## American Studies Program Wins Honor Medal

The Freedoms Foundation of Valley Forge, Pa., has recognized the Harding University American Studies Program and senior Debbie Garrett as national award winners in the 1984 program.

The American Studies Program was selected as the principal award winner in the category of community programs and will receive an encased George Washington Honor Medal for its year-long program. Garrett, a native of Brookston, Ind., was the winner of a Valley Forge Honor Certificate for Excellence for an essay “What ‘Free’ Means In Free Enterprise.”

“We’re especially delighted to have our students and programs recognized,” said Dr. David Burks, director of the American Studies Program and dean of the School of Business. “This is Harding’s first award in the community category and that is especially gratifying to us.”

The Freedoms Foundation Awards Program is designed to promote an appreciation and understanding for freedom and the American way of life. Gordon R. Hall, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court in Utah, served as chairman of the 1984 awards jury.

The multifaceted Harding American Studies Program provides educational opportunities for the students, the community and high school students in the areas of citizenship, government, economics and business.

The program includes the highly ac-

claimed lecture series which annually brings nationally known personalities to the campus and the Searcy community. Past speakers have included news commentator Paul Harvey, economist Milton Friedman, Senator Dale Bumpers, President Gerald Ford, businessman Sam Walton, author Alex Haley and Senator Sam Ervin.

Other facets of the year-long program include the Youth Citizenship Seminar for high school students, the Management Seminar for area business and management leaders, the student business and economics teams, field trips for University students to the economic and historical centers of our country and an invitational business games for high schools and junior colleges.

In addition, the special activities of the Center for Private Enterprise and the Center for Management Excellence have an outreach to the community as well as state wide.

A member of the Harding Students in Free Enterprise Economics team, Miss Garrett spoke extensively at high schools on the theme, “America, Freedom and You.” She is a business management major and a national winner of the Milton Friedman Economics Essay competition.

Harding is recognized as a leader in economic education and has received more than 50 awards from the Freedoms Foundation. Harding’s American Studies Program, originally known as the School of American Studies, began in 1953.

## Orr to Speak at Graduation 340 to Receive Degrees

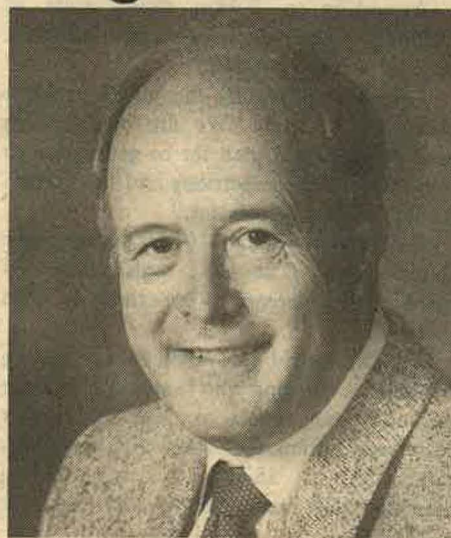
Roy Orr, chairman of the board of the First National Bank of DeSoto, Texas, will present the commencement address to approximately 340 candidates at graduation ceremonies May 12.

Previously, Orr has served as a member of the Dallas County Commissioners Court, president of the DeSoto School Board and mayor of DeSoto.

In state and regional activities, Orr has been chairman of the Texas State Democratic Executive Committee, president of the North Central Texas Council of Governments, regional chairman of the Regional Transportation Council, chairman of the Texas County and District Retirement System Board and is currently a member of the Texas Aeronautics Board.

Orr has served as a delegate at the National Democratic Convention. He was appointed to the Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations Board by former President Jimmy Carter and was appointed by President Ronald Reagan as a member of the President’s Advisory Committee of Federalism.

Orr has received several awards including Oak Cliff Man of the Year; The Press Club of Dallas, Headliner of the Year; City of

DeSoto, Roy Orr Park and the County Line Road was named Roy Orr Boulevard.

President Clifton Ganus will award 120 Bachelor of Art and 105 Bachelor of Business Administration degrees to lead the number of diplomas presented.

The University’s graduation ceremonies will take place at 2:30 p.m. in the Benson Auditorium.

## Accreditation Team Visits

The North Central Association Accreditation Committee has sent a rough draft of the written report to Harding administrators after their on-campus visit Feb. 10-13.

Harding is a member of the North Central Association of Schools and Universities and is seeking continued accreditation of its curriculum and facilities.

“We have submitted a detailed self-study of the University which was followed by the on-site visit by the study committee,” said Dr. Neale Pryor, vice president for academic affairs.

“We have received a favorable preliminary report and believe that everything is on track for the 10-year certification of our program,” he said. “The committee examined our operation from one end to the other and I believe they were favorably impressed with the commitment of our program.”

A five member team, chaired by Dr. Dean Hubbard, president of Northwest Missouri State University, conducted the in-depth examination of the school. Other members were Dr. Jeffrey Barry, president of Walsh College (Mich.), Dorothy Chappell, chairperson of the department of biology, Wheaton College (Ill.), Sister Mary Cahoon, senior vice president and dean of the College of St. Scholastica (Minn.) and George Ralph, professor of theatre at Hope College (Mich.).

Pryor indicated the study report was complimentary of the University in a number of areas. They included the morale and spirit of cooperation among the faculty, the neatness of the campus and facilities,

the development of the Harding University in Florence, Italy, program and the University’s work in student retention.

Other strengths mentioned were the support of the Board of Trustees and the commitment in all segments to the stated mission of the school.

The report suggested study should be given by the administration to long range planning linking enrollment with fund raising needs and recruitment of future faculty.

The accrediting team expressed a concern for the lack of a systemic approach in planning for the migration of the students to the School of Business from the arts and sciences. The team stressed the University’s need to evaluate the impact of the situation on the school as a whole, especially the increase in business majors.

They also noted concern that students needed more access to computer terminals, suggesting a development of a delegation of time schedule.

Other recommendations in the report included a need for a broader range of liberal arts books for students to choose from in the book store and a latent anxiety on the part of the faculty concerning their degree of involvement in the governance of the institution.

“We feel very positive about the preliminary report,” Pryor said, “and anticipate that the final report from North Central will be made sometime this summer.”

Harding became a member of the North Central in 1954 and has undergone periodic evaluations to continue its accreditation.



# College Bowl Team Places Fourth in Regional Tournament

The University College Bowl team placed fourth among 17 teams in the Region 12 tournament at Rice University Feb. 16-17. The accomplishment was Harding's second highest finish in five years of participation in the program. In 1983 the team placed third.

Harding's victories came over Rice, Austin College and a repeat over Rice, before losing two games in the double elimination format to eventual champion Tulane University and runner-up Texas A&M University.

Team captain Greg York, a student at the Harding Graduate School of Religion in Memphis, led the team with 20 correct toss-up questions. York has served as captain all five years.

Senior David Smith of Searcy, in his second year on the team, had 10 correct answers. Smith is majoring in history, English and political science.

Freshman Dan Shill, a music major from Memphis, answered six questions. The fourth position on the team was shared by senior Michael Brumley, a pre-med student from Columbus, Miss., and sophomore Barry Phillips, a nursing major from

Memphis. Each answered three toss-ups, Brumley in three games and Phillips in two.

Baylor placed third. Ranked behind Harding, in order, were University of Texas at Austin, Rice, Austin College, University of Arkansas, Texas Christian University, University of Houston, University of Texas at Permian Basin, North Texas State University, Stephen F. Austin State, University of Texas at Arlington, University of Texas at San Antonio, Trinity University and Louisiana State.

Harding's faculty coaches are Dr. Fred Jewell, professor of history; Dr. Larry Long, associate professor of English; and Dr. Dennis Organ, professor of English. They coordinated a 32-team double elimination tournament on campus during the fall that produced the varsity team from the winning squad named "Krunch" and top players from other teams.

The Krunch team was composed of Bob Wilson and Dave Favre, who graduated in December and thus were ineligible for the varsity, and Glenn Studebaker and Phillips. Two all-stars who did not make the traveling team were Gil Foster and Ron Williams.

Dr. Pryor is executive director of the National Council of Alpha Chi, having served as national secretary-treasurer for many years and in numerous other offices as well.

Also, Dr. Pryor, retired vice president and dean of Harding who now serves as a professor of physical science, was presented a plaque for his 28 years of sponsorship of Harding's Arkansas Eta chapter.

