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McGuiggan To Speak At 1985 Youth Forum

Nationally known missionary/evangelist Jim McGuiggan of Hollywood, North Ireland will present four talks at the 21st Annual Harding Youth Forum, April 5-6.

The 1985 Youth Forum theme is "How Shall We Then Live." It reflects the thrust of McGuiggan's talks which will challenge young people to respond in a positive way to God's love.

The titles of McGuiggan's talks will be: "To Make Friends," "Is It Right?," "Obeying The Unenforceable" and "Broken Hedges and Snakes That Bite."

Born in Belfast, North Ireland, McGuiggan came to America in 1965 as a student. Upon completion of his work he returned to North Ireland, where he preached and taught at the North Ireland Bible School.

In 1973 McGuiggan returned to America on the faculty of the Sunset School of Preaching in Lubbock, Texas, where he taught for nine years. He has been in Hollywood, North Ireland since 1982, when he moved back to his homeland and established a congregation.

Conducted each Easter weekend, the Youth Forum is designed to inspire young people to live closer to God. More than 3,000 came to Harding for the event in 1984. The lively Spring Sing, presented by a cast

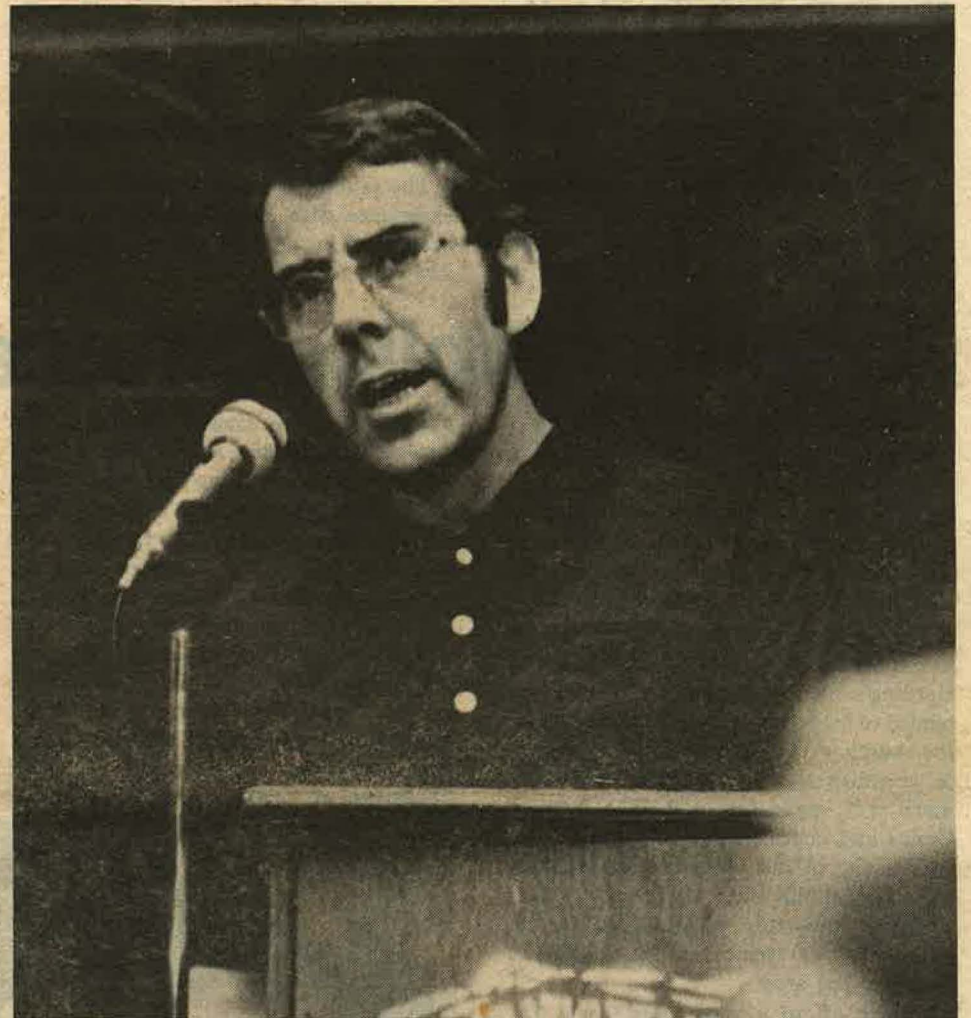
of 400 Harding students, adds to the weekend celebration. Performances by the musical groups Time of Day and Belles and Beaux are also on the schedule.

The Youth Forum is also a time when parents and students can learn more about Harding as they make plans for a college education. The Financial Aid Office will be open all day Friday and until 1 p.m. Saturday to assist prospective students in learning about the various forms of financial aid available.

Tours of the campus will be conducted by Harding students to familiarize visitors and prospective students with building locations and facilities available. The tours will begin each hour on Friday from the American Heritage lobby and will last between 30 minutes and one hour. Also, a special showing of the annual Harding University slide show will be presented at 10 a.m. Friday.

Several faculty members will be on hand Saturday morning to answer further questions from parents or students.

All programs are free except Spring Sing (\$5.50) and the Saturday night movie (\$1). This year's movie is Savannah Smiles and is scheduled for the American Heritage Auditorium at 7 p.m. and 9 p.m.

