Prominent Speakers Highlight Lecture Series

The spring agenda for the American Studies Lecture Program includes presentations by Arkansas Senator Dale Bumpers; Chancellor of Ole Miss, Dr. R. Gerald Turner and former Chancellor of the Federal Republic of West Germany, Helmut Schmidt.

Senator Bumpers will open the spring lectures Jan. 29, followed by Turner March 26 and Chancellor Schmidt will close the series on April 9. "This promises to be one of our outstanding series of lectures," said Dr. David Burks, director of the American Studies Program. "We think the presentations will be very timely and authoritative."

Bumpers will speak on the University campus Jan. 29. Sworn into the United States Senate in January of 1975, he is a member of three committees — Energy and Natural Resources, Appropriations and Small Business. Before entering the Senate, he served two terms as Governor of Arkansas.

His activities in civic and business events in the past included owner of Charleston, Ark., Hardware and Furniture Company, owner of Angus Breeding Farm, Charleston City Attorney and President of the Charleston School Board.

He attended the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville, Ark., and Northwestern Law School in Evanston, Ill., and served in the United States Marine Corps, Pacific Theatre, in World War II.

Turner is the twenty-second chief executive of the University of Mississippi. Previously, he had served as vice president



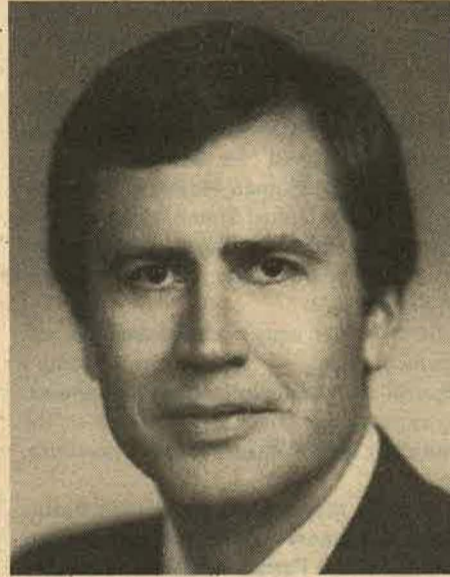

for Executive Affairs at the University of Oklahoma where he had also served as Executive Assistant to the President and acting provost. He will speak March 26.

Turner maintains a strong background in instruction, research, public service and administration.

Turner received the associate of arts in mathematics from Lubbock Christian College and a bachelor of science in psychology and mathematics from Abilene Christian University. He earned the master of arts in counseling psychology and the doctor of philosophy in psychology, both from the University of Texas at Austin.

Schmidt will present the final lecture of

the 1984-85 series on April 9. He served as Chancellor of the Federal Republic of West Germany from 1974-1982. He came to the position after serving as Joint Minister of Economics and Finance, Finance Minister and Defense Minister in earlier governments.

During his chancellorship, he stressed the goal of his political unification of Europe in partnership with the U.S. and domestically, sought to fight unemployment and to safeguard West Germany's position as the country with the lowest rate of inflation and largest volume of trade in Western Europe.

He has contributed to European and American periodicals, including "Foreign

Affairs." Schmidt also received a U.S. Medal for Distinguished Service.

Student members of the American Studies Program travelled to the Dallas, Texas area Nov. 11-14 to visit several businesses and industries.

Fifty-two of the group's members made the trip which highlighted tours at General Motors in Arlington, AA Flight Academy in Ft. Worth, Baylor Medical Center, Republic Bank, Arthur Young, Texas Instruments, Mary Kay Cosmetics and Bloom Advertising in Dallas.

The American Studies Program also includes Youth Citizenship Seminars and Management Seminars. Harding's program has been honored by the Freedoms Foundation of Valley Forge, Pa. for contributing special programs and quality lectures to the community of Searcy and the students of Harding University.

Cone Elected to Chair Board of Trustees

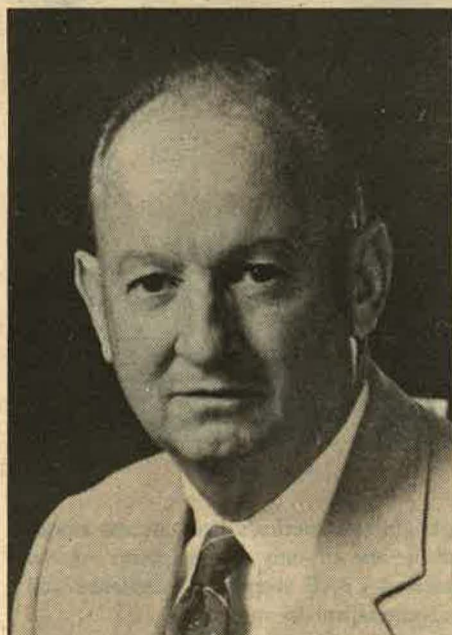
James H. Cone, a Little Rock contractor and a 1948 alumnus, was elected chairman of the Harding University Board of Trustees during the annual fall Board meeting in November.

Cone succeeds Richard H. Gibson of Longview, Texas, who has been chairman since 1980. The 19-member board is the governing body of the University.

"My association with Harding has covered more than 40 years and I've seen it grow from a student body of 400 to a university of national reputation and influence," Cone said. "It is an honor to succeed such a fine gentleman as Richard Gibson and I hope to be able to render the same high level of progressive service."

