Economics Team Wins Fourth SIFE National Title

The Harding University Economics Team captured the national championship for the fourth time in the Students in Free Enterprise (SIFE) competition in New Orleans, La., July 9-10.

The student team and faculty sponsor, Dr. Don Diffine, were awarded a first place trophy and a check for \$3,000 at the awards banquet. College of the Southwest (N.M.) was runnerup and the University of Akron (Ohio) was third.

The competition, which was hosted by the Associates for Free Enterprise and co-sponsored by the National Free Enterprise Center in Bolivar, Mo., involved more than 90 colleges and universities and some 4,000 students during 1983-84.

Team members include Byron Carlock of Blytheville, Ark., Glenda Collier of Memphis, Tenn., Debbie Garrett of Brookston, Ind., Bruce Picker of Searcy, Ark., Ellen Reid of Sugar Land, Texas, Mel Sansom of Pensacola, Fla., Jeff Tennyson of Harrison, Ark. and Kevin Thompson of San Diego, Calif.

“This competition was the most taxing in terms of stress and pressure we’ve ever experienced,” Diffine said. “Our students made nine presentations the final day to win. They were experienced and prepared. It made the difference.”

The national SIFE competition brought 18 regional winners together for two days of intensive competition. Forty judges from business and corporations across the United States evaluated each finalist.

Harding’s entry was entitled, “Free Enterprise — Let’s Re-Invent the Wheel.” It included a display booth, printed materials, a multi-media slide show and Eco Nomics, a talking robot.

The team produced and promoted 68 different projects during the 1983-84 period of competition. Fourteen on-campus and 44

civic, professional and educational groups were specifically reached and a market audience of more than four million people was covered.

“In the competition the quality of this year’s team was the winning edge,” Diffine said. “More than one of the judges commented about the high quality of the oral presentations.”

Diffine indicated two of the team’s projects drew special mention — a “Free Market Calendar” and the Personalized Employee Economic Program (PEEP). The PEEP program was designed to assist employees to become more knowledgeable and aware of the economic system in which they work.

This year’s championship, combined with national trophies in 1980, 1981 and 1982, establishes Harding as the winningest team in the country. Harding was national runnerup in 1978 and 1983.

Harding began its participation in SIFE on a regional level in 1976. National competition was started in 1978.

In 1979 the student-staffed Belden Center for Private Enterprise Education was established on the Harding campus. The aim of the Center is the mass communication of economics. Using the Center — which is a library of private enterprise literature and audio-visual materials — as the nucleus, Harding students attempt to multiply their message to a broad public.

The efforts of the Center have received national recognition, not only in the Economics Games, but from the Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge, Pa. Since 1976, Dr. Diffine, the Harding Economics Team and their projects have received 14 awards in the category of private enterprise education, advertising and public affairs, non-profit publications and platform addresses.

‘Amazing Grace’ Theme Chosen For 61st Annual Bible Lectureship

“Amazing Grace, How Sweet the Sound,” will be the theme of the 61st Annual Harding University Bible Lectureship occurring Sept. 30-Oct. 3, according to Lectureship Director Eddie Cloer.

The featured speakers for the 1984 Lectureship will include Charles Hodge, Jimmy Allen, Neale Pryor and J. Wayne Kilpatrick.

Hodge of Duncanville, Texas, will begin the series Sunday at the evening worship services speaking on “Grace in the Old Testament Church.” He is presently the pulpit minister at the Duncanville Church of Christ and has served several other congregations in Texas since 1960.

He has authored nine books and is a staff writer for *20th Century Christian* and *Restoration Quarterly*. He is a member of the boards of Abilene Christian University and Medina Children’s Home, and is a frequent participant in teacher training series, lectureships and youth rallies. His work has taken him to more than 30 states, Europe and the Holy Land.

Allen will speak Monday night on “Saved by Grace.” He serves as a professor of Bible at the University.

Allen has preached in approximately 50 area-wide campaigns and is a well known speaker on state school and Christian college campuses. He has spoken in 33 states and five foreign countries.

Pryor will speak on “Blessed Assurance” on Tuesday night of the Lectureship. He is a nationally known speaker at youth rallies, gospel meetings and workshops.

A professor of Bible and Vice President for Academic Affairs at the University, Pryor is also an elder at the College Church of Christ in Searcy.

Kilpatrick will close the Lectureship on

Wednesday night speaking on the topic, “The Ultimate End of Grace.” He has written five books, contributes articles to *World Evangelist* and other Christian publications, and speaks weekly on channel 42 television station.

He has served congregations in Hickory Plains, Tenn., Swartz Creek, Mich., Milan, Tenn., Madisonville, Ky. and is currently working with the Birmingham Church of Christ in Ala. Kilpatrick is a member of the Board of Alabama Christian College.

Daily lectures will include topics and speakers: “Can We Fall From Grace?” Leon Barnes; “Standing in Grace,” A. W. Chism; “God: The Source of Grace,” Dowell Flatt; “The Ethics of Grace,” Alan Highers and “Singing with Grace,” Ted Knight.

Other topics include “The Grace of Living,” Mac Layton; “Grace: Power for Living,” Avon Malone; “Grace, Faith and Works,” Hugo McCord; “Jesus, The Appearance of Grace,” James Moffett; “The Cross of Jesus,” Paul Rogers and “Grace: Motivation for Service,” Virgil Trout.