Capacity Crowd Expected For 12th Spring Sing Musical

Music scores are being written, club directors are meeting for rehearsal assignments, hosts and hostesses are practicing weekly and everyone on the Harding campus is excitedly preparing for the 12th Annual Spring Sing extravaganza.

Themes varying from rainbows to dreams, duckhunters to tourists, cavemen to military servicemen, nuns and monks to janitors, and Broadway to girls' prep school will be among the presentations of the April 4-6 performances, according to Dr. John H. Ryan, Spring Sing coordinator.

The show will be cast by approximately 28 social clubs including Ju Go Ju, Galaxy, Kappa Delta, Sigma Tau Sigma, Alpha Omega, Theta Psi, Kirei Na Ai, Alpha Gamma Omega, Ko Jo Kai, Sub T-16, OEGE, King's Men;

Regina, Chi Sigma Alpha, Tri Sigma Delta, Omega Phi, Phi Delta, Shantih, Zeta Rho, TNT, Gata, Alpha Tau, Ka Re Ta, Kappa Tau, Titans, Buccaneers, Tri Kappa, and Kappa Sigma. A group of faculty members are preparing a show around the theme of school days.

Preparations are also being made by Bob Ritchie, lighting director; Warren Casey, director of the jazz band; C. Robin Miller, technical director; Debbie Young, production assistant and Jeff Hopper, hosting director.

The hosts and hostesses have based their music around the theme "I Got Rhythm" and will perform about 12 numbers in all and will introduce each club act.

Serving as hosts and hostesses this year are Brett Phillips of Baltimore, Md.; Geannetta Walker of Buffalo, N.Y.; Tim Dill of Detroit, Mich. and Sharon Healy of Beebe, Ark.

Ryan said approximately 30 judges have been selected to rate the shows in the categories of theme development, music, costume, and choreography.

The sweepstakes winner (the show with the highest number of total points from the four areas) will win a trophy plus \$300 per club. First runner-up will receive \$250 per club plus a trophy. Second runner-up will win \$200 per club plus a trophy; third runner-up, \$150 per club plus trophy; and fourth runner-up, \$150 per club plus trophy.

Plaques are awarded to the winners of each area and a plaque is also given to the club with the highest percentage of members participating.

Ryan expects capacity crowds to attend the four performances which will begin at 7:00 nightly and 3:00 on Saturday afternoon. Tickets are \$4.50 for Thursday and \$5.50 for Friday and Saturday performances.

Searcy-White County Fund Drive Exceeds \$560,000 In Pledges

More than \$560,000 has been pledged to the University in the Searcy-White County Fund Drive, according to Lott R. Tucker, University Vice President for Finance and coordinator of the effort.

"We are tremendously pleased with the progress of the campaign," Tucker said. "The receptiveness and response of the community has been very impressive."

The institutional advancement effort began Nov. 29 with an announced goal of \$750,000. Tucker said he was optimistic the campaign could be completed by the end of February.

More than 50 civic and business leaders from Searcy and the White County area have participated in the solicitation effort. Committee members indicate the \$560,000 represents pledges from basically the Searcy area.

"Many of our corporate supporters are not included because the final decisions are being made by the national offices. It will take some time before those responses are available," Tucker said.

The \$750,000, five-year program is part of a \$13.1 million effort by the University to

provide operational supplementation and endowment funds for the school. The previous five-year program, 1979-84 contributed more than \$500,000 to the University.

"The importance of the local fund raising effort is significant," Tucker said. "When our alumni and friends are aware of the tremendous support of the local community, there is a carryover effect for our entire advancement effort."

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School of Education Receives Gift In Memory of Herman L. Altman

Mrs. Virgie Pierson Altman of Beaver, Okla., mother of Dr. Ted Altman, vice president for student affairs, was honored at a brief reception recently on the Harding campus in appreciation of her gift to the School of Education in memory of her husband, Herman L. Altman.

Born in Roger Mills County, Okla., the late Mr. Altman worked as a farmer and as a right-of-way buyer for the Michigan-Wisconsin Pipeline Co. Married to Mrs. Altman for 53 years, he was a believer in higher education and was proud when his son chose education as his profession, according to Dr. Altman. It was this memory that prompted Mrs. Altman's gift.

"She wanted to do something in memory of my dad," Dr. Altman said. "It was especially good, since I did teach, that she would do something for the School of

Education."

Mrs. Altman's monetary gift was used to purchase equipment for the Curriculum Laboratory, the major piece being a roll laminator which is used in automatically laminating instructional materials

"The laminator is the latest in laminating technology available," said Dr. Bobby Coker, dean of the School of Education. "The students make tremendous use of it. It is probably the most used piece of equipment in the laboratory."

The Curriculum Laboratory is a specialized, laboratory-library combination room for use by the nearly 500 teacher education majors.

The laboratory gives students hands-on experience with equipment equal to that being used in the most modern elementary and high schools.

School of Biblical Studies Expands to Nassau

The Harding School of Biblical Studies-Nassau kicked off its premier session in Nassau, Friday evening, Jan. 11, with special dedication ceremonies followed by opening-day classes in which 25 Bahaman Christians were enrolled, according to Dr. Clifton L. Ganus Jr., Harding president.