The scholarship will be available to a junior or senior member of Region VI, which is located in the Northeast, for outstanding research or creative work.

To earn membership, students must have a 3.70 grade point average on 80 to 103 hours of credit or a 3.50 average on 104 hours or more.

## Tuition to Increase Five Percent For 1985-86 School Year

A five percent across the board increase in costs for the 1985-86 school year has been approved by the Harding Board of Trustees, according to Lott Tucker, vice president for finance.

"Inflation is still a very real, constant problem that we face," Tucker said, "and the administration is striving to implement cost saving programs whenever possible."

According to Tucker rising costs of utilities, equipment, supplies and labor are factors in the situation.

"We are addressing the utility problem directly," he said. "We are investigating and developing a plan for co-generation to produce our own electricity and the savings could be very significant."

Fall tuition will be \$101.50 per semester hour. Costs of housing, registration and food will increase approximately five percent.

For the school year 1985-86 a boarding student at Harding who takes 15 hours per semester can expect to meet all regular expenses (tuition, fees, room and board) for \$5,266.50 to \$5,513. A non-boarding student can meet tuition and fees for \$3,247.50.

"Differences would occur depending upon which dormitory and which cafeteria was selected," Tucker said. "Adjustments would also have to be made for taking more or less than a 15 hour load."

Tucker encouraged parents and prospective students to contact the Admission office for assistance in obtaining financial aid and scholarship information. (WATS lines for the Admissions office are

# New England Tour Planned For Alumni and Friends

A Harding University Alumni and Friends bus tour to New England will be conducted Sept. 23-Oct. 3 with Dr. Jimmy Carr as coordinator.

"Our alumni have expressed interest in this type of program," Carr said, "and the University is anxious to provide the opportunity."

The 11-day tour will originate in Searcy with a stop in Memphis to pick up participants, with the first night's stay in Effingham, Ill.

The group will tour Indianapolis, Ind., with lodging in St. Clairsville, Ohio and will visit Niagara Falls on the third day. After viewing the American and Canadian Falls from the Panasonic Tower, the group will spend a night in Niagara Falls, Canada.

Traveling the New York State Thruway to Syracuse, the tour will arrive at Thousand Islands of the St. Lawrence Seaway at the Eastern end of Lake Ontario and will cruise through the islands with a night's stopover in Alexandria Bay, N.Y.

The fifth day the group will drive through the Adirondack Mountains, stopping in Lake Placid, the site of the 1980 Winter Olympics and the 500 million year old Ausable Chasm. The tour group will journey to Lake Champlain and ferry to Burlington, Vt. for the night.

A circle tour of the Green Mountains will include stops at the 150-year old covered bridge at Waitsfield, the state capitol at Montpelier and other historic sites.

The tour will continue across the Con-

necticut River into New Hampshire to the White Mountains and Franconia Notch, including an aerial tramway ride to Cannon Mountain. After a trip to the "Old Man of the Mountain" phenomenon at Profile Lake, the night's lodging will be in Littleton, N.H.

After a drive to Boston, the group will visit places such as the Boston Common, USS Constitution, Old North Church, Beacon Hill and Back Bay before stopping for the night.

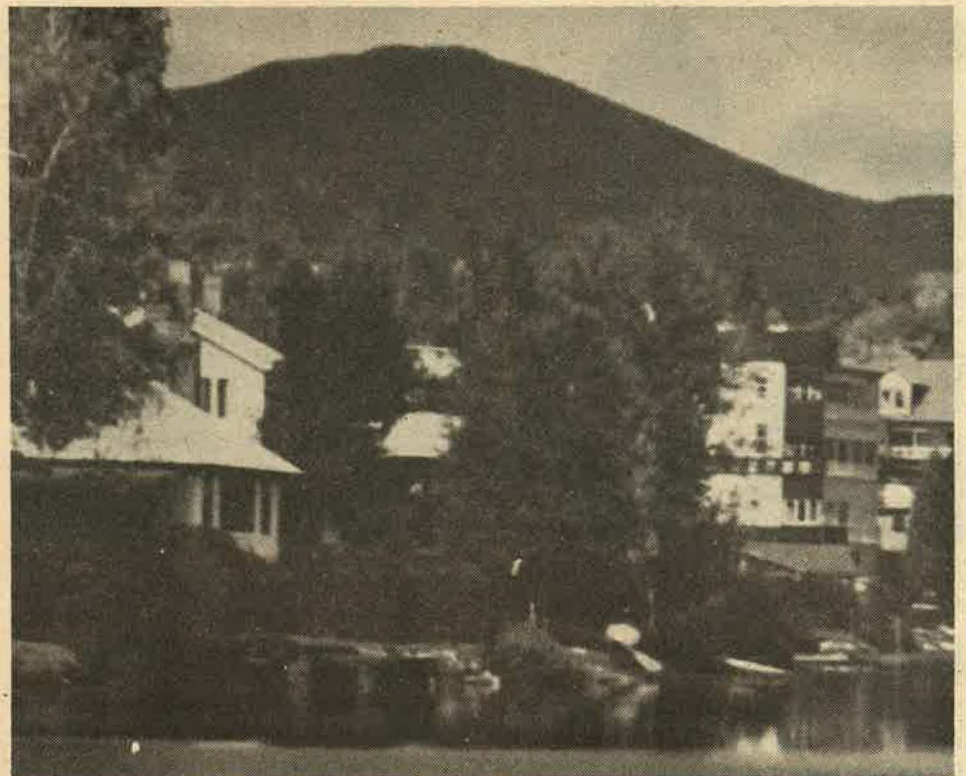
A drive through Rhode Island and Connecticut will end in New York City, where free time will be a part of the fare. The next day a sight-seeing tour of Times Square, the United Nations Building, the Statue of Liberty and other significant points of interest will be made before driving to Grantsville, Md. for the night.

The return route will include travel through West Virginia, with the final night at Bardstown, Ky., site of Stephen Foster's "Old Kentucky Home."

After travel through "Music City, USA" Nashville, Tenn., the group will return to Searcy.

Carr said the 11-day tour will be limited to approximately 40 persons and will cost \$853. A \$25 deposit to Harding Alumni and Friends New England Tour may be made to Box 1224, Harding University, Searcy, Ark. 72143.

## Yates Scholarship Established

A scholarship fund to honor the memory of Timothy Edward Yates, who died in 1980 of heart failure after his freshman year at Harding, has been established by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. D. Yates of Memphis.

In addition to honoring the memory of their son, the fund was set to encourage and reward academic excellence at Harding.

"This is a tremendously loving and unselfish example on the part of Elsie and Gerald Yates," said Al Fowler, director of development, "and we salute this family for their desire to help young people to achieve at Harding."

Qualifications for eligibility include the following: A student must be at least a junior; the student must be majoring in mathematics, computer science, biological science or physical science; the student must maintain a 3.4 grade point average in his major field and a 3.2 overall.

Students interested in making application for the grant should inquire through the office of Dr. Dean Priest, Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences.

A committee of Dr. Neale Pryor, Vice President for Academic Affairs; Jan Renee Cramblett, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Yates; and David Cramblett, their son-in-law, will administer the fund.

When choosing applications, the committee will also consider demonstrated capability and potential for service to the Lord's work.

Initially a junior will be chosen and the scholarship will be renewed for the senior year if he maintains qualification. In the second year, an additional junior recipient will be selected with the same renewal understanding.

Listing of the scholarship has been added to the University catalog, and recipients will be announced upon selection.

## Muncy to Visit Efal, Israel

Dr. Raymond Muncy, chairman of the department of history and social science, will present a paper on "Sex and Marriage in Utopian Communities" in Israel, where he has been invited for an International Conference on "Kibbutz and Communes — Past and Future" at Efal beginning May 19.

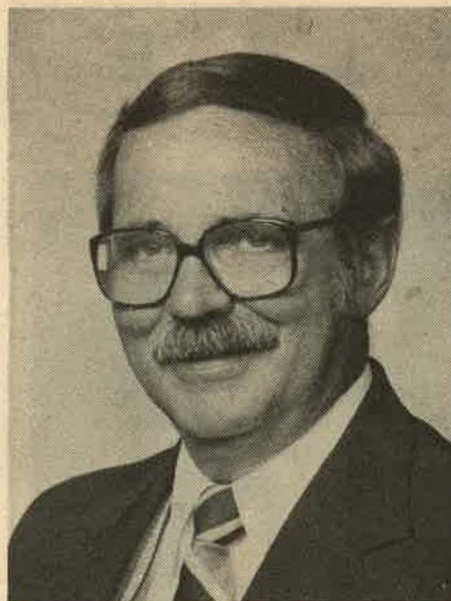
Muncy was invited by the Yad Tabenkin Institute for the Conference, which is sponsored by the Israeli government and directed by the Department of Jewish History at the University of Tel-Aviv.