Speakers during the University chapel period will be Jimmy Adcox on “Can I Know I Am Saved?” and Doug Parsons will discuss, “Must I Be Perfect?” and “The Freedom of Grace.”

Classes will also be available for those attending the Lectureship series. Courses being planned are “Grace in Romans,” Jimmy Allen; “Grace in Galatians,” Frank Pack; “Grace in Revelation,” Hugo McCord; “Resolving Guilt,” Lew Moore; “Grace and Suffering,” Virgil Trout and “Grace in Restoration Preaching,” with Earl West.

Three Speakers Selected For American Studies Lectures

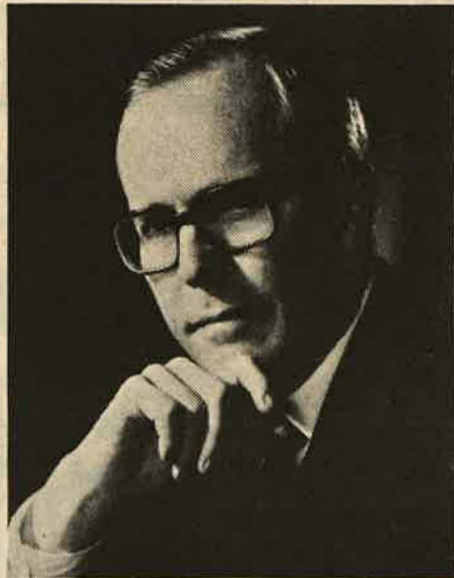
A trio of nationally known speakers will highlight the fall program of the Harding University American Studies Lecture Series, according to Dr. David Burks, director.

The speakers are William Rusher, syndicated columnist and publisher of *The National Review*, Charles "Tremendous" Jones, motivational speaker and Norman Podhoretz, editor of *Commentary* magazine.

Rusher will open the fall lectures September 18 at 7:30 p.m. in the American Heritage Auditorium. He is a syndicated columnist, whose column "The Conservative Advocate" appears twice a week in more than 200 newspapers from coast to coast. He has authored five hardcover books including *The Rise of the Right* (1984), *How to Win Arguments* (1981) and *The Making of the New Majority Party* (1975).

In January 1981, he became a regular commentator on the Group W radio stations of Westinghouse Broadcasting and in 1983 joined the Associated Press Radio Network. He recently was a regular on the ABC television network's "Good Morning, America" show, as a participant in its popular "Face Off" feature.

Jones directs his own company, Life Management Services, Inc. and will speak October 9 at 7:30 p.m. in the Benson Auditorium. A motivator, author and humorist, he left a highly successful insurance career to lecture and consult in the areas of personal and professional growth.

At that time his company tipped the \$100 million sales in force mark.

Jones' appearance will be his second on the Harding campus. He was a featured speaker on the 1982 faculty of the Harding Business Management Seminar. He is the author of *Laws of Leadership and Decision*.

Podhoretz will speak November 8 in the Benson Auditorium at 7:30 p.m. A native New Yorker, he is considered an authority on United States and Soviet relations.

A Pulitzer Scholar at Columbia University, Podhoretz is the author of five

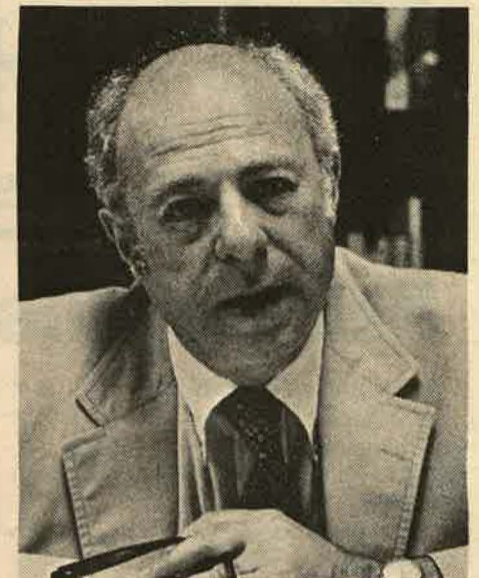

books, including *Why We Were In Vietnam* (1982); *The Present Danger* (1980); *Breaking Ranks: A Political Memoir* (1979); and *Doings and Undoings: The Fifties and After in American Writing* (1964).

Podhoretz is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations and in 1981 was appointed Chairman of the New Directions Advisory Committee of the United States Information Agency.

"We have established a quality lecture program here at Harding and these men will only add to that reputation," Burks said.

The Time of Day Reunited will perform at 1 p.m. This performance will include Time of Day groups from the past four years. Malone will speak again at 2:15 p.m. and then participants will enjoy the Academic Fair. Representatives from each department will be available in the Benson Auditorium lobby to discuss academic interests with students deciding on college career choices.

At 4 p.m. student hosts will conduct campus tours and an old-fashioned barbeque dinner will be served on the front lawn at 5 p.m.

All those officially registered for the High School Day program will be given free admission to the evening football game at 7 p.m. as the Harding Bisons host Evangel

College of Springfield, Mo. At the end of the game, High School Day will be officially ended and sponsors will be responsible for overnight housing if it is necessary.