The 58-year-old Cone was a charter member of the President's Development Council, established in 1965 as an institutional support organization. He was elected to the Board in 1972 and as a member of the Executive Council in 1976. Cone has served as vice-chairman since 1980.

"We are very happy that James Cone of Little Rock has been chosen to serve as chairman of the Board of Trustees of Harding University. He brings to the

position a long dedicated experience and a deep love for Harding and its work," said University President Clifton L. Ganus, Jr. "Richard Gibson served for four years as chairman in a very effective and commendable way and we are confident that

this type of leadership will be found during James Cone's administration as well."

A native of Melbourne, Cone is the owner of a building and contracting firm in Little Rock. He and his wife, the former Bonnie Williams of Melbourne, have three children, Annette Herrington (BS'75) and James Jr. (BS'77), both of Little Rock and Maria, a Harding freshman.

The new chairman is the second member of his family to serve on the Harding Board. His uncle, James T. Cone, was vice chairman of the trustees at the time of his death in 1968.

Elected vice chairman of the Board was Harold N. Cogburn of Forrest City. A 19-year member of the Board, Cogburn is a physician.

Also elected to office were Jim Bill McInteer, secretary and J. Russel Burcham, treasurer. McInteer, minister of the West End Church of Christ in Nashville, Tenn., has served on the Board for 34 years. Burcham, a dentist in Kennett, Mo., was elected to the Board in 1982.

Five board members were re-elected to six year terms. They are Cogburn, Cone, Gibson, Louis E. Green of Newark, Del. and McInteer.

Dwight Smith Elected President of Alumni

Dwight Smith has succeeded David Smith as president of the Harding University Alumni Association with a new slate of officers who were installed during Homecoming.

David Smith, a Little Rock cardiologist, presided at ceremonies during the business meeting to begin Dwight Smith's tenure for 1984-86. Dwight Smith, a 1960 graduate, is campus minister of the University for a program of the College Church of Christ.

Other officers include Philip R. Dixon of Rogers, President-Elect; and James H. Cone Jr. of Little Rock, Carol E. Cato of Little Rock and James Hearn of Harrison as vice presidents. Officers were elected by Association vote earlier this year.

Dixon is associated with First National Bank and Trust Company of Rogers. A Newport native, he holds the MBA from Florida State University and the Juris Doctorate from the University of Arkansas School of Law.

Robert Roy and Callie Mae Coons Endowed Chair Established

The Robert Roy and Callie Mae Coons Chair of Biomedical Science has been established at Harding University as the first endowed faculty chair in the 60-year history of the school.

Mrs. Irma Coons Terpenning of Frenchtown, N.J. and Harding University established the chair to provide salary and expenses for one faculty member in the allied health sciences area with appointments effective for five years, according to Harding President Clifton L. Ganus, Jr. Included for consideration are members of the biology, chemistry, computer science, mathematics and physics departments.

The recipient will be selected by the University president and the dean of the College of Arts and Sciences from those nominated by members of the appropriate departments. Rank, salary, teaching load and other responsibilities of the recipient will remain the same.

"The establishment of an endowed chair of biomedical science reiterates the commitment Harding has maintained to the preparation of health care professionals," Ganus said.

"It is highly appropriate that the names of Robert Roy and Callie Mae Coons be commemorated in this fashion," he added, "since both were deeply involved in Christian education at Harding and at other institutions."

"Their interest and expertise in the field of health sciences served to advance the state of the professions and to glorify their Creator," Ganus said. "And we are deeply grateful to their daughter, Mrs. Irma Terpenning, for her generosity and desire to perpetuate their memory in this worthwhile

way for Harding University."

Both Mr. and Mrs. Coons were professors and department heads at Harding. Mr. Coons, noted for his research in analytical chemistry and for his teaching methods for freshman chemistry, served as chairman of the chemistry and physics department from 1924-26 and from 1933-37. Mrs. Coons, who earned recognition with her studies of metabolism and dietary analysis, headed the home economics department from 1924-26.

The Coons also taught and worked at other colleges and universities across the United States, including Abilene Christian University and Pepperdine University. Mrs. Coons also served for several years as director of the Human Nutrition Research Division in the United States Department of Agriculture and as a member of the advisory committee for the White House Conference on Family Life.

In 1972 the couple established an endowment fund to strengthen Harding's physical and biological science programs. To support the fund, they donated to the University their 226-acre farm in Leesburg, Va.

In 1978 they set up the Coons-Farrar Fund in memory of Mrs. Coon's mother, Catherine Ann Farrar Williams, who spent many years in service to the sick, injured and newborn. The Coons-Farrar Fund provides scholarship aid and equipment for selected premedical and allied health students.

The Coons were named recipients of the Trustee Award in 1980. The award is presented annually by the Harding Board of Trustees to someone "whom the Board considers to have been of great assistance to Harding University and to possess the

character and spirit that Harding tries to instill in the lives of her young people," according to Ganus. The Coons were honored in view of their character, spirit, attitude and helpfulness to Harding, Ganus said.

Mr. Coons died Nov. 5, 1981 at the age of 92 in Sweetwater, Texas. He was born Feb. 16, 1889 at Webbers Falls, Okla. He married Callie Mae Williams Sept. 18, 1919. She was born at Huckabee, Texas.

Mrs. Terpenning is a 1953 graduate of Harding with degrees in mathematics and statistics.

This past November she was commended and thanked for her generosity through a special resolution passed unanimously by

Harding's Board of Trustees. The resolution, in part, recognized Mrs. Terpenning for her "long and distinguished career with Bell Telephone Laboratories," for her active support of the school, financially and otherwise "for more than three decades," and for her "exemplary stewardship."

