade."

Picker is an accounting major and placed first in the state this spring in the Job Interview category at the annual Phi Beta Lambda competition. He is treasurer of the Harding chapter, and will participate in the national PBL competition July 5-8 in Atlanta, Ga.

He will leave from Atlanta and travel to New Orleans, La., where he will compete in the national Students in Free Enterprise economics competition July 9-12, as a member of the varsity Harding Economics (continued on page 2)

Carter Joins Harding Board of Trustees

Paul R. Carter, 43, of Bentonville, has been elected to the Harding University Board of Trustees, according to University President Clifton L. Ganus Jr.

The appointment is effective immediately.

"Paul has a deep interest in the work and mission of Harding University. He is a successful businessman, a Christian leader and a dedicated husband and father," Ganus said. "His experience and maturity will be a great asset to our Board."

Carter, a CPA and senior vice president of Wal-Mart Stores, Inc., is responsible for the company's special divisions, which include jewelry; pharmacy; shoes; tires, batteries and accessories; AIDCO, a sporting good jobber; NADCO, a hobby and crafts jobber; and Dot Discount Durg.

Carter joined Wal-Mart in 1977 and previously was senior vice president of finance for Howard Brothers Discount Centers.

A native of Drew County, Ark., Carter

graduated from Arkansas A & M (now the University of Arkansas at Monticello) in 1964, and is a member of the Arkansas

Society of CPA's and the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants.

He also serves on the Board of Directors of the Bentonville Chamber of Commerce, and is an elder of the Bentonville church of Christ.

Carter becomes the 21st member of the Board, governing body of the University. Serving as chairman of the Board is Richard Gibson of Longview, Texas; James Cone of Little Rock is vice chairman; Harold Cogburn of Forrest City is treasurer, and Jim Bill McInteer of Nashville, Tenn. is secretary.

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Success Through Service Is Advice of Shewmaker

"Success Through Service" was the title and theme of Wal-Mart President Jack Shewmaker's address May 13 at spring graduation ceremonies in the Benson Auditorium.

"You are a very special and elite group," he told the 389 graduates who were among a capacity crowd of faculty, staff, friends and family.

Shewmaker cited the graduates' opportunity to live in America, get an advanced education, and attend a Christian university.

"True happiness comes from a Christian experience and a feeling of self-worth," he added. "The true and final measure of success (of a person's life) comes from one's measurable contributions to others."

Shewmaker then shared seven observations he has made from the lives of successful individuals, as follows: 1) succeed where you are; 2) emulate greatness; 3) practice your skills; 4) resolve to help others; 5) challenge the assumptions of others; 6) persevere to pursue your goals, and 7) be a giver instead of a taker.

"Happiness is a journey, not a destination," he added; "it's a day to day process."

Shewmaker joined Wal-Mart in 1970 when the chain was operating 32 discount and variety stores with an annual sales volume of \$30 million. After hiring in as a district manager, he was promoted to Vice President of Security, the first person to hold that position in the company.

In 1974 he was elevated to Vice President of Store Operations and in 1976 was appointed Executive Vice President, with responsibility for operations, merchandise, sales and personnel.

By the time Shewmaker was named President and Chief Operating Officer in 1978, the company was operating approximately 200 stores. In December, 1981, he assumed full responsibility for the operation of the entire chain.

Wal-Mart currently employs 67,000 people and operates 667 stores in 20 states, with the number fluctuating almost daily. Shewmaker is also a member of the board of directors and executive committee of Wal-Mart Stores, Inc., with headquarters in Bentonville, Ark.

Shewmaker was born in Buffalo, Mo., attended Georgia Tech University and followed a career in business and retail management before joining Wal-Mart.

"The advancement is to recognize the fine job he's doing for Harding and his years of good service," Ganus said.

At the same time Ganus said the designation of Vice President Floyd Daniel would be changed to Vice President for University Relations. Daniel's former title was vice president for development.

"Floyd's areas of responsibility will continue to be development, alumni and placement," Ganus said. "The new designation more nearly describes his activities, since all areas under his supervision deal with our off-campus constituency."

A 1968 alumnus of Harding, Fowler was a cum laude graduate with a major in business and accounting. He was a member of the first championship business team which won a national title in the Michigan State University Business Games.

In 1971 he passed the requirements and received the Certified Public Accountant's designation. He is certified in Arkansas and Arizona and is a member of the American

Institute of CPA's.

Before returning to Harding he was an accountant for Ernst and Whinney from 1968-71 and was controller of Superlite, Inc., a division of U.S. Industries, from 1971-73.

"Whenever we have asked Al to take on additional responsibilities, he has always responded in a capable and enthusiastic way," said Daniel. "He has played a vital role in the development program at Harding University."

Fowler is married to the former Marilyn Young and the couple has a daughter, Alicia, and a son, Ryan.

Three Receive Distinguished Teacher Awards

Recipients of Harding University's 1983-84 Distinguished Teacher Awards are Jeff Hopper, assistant professor of music; Dr. Dennis Organ, associate professor of English; and Mary Shock, assistant professor of social work.

Announcement of the awards was made Sunday by University President Clifton L. Ganus Jr. during spring commencement ceremonies. Each of the three was presented a check for \$1,000, along with a framed awards certificate.

Finalists for the annual awards are selected on the basis of written evaluations by students, and by recommendation of a committee of faculty members.

Organ, 39, was appointed chairman of the English Department in 1982 and served as acting chairman of the journalism department during the 1983-84 school year. He has been a member of the faculty since 1967 and is a Louisiana native.

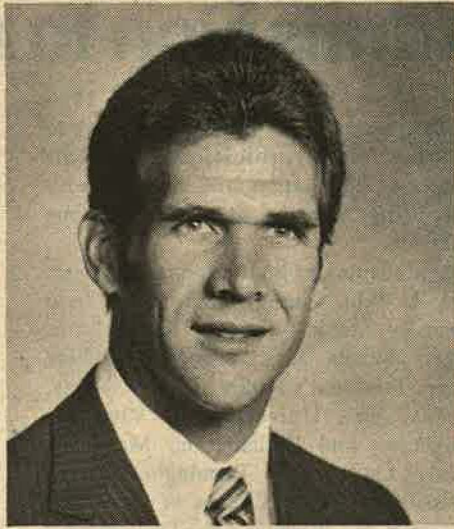
He graduated summa cum laude from Harding in 1966 and was involved in a wide variety of school activities, including Belles and Beaux, A Cappella Chorus, the varsity bowling team, and *Bison* editor for two years. He also was named the AIC Cliff Shaw Scholar-Athlete award winner his senior year.