"We're hoping all youth directors, counselors, teachers, ministers, and especially the students will mark Oct. 13 on their calendars. We're looking forward to a great day," Dell said.

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Record Budget Adopted

A record budget of \$22,341,852 has been adopted by the Harding University Board of Trustees for the 1984-85 fiscal year, according to Lott Tucker, vice-president for finance.

The budget reflects only a slight increase over the budget projection of last year, \$21,750,000, Tucker said.

"The Board and the administration have worked hard to hold down the University expenses so as to keep student costs as low as possible," he said.

The Board approved increases in three areas, room, board and cost per semester hour. Housing will increase seven per cent, board will be up three per cent and the per

semester hour will be \$96.50, up from \$92 last year.

Tucker indicated the \$1.2 million addition to the Science Building was progressing according to schedule and that extensive renovation was accomplished this summer in the East Married Students Apartments.

"We are reworking one of the units and plan on doing another next summer," he said. "Central heat and air has been installed, as well as new appliances and carpeting."

Tucker also said that work has been completed on the installation of telephone lines for every dormitory room.

AWH Iris Collection Developed; Rhizomes Available For Order

Registered Iris rhizomes from the Harding Collection are now available according to Associated Women for Harding project chairman Mrs. Dee Kernodle of Jonesboro, Ark.

Four irises have been developed by hybridizer Henry C. Rowlan of Little Rock. The irises are the tall bearded variety and are officially registered with the American Iris Society.

The irises are named in honor of Jan Burt of Richardson, Texas, Louise Ganus and Jimmy Carr of Searcy and Carrie Lou Little Davis of Dallas.

"The rhizomes can be ordered for \$20 each," Kernodle said, "and are the perfect gift for birthdays, anniversaries and special occasions. Shipping will be done once a year, usually around the first of September."

The Jan Burt iris is a ruffled full violet with brown shoulders. It was the first of the Collection to be developed in 1981. Mrs. Burt is the wife of Richard Burt, former chairman of the Board of Trustees. She was instrumental in the organization of the AWH chapter in Dallas and is a past Chairman of the AWH National Council.

In 1982 a lightly laced, mimosa yellow iris

was named in honor of Louise Ganus, wife of Clifton Ganus and first lady of the University. Mrs. Ganus is a charter member of AWH and is past president of the Searcy AWH chapter and the secretary of the AWH National Council.

Also in 1982 the Jimmy Carr iris was introduced. The lightly laced iris is white with yellow shoulders and yellow beard, tipped in white. Carr is the assistant to the president and coordinator for the AWH organization.

The genial native of Farmville, N.C., is well known as an active spokesman for the University and AWH.

The Carrie Lou Little iris is violet purple with brown shoulders, brown edging and a brown beard. Introduced in 1983, it was named in honor of the former member of the Board of Trustees. She is the wife of Robert Davis of Dallas.

Presentation of the award was made by Judy Williams, president of IAB-C/Arkansas. Entries were judged by members of the St. Louis, Mo., chapter of IABC.

The award recognized a two-piece set of student recruiting brochures, "One Thousand Days" and "Discover the Harding Difference." The set was the first place entry in the brochure and booklet category.

Stan Green, the Harding director of public relations, designed the materials. Bruce Cook, former director of information, wrote the narrative copy and the full color photography was produced by Mike James, director of media productions and Yo Kurabayashi, student photographer.

The matched folders serve as the primary recruiting publications for the University Admissions office. "One Thousand Days" is a 12-page folder used as the introductory contact piece with prospective students. The "Discover the Harding Difference" is a 24-page booklet which includes a more

complete presentation of the Harding program and student activities.

"The brochures introduce a strong color concept and convey a family look to our publications," Green said. "Through the photographs and our written copy we also attempted to portray a sense of the quality and tradition of the school and the beauty of the campus."

Awards were presented in the areas of publications, writing, photography, illustration and multi-media productions.

Florence Program In Fifth Year; 16th Century Villa To Be Renovated

Thirty-six students will depart for Europe Sept. 18 as the Harding University in Florence begins its fifth year of operation.

Negotiations have been completed by Harding officials to purchase an 16th century villa outside Florence, Italy.

Program Director Don Shackelford was in Florence this summer to arrange for renovation of the villa which has 12 bedrooms and eight baths.

Reese Returns From South Africa; To Serve as Visiting Missionary

John Reese has been selected to serve as the visiting professor of missions at Harding University for the 1984-85 school year, according to Neale Pryor, vice president for academic affairs and chairman of the Bible department.

Reese and his wife, Beth, began their missionary work in 1976, with a two-year stay in Salisbury, Rhodesia, now called Harare, Zimbabwe. In August, 1978, they began working as partners with Bill and Cheryl Bryan in Kempton Park, South Africa. Reese has worked with the University of South Africa teaching courses on marriage and family counseling. Since 1979, he has also taught part-time at the Southern Africa Bible School.

"John's experience in mission work in a third world area should be very valuable to our students. He is very aware of the current challenges facing missionaries in the field," said Van Tate, director of the Mission/Prepare Program.

While at Harding, Reese will teach two sections of Acts, a course in world missions, and will teach four days in each freshman Bible class, emphasizing missions.

"John was a good student leader when he was on campus some ten years ago and we expect him to be a strong example for the students this year," said Tate.

