'A Musical Weekend' Set for Homecoming '85

The theme for Harding Homecoming '85 has been designated as "A Musical Weekend" with reunions, activities and special events being finalized for Nov. 1-2.

Two alumni classes will be honored, the class of 1935 on its 50th anniversary and the class of 1960 for its 25th annual celebration. Festivities will begin Friday, Nov. 1, when the homecoming queen is crowned. Registration tables will open at 1 p.m. Friday in the lobby of the American Heritage Building and from 4:15-6 p.m. there will be a chili supper for students.

The annual Black and Gold Banquet will begin at 6 p.m. in the American Heritage Cafeteria. Harding alumnus David Slater will provide musical entertainment and the distinguished and outstanding alumni awards will be presented.

This year's homecoming musical, "The Music Man," has been cast and performances are scheduled for Friday and Saturday at 8:15 p.m. in the Benson Auditorium.

Saturday morning the complimentary continental alumni breakfast will be served from 7-9:30 in the Hammon Student Center. The Bison Stampede consisting of a 10K run, two mile run and 20K bike race will start in front of the American Heritage Center at 8 a.m. There is a fee of \$6 to participate. A new event has been added to the activities this year which will include golf contests. The contests will take place at the golf practice area just east of Jerry Moore baseball field and will include longest drive, closest to the pin and various other categories. Participants will be required to pay a fee of \$1.

Long Receives Honorary Doctorate

Jesse C. Long Sr., president of Greater Atlanta Christian School since 1962, received an Honorary Doctorate of Laws from Harding at Summer Commencement ceremonies Aug. 16 when Long addressed the 126 graduates.

Dr. Clifton L. Ganus Jr., president of Harding, conferred the degree, citing Long for his exemplary life of service to God and to Christian Education.

Long, an elder and a minister of the Campus Church of Christ in Norcross, challenged the graduates toward continuing their lives in a pattern of service.

The educator holds degrees from Alabama Christian College, Valdosta State College, Alabama Christian School of Religion and Georgia State University. He is also preparing the dissertation for a doctoral degree from Georgia State.

Fall Enrollment Reaches 2,771

Fall registration reached 2,771 at the deadline with students enrolled from 46 states, the District of Columbia, Virgin Islands and 30 foreign countries. No students are registered from Maine, Nevada, Rhode Island or Utah.

Registrar Virgil Beckett said a complete analysis will be issued, but early figures show a freshman class numbering 733 with 800 new students on the rolls.

More than 800 list a business-related major, with 255 naming accounting to lead the individual choices.

By states, Arkansans account for 908, or approximately one-third of the student body. Next in order are Texas with 225, Tennessee with 217 and Missouri with 134. The other states were represented with less than 100.

Last year's final tally was 2,828.

The number does not include students in the School of Biblical Studies, Academy or Graduate School.

Pfeifer Chosen HSBS Director Program Begins 12th Year of Work

L. V. Pfeifer, associate professor of Bible, has been named as director of the Harding School of Biblical Studies, according to Clifton L. Ganus Jr., president of the University.

Pfeifer comes well-prepared to head the HSBS program. He is a veteran missionary to Italy, where he and another missionary established the Florence church in 1953. He also has 20 years experience in serving with U.S. congregations as a located preacher. For six years prior to coming to Harding in 1973, Pfeifer taught in the Preston Road School of Preaching in Dallas. He continues to preach nearly every weekend and in gospel meetings.

"We are happy to have a man of the ability, experience and dedication of L. V. Pfeifer to head up our program in the Harding School of Biblical Studies. We have been pleased with the direction and success of the program and know that it will continue to do an outstanding work in the training of preachers and missionaries," Ganus said.

Pfeifer indicated the school is in "excellent condition" from the efforts of his predecessor, Joe Jones, who returned to full-time teaching in Harding's Department of Bible, Religion and Philosophy. His goals, Pfeifer said, will be to help the school grow and to continue and increase the emphasis on missions.

"I would like very much for us to reach our capacity of 80 students. That's one of

my goals," Pfeifer said. "And I want to give a very strong missions impetus to the School of Biblical Studies."

The Harding School of Biblical Studies was established in 1974 under the name Christian Communications Program. The school is designed to train mature men, 21-years-old or older, who desire to preach.

The school is a division of Harding's Department of Bible, Religion and Philosophy, which is chaired by Dr. Neale Pryor. Bobby Parks is Field Director for HSBS.

Nursing School Celebrates 10th Anniversary

During the annual Homecoming festivities, Nov. 1-2, the Harding School of Nursing will celebrate the 10th anniversary of its first class of students.

A reception has been planned for all nursing alumni, according to Dr. Cathleen Shultz, dean of the School of Nursing.

"We are attempting to contact our alumni and hope they can be with us to celebrate the first ten years of our program," Shultz said.