The Board resolved "that unanimous thanksgiving be conveyed to Mrs. Terpenning for her generosity and her foresight" and "that this governing Board of Harding University go on record as expressing its sincerest appreciation to not only Mrs. Terpenning, but also to Mrs. Callie Mae Coons and the late Mr. Coons for their service and devotion to Harding."

Management Seminar Planned Feb. 22-23

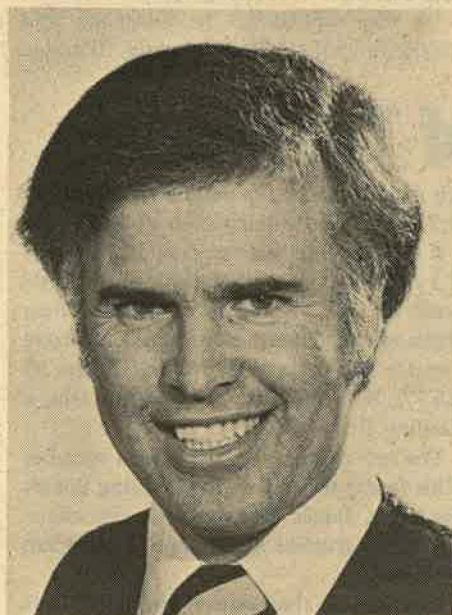
The thirteenth annual Harding University Management Seminar has been scheduled for Feb. 22-23 according to Dr. Bob Reely, seminar coordinator and associate professor of management, with guest speakers Don Beck and Don Hutson.

"I believe this is going to be an exciting management seminar. Both men are well known for captivating audiences across the country with their motivational presentations," said Reely. "We hope to have an outstanding attendance of business men and women from throughout the area."

In 1975, Beck organized the National Values Center and is actively involved in the fields of human resources development, strategic planning and organizational psychology in the United States and several foreign countries such as Spain, Ireland and South Africa. He acts as a consultant to several large corporations, health care institutions, governmental agencies, professional and college athletic programs, educational organizations and law enforcement agencies.

Beck received the doctorate degree from the University of Oklahoma, and for 18 years taught at North Texas State University, where he was selected Outstanding Professor in 1969 and Honor Professor in 1970.

Hutson has record-setting careers in sales, management, and speaking which have brought him honors unmatched by anyone his age. He started selling at age 13

and successfully worked his way through Memphis State University as a commission salesman.

At age 21, he graduated with a major in sales, was the number one salesman in a national sales organization at 23, and was president of his own sales training firm at 24, ultimately managing the organization's 50 plus salespeople.

He has addressed over 200 Positive Thinking Rallies, has been featured in the television series, DAWN, a program

highlighting America's true success stories and is one of only 62 recipients of the esteemed CPAE award for excellence and professionalism in speaking.

Seminar registration will take place from 5:30-6:30 p.m. Friday, followed by the first presentation at 7:30 by Hutson who will speak on "Leadership Makes the Difference." Saturday, Beck will speak beginning at 9:00 a.m. on the "Managerial Brain." Each of the lessons will be presented in two parts.

The Harding University campus will be the site of six exciting days of meaningful, spiritual and recreational activities for young people, June 23-28, 1985. This new, week-long program, to be called "Uplift," is designed to provide unique spiritual experiences for young people as outstanding speakers and teachers address the theme, "If I Be Lifted Up."

Approximately 20 youth ministers will be involved in making Uplift a unique Bible camp. The daily schedule will be a fast-paced mixture of special Bible classes, athletic activities, entertainment events and day-ending devotionals and keynote talks.

Classes during the day will be designed to involve class members in a way that will bring them closer to God. "Uplift is designed to point young people in the direction of the Cross," explained Charlie Hester, youth minister for the Downtown church in Searcy and off-campus coordinator for Uplift.

"We're mindful of the pressures young people face," Hester commented. "Uplift will be an environment which stresses Christianity as the best alternative in life."

"Uplift will be an opportunity for young people to fellowship with young people from around the country," said Hester. Hundreds of young people are expected with groups as far away as Florida making plans to attend.

Young people attending Uplift will be housed on Harding's campus in dormitories. Meals will be served in the Charles M. White Dining Hall located in Harding's American Heritage Center. Many of the University's athletic and recreational facilities will be used throughout the week.

Life Underwriters Association and the Bison Booster Club. He is also a member of the Million Dollar Round Table.

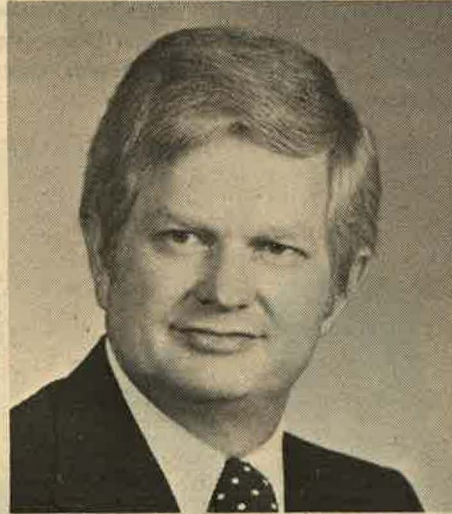

He will serve as chairman of the North Central Arkansas Region of the Development Council. This region includes Searcy, Newport, Batesville, Mountain

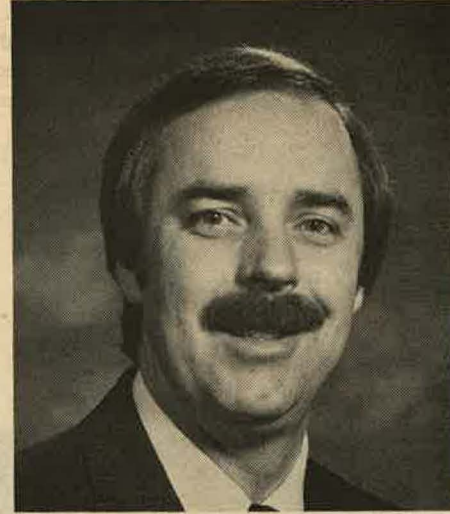
Home and Harrison.