The professor will join Utopian scholars from Holland, Denmark, Norway, Germany, Belgium, Switzerland, France and Australia to spend three days reading papers and attending workshops. The participants will then visit the various kibbutzim and later each will spend five days living in one. Muncy will be at the Beka Valley Kibbutz near Jericho, and later will be the guest of the Israeli government to travel to historical sites. He will return to the United States May 30.

Dr. Muncy wrote a book entitled "Sex and Marriage in Utopian Communities," published first by Indiana University Press and later in paperback by Penguin Press. The volume has drawn attention of Utopian scholars and communal experiments throughout the world.

His thesis, that monogamous familism militates against the collective idea and contributes to the demise of communes, is one that drew considerable criticism when published, particularly in the New York Times review of Aug. 12, 1973.

However, the thesis was, as Muncy claimed, historically verifiable for the 19th Century experiments, and has proved to be

the major cause for the failure of more recent communal experiments.

Muncy also has authored a history of Searcy, written for the Bicentennial, entitled "A Frontier Town Grows Up With America," and has written chapters for several other publications. He has received a Mellon Fellowship at Rice University to study "Crime and Punishment in History."

Dr. Dean Priest, Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, said of the invitation, "This is indeed a great honor. We have long since recognized Ray Muncy as a great teacher, and we are pleased that he has received widespread recognition as an author. Now we are especially thrilled to have him recognized internationally as well."

## Memorial To Honor Former Teacher

Mary Ann Harris, a professor of education, died Feb. 11 after a five-year battle against cancer. Dr. Harris had taught through the fall semester, but was hospitalized early in January.

The 52-year-old professor was a 1954 graduate of Harding, having served as *Bison* editor two years. She later was assistant to Publicity Director Russ Simmons two years.

In 1957 she was married to Jack D. Harris and the couple resided in Illinois and later in Memphis, where she taught in the public schools several years. She received the doctorate at Memphis State and in 1978 joined the Harding faculty.

Her colleague, Betty Ulrey, said of her, "Mary Ann was one of our finest teachers, receiving the Distinguished Teacher Award in 1983. She told me that her love of writing had helped her in teaching on all levels, from elementary school to university graduate courses. Her love of music was incorporated with her love of children in her doctoral dissertation as she studied the effect of the Orff music technique on teaching exceptional children.

"I will always remember one shining moment in chapel last fall as she stood before 3,000 people, pulling herself up to

her maximum height of five feet, to thank all of the Harding family for prayers and expressions of concern during her illness. She inspired us not only by her sincere words, but also by her courage."

Other survivors include two sons, Bob of Harrison and Lee of Memphis; her mother and stepfather, Margaret and Carney Moore of Memphis; a brother, Robert Whitaker of Nashville, Tenn. and two grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at the College Church of Christ by Evan Ulrey, who had performed the Harris' wedding ceremony, Bobby Coker and Jimmy Allen. Burial was in Oak Lawn Cemetery in Searcy.

A Mary Ann Harris Fund has been established in the School of Education, with a scholarship to assist students in the field of education will be awarded. Memorial contributions to the fund should be made payable to Harding University with notation for the Mary Ann Harris Fund.

## University Band Seeks Bassoonist

### Lavon Carter

Lavon Carter — Assistant Professor of Management. B.S. (1967) Harding University; M.B.A. (1970) University of South Carolina.

Lavon Carter grew up on a farm in South Georgia, where he learned the meaning and value of hard work.

He utilized that experience, scrubbing and cleaning on the maintenance crew while earning a degree, magna cum laude, at Harding, where he also met and married Leah Michaels.

After graduation, graduate school and six years with Washington Post organizations, he, feeling a debt to and believing in Christian education, returned to teach, bringing Leah and daughters, Ladonna, Lisa, Laura, Latina and Lacinda.

At — where else — Letona, the family purchased a 115-acre farm, because he "felt strongly that the girls learn what work is all about." That philosophy, helping others learn to reason and think, is his thrust for the students in his business, economics and management courses.

At the farm, dubbed "Achin' Acres" by Leah, the Carters run cattle (all the girls can milk), produce, kill, cure and smoke meat ("I had two big pieces of our bacon for breakfast"), plant and harvest squash, corn peas and strawberries, can 500 quarts of

produce and fill two freezers each summer.

In addition, Leah has worked full time at the College Inn, but recently dropped to three days a week when participation in sports activities at Harding Academy, where four of the girls are involved, taxed the time limit beyond maximum. Until recently, Lavon was full-time minister of the Letona Church of Christ.

Last fall the farm became somewhat an extension of the University as the Carters developed a service opportunity for social clubs.

Growing from an inquiry by a club or two, the Carters offered a "Hayride Plan" for club functions. For a fee, clubs went to the farm, where a bonfire and weiner roast with all the trimmings waited. After the meal, served and serviced by the girls, Carter hooked up the tractor and pulled the couples on a long, fun ride around the farm. "We had about 20 of those," he recalls.

Just this semester, Lavon has passed his orals for the doctorate at Memphis State University. The next step will be writing his dissertation. The topic? Management, of course.

She much prefers to enjoy her situation and share her excitement for the future. And to talk about Harding.

Obviously she's been successful. Son Alex is completing his freshman year, and Rachel, a graduating senior, has already been accepted for registration this fall.

Ernie herself is completing supervised teaching at Searcy Junior High and looking for a teaching job for the fall, adding, "With two children in college, I think I'd better!"

## Late Career Start No Deterrent; Addington Builds Honors Degree

Several years ago Bald Knob homemaker Frances Ernie Addington, frustrated, bored and confused, picked up on a segment of a Little Rock talk show that changed her life into one of self-confidence and satisfaction.

On May 12 she will pick up a diploma in Harding's spring commencement exercises, and she's so completely captivated by her accomplishment that she's ready to take to a soapbox to encourage other women she thinks would benefit from her experience.

At 39, Ernie has completed a Bachelor of Arts degree with a political science major and a history minor. En route she compiled a creditable 3.5 grade point average, earned membership in Alpha Chi, and has been selected for inclusion in Who's Who. In addition, she has become a bona fide proponent of Christian education, citing her personal spiritual development and that of her family as examples.

"I am so happy I've done this," the attractive lady bubbles. "The classroom has opened a whole new world for me. I know there are many women thinking 'Is this all there is' and leading desperate, empty lives."

Ernie and Wilburn Addington married soon after she finished high school and moved to the Chicago area, where activities and opportunities for cultural development or entertainment were plentiful. Ten years later, when family circumstances deemed it advisable, they, with children Alex and Rachel, moved back to Arkansas. Wilburn started a heating and air conditioning business in Augusta.

Ernie was not prepared for the change and was 'terribly unhappy,' she admits. "I'm ashamed to admit it," she acknowledges, "but I felt I had to do something."

When the Addingtons decided to move their business to Bald Knob, Ernie delved into volunteer and civic work, serving on various committees and as president of a garden club. The business continued, as it does yet, to flourish. Things were looking up.

When she heard Little Rock weatherman

Tom Bonner and the Arkansas Symphony Conductor Kurt Klipstatter during one noon hour, she became most interested. The two were touting season tickets to the Symphony.

"I got excited just thinking about having some place to go. It wasn't that I wanted to hear the Symphony, for I'd never been to an orchestra concert in my life," she smiles.

Wilburn agreed to the idea and the tickets were ordered. But the results were not so satisfying.

"I came from a family of seven, and there had been no funds for musical training," she explains. "Wilburn enjoyed the concerts, because he had a good music background, but for me it was a total disaster."

Not easily discouraged, however, the searching Mrs. Addington hit upon the idea of taking a course in music appreciation at Harding University. "I'm surprised I even knew there was such a course," she recalls.

Even that step caused concern and confusion for her, for she didn't have a good image of Harding. "Frankly, I was hesitant because I was afraid I would break a rule and get kicked out. I smile now when I think back to that — but that is truly the way I felt."