The reception is planned from 5-8 p.m., Nov. 2 at the Nursing department on the third floor of the Olen Hendrix Building.

Since the first entering class in the fall of 1975, the Nursing program at Harding has made significant advancement and achieved national recognition for its efforts. The program has established a strong focus on missions, primary care, rural health and leadership.

The nursing program was initially accredited by the National League of Nursing in 1980 for an eight year period. Accreditation not only addresses the quality of the program, Shultz said, but it gives Harding graduates access to scholarships, military service and graduate schools.

Since the first graduation in 1977, more than 375 nurses have received their baccalaureate degrees. "Including those who took the test in February (1985), all have passed the licensure examination and are registered nurses," Shultz said.

The mission focus of the program has been strong. The students and faculty have been involved with the work in Nigeria since 1977, the Panama program since 1979 and the Caribbean program since 1984.

Miss Bell, who holds the Master of Arts in Library Science from George Peabody College, joined the Harding staff in 1959. She was the recipient of a Distinguished Staff Award in 1979 and has been active in assisting many libraries in building their programs.

Dr. Howard holds the Ed.D. from the University of Arkansas. He joined the faculty in 1972 and also serves as Director of Institutional Testing for the University.

A herpetologist, Dr. Plummer has been a member of the faculty since 1970. He holds the Ph.D. from the University of Kansas.

Rushton joined the faculty in 1960. He holds the Master of Arts from the University

of Arkansas.

Underwood, who holds the Ed.D. from East Texas State University, joined the faculty in 1970.

Graduate School Establishes Lipsey Endowed Faculty Chair

The Harding University Graduate School of Religion has established the school's first endowed faculty chair through a gift from R. Walton Lipsey Sr. of Memphis, Tenn., announced Harding President Dr. Clifton Ganus and Dr. Harold Hazelip, dean of the school.

Lipsey's gift went to the graduate school in honor and memory of his late wife, Margaret S. Lipsey. The school's administration convinced Lipsey, however, to allow the chair to bear his name also and, therefore, have named the position "The R. Walton and Margaret S. Lipsey Chair of Biblical Studies."

"Through this gift, and through other means," said Hazelip, "we hope that generations of ministers who attend Harding Graduate School will come to know something of the life and commitments of the Lipsey family and the tremendous contribution Mrs. Lipsey made to the family, the church and the community."

Dr. Jack P. Lewis, professor of Bible, will be the first occupant of the Lipsey Chair of Biblical Studies. Lewis has taught at HGSR since 1954. He also serves with Lipsey as an elder of the White Station Church of Christ in Memphis.

"Endowed chairs are all but unknown among our Christian schools," said Glendol Grimes, HGSR's director of development. "The concept involves a significant contribution, either through current giving or estate planning or both. An endowment gift is large enough that income derived from the original gift will pay a teacher's salary and provide other assistance, such as secretarial help, in perpetuity."

Mrs. Lipsey died on March 1, 1984, following a long illness. "She is remem-

bered," Grimes said, "as a gracious lady, characterized by inner and outer beauty. She was a positive, cheerful person who brightened the world around her. She was noted for her teaching of children in Bible school as well as for her gift of comforting others in times of grief."

The Lipseys were members of the McKellar and Berclair congregations in Memphis before becoming charter members of the White Station church in 1954. Lipsey is one of two surviving members of the original board of Memphis Christian School who purchased the property now occupied by Harding Academy of Memphis and the Harding Graduate School of Religion. The administration building at Harding Academy is named in Lipsey's honor.

The Lipseys were married for more than 40 years. They have four children and eight grandchildren.

Bison Receives All-American Rating

The *Bison* received an All-American rating from the Associated Collegiate Press of Minneapolis, Minn. for the fall semester of the 1984-85 school year.

The student-staffed newspaper received marks of distinction in coverage and content, writing and editing, design, and photography, art and graphics. Judge Peg Zidonis wrote, "Your paper shows a commitment on the part of a talented staff

and a knowledgeable advisor. The paper covers many issues in depth and allows the school community to voice its opinions."

Economics Team Aims for Sixth National Title

The University economics team will attempt to win its sixth first place trophy at the National Students for Free Enterprise Competition in the summer of 1986.

The University economics teams have won first place eight times at the regionals and five times at the nationals which were started in 1978. Harding teams, the winningest in the country to date, were national runners-up in 1978 and 1983.

The 1986 team, composed of Kevin Thompson, co-captain from San Diego, Calif., Stephanie Carter, co-captain from Bentonville, Ark., Melissa Brenneman from Spartanburg, S.C., Glenda Collier from Memphis, Tenn., Bruce Picker from Searcy, Ark., Joel Reed from New Haven, Ind., and their sponsor, Dr. Don Diffine, professor of economics and director of the student-staffed Belden Center for Private Enterprise Education, will attend an orientation meeting in Nashville, Tenn., in early October to map out their strategy and meet their competitors.