He graduated from Harding with a bachelor of arts degree in Bible and French in 1974 and a master's degree in education in 1975. His wife, a 1974 Harding graduate, received the bachelor of science degree in vocational home economics. They have three children — Marcus, Tammy and Daniel.

Reese is replacing Gordon Hogan who returned to Singapore. Hogan and his wife, Jane, will continue their work with the Four Seas College of Bible and Missions. He serves as president of the institution.

The Visiting Professor of Missions program began in 1968. Those who have served in this position are Joe Cannon of New Guinea, Keith Robinson of Italy, Evertt Huffard of Israel, Gottfried Reichel of Germany, John Pennisi of South America;

Van Tate of Africa, Frank Worgan of England, Earl Edwards of Italy, Gailyn Van Rheenen of Africa, Howard Horton of Japan, Gary Walker of India, Dale McAnulty of France, and Hogan of Singapore.

Four Receive Top Ten Honors At PBL National Competition

Four students from Harding University scored in the top ten in the Phi Beta Lambda National Collegiate Business Competition in Atlanta, Ga., July 5-6, according to Dr. Don Diffine, faculty sponsor.

Competing in the national finals were Bruce Picker of Searcy, Lorrie Young and Cindy Costello of Harrison, Stephanie Carter of Bentonville and Dean Burton of Honolulu, Hawaii.

Picker placed seventh in Job Interview; Young placed fifth in Data Processing I; Costello placed second in Administrative Assistant Typing and Carter placed tenth in Parliamentarian (State) competition. There were approximately 25 competitors from 25 different states in each area of expertise.

"To my knowledge, it is extremely rare that one school would have this kind of success, percentage-wise, in national

competition," Diffine said. "We are very proud of the students' achievements." Each one of the students was a first place winner in the Arkansas State Competition.

Harding senior Ellen Reid of Sugar Land, Texas, presided over the convention as national president. As national president for the 1983-84 school year, Reid directed the activities of 561 chapters, with a student membership of 17,600. On July 1, she appeared with television personality Hal Linden on the National March of Dimes telethon when she presented a check for \$67,000 on behalf of Phi Beta Lambda.

Karen Koonce of North Little Rock, Ark., served as secretary of the Arkansas Phi Beta Lambda Chapter. The Harding chapter's motto — "We Mean Business (Among Other Things)" — was adopted as the official state conference theme.

Wilson Receives Rose Scholarship

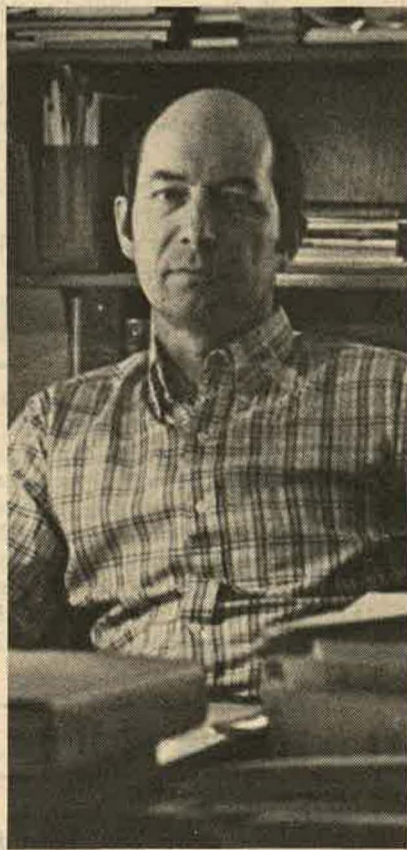
Debi Sue Wilson, a senior mathematics major at Harding University is the 1984-85 recipient of the Kenneth Rose Memorial Scholarship.

Don Robinson

Don Robinson — Professor of Art and Chairman of the Department. B.S. in Ed. (1954) Southwest Missouri State University, M.A. (1962), Colorado State College.

To the casual observer, Don Robinson comes across as a soft-spoken, somewhat taciturn individual. But his calm expression belies the intensity of the creative instincts that burn inside.

Robinson is a prolific artist. Although painting primarily in acrylics now, he is an accomplished craftsman in jewelry design and in sculpture. His works have been exhibited in three Arkansas Governors' Shows as well as in one-man exhibitions.

"I teach because I enjoy it. There's an excitement in seeing the glint of recognition, awareness and knowledge in the eye of the student. That, 'ah ha, now I see,' is a precious moment."

A major area of contribution since being named chairman of the art department in 1982 is the development of a course in visual aesthetics — the study of the nature of art (beauty) in the purest sense.

"In times past students had difficulty in

justifying the devotion of necessary time and study to art, as if it somehow took away from their commitment as a Christian," Robinson said. "Now we try to show the philosophy of art and the workable connectors to living Christianity. It's been a learning experience for me as well."

"Aesthetically, we try to equip students with a base and foundation for making value judgements that are based on the Christian ethic," he said.

Robinson's excellence in the classroom earned the Distinguished Teacher Award in 1972. This fall he and his wife, Shirley, will serve on the faculty of the University program in Florence, Italy.

He serves as an elder at the Westside Church of Christ in Searcy and has been active in its teaching program since 1966. An avid gardener and do-it-yourselfer, his home bears the clear imprint of his personality: quietly understated, creative, functional and stable.