However, she found something entirely and completely different. The professor led a prayer to start the class; he shed tears as he related a recent death on campus. "I couldn't believe it; it was a wonderful introduction to Harding and to a new world for me," she says.

Ernie was also impressed with the bright, young people and took note of their nice attire, their polish, their friendship and their love.

Her enthusiasm, coupled with study, resulted in an A for the course. Next she tackled History of Western Civilization and again a new world opened up. "I loved history, and the teacher was so interesting that the world became real to me. I started reading *Newsweek* magazine and understanding what I read . . . it was wonderful."



# Pioneer Christian Educator, Administrator Succumbs

Adlai Stevenson Croom, 92, one of the earliest innovators of Christian education in the state of Arkansas and a pioneer administrator of Harding, died Feb. 16 in Searcy. He was President of Arkansas Christian College at Morrilton from 1922 to 1924 and Vice President of Harding College 1924-25.

Croom was born in Oxford, Ark., in 1892. Both his parents were originally from Tennessee, but moved to Arkansas while they were very young. His early education was limited to elementary as no high school facility was available. He completed secondary school work, however, in Henderson, Tenn., and subsequently attended the University of Louisville from 1915 to 1919. His master's degree was completed at Harvard University in 1922.

Following his work with Arkansas Christian and Harding College, Croom taught for four years at Washburn College in Topeka, Kan., during which time he also preached for the Topeka church. During the next 17 years, he served as a manager for Equitable Life of New York insurance company in Enid, Okla.

Croom supported himself through these secular jobs, but had been primarily interested in his work as a preacher since 1914. He began the first congregation of the Lord's church at Enid while working there — beginning with about a dozen women and children and growing to about 200 members before he left in 1948.

From 1949 until his retirement in 1957, Croom served as business manager at Harding College which had already moved to Searcy. Since that time, he devoted himself exclusively to preaching and writing. During his 60 years of preaching, he served more than 130 churches in 16 states.

During his last years in Searcy, Croom continued his interest in Christian education and was frequently found speaking or leading prayer during the college lectureships and religious forums. Very alert at age 92, he was a delight to audiences with his grammatical exactness and his witty evaluations of himself.

Bro. Croom had more than 250 articles published in brotherhood papers and had authored four books.

He had been married for 62 years to Margaret Price Croom, who followed him in death on March 21. They had three children, John A. Croom of Edmond, Okla.; Dr. William S. Croom of Lubbock, Texas; and Sarah Croom Hatch of Boulder, Colo.; nine grandchildren and three great grandchildren.

Both funeral services were held at the College Church of Christ.

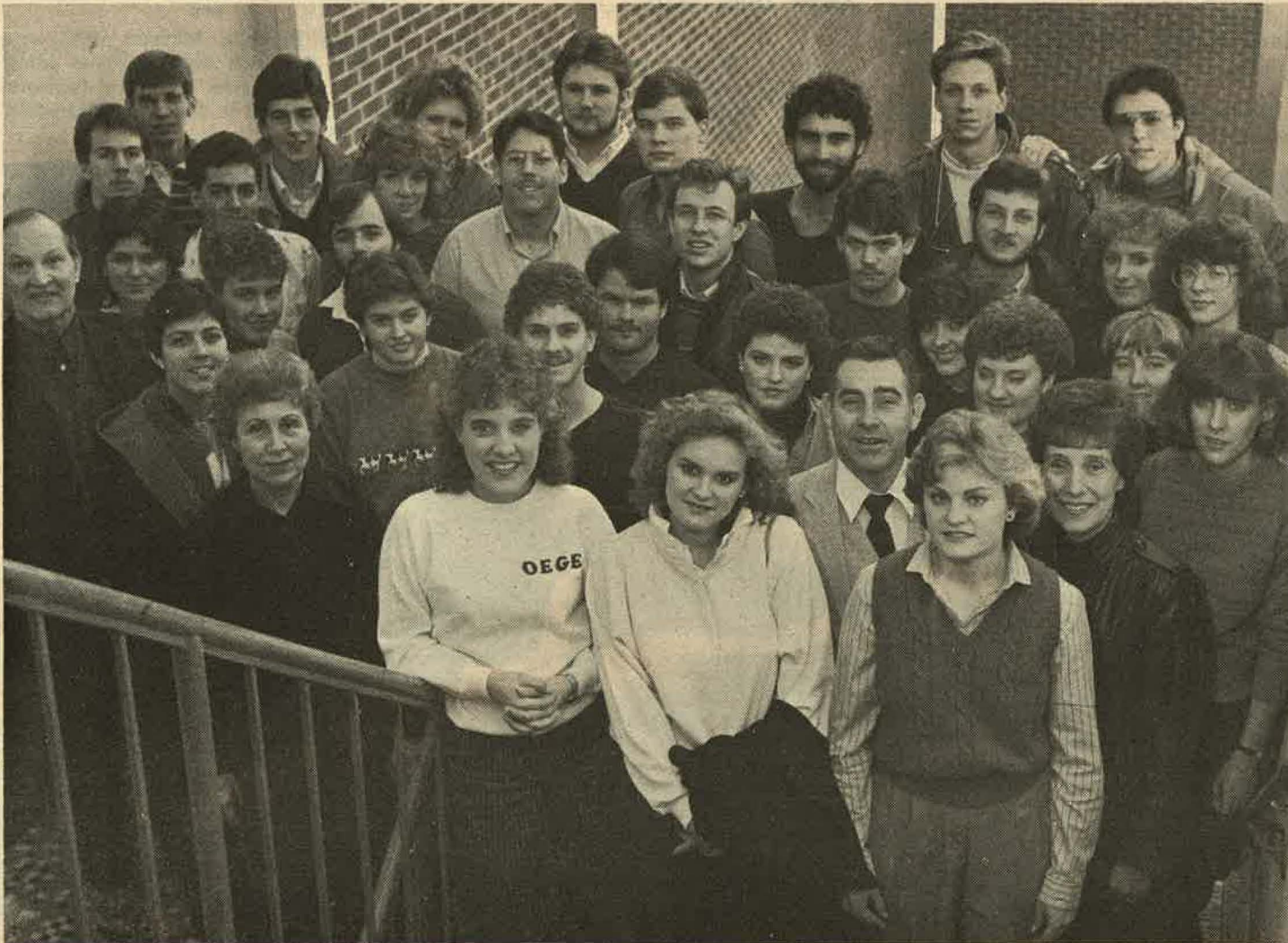

# Communication Area Enjoys Rapid Growth

When Harding embraced university status in the fall of 1979 the change in title marked the beginning of a new growth era for the school. A logical result of the new growth has been the metamorphosis of the speech and journalism departments into the single Department of Communication.

After the mid-year exit of Dr. Heber Taylor, the journalism chairman, into the private business sector in January 1984, it seemed appropriate to follow a logical trend and merge journalism with the speech department, which already handled instruction in the other mass media — radio and television. The creation of the Department of Communication finally brought the teaching of all modern, mass media under one roof.

"I think it's working well," said Dr. Evan Ulrey, chairman of the department. "The change has given a kind of unity to the whole area (of communication)."

Partial results of the change include a more streamlined approach, the upgrading of some opportunities and requirements for print journalism majors, and increased hands-on opportunities for radio/television majors.

While still separated in the 1983-84 school year, the departments of speech and journalism offered majors in a total of eight areas. The departments overlapped considerably, however, with the similar majors of mass media being offered by journalism and mass communication being offered by speech.

Mass communication majors were required to take introductory journalism courses and majors in mass media, public relations or advertising had required courses in the speech department.

With the creation of the Department of Communication duplication has been largely eliminated. For instance, the courses "Introduction to Journalism," and "Introduction to Mass Communication" have been combined. Majors from the former two departments have either been combined, redefined or renamed, giving students a more precise knowledge of the major area of study.

Students may now choose majors from two general areas — communication and mass communication.

From the area of communication students may major in oral communication, which replaces the old speech major; theater or theater management, both which replace the old drama major; or communication disorders, which replaces the old speech therapy major.

In the area of mass communications the advertising major and the public relations major have been carried over basically intact from the journalism department. A major in print journalism replaces the old journalism major and a major in radio/television replaces the two majors of mass communication and mass media.