Organ earned a master's degree in journalism from the University of Missouri — Columbia in 1968 and the Ph.D. from Texas Tech University in 1974. He serves as editor of *The Recorder*, official publication of Alpha Chi National Honor Society, and is married to the former Sherry Balthrop. The couple has three sons.

Hopper is a 1974 Harding graduate and a native of California. As an undergraduate he was involved with radio station KHCA as a disc jockey, accompanist for the Belles and Beaux, president of the A Cappella Chorus, and musical director of the 1973 Homecoming production of "My Fair Lady."

He holds the master's degree in piano performance from Southern Illinois University (1976) and is a cellist with the Harding Symphony Orchestra. Hopper has directed the Spring Sing hosts and hostesses for the past nine years and has also served as musical director for productions of "Annie Get Your Gun," "1776" and "The Fantasticks."

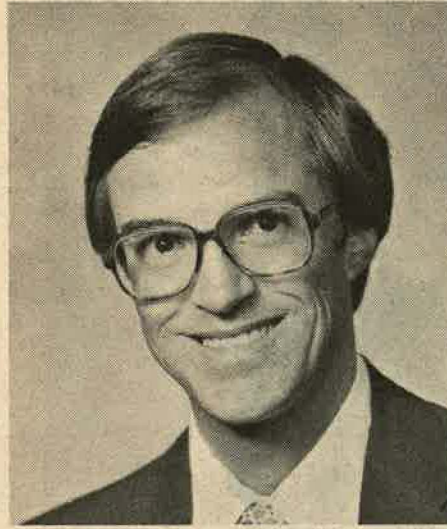

Summer Campaign Groups At Work

More than 200 faculty, staff and students from Harding University will be involved in campaigns for Christ this summer in different parts of the world. Represented will be International Campaigns, May Campaigns, Campaigns Northwest, Campaigns Northeast, Eastern European Campaigns, and mission efforts to Costa Rica, England, Nigeria and Venezuela.

International Campaigns, coordinated by Dr. Don Shackelford, and under the oversight of the College church of Christ, will send groups to Australia, England, Italy and Scotland for six weeks, beginning May 14 and ending June 24.

Tom Eddins and Ted Lloyd will lead a team of 31 to Australia, where efforts will be concentrated in Sidney, Brisbane and Toowoomba. James Walters will lead a group of 10 to England, for work in Northampton, Morley, Loughborough and Livingston. Carl Mitchell will direct a group of 24 in Italy, and Kenneth Davis will lead a team of 18 to Scotland. Harding alumnus Mike Jones, a missionary in Scotland, will also work with the Scottish campaigners. Efforts will be centered in Peterhead, East Kilbride, Kirkaldy, Wellingborough, Castlemilk, and Sighthill.

May Campaigns, directed by Dwight Smith, is also under the oversight of the College church of Christ. During the week of May 13-18, 52 students will work with Arkansas congregations in Ash Flat, Dierks, Dover, Marked Tree, Mayflower, Monticello, Murfreesboro and Newport.

Campaigns Northwest is directed by Obert Henderson, under the oversight of the Downtown church of Christ. Nineteen Harding students are committed to this work, with several students from other Christian colleges also planning to help. Dates for the campaign are May 13-Aug. 5. Evangelistic efforts are planned for Toledo, Beaverton and Gresham, Ore.; Spokane, Wash.; and Boise and Caldwell, Idaho.

Campaigns Northeast is directed by Owen Olbricht, and overseen by the Sylvan Hills church of Christ. Approximately eight Harding students will work with other students from across the country in evangelistic efforts. Cities and dates are as follows: May 20-June 8, East Syracuse, N.Y., Marion, Ill., Randolph and Smithfield, N.J.; June 10-29, Baltimore, Md. and Indianapolis, Ind.; June 10-Aug. 9,

Laurelwoods, New Egypt and Freehold, N.J., and Rochelle, Ga.; July 1-20, Aiken, S.C.; July 29-Aug. 9, Xenia, Ohio.

Eastern European Campaigns is directed by Fred Jewell and Ike Hamilton. Two adults and five students will participate June 4-July 30.

Ron and Faye Doran will lead a team of 10 Harding students to San Jose, Costa Rica May 12-26. They will be part of Global Campaigns, directed by the Minter Lane church of Christ in Abilene, Texas. This is the third year for the Dorans to take a team.

Bobby and Sue Parks will lead a team of 34, including 28 students in the Harding School of Biblical Studies (formerly CCP) and four wives, to London, England May 15-31. They will work with the Illerton Road congregation in the South Bermondsey district of London. Vurel Vick is the minister at the Illerton Road church.

Nancy Clark and six or seven nursing students will be in Nigeria for 10 weeks, June 4-Aug. 10, at the Nigerian Christian Hospital.

Bill and Ava Conley will be taking five students to Venezuela June 1-July 12, where they will work with churches in San Felipe and Caracas. This is the seventh year that the Conleys have been to Venezuela. They will do one-on-one Bible studies and also followup work with Bible correspondence course graduates.

Another effort is MISSION/PREPARE, under the direction of Van Tate. Five students are signed up to work with churches in Italy, the Philippines, Scotland, Singapore, and the Pacific Northwest.

Other Harding students will be spending the summer working with congregations as youth ministers, camp counselors, Bible class teachers, song leaders and evangelists.

West Named Outstanding Citizen

Herman West, director of Harding University Press for the past 32 years, was recently selected "Outstanding Citizen of the Year" in 1983 for White County, Ark.

West was nominated for the annual award by the Searcy Lions Club, and was selected from among 16 local nominees by a panel of judges. Radio station KWCK-KSER in Searcy sponsors the award.

West has also been a member of the Lions Club for 37 years, serving as president of Mid-South Lions Sight Service, president of the Arkansas Enterprises for the Blind in Little Rock, president of the Arkansas Eye and Kidney Bank, and chairman of the Arkansas Lions Committee for Conservation.