Bryant Receives Alumni Award

The official presentation of a Distinguished Alumnus Award was made to Rees Bryant (BA'52) by Alumni Executive Secretary David Crouch in a visit to Searcy in June, several months after the initial announcement of the honor.

But the campus ceremony was, in fact, anti-climactic to the celebration held last October in Keffi, Plateau State, Nigeria, when Bryant first learned he was the choice for 1983 of the College of Arts and Sciences at Harding.

Bryant and his wife, Patti Mattox (BA'52) Bryant were serving and teaching school in Panda, Plateau State, as employees of the Nigerian government.

On a weekly excursion to Keffi to collect a supply of water, the Bryants went routinely by the post office first, eager to see what mail had arrived.

Included in their receipts was the announcement from Harding of Rees's selection. The letter told of the plans, naming 6:30 p.m., Oct. 30 as the specifics. "We didn't think we could get there in one and a half hours," Rees laughed, "but I'll have to admit we were thrilled and delighted and in our minds and hearts we surely wanted to be there."

The Bryants then continued with their plans, going to the home of fellow team members Tammy and Wallace Sutter, where they were to get the water and also have dinner. Other guests for the evening were still other team members, Debbie and Ken Cline and Clarence Wilson.

As they dined, Patti was making a few mental plans. At the end of the meal, she

told the group that a very outstanding person was in their midst, and shared her good news with their friends.

"It seemed appropriate," she said, "because we were all products of Christian education, although we were the only ones from Harding."

Host Sutter quickly picked up the cue, and conducted an impromptu "Black and Gold" banquet, waxing eloquently with the procedures and, according to Bryant, "lifting our spirits."

Bryant admitted they were pleased with the honor, and they wished they could have been at their alma mater for the occasion. "But what was more important to us," he said, "was that Harding University will honor missionaries."

He mentioned that later when he read of the accomplishments of fellow distinguished alumni selected from the various divisions, he felt his accomplishments didn't match theirs. "We felt flattered to be included in such a distinguished group," he said.

The Bryants continued teaching in Panda schools through February, at which time a government takeover cancelled all teaching contracts, necessitating their return to the States and ending an eight-year total time on the mission field that included the co-founding with Henry Farrar ('49) the Nigerian Christian Hospital.

During their time in the United States, Bryant served as president of the African Christian Hospitals Foundation.