For students from the old journalism department with majors in print journalism, advertising or public relations, the change to the Department of Communication has brought about a more challenging program which may offer better opportunities for employment after graduation. Beginning in

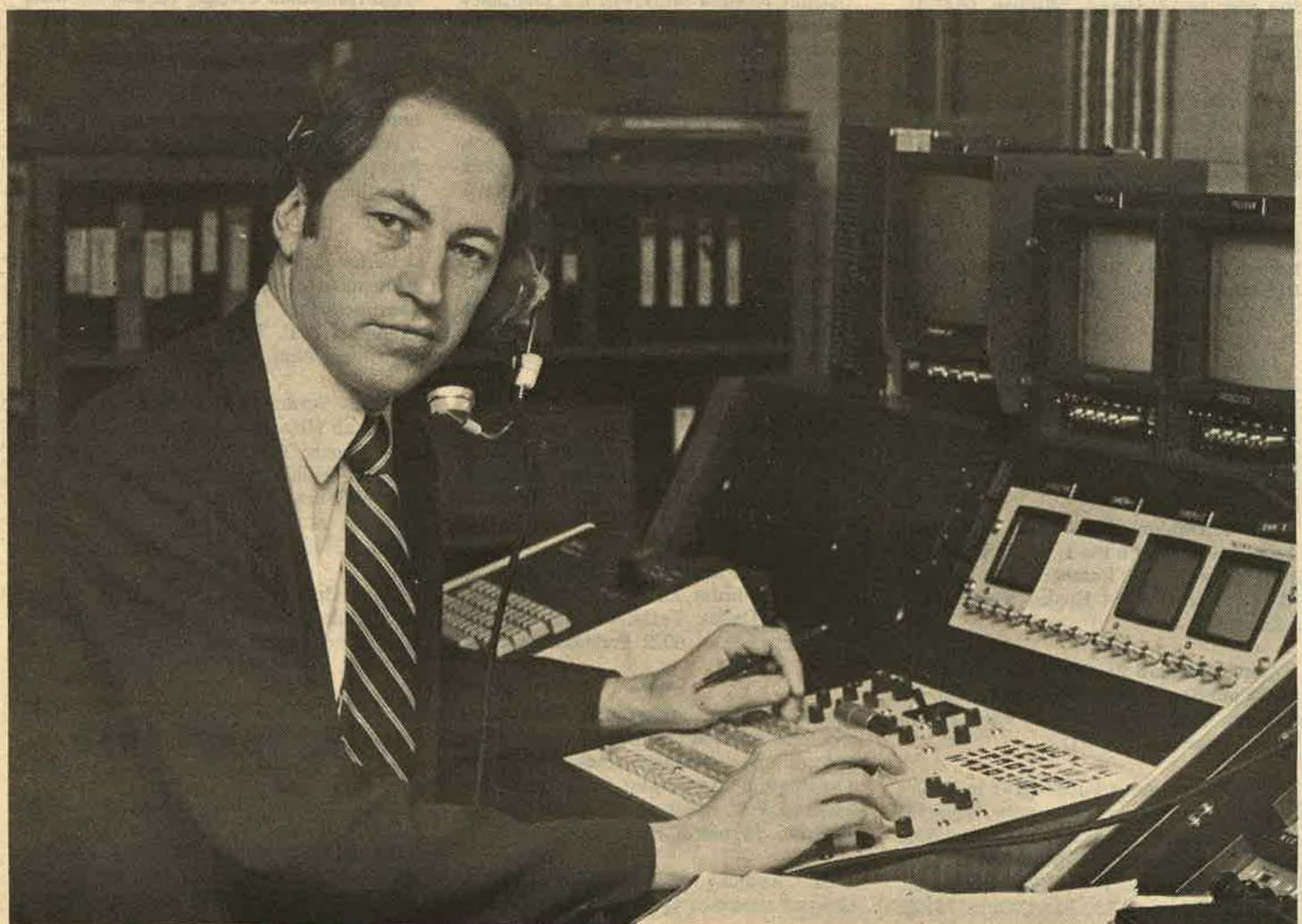
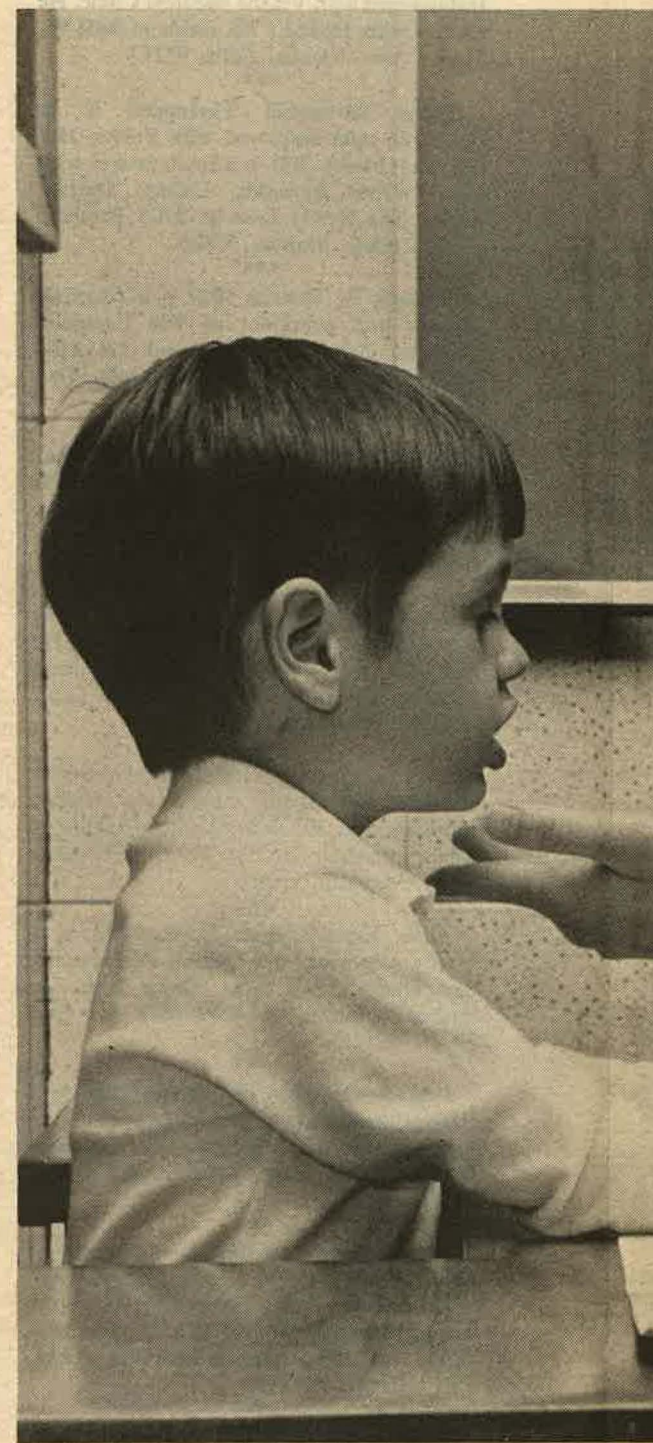
the fall of 1985 those students will join the radio/television majors in being required to fulfill an internship.

Under the speech department, for several years mass communication majors had been required to fulfill internships. The result has been an abundance of those students finding ready employment; as many as four

have worked at one time for the same Little Rock television station.

"The internship is one of the best features of the whole program," stated Dr. Ulrey. "It was not required of journalism students before. They had the choice between an internship or an independent study."