He was appointed on two different occasions to special committees of the board of Lions Clubs International in addition to having served a two year term as a director of the world-wide organization.

35 Pinned At Nursing Ceremony

The Harding University School of Nursing conducted their annual spring pinning ceremony Saturday, May 12 at 7 p.m. in the Benson Auditorium with several hundred persons in attendance.

Priscilla Parsons of Atlanta, Ga., a former member of the Harding nursing faculty, delivered the keynote address and told the 35 senior nursing students that life is full of changes. "Every stage of life provides new possibilities for growth," she said. "We are constantly graduating from one area into another, and becoming freshmen all over again."

Jerry Myhan, assistant professor of nursing, introduced the nursing faculty to the audience and Dr. Cathleen Shultz, dean of the School of Nursing, presented the candidates for pinning.

Several awards were presented. Jeff Walling, minister from California, was the guest speaker at Youth Forum, and according to Chris Dell, admissions counselor and co-coordinator of Youth Forum, there were nine baptisms and 141 responses for Walling's four sermons. Walling was also the speaker at last year's Youth Forum, and will be the featured speaker again next year.

"It was a great weekend for everyone concerned," said Wilson.

Wilson Receives Travel Grant

Dr. Edmond Wilson, professor of chemistry at Harding, has received a travel grant to visit a vitamin and mineral nutrition research laboratory of the United States Department of Agriculture in Beltsville, Md. for six weeks this summer.

The special grant from the research corporation will allow him to develop a research proposal in chromium biochemistry. The Beltsville lab is the leading site for research of this type.

"Chromium is one of the essential trace elements for the normal, healthy functioning of the human body," Wilson said, "and although the biochemistry of chromium is not fully understood, current evidence indicates that one of the chief functions of chromium in the body is for proper glucose metabolism. If the exact mechanism of glucose metabolism, including the influence of chromium, were known, then better preventive and therapeutic measures could be utilized to alleviate the physiological symptoms due to disturbed glucose utilization, such as is seen

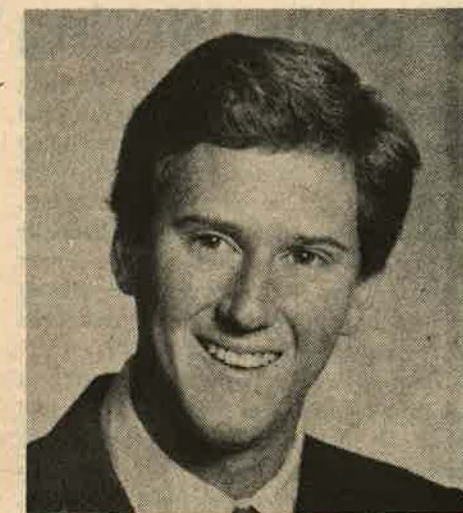

Alumnus Teaches Printing to Nigerians

Little did I realize when I started corresponding with an old college friend that one day I would be joining him on the mission field as a co-worker. When I renewed friendship with Henry Huffard and his wife Jane, they were on the way to Nigeria, West Africa to work with the Nigerian Christian Hospital located at Onicha Ngwa in Imo State.

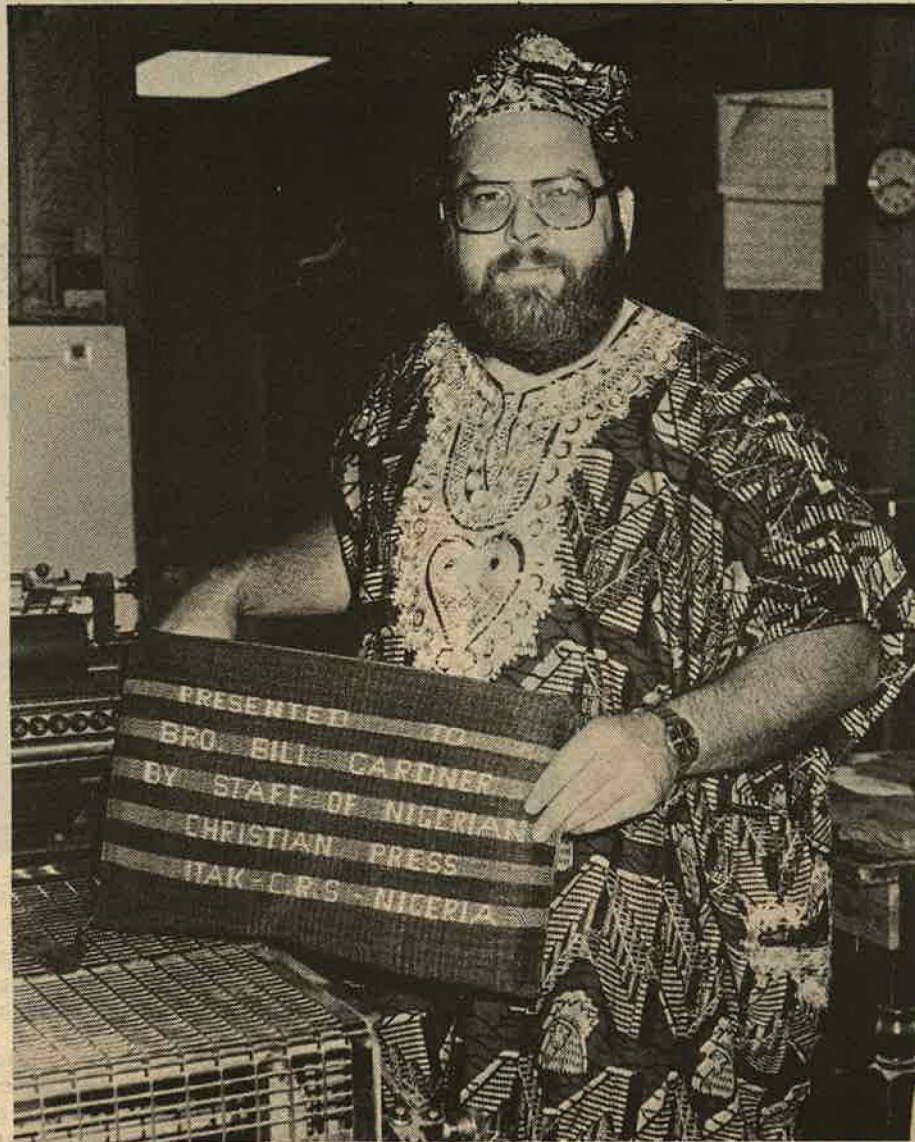
When they arrived on the field I started writing letters to Henry to keep them informed of things at home. Henry was aware of the Nigerian Christian Press and the need they had for someone to come and teach the printers there how to use the new presses that had been at that location for two years.