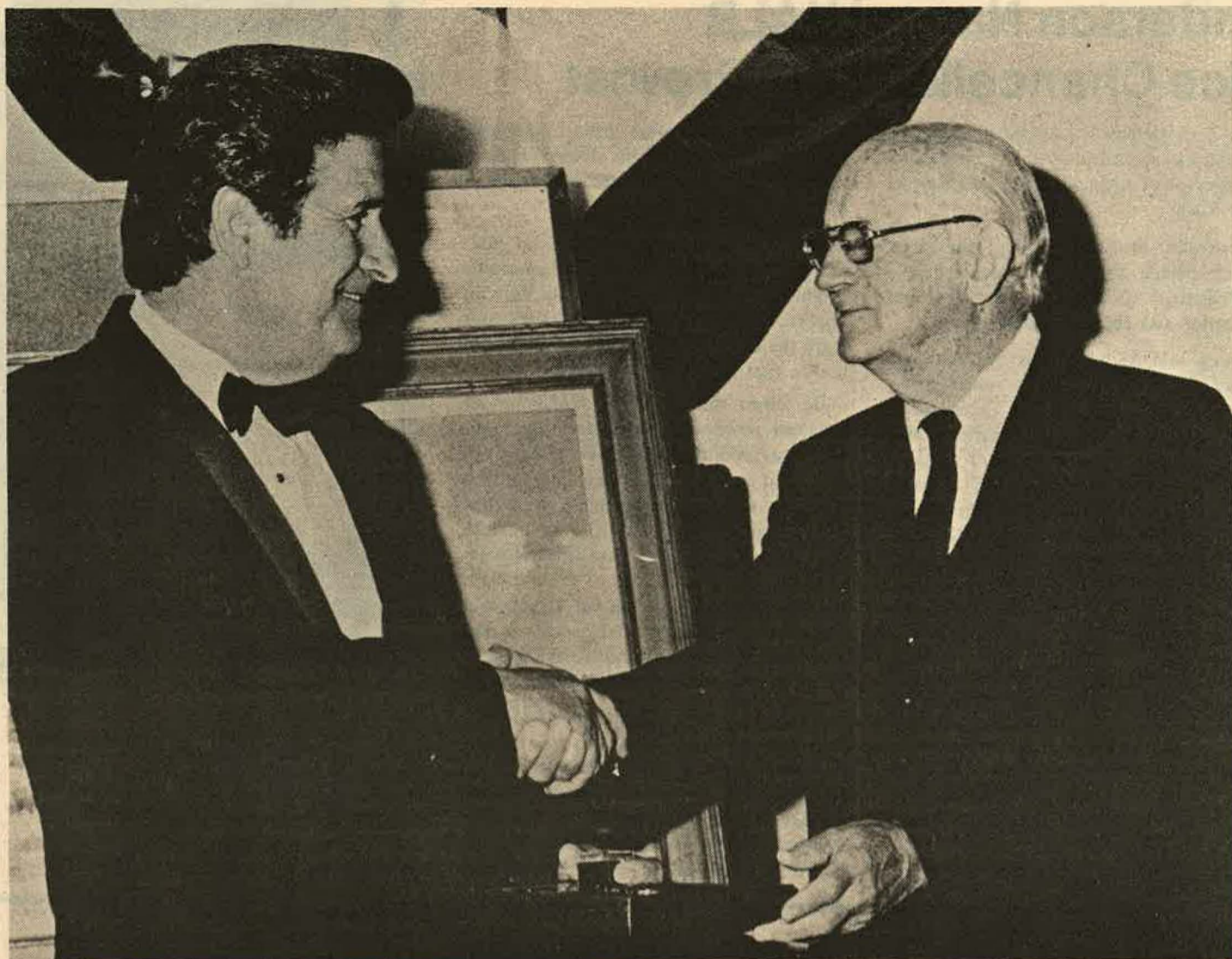

The Tennessee Walking Horse National Celebration honored Harding alumnus, Joe Webb of Searcy, by inducting him into the National Tennessee Walking Horse Hall of Fame at a banquet in Shelbyville, Tenn. in the new Blue Ribbon Circle Club. A plaque and a gold pin were presented with the inscription "In recognition of the contributions made to the greatness of the breed, the Tennessee Walking Horse."

In response to this honor Webb said, "I have always thoroughly enjoyed what I do. I have learned something from every horse and every person I have worked with. I feel as though Searcy and Arkansas, where so many horse people have come to the stables, share in this honor."

He is the only trainer ever to have started, trained and ridden three generations of

World Grand Champions. He first smelled the roses of the Celebration big stake in 1959 with Rodgers Perfection, followed by Perfection's Carbon Copy in 1964, and Mark of Carbon in 1978. He is well on his way to having the fourth generation with Touch of Mark, a four-year old stallion by Mark of Carbon. Mark of Carbon won the title of World Champion last year as a three-year-old, and will be going to the grand championship title competition in 1985.

In addition to these three, Webb has also won 14 other world titles, having won every professional division at least once, covering a time span in the 50's, 60's, 70's and 80's.

He is also the author of "The Care & Training of the Tennessee Walking Horse," the only book available on the breed. Twice each year he conducts week long adult

riding and training schools and each summer accepts 40 students in a riding camp. The adults and children come from all over the nation as it is the only school and camp where they can come to learn and ride trained show horses.

Webb's inventions include the Webb Copper Port, Webb Motion Barns, Webb Training Collar and the Webb Mechanical Hoss-Trainer.

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Anderson Named UALR Vice Chancellor And Provost