The school, similar in concept and thrust to the School of Biblical Studies started at Harding's Searcy campus in 1974, is intended to help train teachers and leaders for the church in the Bahamas. The agreement to establish the school under Harding's name was made late last year between Ganus and church leaders in Nassau, the capital city of the Bahamas. Establishing the school fulfills their desire to provide a Christian leadership program for the approximately 400 members of the churches of Christ in the area.

"We're off to a good start," said Dr. Ganus. "The people there (in Nassau) are very excited and we are too."

To help the program begin a library, Ganus took with him 300 volumes of books. About 200 more volumes are to be sent as soon as possible, but more books will be needed to make the program the best it can be. To acquire more books the library is in need of donations for the

purchase of books, Ganus said, and a fund has been established at Harding for that purpose. Persons sending donations should mark their checks for "Books: HSBS-Nassau." Also, sets of books might also be donated. Monetary donations can be sent in-care-of Dr. Ganus at Harding and donations of book sets should be coordinated with Dr. Ganus by contacting him in advance.

L. V. Pfeifer, associate professor of Bible at Harding, accompanied Ganus to Nassau where they met with a large group of Christians at 6:30 Friday night for a

dedicatory worship service, a reception and open house. The school's first classes began later that evening with Pfeifer teaching 25 students in a course titled "The New Testament Church." Pfeifer will continue the course for six hours, one weekend a month until May.

On the other three weekends of each month three preachers in the Nassau area will take turns teaching classes. Bill Miller of the Highberry Park Church of Christ in Nassau will teach "The Life of Christ." From the Kemp Road church, Andrew Major will teach "The Pentateuch" and

David Caskey will teach "Personal Evangelism."

The fall class schedule will be similar to that in the spring, with classes conducted only on weekends. During the summer two, five-week sessions will be held and will correspond with the dates for Harding's regular summer sessions.

The summer sessions for 1985 will have husband and wife teams going to Nassau from Harding. Bill Lambert will teach the first summer session and will be accompanied by his wife Helen Lambert, who teaches in Harding's School of Nursing. Richard King, accompanied by his wife Lola, will teach the second summer session.

Students will be able to take up to four courses in the spring and fall terms and one course in each of the summer terms. Students taking the full slate of courses at all sessions will be able to complete the full program in two years and receive a diploma. Although the classes do not count directly for credit towards a bachelor's degree, Ganus said Harding will allow students from the program to take examinations similar to College Level Examination Program (CLEP) tests for a designated number of Bible credits.

Elderhostel Program Plans Sessions

The University will sponsor its Fourth Annual Elderhostel Program this summer by offering two sessions June 9-14 and June 23-28, according to Dr. Jimmy Carr, coordinator.

The Elderhostel program is for those 60 years of age and over to enroll in courses strictly for the opportunity to learn. There are no examinations, no grades and no homework for Elderhostelers, only interest, fun, and sharing.

Courses for the first session will include "Bread Lines and Blue Eagles: The Great Depression," taught by Fred Jewell, professor of history; "The American Civil War-The 'General' Situation," with Virgil Lawyer, professor of history; and "Thru a Looking Glass — With An Eye to 'Other Worlds'," instructed by Bill Rushton, associate professor of biology.

The second session course schedule includes "Cults — Their Histories and

Teachings," taught by Ed Sanders, associate professor of Bible; "Bread Lines and Blue Eagles: The Great Depression," instructed by Ray Muncy, chairman of the department of history and social science; and "Thru a Looking Glass — With an Eye to 'Other Worlds'," with Rushton.

Harding's Elderhostel program can accommodate a maximum of 40 students for each of the 1985 sessions. Participants will be housed in the American Heritage Center with private baths, dining and meeting rooms available. Other facilities include tennis, track, bowling and swimming.

The 29th Annual Youth Citizenship Seminar is being planned for June 9-14, and will be sponsored by Civitan International, Arkansas and Tennessee Farm Bureau and the University's American Studies Program.

Several hundred high school juniors and seniors will spend a week on the Harding campus to learn more about American democracy, free enterprise and Christianity. In past years, the students have come from Arkansas, Georgia, Alabama, Florida and Tennessee to attend the seminar on the country's heritage.

Individual clubs sponsor the visiting students who will hear speakers including Oddvar Berg, former missionary in the Belgian Congo; Col. Joseph E. Hickox, former attache to the U.S. Embassy in Moscow; Dr. Walter H. Judd, former Minnesota Congressman and medical missionary and Eldridge Cleaver, former Black Panther leader.

Harding President Clifton Ganus, Dr. Don Diffine, director of the Belden Center for Private Enterprise Education, and Dr. Bob Reely, director of the Center for

Management Excellence, will also have a part on the program.

On the final day of the seminar, students will be given opportunity to display their talents or make presentations of what they have learned during the week at a formal banquet.

Reely, assistant director of the program, said he considers the seminars to have a twofold purpose: the program educates them in the country's heritage and goals and encourages them to take active roles as citizens and leaders in the future.

Russell Showalter of Harding University has been elected President of the Student Loan Guarantee Foundation of Arkansas Board of Directors.

A member of the 12-member board since 1974, Showalter serves as director of Financial Aid at Harding. He previously served as president of the foundation in 1977.