Henry knew I had been a printer for many years and was familiar enough with presses to be able to teach someone else how to use them. He also knew that when I heard about new presses that had never been inked there would be a pull on me to fulfill a dream to ink up a new press.

When the decision was made to go, things began to happen. My support was provided for and people helped me to make travel plans. I got a passport, shots, and visa. All of the plans seemed to go fairly smoothly. Then the realization that I had to leave my wife and children for three months set in. We had been apart before but not for this long. But we decided we could handle it with God's help.

Then came the challenge to bring some medicine for the Nigerian Christian Hospital. The Lord must have wanted that medicine there because there were relatively few problems in getting it delivered. Finally I was in Africa and ready to get the presses rolling.

There were many problems in getting the 60-cycle American-made presses to run on the 50-cycle African electricity. I had to get a water system in use because of the need in offset presswork for water. After building a mini water tower to hold two 55-gallon drums for water storage, John Beckloff, fellow missionary, installed a new sink on the inside of the

building. It was interesting to try and get the four pressmen to use this new device. They were accustomed to using a basin on a stand outside the building. But they finally adapted.

I started using a 110 volt generator for the 60-cycle presses. Then I started from where they were in their understanding of printing. They are very smart and were able to learn the information very quickly. Some of the terms I used as an

American printer meant something slightly different. Our term "gathering," applied to putting sheets in order of original, duplicate and so on was called "sorting" by them. But we overcame minor things like that and got some tracts, business cards and forms printed along with some time cards for the hospital.

They were surprised at how fast these new machines could do the same work

they had been laboring with in the letterpress part of printing. The look on the manager's face was one of disbelief. He had seen this piece of machinery doing nothing but rusting for two years. And to see the possibilities for the future was indeed enlightening.

As the bond of friendship between these men and myself grew, they began to call me teacher, a term of affection. At one time during the three months I was concerned that my trip was going to be wasted. Before I left to come home, however, I was confident that the information I had given to them would cause them to be able to keep the presses lubricated and running smoothly in the years to come.

I decided that we needed to have a special dinner similar to a graduation. On the sly, at times when they were not around, I made them some certificates of testimony that were given to them for their efforts. They had had a "chief" shirt made for me and the hat to go with it. Then they presented me with a handmade raffia-palm tree briefcase engraved with my name.

This trip went down in my memory book as one of the most interesting things I have ever experienced. The gospel in the printed page will go far in that country. The cost of paper is high. We pay about \$4.00 for a ream of paper in the United States. That same ream of paper in Nigeria costs upwards of \$62.00 and the price was rising daily. Maybe the cost of the paper will offset the major cost of shipping pre-printed material to them.

There are people in Nigeria that have never seen a white man much less read about a man named Jesus. You might have to go to the north and back into the bush but those people still exist in our world today.

The presses are rolling. The main purpose is still to carry out Jesus' command to go teach all nations. With the blessing of these presses maybe the gospel can be preached to many more people and the cause of the gospel can be spread further in this part of the world.

Couple Plans Deaf Ministry for Southeast Asia

Sam (BA '53) and Ruth Roach, who made a two month trip to Southeast Asia in December 1978 and January 1979, are returning to the area this summer to implement a program for evangelizing the deaf.

In addition to teaching and preaching Christ, they will be conducting training classes to teach and train native Christians for the Lord's work among deaf people in their respective areas. Also, they will encourage and strengthen those already involved in teaching and preaching to the deaf.

Planned stops on their two-year effort are in Japan, Korea, Thailand, Malaysia, Singapore, and Indonesia.

Brother Roach, hard of hearing since birth, has been active in teaching the deaf the way of life in Christ since 1946. He has been responsible for deaf congregations coming into being in Little Rock, Ark.; Detroit and Lansing, Mich.; and Memphis, Tenn.; and has helped the Lord's church meeting at Exchange Street, Union City, Tenn. to develop their program of work in

that area. He also was responsible for starting the campus sign language training class at Harding University in the 1950s. Later this class began what is known as the Dactylogy Club. This class has yielded outstanding workers among the deaf, such as Bob Anderson, Hollis Maynard, Gary Blake, and others.

Sam and Ruth Roach have also developed a home Bible study series, "The Bible and You," for prospective converts. This series is being translated and adapted for use with both hearing and deaf people in Thailand, using their own translation of the Bible. Other nations will be included as the opportunity arises.

"We do not believe that there is a more pressing need at this time — the deaf have been neglected and have had little opportunity to hear the Good News in its purity and simplicity regarding the way of life in Christ," Brother Roach said during a recent visit to Searcy.