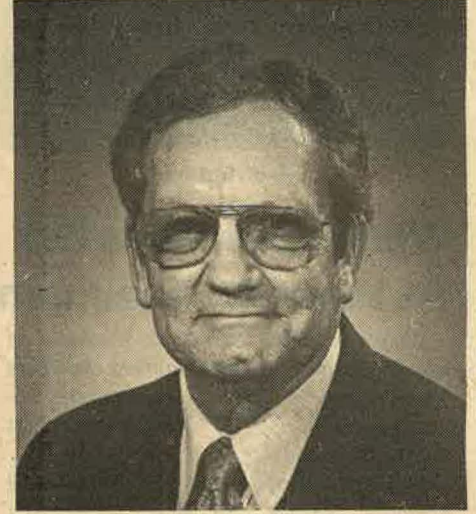
The regional chairmen will be responsible for coordinating regional activities with staff service from one of the University's development officers.

Walter Porter

Walter L. Porter — Professor of Psychology. B.A. (1961) Pepperdine; M.A. (1961) Pepperdine; Ph.D. (1967) Peabody College.

Walter L. Porter is currently both building and overseeing the building of an earth sheltered home in the hills just north of Searcy. If that program is anything like his classroom workings, it, too, will be completed after much planning, thought and attention to details.

"Any time he says or does something," a colleague said, "you can be sure it is well thought through. He comes through with little jewels, little pearls that give us insight. He is a tremendous asset to us here."

Porter is a professor of psychology who handles all labs, and teaches science and research oriented classes of the department. He is not involved in counseling, but teaches more in the nature of human behavior. "For several years I have been researching the Bible for all truths pertaining to the human mind. Then I try to bring those truths to the classroom. There is a lot of interest in normal people, as well as those with

problems," he notes.

The professor has a special interest in the writings of Solomon and has researched the book of Proverbs in depth. He has written manuscripts and has studied Solomon's advice on living as relates to modern day psychology.

The 52-year-old teacher was born in Arkansas, but, after a stint in Chicago, moved to Miami at age 10, so he calls Florida home.

He met his wife, Genelle, at her hometown of Nashville when he was attending David Lipscomb College. Mrs. Porter now teaches math at Searcy Middle School. They have a son, Harold, who is a Harding freshman, and a daughter, Genette, a junior at Harding Academy.

A few years ago the Porters established a department scholarship for qualifying students who do research papers in psychology research.

Harding Academy, York College Win Business Games

The second annual Harding-Lomanco Invitational Business Games Conference and awards banquet were held on the University campus Nov. 16-17. The financial and technical sponsorship of the games was provided by Louver Manufacturing Company (LOMANCO) of Jacksonville, Ark., according to Dr. David Burks, Harding dean of the School of Business.

Twenty-three high school and junior college teams participated in the event coordinated and directed by David Johnson, assistant professor of accounting. "The benefit of the games," said Johnson, "is that the students learn the complexity of business decisions and that a competitor's decisions affect them."

In the business simulation games the five- or six-member teams are divided into four divisions called industries. Beginning in September each team makes a series of 22 decisions and each week represents the operational decisions of three months for a calculator manufacturer. The students make decisions concerning the level of production, plant capacity, price, wages and marketing strategy. Each week their decisions are telephoned in to the Business School at Harding.

All the figures are fed into a computer which has been programmed to simulate realistic market conditions. Based on the market and how it reacts to the decisions of all the student companies, the computer feeds out information showing profit margins, market share and other pertinent items for each student company.

The computer-generated financial statements and operations reports are mailed out the same day. Each student team examines the results of each decision and prepares for the next decision. In all, eight decisions are turned representing two years of production.

In mid-November the teams come to Harding to make final presentations to a panel of judges. Each team makes a professional presentation with charts, graphs or other visuals and explains the strategy behind the decisions that were made. The teams seek to show both how well their company did and that they know why. The winners in presentation and in industry results are awarded plaques at the awards banquet. Plus, an overall winner in the junior college and high school industries receives a trophy.