The Student Loan Guarantee Foundation administers the Guaranteed Student Loan Program in Arkansas. The Foundation guaranteed 13,237 loans totaling \$25,206,076 in the fiscal year 1984. Student loans of \$165,792,281 have been guaranteed by the Foundation since it was established in 1968.

Showalter succeeds Bert Mullens, president of the First National Bank of Russellville. Other officers elected, include Edward Murphy of John Brown University, vice president and Juanita Morden of the Bank of Cabot in Cabot, secretary-treasurer.

"This program is one of primary importance to the young people of our state who want to attend college," Showalter said. "It is a pleasure to be able to serve and be part of the work."

A native of White County, (Showalter Corners), Showalter has served as director of financial aid at Harding since 1967. He also is beginning his fifth term on the Searcy City Council, having served as a member since 1976.

She earned her first degree, a bachelor's degree in French, in August 1983. She completed that four-year program in two years, becoming the first Harding student ever to do so.

Pagcaliwagan said the completion of the two degrees in such a short period of time "was something that just worked out that way. I was also under a directive from my mother."

Pagcaliwagan, who teaches French part time at Bald Knob High School, said she would work the remainder of her contract at Bald Knob and then would decide what school she would next attend.

She said she had applied to the University of South Carolina-at Columbia to enroll in courses for international business.

Alley Receives Loan/Grant Fund

A Student Missionary Loan/Grant Fund for Single Women at Harding University has been established and was awarded to Lynn Alley, a 1984 graduate.

The fund is to be made available to single, senior-year women who plan to enter the mission field or single, women graduates of Harding who begin a chosen mission work within a reasonable time after graduation. Should she serve less than two years in the work, the funds are treated as a loan to be repaid. After completing two years in the mission field, however, the funds are considered a non-repayable grant.

Few limitations are placed on the type of mission endeavors, making the funds available to single women becoming nurses or other types of medical assistants in a mission field, teachers serving in missionary schools, social workers in homes for the

widowed, aged, or orphaned, or workers assisting missionary families in fields needing assistance.

Alley, of Boring, Ore., received the Bachelor of Arts degree in office systems. She is presently working with Dean English, a missionary in Scotland.

The fund was established by Mr. and Mrs. James S. McDonald Jr. of Doctor's Inlet, Fla., who became very interested in the financial support of single women while observing their daughter's efforts to fulfill her desire in using her talents to assist Lois Brown in her family's work in Searcy.

The McDonalds invite everyone interested in this type of loan/grant for single mission-minded women to contribute to the fund by either direct gifts or through provisions in wills. Only interest earned on the contributions into this fund will be used to assist those in need.

"This type of fund is unique to the scholarships Harding has available. It provides assistance to a very singular problem and we believe it will be most effective over the years in helping single

Harding Grads Tops In '83 NTE Scores

All 1983 Harding University teacher education graduates at both the baccalaureate and graduate levels have successfully passed the National Teacher Examination Specialty Area Tests as shown in scores released by the Arkansas Department of Education.

Dr. Bobby Coker, dean of the School of Education, and Dr. Wyatt Jones, director of the graduate program, reported 81 students at the undergraduate level and eight at the graduate level certified in the May, 1983 class.

"All were required to take a Specialty Area Test in their respective majors," Dr. Coker said. "The State Board of Education sets requirements for the scores, and we are delighted that our students passed 100 percent. This is an honor both for them and for the school."

Harding was joined by John Brown University of Siloam Springs in having all graduates pass at the baccalaureate level. Master's and above graduates at the University of Arkansas at Little Rock and Fayetteville and also at Henderson State University in Arkadelphia registered 100 percent. Harding was the only institution to have complete success at both levels.

In addition to Coker and Jones, nine faculty members make up the School of Education, including Jerome Barnes, Edward Sewell, Tony Finley, Mary Ann Harris, H. Wade Bedwell, Lois Brown, Betty W. Watson, Richard Duke and James Nichols. Twelve faculty members assist from other departments.

Ava Conley

Ava M. Conley — Associate Professor of Spanish. B.A. (1968) Ohio University; M.A. (1969) Vanderbilt University.

Ava Conley teaches Spanish to Harding University students each semester, and does the job well enough to have won a Distinguished Teacher Award in 1979.

In summers she uses Spanish to teach the Word of God to souls in Spanish-speaking countries, and has been influential in placing missionaries in the field and in strengthening congregations particularly in Venezuela.

Conley joined the faculty in 1973 after teaching at Hendrix College in Conway. She chose Harding after considering mission work in Bolivia, because "We believed we could have greater impact through training others to 'think missions' and expand their comprehension of spreading the Gospel."

'We' includes husband Bill, who teaches eighth grade physical science in the Little Rock public school system. They have a 14-year-old daughter, Anna.

Their efforts have proved successful. Not

only have they continued to lead groups primarily to Venezuela every summer since 1976, but 28 of those students have made additional campaign trips or returned for mission work. Currently six are serving full time in the field and two others will be leaving shortly for Venezuela, a nation of 14 million persons and one held in high esteem among Latin American nations because of its stable democratic government.

Conley stresses an attempt at presenting practical usage of the language. "Population predictions show that by 1990, one of every four U.S. residents will prefer to speak Spanish," she noted. "It is gratifying to see students realize that they can communicate in the language to serve others."