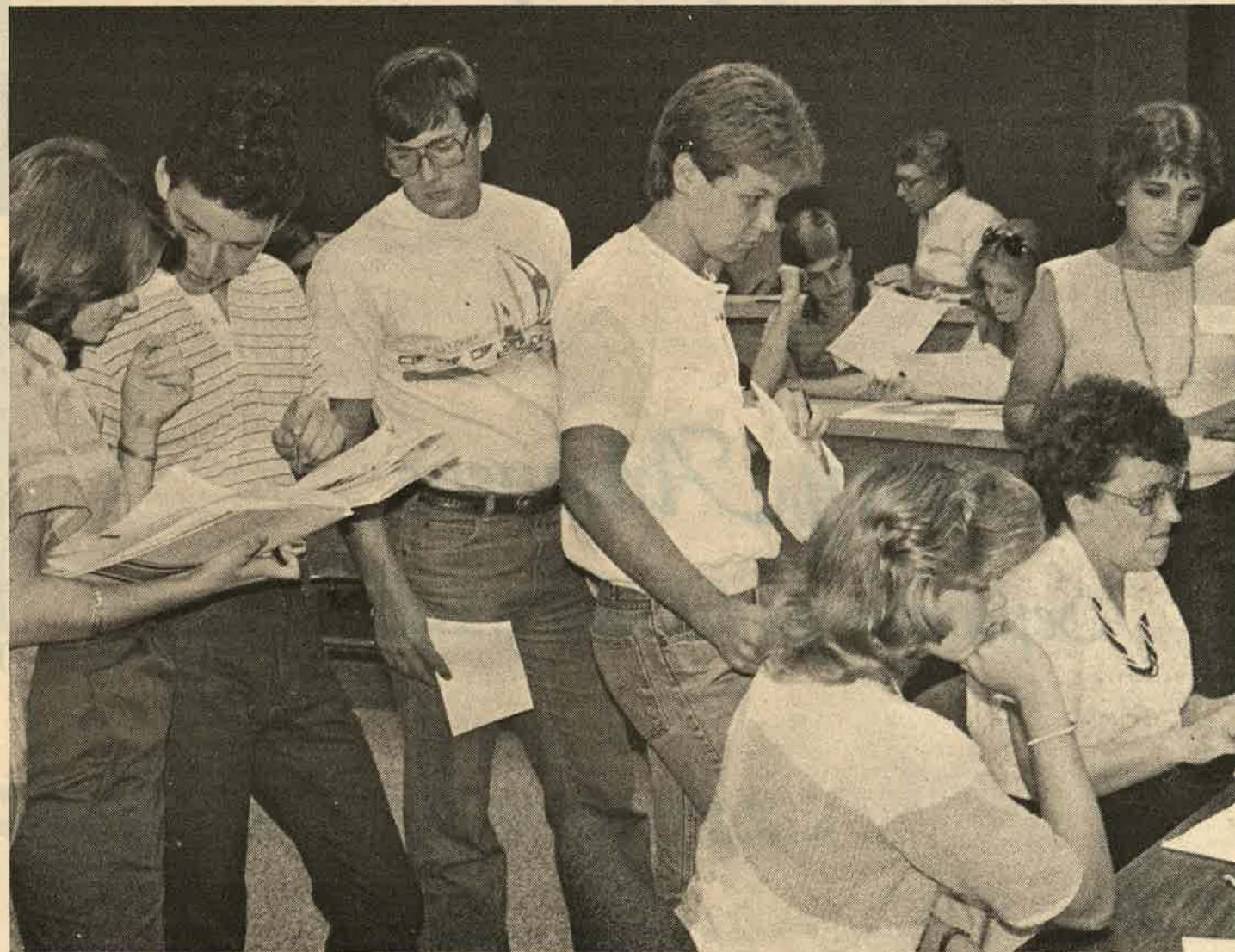

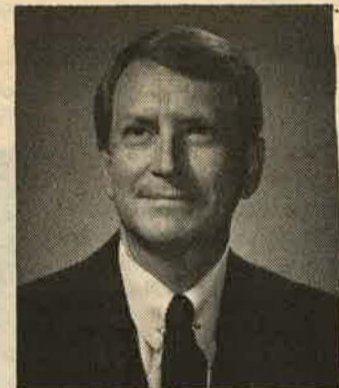

Optimism High For 1984 Bison Football

Development of a consistent offensive attack ranks high on the list of priorities for Harding University head coach John Prock.

Seeking to rebound from a 3-6-1 season, the Bisons will return a solid nucleus of 12 seniors, including tight end Mark Adkison of Tulsa, Okla., an All-American candidate, and tailback-return specialist Bobby Jones of Steens, Miss., an all-conference choice in 1983.

Spring drills saw sophomore-to-be Mannie Lowery of Little Rock emerge as the leader at the quarterback slot. He saw duty last season and displayed the talent and leadership the Bisons have been looking for.

Despite the loss of All-AIC and All-District 17 linebacker Greg Poston, the Bison defense should maintain its hard-hitting reputation. At least four athletes who came at semester earned starting positions in spring drills and have filled some spots created by graduation.

Offensively, the Bison attack should be stronger. In addition to Lowery, a former all-stater, Prock will have the services of Jones, a speedy 5-9, 155-lb. tailback who is a big play type. Last year he led Bison rushers with 645 yards and five touchdowns, including a 61-yard dash. Also returning to bolster the running game is Glenn Segars, a speedy, 200-lb. sophomore from Lithonia, Ga. He had a standout freshman year in 1982, but was not in school last year.

At fullback Harding will start Z.C.O. Uhatafe, a 212-lb. junior from St. Petersburg, Fla. A Samoan, Z.C.O. rushed for 548 yards before a knee injury put him out of action last year. His return to peak condition could give the Bisons one of the best running attacks in some seasons. Also returning is senior Gary Hill of Memphis, a versatile athlete who will see duty as a receiver and ball carrier. A 5-10, 185 pounder, he was Harding's big play man last year, consistently coming up with a key pass reception or gain to spark the offense.

Expected to set a hot pace for the Bisons will be the talented Adkison, a solidly built

6-2, 215 lb. tight end. Although hampered by a sub-par passing game last season, Adkison still caught 18 passes, upping his career catches to 81 for 1,137 yards.

"If the ball is anywhere close, Mark will catch it," Prock said. "And with his strength and size he can handle the blocking load at tight end."

At wide receiver, three-year veteran Don Shumate of Sherwood, Ark., will get first call. He missed most of the '83 campaign due to injury and his physical status could be in question.

Defensively, key experience in the secondary will be available. From a complete famine a year ago, the Bisons now have a solid nucleus in sophomore Chris McDavid of Dallas, Texas, and junior Drake Jackson of Temple, Texas at the corners and senior Byron Walls of Columbus, Ohio at strong safety.

Todd Potter, a junior from McGhee, Ark., came on strong last season and has the

size and aggressiveness to handle the other spot.

Up front, all-conference candidate Gordon Roddenberry, a 6-1, 235 lb. senior from Pavo, Ga., heads the defense. Three transfers, Fanasial "Dump" Quinn, a 5-8, 224 lb. noseguard from West Point, Miss., Kevin Hunt, a 6-1/2, 238-lb. tackle from Denison, Texas and Franz Patterson, a 6-0, 215-lb. linebacker from Killeen, Texas will also play vital roles in the Harding defense.

Senior linebacker Gordon Gerbholz, a 6-0, 200-pounder from Omaha, Neb., could be the real sleeper, however. Hampered by injuries throughout his career, a healthy Gerbholz could be a solid replacement for last year's standout, Poston.

Better speed, better passing and a solid running game should describe the 1984 Bisons. A good secondary and an able line should uphold the Harding tradition for a swarming, sticky defense.

In short, for the Bisons, the way is up.

Harding Academic All-American Marci Crump is the first recipient of the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference Downing-Swift-Wallace Scholar-Athlete Award.

The award was announced by AIC commissioner Harry Hall.