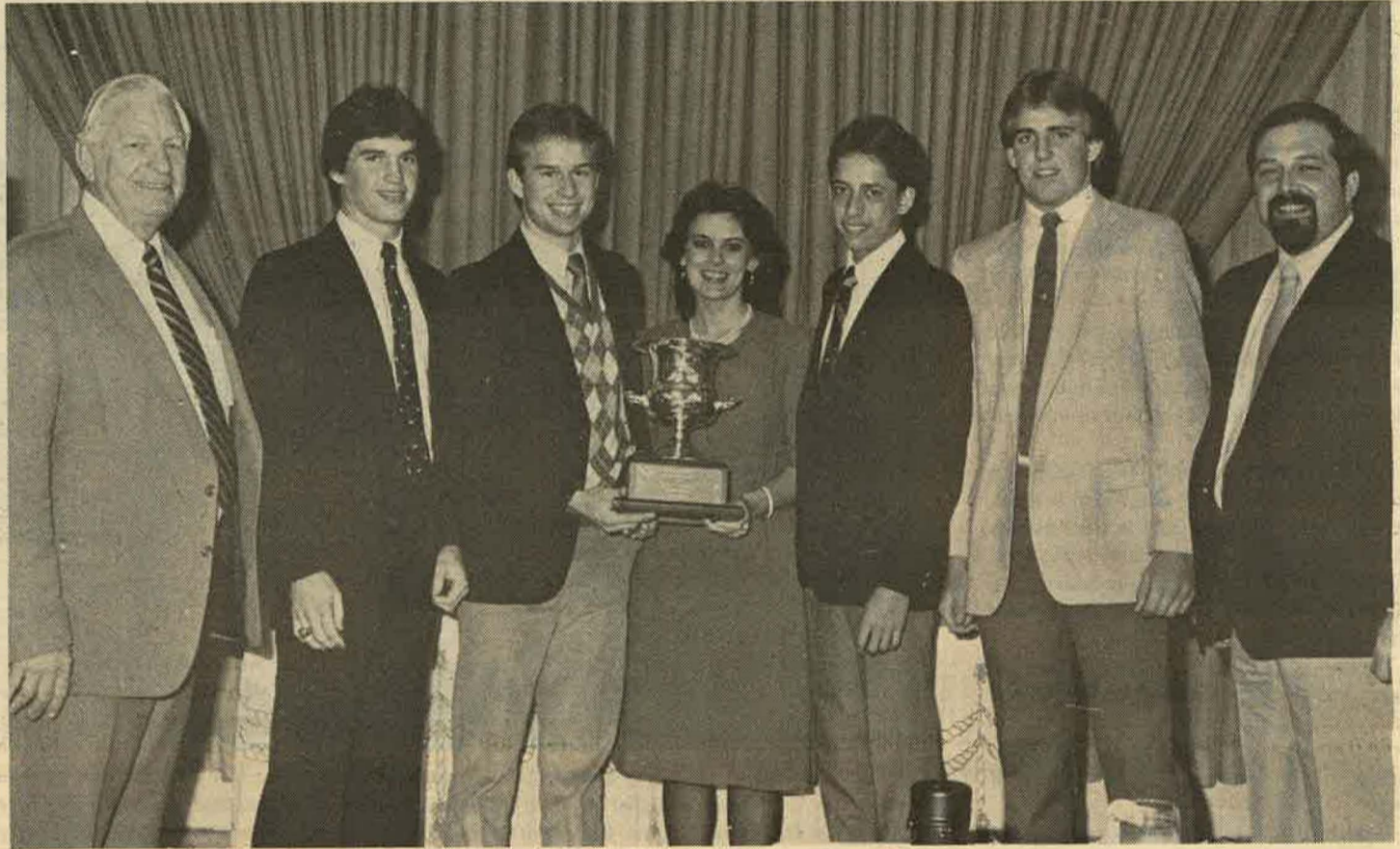
"The Business Games represent a

tremendous opportunity for these young people," said Lomanco President Paul Belden. "It is hard for young people to make career decisions before they know what the career choices really involve. The games introduce them to all aspects of business, from production to marketing and it is a chance for them to get a real feel for what the business world is all about."

Matching Gifts Benefit Harding

"Giving at the office" can have extra meaning to Harding alumni, especially if your employer is one of nearly 1,000 corporations with matching gift programs.

In 1983 Harding University was the recipient of \$156,000 in corporate matching gifts, according to Director of Development Alvin Fowler.

"The method is basically simple," Fowler said. "If you as an alumnus contribute to Harding, then your company will match it. Of course, proper forms must be completed, but it is a tremendous opportunity to multiply a gift to the school."

Of the United States' corporations which have matching gift programs, more than 20 percent use multiple match ratios. That means that the company matches the employee gift at a ratio of two to one or three to one.

For example, a \$100 gift to Harding by an employee of the Gulf Corporation has a \$300 impact on the University because Gulf has implemented a two to one matching gift program. Donors and potential donors employed by companies offering matching gift programs can double and triple the value of their gifts.

Harding does not apply for these matching funds. Interested employees must go by their company's personnel office and complete the necessary forms. The company will then send a matching contribution to Harding. Each corporation has different policies regarding matching gifts. The

employee should check with the company's representatives to determine the appropriate procedure for having his or her

According to *Fund Raising Management* magazine, the average amount received by institutions of higher education was \$51,000. Harding received matching gifts totaling three times the national average.

"Actually that amount could have easily topped \$200,000 if more donors had been aware of the existing gift programs," Fowler said. "We urged all contributors to check and see if they work for a matching gift company."

Fowler said many donors to Harding fail to complete necessary company forms even after making a donation to the University. "If the proper forms are not completed, the company will not provide the matching funds," he said. "Others are sometimes unaware their company is one that has such a program."

The national average of employee participation in these matching gift programs is only two or three percent. Nationally this is an untapped resource of financial support for institutions of higher education. For Harding it has been a significant source of support through greater employee/donor participation.

In these tough times for fund raising, donor awareness is the key to more matching gifts. "I gave at the office" will become a more and more significant statement for donors to Harding.