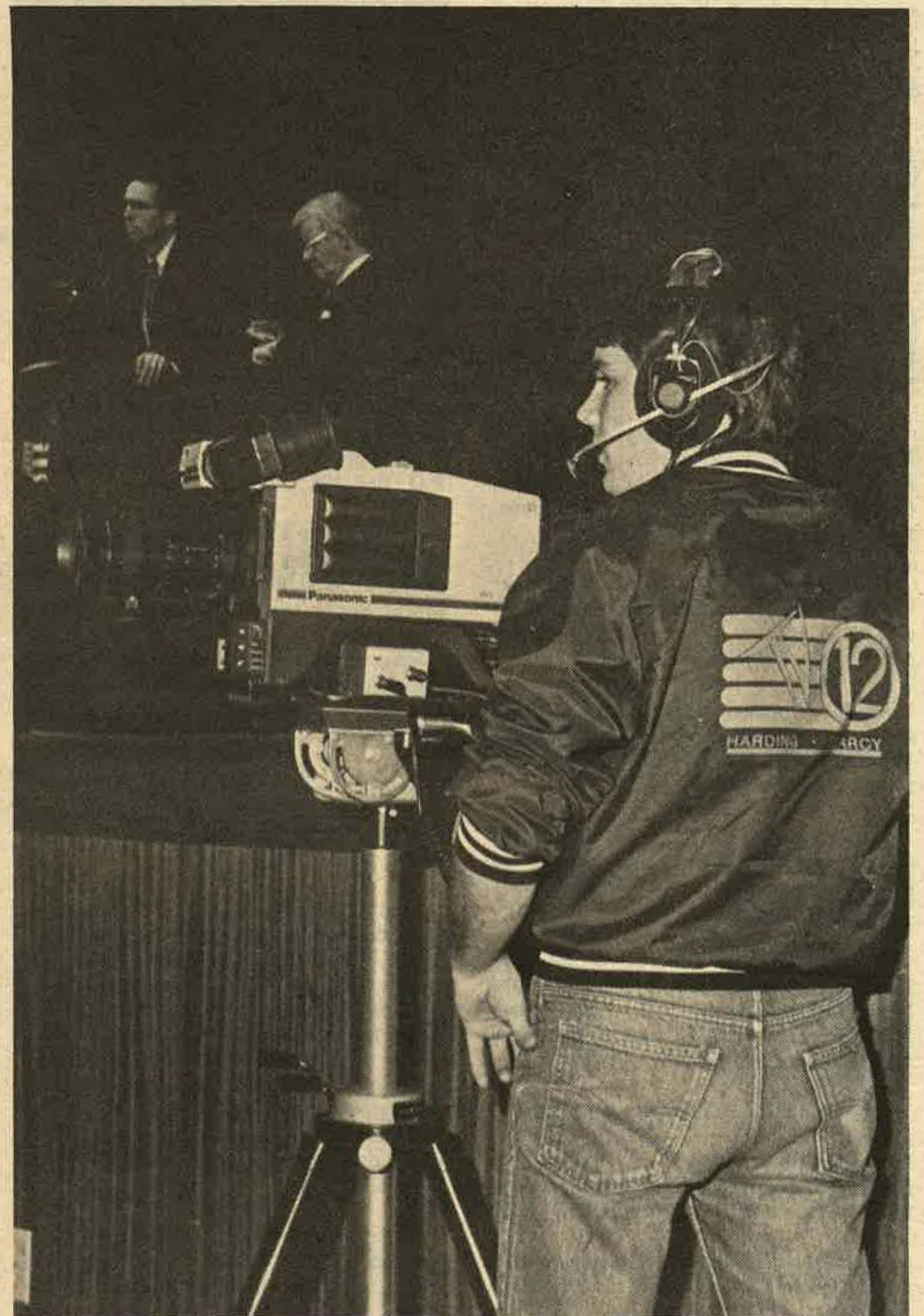
Another plus for the Department of Communication, Dr. Ulrey points out, has been the establishment of TV-12, Harding's student-operated, cable-access channel. The station has given radio/television majors additional hands-on experience before internships begin. This has made the internships more valuable learning experiences in that students can learn more advanced aspects of their future jobs during the time that was normally used in just learning basics.

"I think Channel 12 has done a

tremendous amount of good for us," Ulrey said.

Ulrey indicated the overall good that has come from the creation of the Department of Communication is that the students get a better picture of the role of personal and mass communication in the world today.

"All these aspects of communication are interrelated," explained Ulrey. "In this new arrangement a student begins to grasp his role in relation to other communication areas . . . To me, our students are just better prepared."