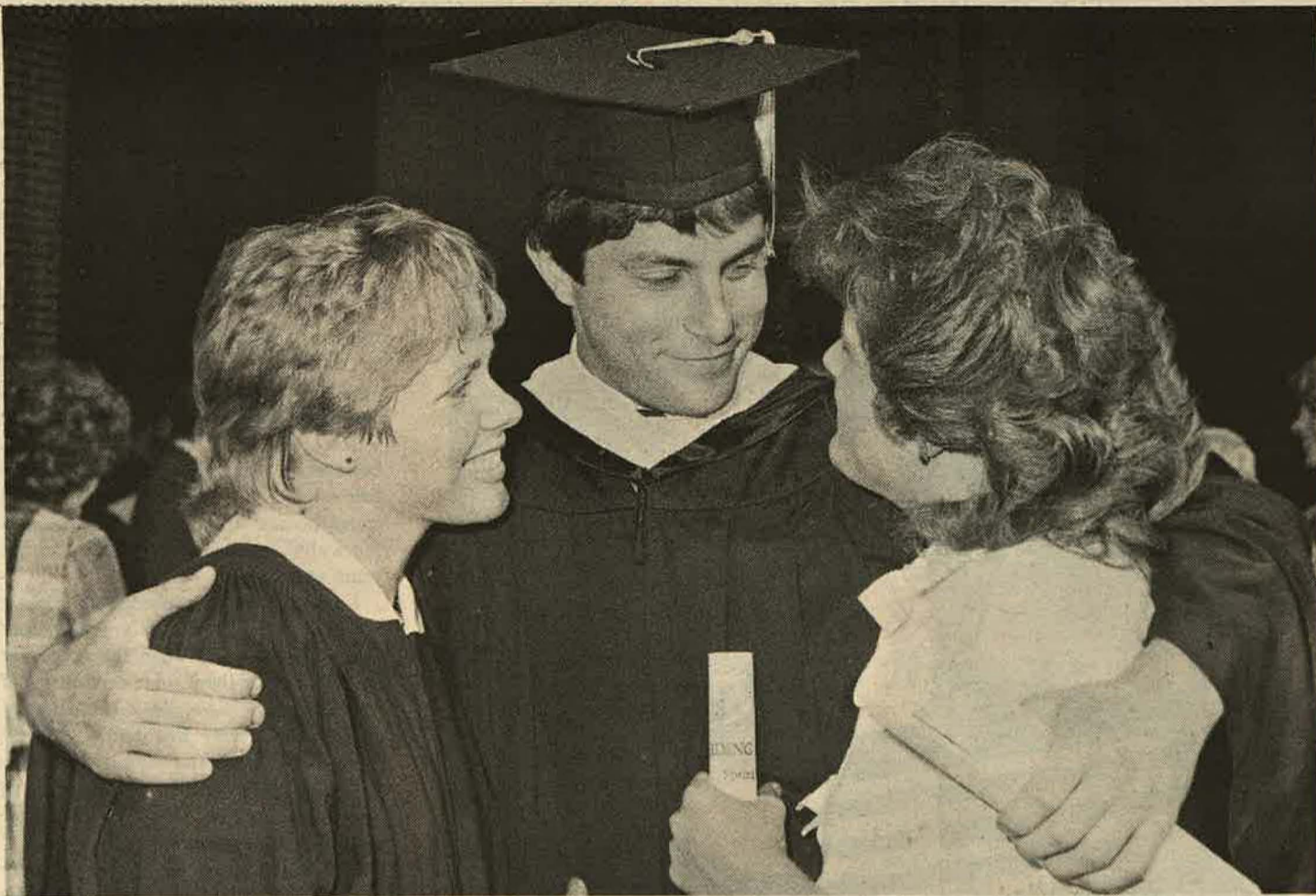
The elders of the Lord's church meeting at East Frayser, Memphis, Tenn., are

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Medical Mission Team Ministers to

Harding University nurses recently took part in a nine-day effort to bring both physical and spiritual relief to inhabitants of the San Blas Islands, located off the eastern coast of Panama.

The biannual medical missions trip, entitled Panama Campaigns, was sponsored March 30-April 7 by the Forest Park church of Christ in Valdosta, Ga. and directed by Bob Bryson. Bryson, who organized the campaigns approximately 20 years ago, was aided by a team of 47 medical professionals from all over the southern United States.

Included in the team were four Harding students, three faculty members and five alumni.

Dr. Nancy Clark, assistant to the dean of the School of Nursing, served as the University's campaign coordinator, and made her 10th trip to Panama. Jim City, M.D., and Jerry Myhan, assistant professor of nursing, along with four nursing majors — Angel Carter, Meg Cook, Lena Meisner and Kathy Youngblood — also made the trip, as did Harding alumni Jan Brown, David Sayle, John Brinkley and Bill and Peggy Perkins.

Each of the participants raised his or her own support, which amounted to approximately \$900 apiece.

The trip began for the Harding group when they boarded a flight from Little Rock to Panama, with layovers in Atlanta and Miami. At Colon they joined the other members of the team for an eight-hour boat ride which took them to the focal points of the campaign — Tupelie and Which-hub-wala — two of the 54 inhabited islands in the San Blas chain.

Upon arrival, the team received a warm greeting from the natives and island leaders alike. The islanders are Cuna Indians, a fact which made communication difficult. But faculty members of the Panama Bible School (located in Panama City) served as interpreters, translating Cuna to Spanish — the common language — and Spanish to English, or vice-versa, as the situation

dictated.

Cooperation on the part of natives, translators and campaigners made a seemingly impossible job become a valuable learning experience for everyone involved. "All considered, this is one of the best groups we have ever had," stated Clark. "Things really went smoothly, just like clockwork."

According to Meg Cook, a senior nursing major from Owasso, Okla., the Cuna women wore traditional gold rings through their noses, were arrayed in beautiful colors, and dressed identically in blue wrap-around skirts and blouses made of sewn-together molas (vividly-colored square patches of cloth depicting birds, fish and other island scenes). Red and yellow scarves and strings of beads completed the women's attire.

The men, however, dressed much like American men, and island chiefs could easily be distinguished by the black felt hats they wore.

The islands themselves are small and sandy with sparse vegetation, crowded by natives living in grass huts. Most of the islanders farm on the mainland where the natives get their food supplies and timber or bamboo for building. Islanders are even buried on the mainland but prefer living elsewhere because the wind and sea keep insects away.

Approximately 2,400 natives received medical attention during the campaign. Each patient was given a basic physical examination, and then specific problems were treated. One of the most common diseases treated was measles, an affliction which kills about 50 percent of the Cuna children every year.

Because the islands have no system for sanitation, other than the nearby ocean, worms and skin-related diseases also cause a number of problems for the natives. However, dental work was the most needed service and took up many hours of each day.

Many workers gave up their breaks in order to make hut visits, aiding the needs of those unable to come to the clinics. In one instance, a campaigner treated a woman who was bedridden with a 105-degree fever. The nurse provided antibiotic therapy for the patient, and the

woman was up walking around by the time the health care team left.

An estimated \$100,000 in drugs was donated to the Panama Campaign work by various pharmaceutical companies. Toothbrushes, toothpaste, vitamins and worm medicine were given to each patient who came to the clinics. For many of the Cuna Indians, the campaigners provided the only medical attention they had received in a very long time because each island has its own witchdoctor.