Shewmaker Selected By Alumni As Distinguished Award Recipient

James E. (Eddie) Shewmaker, a 1944 graduate, was named the 1984 Distinguished Alumnus by the Alumni Association during Homecoming weekend.

Shewmaker, a research chemist for Exxon for 32 years before retiring, teaches chemistry part-time at Northeastern Christian Junior College in Villanova, Penn.

A native of Paragould, Shewmaker completed the B.A. in chemistry and served in the Armed Forces until 1946. He was married to the former Reba Faye Nadeau ('47) and the couple moved to Lincoln, Neb., where he completed the Ph.D. in chemistry at the University of Nebraska. He joined Exxon at graduation and moved to Westfield, N.J.

From his first assignment, which was to search for an answer to "How is oil formed?" Shewmaker researched numerous projects for Exxon. Among his most significant achievements was the development of an oil tanker cleaning process which ultimately gained worldwide application including sanction by the United Nations. The process has reportedly

saved numbers of lives and eliminated the environmental hazard created by former methods.

Shewmaker's program involved dealing with a sludge which forms and adheres to oil tanker walls in transporting crude oil. The old process of cleaning involved high pressure spraying of sea water to remove the residue, but problems created were as unsatisfactory as the residue itself.

The chemist took an idea which had "popped into my head," and developed a safe, simple and economical process for cleaning tankers.

In 1978, the U.N. Committee on Marine Pollution adopted the process and now every ship carries published guidelines of the process.

The Shewmakers have five children, Jim of Imperial, Calif.; Cyndi (Mrs. Kerry) Rhodes of Las Cruces, N.M.; Jane (BSN'82) (Mrs. Terry) Neu, of Searcy; Ann (Mrs. Tom) Turnbull, of Princeton, N.J., and Mary, of Westfield. The school then was known as Harper Christian College and was located at Harper, Kansas. Our boys were playing some other team and the game was close. Almost the whole student body was sitting on the grass or standing about, watching. I became so excited that I stepped forward and began clapping and yelling, cheering our boys on to a hoped-for victory. In just a moment my friend, Bea McLoughlin, had joined me; others moved forward and took up the cheering and now we had a whole squad of enthusiastic supporters.

I hope we won; I do not remember. But I do well remember very vividly what happened next. Everyone who had taken part in this unseemly display was asked to present himself before President Armstrong and make his apologies. I was truly sorry I had displeased our beloved president; that I had lowered in some way the standing of the college; but in my own inner self I felt no guilt.

For some 55 years — if I thought of it at all — I was still in doubt as to my offense. One day then, I picked up, again, Mr. Sears' superb story of Bro. Armstrong's life, "For Freedom." The book opened at page 127 and at the bottom of the page I read: "No one at Cordell ever dreamed that childish yells were needed to create mature 'college spirit,' or that winning teams were necessary to build loyalty to an institution. Bro. Armstrong was never opposed to reasonable athletics . . ." I smiled as I closed the book. At last I knew. Childish yells just were not needed.

But for that lovely one Fall afternoon I was Harding's first cheerleader.

I have seen one or two recent pictures of Harding cheerleaders — precious darling girls — their loose lovely hair; well-fitting jeans. You've come a long way, baby — a long way!

Yet the high standards of the school are just the same; the spirit of John Nelson Armstrong's godly leadership is still the spirit of Harding and will, I trust, ever be.

Let me say in closing that I was deeply saddened by the news of Rena Woodring Sanderson's tragic recent death. Rena was my best friend in those Harper college days.

If at any time you have the opportunity remember me to George Benson, an old schoolmate, and to Mr. Sears, my beloved English instructor. Those two, Rena and Bro. Lloyd, are my only links with the old days.

He said the entire Lectureship is available in book form and can be ordered through the Bible department.



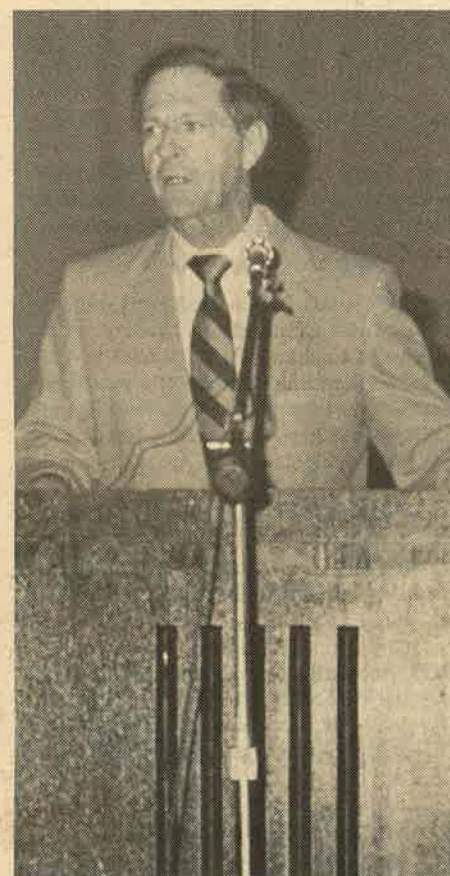

Madison, Tenn. — A Nashville-based student loan fund has been established by the family of the late Dr. Ira North, minister, educator, author and civic leader.

Dr. North was a Church of Christ minister for 45 years, serving 32 as minister of the Madison Church of Christ, the largest congregation among Churches of Christ in the world.