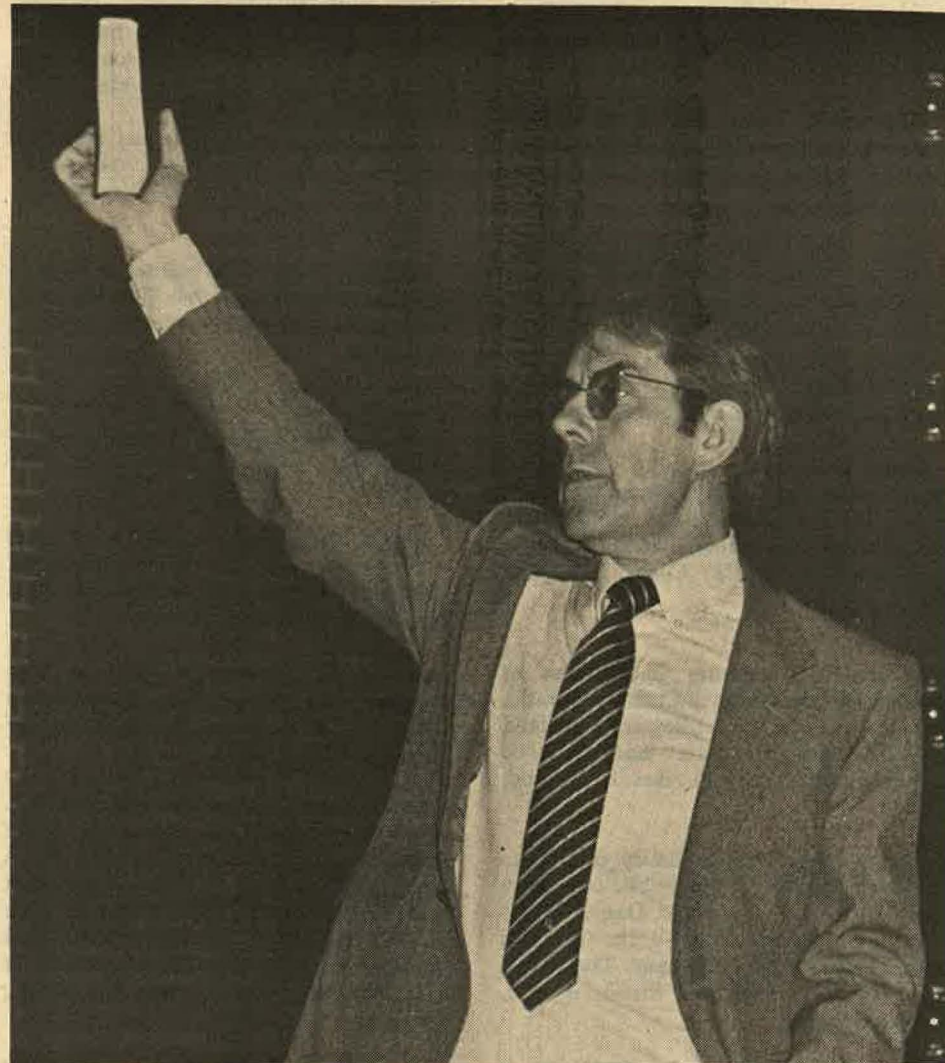

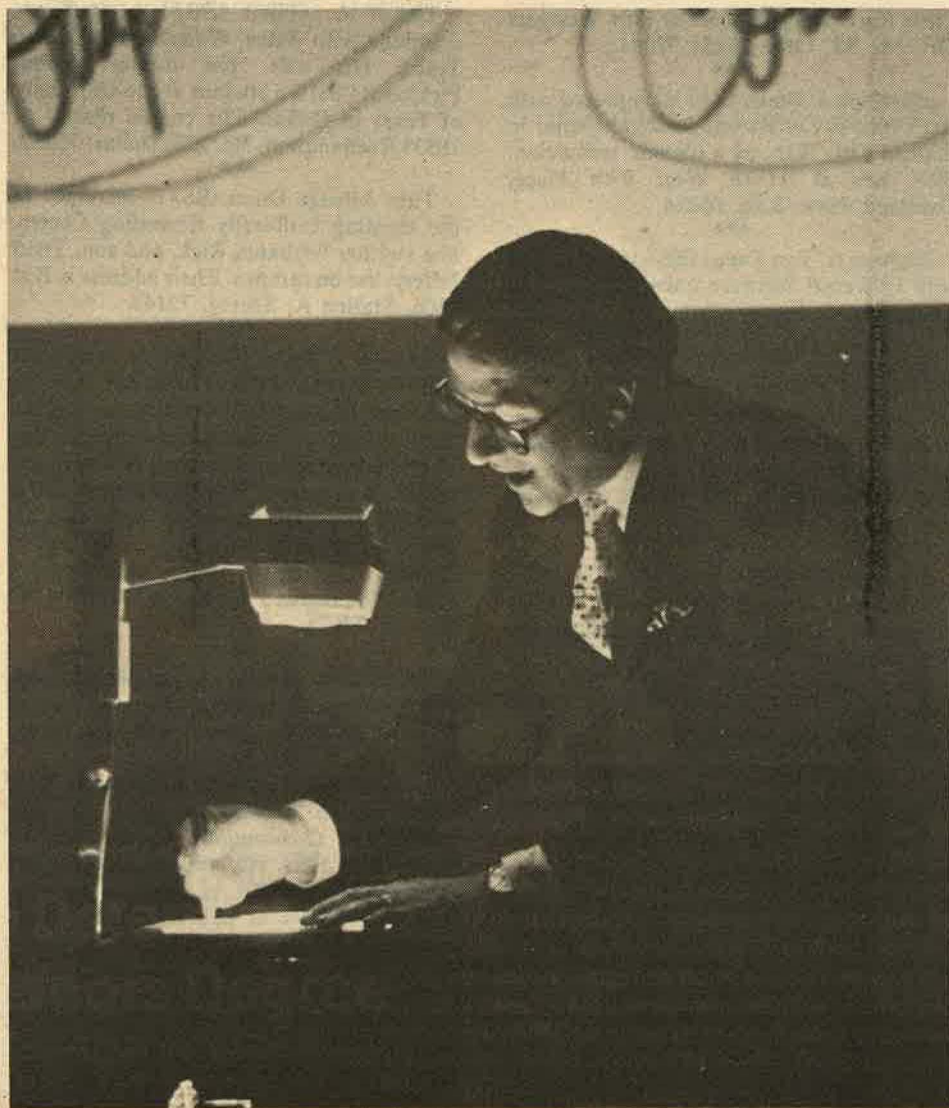

## Butcher Receives NAIA Academic Award; Qualifies For Nationals

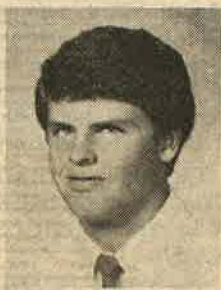
Swimmer Gano Butcher has been named to the 1985 Academic All-America team selected by the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics.

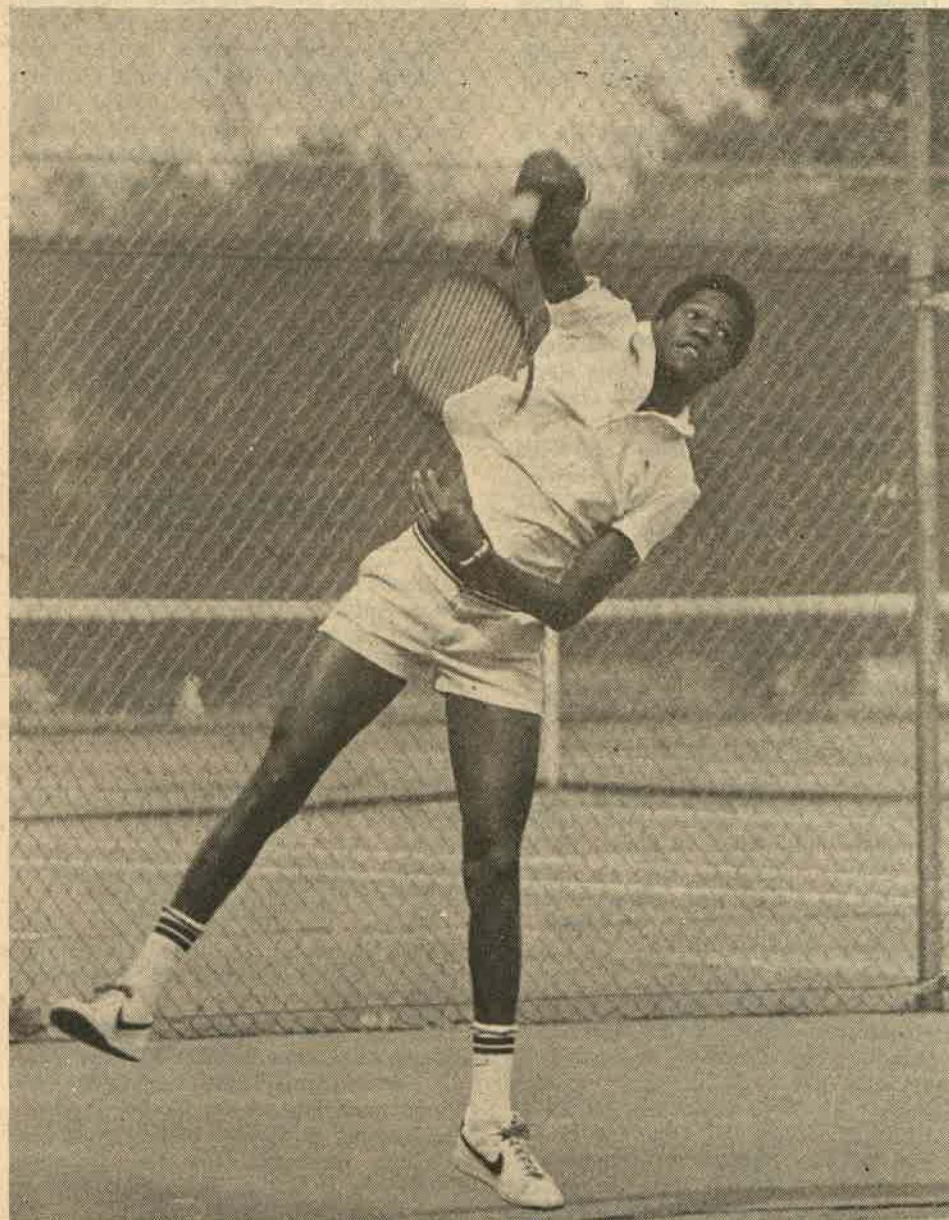
(Texas), Scott Irving of Florida State and Nell Jackson of State University of New York.