Clark and City recognized a need, on this visit, for unique attention that was not exactly medical. A number of island superstitions place a pregnant woman in the position of social outcast. She must live separated from her husband and everyone else during the term of her pregnancy. To allay some of the fears on the subject and to diminish some of the superstitions, Clark and City conducted a maternity clinic for the women.

Although much time was spent in meeting the physical needs of the Cunas, the primary purpose of the Panama Campaigns was spiritual in nature, and everyone who came to the clinics was exposed to the gospel in some way. Medical workers spent countless hours talking to those who were waiting to be

treated and encouraging interest in learning about Christ and His church. As a result of these conversations, many Bible studies were set up and often conducted during the workers' only breaks.

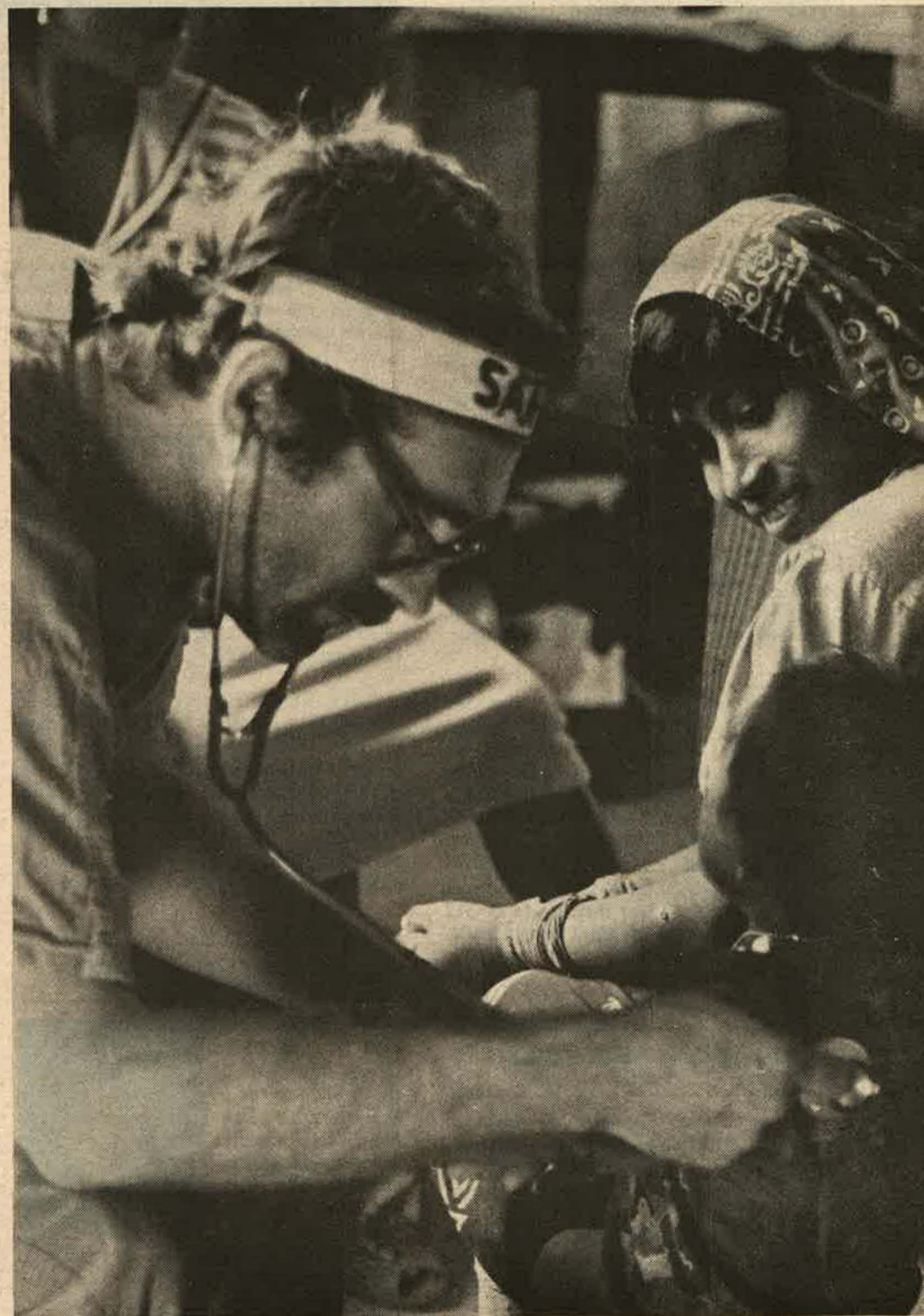
The Harding nursing students also taught Bible classes for the island children, using colorful lessons written in Spanish. Stories such as the good Samaritan and the unforgiving servant dominated the sessions. The nurses felt that teaching these Bible classes was a great learning experience not only for the children but also for themselves.

Each evening was capped by a gospel meeting, translated into both Cuna and English. On the island of Tupelie, Ferdinand Ponce, a Nicaraguan missionary who recently has spent much of his time with the islanders, led the meetings which reinforced all the other evangelical efforts by the Christians. Forty-nine baptisms on the two islands during the campaign and eight more since that time reflect the success of the Christian medical team.

Another sign of Panamanian campaign effectiveness in the past was the willingness of the islanders of Which-hub-wala to sacrifice for the church. In a previous effort on that island, the natives

donated a parcel of land, an extremely precious commodity in the island chain, for the Christians to build a church building. In another incident, the island chief of Tupelie missed a very important annual chiefs' meeting because he was so impressed by the work of the medical team.

Although the work was hard and the hours long, the benefits were great for everyone involved. Clark stated that the opportunity for her nurses to be exposed to another culture and to learn new application skills was invaluable.

"Watching the Cuna Indians accept Jesus Christ with such enthusiasm was really encouraging," explained Carter, a senior nursing major from Nashville, Tenn. "They taught me to be happy with what I have because they had so little and still were so happy."

"The most striking thing to me was seeing the power of the gospel," added Cook. "Never before had I seen those without the gospel so willingly respond."

The next major Panama Campaign is scheduled for January of 1985 when the workers will visit different islands in the chain. During the interim students from the Panama Bible School will help strengthen the new converts, who hopefully, will make other converts.