Plans for the 1985 campaign began last September and the group of approximately 12 will continue preparations through the spring semester when the new effort will get underway.

White's Actions Show Genuine Concern for Students

Have you had a hug today? If you know Ed White, you probably have.

Ed White, professor of English, is sincerely interested in helping students become better people in all areas of life, not just academics. As sponsor of King's Men social club, White is able to influence students spiritually and socially.

Calling himself the "Tom Landry" (head coach of the Dallas Cowboys football team) of King's Men, White said he has sponsored the club for the past 10 years. His wife, Evelyn, is sponsor for Oege, King's Men sister club.

This arrangement has proved advantageous for the Whites as well as the two social clubs.

"It is convenient for us this way," White said. "We have been able to form some really close relationships with the members of both clubs."

Dawn Pryor, a member of Oege, said, "Whenever he sees you he makes you feel special. It is like having your grandfather here on campus. Anything Oege does, he and his wife are right there behind us."

White, now in his 16th year at Harding, thinks the students are special too. "I like working with young people," he said. "I have had the opportunity to work with some of the finest students while here."

Frank Lott, a member of King's Men, also thinks highly of White. "Ed White is one of the most conscientious and supportive men I know," he said.

"I feel that Harding's teachers ought to be above other teachers," White said. "We,

the faculty, ought to be caring and help the students become better people. That is what Harding is about."

White is also a man dedicated to service, spending his time away from teaching ministering to the community.

An active member of the local Red Cross, White has served as county co-chairman for

the past two years. So far he has given 84 pints to the Red Cross blood drives. Roughly, this averages out to 10 and a half gallons, and he is still giving.

White is also active in the Searcy Optimist Club. Over the past 16 years, he has been awarded the "Optimist of the Year" award three times. He is known as a per-

manent fixture to the Harding track where he spends time running.

Of students' complaint that he is too hard, White responded, "I don't want to be soft and easy." He added, "I don't want to be too hard. I just want to be hard enough."

"If I hear the comment, 'You were hard, but I learned,' I think I have been truly complimented," White said about his reputation for toughness. "The goal of every college student should be to learn, not just make good grades."

White thinks some high schools do not prepare one for college and molds his curriculum accordingly.

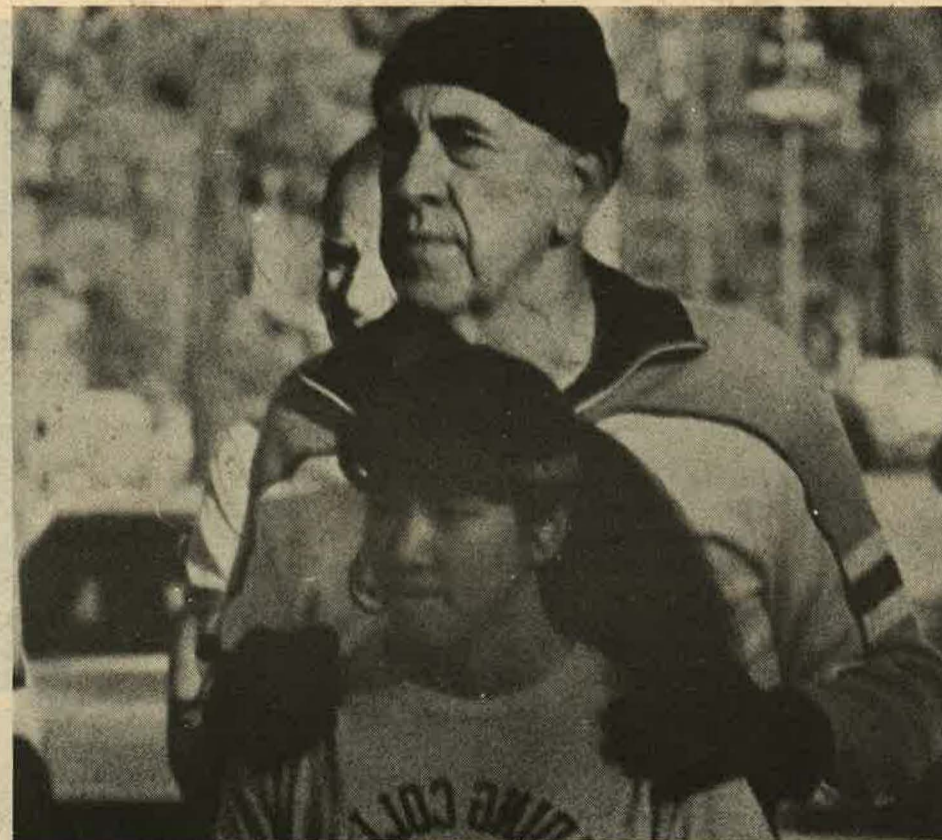
"In my freshman classes I try to prepare students for what lies ahead," White said. "If my students benefit in this way from my classes, I feel I have taught them something very important."