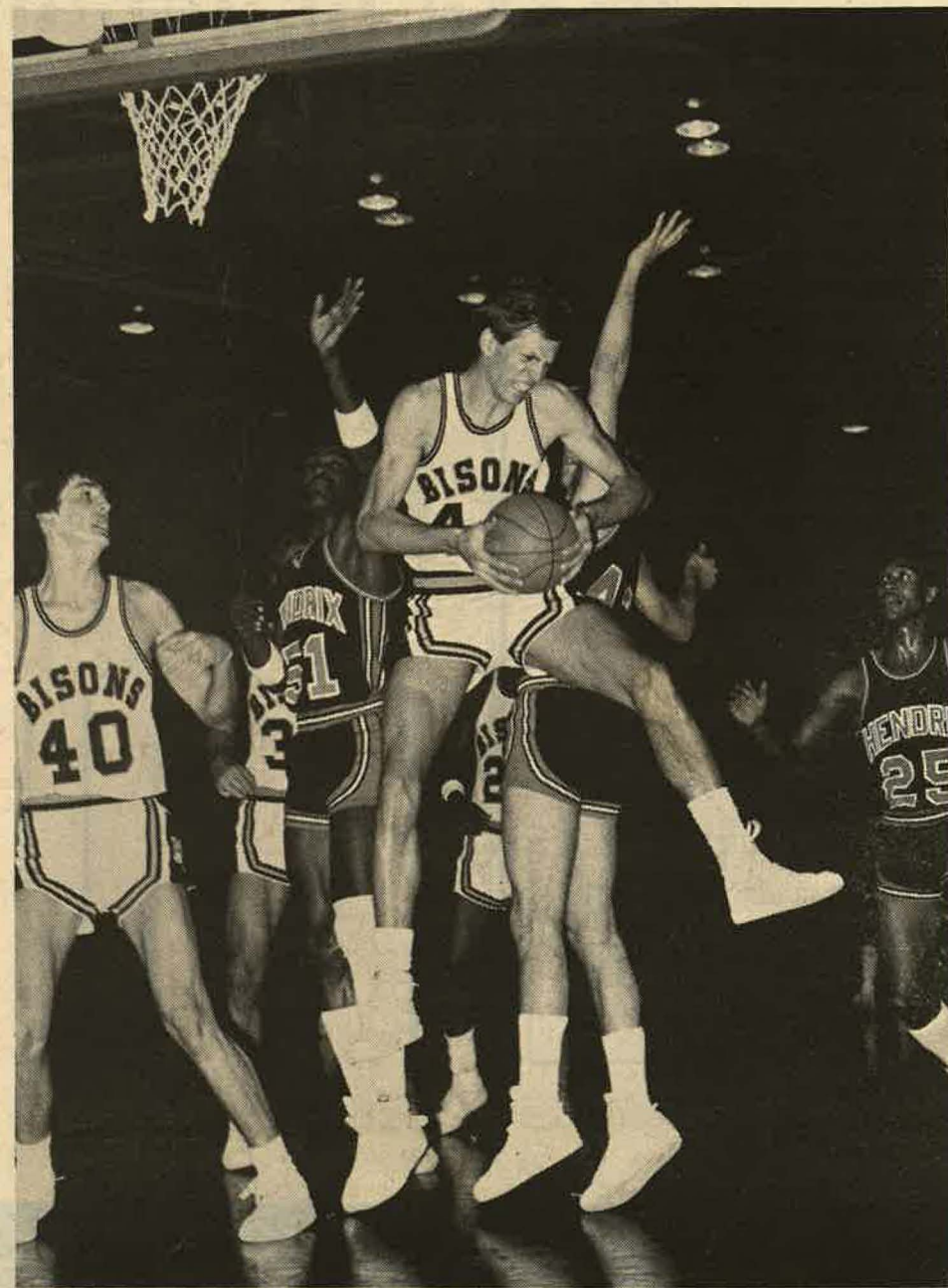

## Bisons, Lady Bisons Gain Post Season Recognition

The Bisons and Lady Bisons basketball teams ended their 1984-85 season with solid performances and with several athletes earning post-season recognition.

Junior Kenny Collins, a high-scoring forward from Valley Springs, Ark., was named to the Academic All-America team by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA). He has earned a 3.4 grade point average (on a 4.0 scale) while pursuing a major in pre-veterinary medicine.

Collins was also a unanimous selection to the All-Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference team and received NAIA All-District 17 honors. The Bisons' leading scorer and rebounder, Collins scored 444 season points to enable him to break the 1,000 career point mark with 1,076 points and rank 14th on Harding's all-time scoring list. The 6-6, 190 lb. standout averaged 14.8 points and 6.9 rebounds per game in his third season as a starter.

For the Lady Bisons, junior college transfer Kim Wilkins of Flippin, Ark., was named to the NAIA All-District 17 team and was an All-AIC honorable mention performer from her forward spot. Wilkins averaged 14 points and 6.7 rebounds per

game as she led the Lady Bisons in both departments.

Another strong performer at forward for the women's team, junior college transfer Dena Sims of Pernell, Okla., ranked in the top ten conference shooters as she recorded a .513 percent average from the field.

A strong contributor to the men's scoring output was senior forward Rich Foster of Festus, Mo. He used an outstanding shooting touch from the outside to rank second on the Bisons' scoring list with an average of 14.1 points per contest. This year's team captain, Foster's outstanding performance brought him honorable mention status on both the All-AIC and NAIA All-District 17 teams.

Another senior who played a vital role for the Bisons, guard Dwight Weaver of Wheatley, Ark., was an NAIA All-District 17 honorable mention choice. A strong rebounder and fine pressure shooter, Weaver was second on the team in the rebounding department with an average of 6.0 per game and was third on the season scoring list as he averaged 12.4 points per game.

The men also enjoyed fine performances from seniors David Allumbaugh and Troy Sanstra who provided the squad with depth and experience while seeing action in all of the team's 30 games.

Allumbaugh, a four year letterman forward out of Dallas, hit a solid .502 percent of his field goal tries and boasted a .806 percent success rate at the free throw line. Sanstra, a four-year letterman center from Tulsa, provided the inside muscle while hitting .627 percent of his shots from the field.

While compiling a 13-17 overall record and a 5-13 AIC mark, the Bisons ranked second in the conference in field goal percentage with an impressive .517 percent showing. At the free throw line, Harding hit .693 percent of their tries to rank fifth in the conference.

Seniors Lynette Gardner and Ginger Berry provided experience and leadership for the Lady Bisons' inside game while taking the floor in all 26 outings. Gardner, a forward from Andover, Kan., was second on the team in rebounding with an average of 4.9 per game and scored at a 6.6 points per game average. Berry, a center from Manila, Ark., contributed to the team's scoring efforts with 4.1 points per game and pulled down three rebounds a game.

The Lady Bisons finished their second season of play with a 4-22 record overall and 1-15 in the highly competitive AIC while ranking seventh in the conference in free throw accuracy at .633 percent and ninth in field goal proficiency at .385 percent.

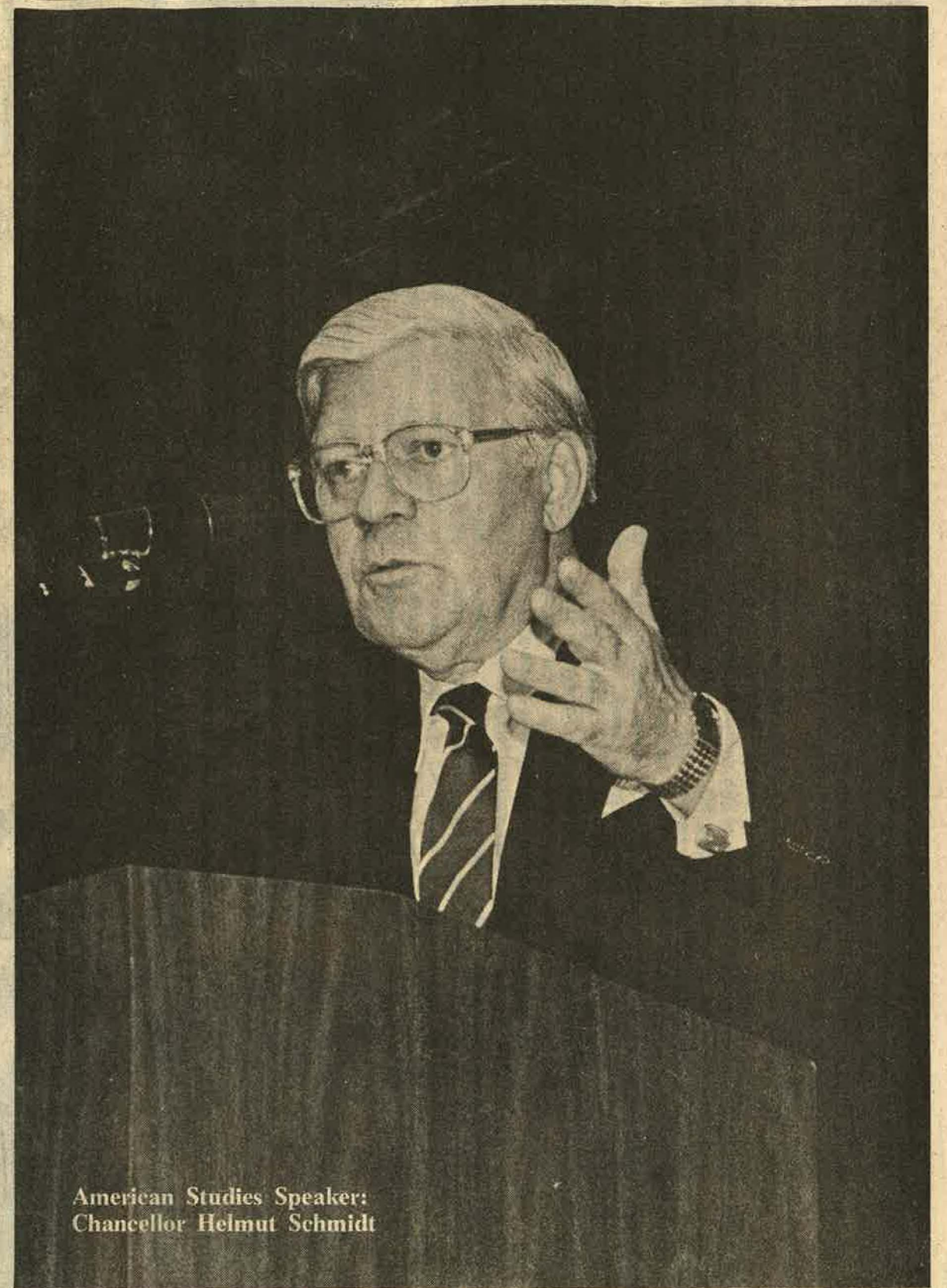