The Harding Bison tennis team pulled off a thrilling, come-from-behind victory over conference rival Southern Arkansas University April 13 to clinch a share of the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference championship.

In doing so, the Bisons overcame a 4-2 deficit in singles play to take a clean sweep of the three doubles matches and dispel any jinx from playing on Friday the 13th.

"It's been a long time since I've had one (win) this exciting," said a jubilant coach David Elliott after the marathon five-hour contest by a score of 5-4.

Nigel Liverpool and Peter Nanton, the number one doubles combo for Harding, scored a quick 6-2, 6-3 win over Hernan Guevara and Robert Barr. At number two doubles Jon Wood and Nat Malone defeated Roger Meredith and Kyle Humphrey 6-4, 7-6 (7-1).

With the adrenalin flowing and the match on the line, Donnie Wallis and Michael Clayton, playing at number three doubles, responded with an identical 6-4, 7-6 (7-1) win over Roger Payne and Kip Humphrey.

It was a classic tennis match, similar to the 1983 District 17 tournament when

Harding beat SAU 32-30 with a win at number three doubles.

The Bisons lost to a tough Arkansas Tech University team April 23 by a score of 6-3, forcing the championship into a three-way tie between Tech, Harding and SAU.

Final results of the NAIA District 17 tournament April 30-May 1 were SAU 28, Tech 26 and Harding 25.

"We achieved our main goal for the year by winning a piece of the AIC championship," Elliott said. "Of course, the district title would have been icing on the cake, but things just didn't fall into place for us." Overall, I'm pleased with our players and the tremendous progress they made during the year."

Wallis was involved in two of Harding's three wins at the district tournament, taking the number four singles title and helping Mike Clayton win the number three doubles title.

Liverpool, a junior, and Nanton, a graduating senior, were named to the All-AIC and All-District teams for Harding. Wallis was close behind in the balloting, gaining honorable mention status.

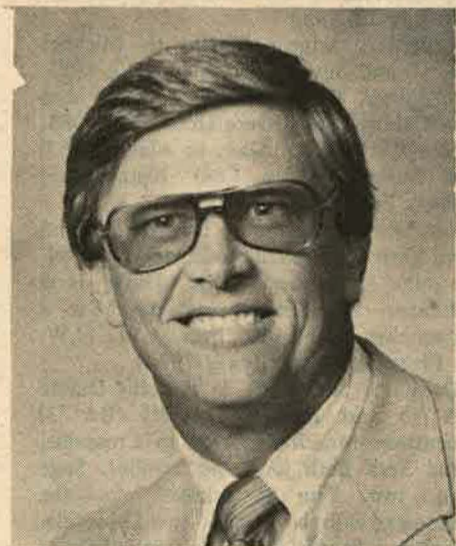
"We're fortunate to have such a qualified man available," Olree said, "and we think he will make a fine addition to our staff."

A native of Texarkana, Texas, Boyd began his coaching career at Arkadelphia High School where he served from 1969-71. From 1971 to 1976 he coached at Cabot High School and was named Region 6AA Coach of the Year in both 1975 and 1976.

administration as the principal of Cabot Junior High. In the fall of 1982 he joined Harding Academy as head basketball coach.

Boyd replaces Butch Gardner, who recently accepted the position of head basketball coach at the University of Arkansas — Pine Bluff.

Golfers, Tracksters Take Third

Standout individual performances were recorded in golf and track competition as each of the Harding teams finished third in Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference competition.

Five tracksters qualified for the NAIA national track and field championships in Charleston, S. C., including sprinters Tony McCoy of Texarkana, Texas; Attah Frimpong of Kumasi, Ghana; Gill Stegall of Searcy and Drake Jackson of Temple, Texas. Al Bates, a sophomore from Nashville, Tenn. is entered in the 1500 meter event.

For the first time in recent memory, coach Ted Lloyd will have three bona fide sprinters seeking to qualify in their

specialty. A trio of the group, McCoy Stegall and Frimpong, all placed in the 100-meter dash in the AIC meet.

In the AIC track meet, the Bisons placed third with 78.5 points.

On the golf course, coach Phil Watkins' team got off to a slow start in AIC play. Behind sophomore Didier Villard of Royan, France and John Talkington of Searcy, the Bisons closed with a surge to take third place.

Villard, for the second straight year, was named to the All-AIC and All-NAIA District 17 all-star teams. He shot rounds of 74-76 — 150 to place second in the individual district competition.

Bison Baseballers Clinch AIC Championship

A never-say-die Harding University baseball team twice came from behind to sweep a doubleheader from Arkansas Tech on the final day of the season to clinch its first Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference title since 1938.

Homeruns by catcher Payton Burgess of Newport and pitcher Steve Pilkington of Heber Springs, Ark. and strong pitching efforts by Pilkington and senior Jimmy Sites of North Little Rock propelled coach Dick Johnson's squad to the pair of victories and the Bisons finished 12-2 in league action and 19-15 on the season.

The championship is the first for Harding since 1938 when Elwin "Preacher" Roe, who went on to major league fame with the Brooklyn Dodgers, led his Harding teammates to the AIC championship. (The AIC was reorganized in 1947 and Harding, after a break of some years, returned to intercollegiate competition in 1957.)

"It's tremendous," Johnson said. "There's just no way to describe the kind of feeling we had the day we beat Tech. The kids just kept coming back, they're a bunch of fighters, all right."

The Bisons went into the doubleheader with Tech 10-2. They had dropped single games to Central Arkansas, Henderson State and Southern Arkansas during regular play. However, use of an ineligible player caused Southern Arkansas to forfeit to give the Bisons only two conference losses.

"An awful lot of credit has to go to our captains, Marty Ninemire and Jimmy Sites," Johnson said. "They've been after the championship idea all along. They set the team goals high and I believe that's what pulled them through a couple of those close ballgames we've had."

"At the first of the year we really weren't for sure what our chances were," Johnson

said. "We expected to have some depth on the mound, but lost a couple of pitchers and our catcher before the season even started. That situation made it a challenge and the team accepted it."

Ninemire, a four-year standout at third base, enjoyed his best collegiate season by hitting for a hefty .417 average. The Salem, Ark. senior also drove in a team-leading 27 runs.