His death from cancer on Jan. 15, 1984, came less than two months after he proposed in his last public sermon that a non-profit, tax exempt organization be established to raise funds to be loaned to students seeking to further their education at a Christian college or university.

In response to Dr. North's proposal, the Springfield, Tenn. Church of Christ has made the first contribution to the Ira and Avon North Student Loan Fund, Inc. Forrest Durrett and Jim Wilhite, members of the Springfield congregation, coordinated the fund-raising campaign there.

Mrs. North (Avon), their three sons and daughter, will serve as permanent executive directors of the fund.

The North family is encouraging elders of more than 11,000 other Churches of Christ in the nation to authorize a special annual Sunday contribution around the 31st of August (birthday of Dr. North) to collect funds to be designated for the student loan fund.

Bisons Post 5-3-1 Record; Trio Named All-Conference

With a solid core of 13 seniors leading the way, the Harding University Bisons recorded a 5-3-1 record and narrowly missed a place in the NAIA's top twenty national poll.

"At the beginning of the season we set two goals," Bison head coach John Prock said. "One was to have a winning season and the other was to be in the race for the conference title. We think we met both our goals."

Prock credited the seniors as one of the major factors in the team's success. "They gave us great leadership and effort. I couldn't say enough about the contribution they've made to our program."

The Bisons recorded victories over Lane College (Tenn.), Southeastern Oklahoma, Evangel College (Mo.), Henderson State University and the University of Arkansas at Monticello and fought to a 21-21 tie with Southern Arkansas University in the annual homecoming game.

The three losses were to Arkansas Tech University, Ouachita Baptist University and to the NAIA's fourth ranked team, the University of Central Arkansas.

The performance of the Bisons earned national recognition. For three weeks Harding was listed in the NAIA's top twenty teams, with a high ranking at 17th. A narrow 14-3 loss to third ranked Central Arkansas in the season finale cost Harding a spot in the final poll. (Central Arkansas is now in the NAIA national playoffs.)

Setting the pace for the '84 Bisons were the tri-captains, Mark Adkison of Tulsa, Okla., Gordon Gerbholz of Omaha, Neb., and Gordon Roddenberry of Pavo, Ga.

Adkison, a 6-2, 215 lb. tight end, Roddenberry, a 6-1, 235 lb. defensive tackle and senior Jeff Klein (6-2, 260 lbs.) of Tabernacle, N.J., were recognized with All-Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference and All-NAIA District 17 honors for their performances.

Careerwise, Adkison moved on the Bisons' list of all-time receivers with a four-season record of 105 receptions, good for 1,393 yards and nine touchdowns. Another senior, tailback Bobby Jones of Steens, Miss., narrowly missed the 1,000 yard rushing mark. Jones, a junior college transfer, compiled a two-year total of 942 yards rushing. He also had a two-year total of 935 yards in kickoff returns.

Sophomore Glenn Segars made a firm impression on the opposition with 680 yards on 170 carries. A 200-pounder from Lithonia, Ga., he surpassed the 1,000 yard mark in only his second collegiate season. As a freshman in 1982, he gained 471 yards for a career total of 1,151 yards.

A very important component in the Bison success was the play of the defensive unit,

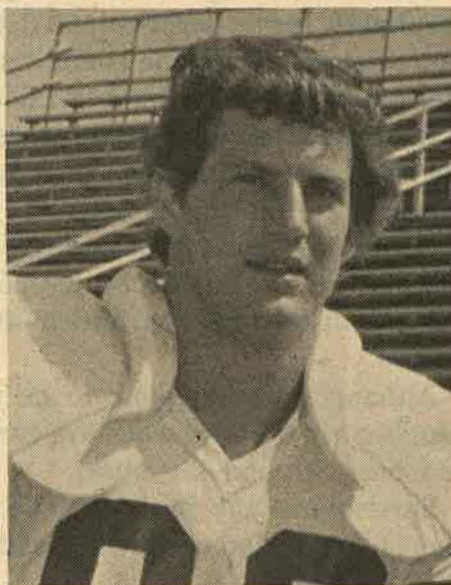

Basketballers Set Fast Pace In Early Season Play

Harding basketball teams, the Bisons and the Lady Bisons, are off to a fast start for the 1984-85 season.

Coach Jess Bucy's Bisons capped third place in the Evangel Invitational over the Thanksgiving holidays and compiled a 5-2 record in the early going.

The Lady Bisons, of Coach Phil Watkins, are 2-2 and are optimistic about a much improved outlook for this season.

For the men, a hot shooting threesome of seniors Rich Foster of Festus, Mo., and Dwight Weaver of Wheatley, Ark., and junior Kenny Collins of Valley Springs,

Ark., have been a highlight.

Collins, an all-tournament selection at Evangel and the Harding Classic, is averaging 16.1 points per game. Foster is scoring at a 15.1 point clip and Weaver shows a 12 ppg. average.

Senior David Allumbaugh, out last season with a hand injury, has bounced back to register an 8 point average at forward. Allumbaugh is from Dallas, Texas.

Teamwise, the Bisons are shooting a torrid .539 percentage from the field and a .724 from the free throw line.

The Lady Bisons, in only their second season of competition, has improved with the infusion of five junior college transfers and a good recruiting year by Watkins.

Junior Kim Wilkins, a 5-8 transfer from North Arkansas Community College, is leading the team scoring with a 12.5 average per game. Also in double figures is another transfer, 5-8 Dena Sims of Pernell, Okla. She has an even 10 point average.