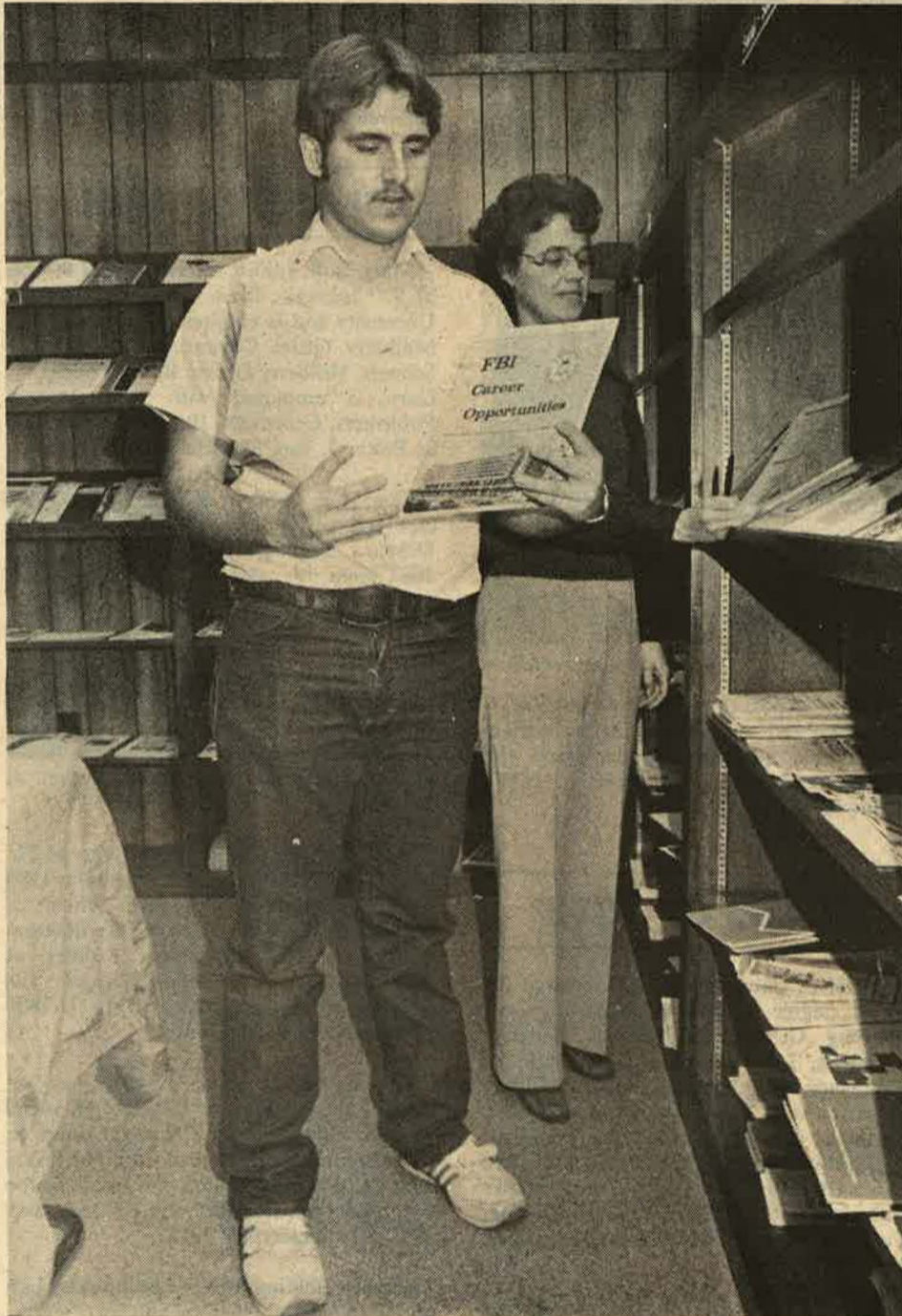

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Looking Good

That Harding exists for the sake of the student is declared in the official catalog and underscored with programs designed to develop the young people "academically, emotionally, physically and spiritually."

The University Counseling Center has been actively involved in assisting many through the years.

"However," says Dr. Lew Moore, counseling director and an associate professor of psychology, "we are aware that there are many new job opportunities, and changing patterns in careers, and that many of our students have a myriad of questions about their future, both from a career standpoint and from a personal standpoint as well."

From that view, the Counseling Center personnel have been busier than usual in recent months in developing new programs for the students.

"What are you gonna do when you get out of college?" is a question routinely asked. Many times the question is casual, intended merely as a conversation starter.

But to any given college student, the question must be faced realistically sooner or later and it can loom bigger than the student may want to realize or admit.

"We are interested in directing the graduate to a field in which he can live, work, be happy and be useful," Moore noted. "He may be at one of many stages in getting toward that end, and we want to be

helpful to him in making good decisions."

Located in the Counseling Center and open for anyone to visit is the "Career Planning Library," where literally thousands of brochures, pamphlets, lists and catalogs of jobs, careers and work opportunities from fields and professions ranging from accounting to wild life conservation are available.

But the staff doesn't rely on those alone to aid the student. The personnel, who include Dr. Moore, Dr. Bob McKelvain, Dr. Dwight Ireland, Dr. Bill Verkler, Mary Shock, Louise Pace, Sherry Pollard, and assistants Joni Mackey and Kathy Howard, are not only available for counseling, but eager to give personal attention to the students.