Sites and Pilkington paced the Bison pitching staff. Pilkington led the team with a 6-1 record and Sites had a 5-2 mark.

Others who experienced standout seasons included the shortstop-second base combo

of Randy Hindman of North Little Rock and Greg Thompson of Decatur, Ill. "They gave us strength up the middle, great defense and they had great seasons at bat," Johnson said. Hindman hit .330, stole 21 bases and Thompson had a .354 average with 25 runs batted in.

Billy Tucker, a Searcy native who stepped into a starter's role in left field, led the team with 40 base hits while putting together a .370 batting average.

"What's unusual is that we have some key veterans like Ninemire, but overall we were really a pretty young bunch," said assistant coach Steve Smith. "We usually started

three or four sophomores and a freshman and defense was good for us all year long."

Johnson summed it up by saying, "Everyone on this team made a contribution. Not only the guys on the field, but the fellows on the bench as well. Against Arkansas Tech a couple of the reserves were so hoarse from yelling they could hardly talk. They're a great bunch of young men and they did a great job for us this year."

Four Bisons received post season honors. Named to the All-AIC and All-NAIA District 17 teams were Ninemire, Hindman and Pilkington. Tucker also earned a position on the All-District team.

Kirkland Authors Magazine Article

Roy Kirkland, a May graduate of Harding University with a master's degree in education, is the author of an article published in the April 1984 issue of *The Coaching Clinic*, a monthly magazine distributed nationally and published by Princeton Educational Publishers, Princeton, N.J.

The article, entitled "Agility and Quickness Formula," deals with several drills that can be used for any sport, including the 40-yard dash, 25-yard dash, jump rope, star drill, etc. The drills can be used to determine time, speed, and number of repetitions for athletes.

Kirkland included a mathematical formula by which coaches can determine the standard deviation and correlation factors for comparison with other tests of athletic prowess and ability.

The article was written in connection with a graduate class taught by Dr. Wyatt Jones, director of graduate studies. "Roy is an able scholar and coach and will make a fine teacher," Jones said. "The publication of this article is a small indication of his many abilities."

Kirkland is a former football standout at the University and has served as a graduate coach at Harding while pursuing the master's degree. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Leroy Kirkland of Ward. He is married to the former Carla Brents, a registered nurse. Roy has accepted a job as assistant football coach and business teacher at Harding Academy in Memphis for the 1984-85 school year.

Johnson Named Coach of Year In AIC and NAIA District 17

Dick Johnson of Harding University, who led his team to the 1984 conference baseball championship, has been named "Coach of the Year" in NAIA District 17 and the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference.

Selection was made by ballot of the area coaches.

In what was supposed to be a down year for the Bisons, Johnson led Harding to its first collegiate baseball title since 1938. That year Arkansas Hall of Famer Elwin "Preacher" Roe led the Bisons to the championship.

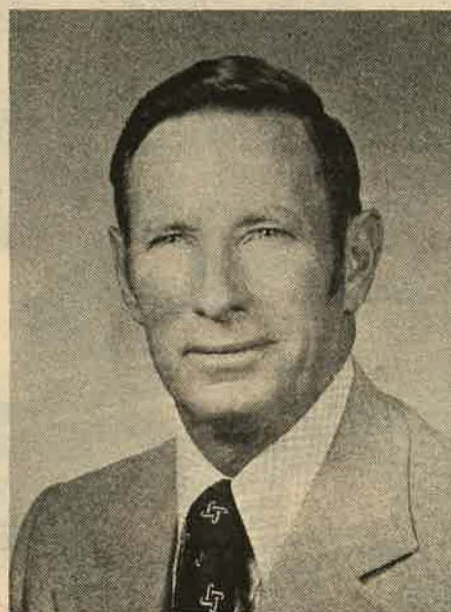
This season Harding went 12-1 to capture the AIC title and finished the season 19-15.

"We had our work cut out for us," Johnson said. "Our kids played with a lot of heart and hustle and I'm really proud of what they accomplished. This team was a great bunch of players."

For the 59-year-old Johnson, the award was his second during his tenure with the Bisons. In 1972 he also was honored when Harding qualified for the NAIA District 17 playoff. Since joining the Bisons in 1969, Johnson has compiled a 226-221 won-loss record.

"This year's performance wasn't just my doing," Johnson said. "This award also belongs to assistant coach Steve Smith, who was in charge of pitchers. He's a tremendous asset to our program."

Johnson also gave special recognition to Allan Isom, who has worked previously with the Bison pitching staff. Isom, due to a new administrative assignment, was not able to

work with the team this year.

"But what he's done for the staff over the past couple of years has played a big part in the development of our pitchers."

Johnson is a Memphis native. He played professionally with the Arkansas Travelers before coming to Harding as a student. He was graduated in 1960.

Johnson also is offensive line coach for the football Bisons and teaches in the Harding physical education department.

He is married to the former Joyce Springer of Memphis and the couple has two children and four grandchildren.

Poston Inks Contract With Kansas City

Harding University linebacker Greg Poston has signed a free agent contract with the Kansas City Chiefs of the National Football League.

Kansas City representative Dan Krouse signed the All-Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference and All-NAIA District 17 athlete on campus May 7.

A 6-1, 207 pounder, Poston ranks as the number two all-time tackler for Harding with 397 and led the Bisons last season with 141 stops.

"We're excited about getting Poston," Krouse said. "It's my understanding the Chiefs' coaching staff is interested in looking at him at the strong safety position and he has the speed and ability we're looking for."

"I'm dying to play," Poston said. "I was hoping to get a shot at the bigtime and I hope to make the most of it."

A 1980 graduate of Harding Academy of Memphis, Poston was moved to the linebacker position as a sophomore and became one of Harding's all-time great defensive players. In 1983 he had five pass interceptions, returned a fumble 39 yards for a touchdown, had three quarterback sacks and blocked two kicks.

"Greg is one of the finest athletes I've ever coached," Bison head coach John Prock said. "He knew only one way to play and that was full speed all the time. He was a real headhunter."

Poston is the ninth Harding footballer to be signed by an NFL team. The last was Bruce Baldwin, a 1982 NAIA All-American defensive back now with the Buffalo Bills.