Women's competition was incorporated into the AIC during the 1983-84 school year. The women's scholar-athlete award was instituted to recognize a senior female athlete with the highest academic grade point who has earned at least two varsity letters in AIC sponsored sports.

Crump, who lettered three years in cross country, will graduate magna cum laude in August with a major in physical education. She earned a 3.73 grade point on 139 semester hours.

In cross country, she was the 1983 AIC champion and was named to the All-AIC team. She earned All-NAIA District 17 recognition in 1982 and 1983 and was selected to the NAIA Academic All-America team as a senior.

In addition to her athletic achievements, Crump was a member of the Chorale, the Chamber Singers and the Belles and Beaux musical groups. She was a member of the PEMM Club and was named to Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities. She also was elected to membership in Alpha Chi National Honor Society.

Crump is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bennie Williams of Salado, Texas, and the wife of Richard Crump, a senior at the University.

Harriers Ready To Defend Title

It looks like another banner year for the men's cross-country team, according to head coach Ted Lloyd.

"I feel extremely confident with our team," Lloyd said. "We have our top six finishers from last year's team and look like the top seed for the conference title again."

Under Lloyd's tutelage, the team has won the conference title for the past 13 years and 19 out of the 22 years cross-country has been a conference sport.

The top six returning lettermen are Al Bates of Nashville, Tenn., Larry Wayne of Fair Hope, Ala., Eddie Neal of Griffithville, Ark., Darryl Holbert of Lakewood, Colo., James Pinson of North Little Rock and Mike Kamperschroer of Hokah, Minn.

New recruits that should contribute to the team will be Kevin Cantrell of Cocoa, Fla., Steve Hockenberry of Hoffman Estates, Ill., Jon Partlow of Portland, Ore., Danny Thompson of Searcy and Bill White of Memphis.

On the Lady Bisons' side of the ledger, this season looks like a total "rebuilding" year.

Harding placed second in the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference and NAIA District 17 in 1983 when seniors Marci Crump, Anne Sears and Lynn Dupaul all placed in the top ten. Junior all-AIC Stacie Turner of Ashdown, Ark., was also a top ten finisher.

Without the services of the senior trio, Lloyd will have to find replacements among newcomers and returning squad members.

Women Volleyballers Prepare For Season

Twenty-five candidates are expected to be on hand Aug. 23 when Harding women's volleyball coach Karyl Bailey begins workouts for the 1984 season.

"We're definitely going to be improved," he said. "Last year everything was new to us but we plan on being respectable. We have some good athletes coming and believe our program is definitely on the way up."

In Harding's inaugural season last year, Bailey's team posted a 4-17 season record and had a 2-10 mark in Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference play.

"Our girls did a fine job last year under the conditions," he said. "We started from point one with no one who had played on the intercollegiate level and we were better than our record would indicate."

Five returning letter winners will be back. They are senior Susan Mattox of Wills Point, Texas, juniors Carla Phillippi of Fairfax, Ohio, and Julie Thweatt of Taipei, Taiwan and sophomores Rita Marie Glenn of Strafford, Mo. and Beth Shanklin of Decatur, Ill.

"We believe we have some good freshmen prospects coming in," Bailey said, "and we expect that some of them will see a lot of playing time this season. "We'll have more players who will be able to actually contribute."

Bailey announced a 19-match schedule and three tournaments for the fall season. The Lady Bisons will open the campaign Sept. 6 against School of the Ozarks of Point Lookout, Mo.

Tournament competition will be played at Arkansas Tech in Russellville, Ark.; Christian Brothers College in Memphis, Tenn. and Southwestern of Memphis.

Assisting Bailey will be Tom Ritchie of Canterbury, N.H.

The announcement was made by Athletic Director Harry Olree.

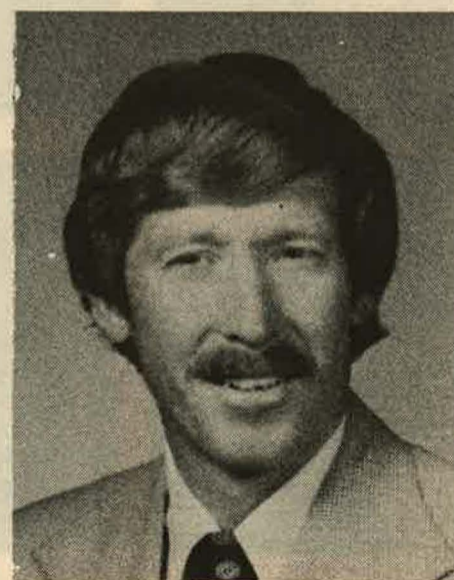
"We're delighted that the opportunity has come to offer young women competition in track," Olree said. "Additionally, we're fortunate to have such a capable coach to head up the new program."

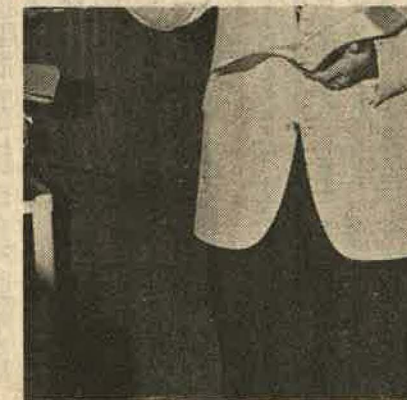