One facet of the services available includes the "World of Work" series. Utilizing video taping facilities on campus, the series has been developed with speakers from professions coming to the campus to share their expertise. The participants have included such recent graduates as Nancy Lowery, family service consultant at Oklahoma State University, speaking as one launching a new career and Charles Kelly, vice president for Corporate Communications with Arkansas Power and Light Company, who could share from years of professional experience.

Another particularly popular part of the Center's offerings now underway is a "Looking Good" program, developed by the staff in other departments on campus.

“Looking Good” is basically a nutrition awareness program offered through the Heritage Cafeteria. Available is a computer dietary analysis for students, faculty or staff interested in improving nutritional habits.

The program was introduced from several areas that included an emphasis on color analysis and appropriate dress, nutritional analysis, a weigh-in for those wishing to take off pounds or inches, and a special computer terminal and printer at the cafeteria entrance for students to analyze their eating habits.

“We were amazed at how little information some had about the caloric and

also the nutritional value of the food they ate,” a counselor pointed out.

Cafeteria-goers could punch in a menu and see the percentage of the nutritional values of their choices, i.e. protein, vitamins, calcium, etc. An especially revealing part of the printout included the percentage of calories among the food choices that had come from fat.

A more intensive program will be implemented this spring, and initially 80 students had indicated a desire to take part for the semester.

Evidence in the interest in the program is seen in the “Looking Good” T-shirts being worn around campus.

The counselors will place the students in small groups and will keep records on their progress, expecting the participants themselves to be pleasantly surprised in their increased vitality and energy, not to mention better results from their studies in higher grade point averages.

Career counseling and “Looking Good” programs are not the only fields available through the Counseling Center, with personal concerns, pre-marital and marital sessions, and others among the listings.

“And we’re continuously looking for any angle or avenue through which we can serve,” Moore said.

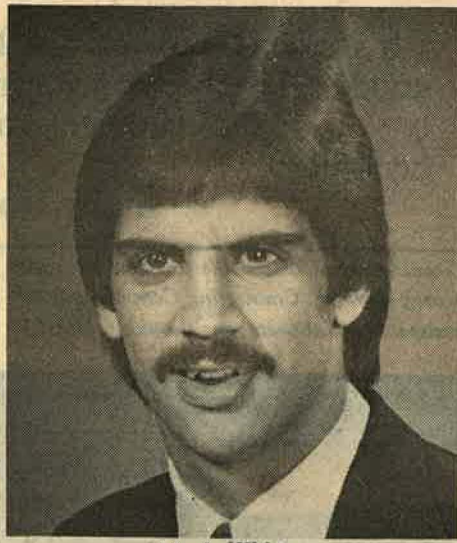

Senior linebacker Gordon Gerbholz has been named to the 1984 Academic All-America team selected by the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics.

The announcement was made by Charles Morris, associate executive director of the NAIA in Kansas City, Mo., Jan. 15.

Gerbholz, a 6-0, 205 lb. athlete from Omaha, Neb., has recorded a 3.38 grade point average (on a 4.0 scale) while pursuing a major in computer information systems. Also excelling on the football field, he was one of the 1984 tri-captains and was named to the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference and NAIA District 17 honorable mention teams.

Hindman and Pilkington were named to the All-AIC and District 17 teams and will serve as the co-captains of this year's team.

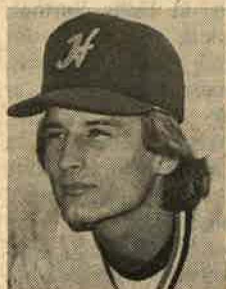
Golf

Stegall Signed By Denver Gold; First Bison Drafted By USFL

University wide receiver Gill Stegall was drafted in the 11th round of the United States Football League open draft Jan. 3, by the Denver Gold.

For the speedster from Searcy, the opportunity to have a shot at professional football is the realization of a dream.

"I've wanted to get a chance at this for some time," Stegall said Thursday night after learning of the news.

Stegall actually signed a free agent contract with Denver on the Friday before Christmas, but it included a clause which nullified the contract if he was drafted by any other USFL team.

He was not surprised that Denver went ahead and drafted him anyway. "Not really," said Stegall. "They said they might

June Jones, the former Atlanta Falcons' quarterback, is the new offensive coordinator for the Denver Gold. Last year, as an assistant for the Houston Gamblers, he developed the vaunted Gamblers' passing attack which set numerous passing records.

"They're going to do the same thing there that they did at Houston," said Harding Coach John Prock, who talked with Jones on the phone Thursday. "They're going to use four receivers and just one running back. He was hunting for the Gill Stegall types. We're proud of Gill. It may be an ideal situation for him with that run-and-gun offense."