Wilkins and Sims are also the team's leading rebounders, with averages of 9.5 and 4.8 respectively.

The Harding Academy Wildcats won their third straight conference title and reached the quarterfinals of the Class A State Football Playoff.

Under head coach Bill Barden (BS'64) the Wildcats posted a 9-1 record. Barden, now in his 13th year at the Academy, was named Coach of the Year in the District 5-A Central. He has directed the Wildcats to three state championships and into the playoff nine times.

Harriers Capture 14th Straight AIC Title, Lloyd Honored



Harding junior Al Bates of Nashville, Tenn., led the cross country team to the conference championship and a 17th place finish in the NAIA National meet in Kenosha, Wis. Bates placed 71st in the individual competition in a field of 336 runners.

Harding University captured its 14th consecutive Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference cross country championship in Conway, Nov. 2 and went on to place 17th in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics national championship meet at the University of Wisconsin-Parkside in Kenosha, Wis., Nov. 17.

During the week following the AIC championship win Harding Coach Ted Lloyd was once again named AIC and NAIA District 17 Coach of the Year by a majority vote of all area cross country coaches.

Lloyd, one of the NAIA's most successful coaches, has been accorded Coach of the Year honors six times. He is a past president of the NAIA Track Coaches Association.

In winning the conference title the Bisons were led by junior runner Al Bates of Nashville, Tenn., who finished third with a time of 26:23 over the slow, soggy, eight-kilometer course on the Hendrix College campus. Arkansas Tech's Clint Daniels was the first AIC finisher with a time of 26:03. Ouachita Baptist took second in team scoring with 61 points to Harding's 42 points.

Harding senior Larry Wayne of Birmingham, Ala. was the second Bison finisher in fifth place, coming across the line just two seconds and two places behind Bates. The next three Bison runners finished in consecutive order from 10th through 12th place. In respective order, Jon Partlow finished with a time of 27:02 and was followed by Eddie Neal in 27:11 and Darryl Halbert in 27:16.

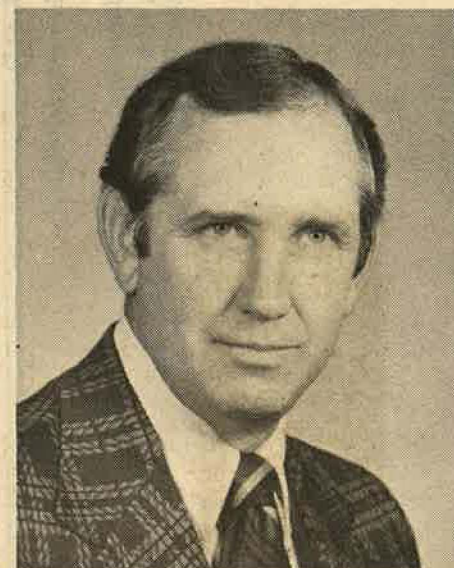
"Partlow ran the race of his life," commented Lloyd. The effort helped make up for the absence of Keven Cantrell, normally Harding's fourth or fifth runner, who missed the meet due to recent medical problems.

"When I found out Kevin couldn't run I was kind of worried," Lloyd said. "But Jon ran the race of his life."

Due to their performances in the AIC meet, Bates, Wayne and Partlow received All-AIC designation. Bates and Wayne were also named All-District for the NAIA District 17.

In the national meet four of Harding's top five runners improved their times from what they ran in the AIC. Their improved effort netted the Bisons 464 team points and the 17th place finish.

"Our kids ran about as well as they could," Lloyd said. "When we left we felt like anything in the top 20 would do. But, of



course, we're never really fully satisfied," he said.

Bates improved his time to 26:05 in placing 47th for team scoring and 71st overall out of 336 runners. Wayne placed 50th in team points and 77th overall, improving his time to 26:09. Also improving their times were Neal of Griffithville, timed at 26:39 and finishing 94th, 135th overall, and Halbert of Lakewood, Colo., who placed 106th, 229th overall with a time of 26:27.

Other Harding finishers and their respective team finishes were: Jim Baird, 175th and Kevin Cantrell, 213th.

In the women's division of the AIC freshman Beverly Gardner and senior Amy Clayton received All-AIC honors as they placed fourth and ninth, respectively, in a five kilometer race. Their efforts helped pull the Lady Bisons into third place in team scoring.

Gardner also received All-District 17 honors for the NAIA and, therefore, qualified individually to compete in the NAIA national meet. There, in Kenosha, she placed 167th overall out of 261 runners.

Arkansas College claimed first place in the AIC meet for the second year in a row with a low score of 30 points. The University of Arkansas-Monticello placed second with 42 points, followed by Harding with 62.

"The girls did, by far, the best they've done all year," Lloyd said. "The meet results were about what we expected."

Other Harding finishers were Sara Jimenez in 12th, Stacie Jester in 18th, Linda Pryor in 19th and Ruth Meechum in 20th.

Youthful Swimmers Prep for 84-85

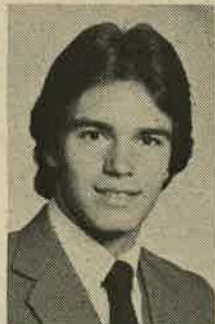

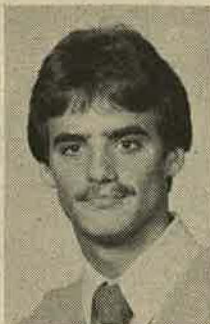