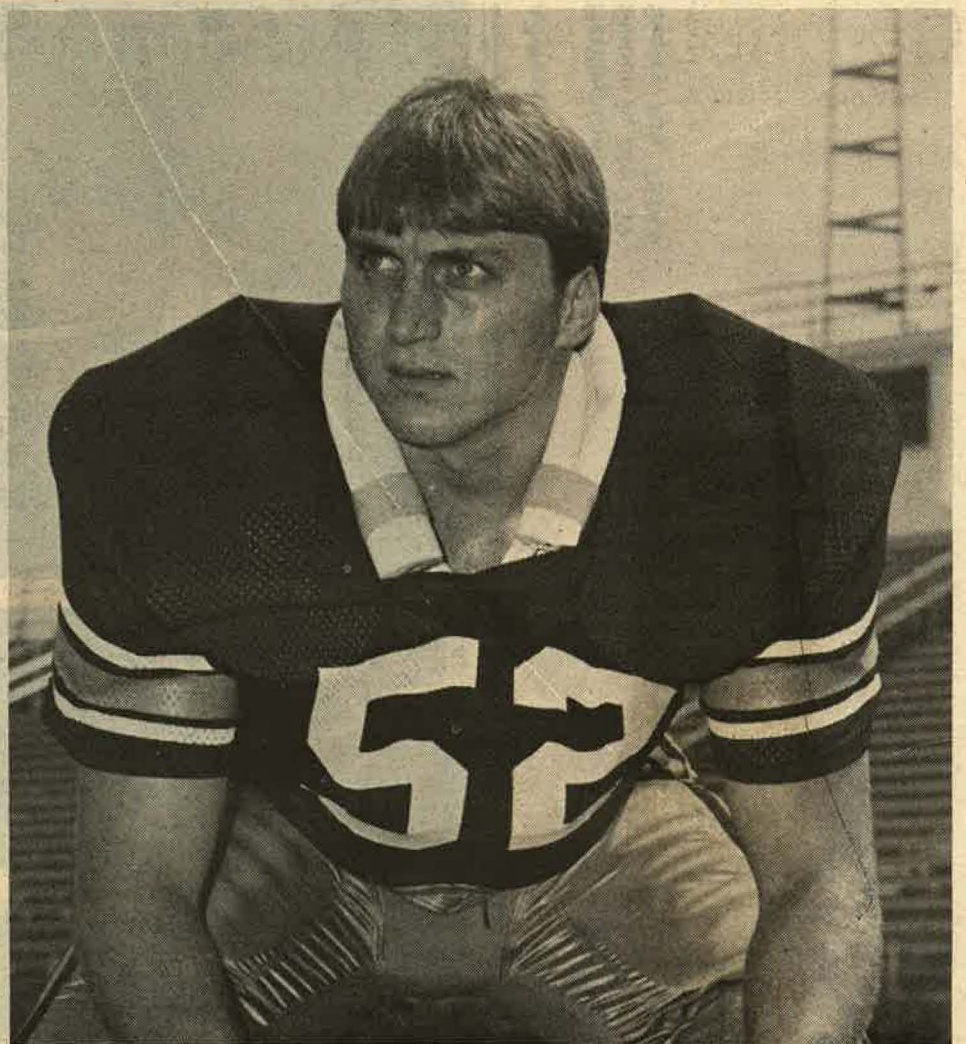
Stegall caught 14 passes for the Bisons this fall. He averaged 29.6 yards per catch. The 5-8, 160 lb. senior caught four touchdown passes, including a game-winning 80-yard TD reception against Henderson State.

The two-time all-conference performer at Searcy High School, Stegall twice won the Class AAA 440-yard dash champion. He was an All-State football selection at Searcy in 1980. He was also a member of Harding's 440-meter relay team which qualified for the NAIA national track meet last spring.

Stegall has blazing speed, running 9.6 in the 100-yard dash, 21.8 in the 220 and 48.1 in the 440-yard dash. He has 4.4 speed in the 40-yard dash.

The physical education major began his collegiate career at Arkansas State. He started for three years for the Indians before transferring to Harding. He ran track for the Bisons last spring and then went out for football this past fall, earning honorable mention honors on the All-AIC and NAIA District 17 teams.

Stegall and his wife Charlotte have two children.

Room and board for resident campers is \$135 and for commuting campers, \$75. If five or more players from one team attend a discount fee of \$125 will be charged for resident campers and \$70 for commuters.

Martin indicated that enrollment in the camps will be limited this year. Ninety-six (96) will be enrolled for the Senior high camp and 128 will be accepted for the Junior high camp. He urged interested athletes to apply as early as possible.

Bisons, Lady Bisons Meet Success, Frustration At Mid-Point Of Season

A high scoring trio has paced the Bison basketball team to an 8-7 record as the season hits the halfway mark.

Two seniors, 6-5 Rich Foster of Festus, Mo., and 6-3 Dwight Weaver of Wheatley, Ark., and junior Kenny Collins of Valley Springs, Ark., are each averaging in double figures for the Bisons.

Collins, a 6-6 post man, is leading the team with a 15.3 point average per game. Foster is close behind with a 14.3 average and Weaver has a 12.4 ppg. average.

Collins also leads the team in rebounding with a 6.4 average and Weaver, a guard, is the Bisons' second leading rebounder with a 5.6 average per game.

Another senior, 6-5 David Allumbaugh of Dallas, Texas, is averaging 9.4 ppg. and is ranked number two in the Arkansas In-Intercollegiate Conference in free throw shooting with an .820 percentage.

Coach Jess Bucy's Bisons, who were runnersup in the NAIA District 17 playoff last season, have posted some impressive statistics in early season play. Teamwise, Harding is shooting .542 from the field, good enough for a second place ranking in the AIC. In the free throw category the Bisons have a .682 accuracy, which was good for first place in the AIC in the first conference statistical release.