Sponsored by the National Free Enterprise Center in Bolivar, Mo., the Harding program theme is to be "Capitalism Is Innovative — It Made America."

"Free enterprise" is simply the idea of freedom applied to the marketplace . . . and

that has rarely been taught," said Diffine. "We take the approach that economic individualism, private property and the market economy are not just neutral concepts. They are, in fact, worthwhile and attainable goals. We are supporting the system that supports us."

Begun ten years ago, the "Students in Free Enterprise" (SIFE) competition challenges young people anticipating business careers to devise and implement programs that will help preserve the competitive American business system, thereby preserving for their generation—and those that follow the opportunities for a better life which it provides.

Project goals are to offer solutions to problems confronting the American economic system. The participating institutions are challenged through formal intercollegiate competition to design and implement free enterprise programs suited for their particular campuses and communities.

Diffine said, "Business and economics students and faculty are a great hope for providing credible free enterprise education to other school disciplines and the community. It is for this reason the business community chooses to ally itself more and

more with schools of business in preserving and improving a free enterprise and incentive system which develops the talents of all the people."

Harding's entry last year was entitled, "Free Enterprise — An American Revolution." It included an annotated supplement and appendix, that described 68 projects and programs involving the Economics team with 14 on-campus and 44 civic, professional and educational groups

in the Mid-south.

The efforts of the student-staffed Belden Center have received national recognition, not only in the Economic Games, but also from the Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge, Pa. Since 1976, Dr. Diffine, the Harding economics team and their projects have received 15 awards in the category of private enterprise education, advertising and public affairs, non-profit publications and platform addresses.

Harris Scholarships Awarded

Three elementary education majors have received the first awards from the Mary Ann Harris Scholarship Fund, established at the death of the professor of education in February.

The designees are Teresa Price of Mammoth Spring, Ark., who was awarded \$400; Deborah Weatherington of Harrisburg, Ill., and Melody Harrell of Mena, Ark., who received \$300 each. All are seniors.

The scholarship was established by the professor's husband, Jack D. Harris; her brother, Robert Whitaker, a Nashville,

Tenn., architect; and through memorial gifts from friends.

Dr. Harris, a 1954 alumna, was a highly respected teacher in Memphis prior to joining the Harding faculty in 1978. She was named a Distinguished Teacher in 1983.

The award was designated to provide grants to students in the School of Education. Criteria includes financial need, scholarship, demonstrated capability and potential for future service in the teaching profession, with preference given elementary education majors.

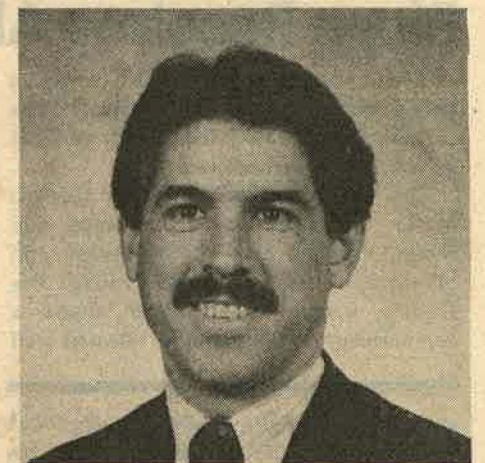
Bruner Joins Alumni Office Staff

A 30th birthday can be a dreaded one for some people, especially females. Not so for Lou Pace. To her it represented yet another step in a battle with the unexpected, and perpetuated her belief that "one cannot control events, but one can control how he responds to those events."

The efficient teacher, now in her third year as a member of the Harding social work department, has confronted, overcome and adapted to a situation that could have devastated the lesser-determined. Instead, she chose to analyze and evaluate, and in her words "go for it."

Things were progressing rather uneventfully in 1981 when Lou, teaching at Freed-Hardeman College in Tennessee, settling in to her recently-purchased house, was faced with a startling realization. Tests had shown she had a malignant 'lemon-size' brain tumor.

Along with the treatments of surgery, radiation and chemotherapy, she ex-

perienced the stages of denial, depression and finally acceptance.

"I did not realize how much you depend on hair," she confessed, as she dealt with reactions of others during the period when her hair was disappearing and replacing itself. Standing in line at a restaurant one evening, Lou spoke with another waiting diner who observed, "I bet your hairdo is easy to keep."

With most of her family in North Little Rock, she moved to Searcy to join Harding in 1983.

But more importantly, she dealt with new feelings and made some determinations about relationships with others. "If I have something to say to someone, I'll say it," she explains with a ring of boldness.

Most importantly, she has recognized the vital difference in the meaning of the words urgent and important. And she has put the distinction into reality as she goes on with her schedule of daily activities.

Lucas, who holds the Doctor of Education from the University of Montana, is professor of education.

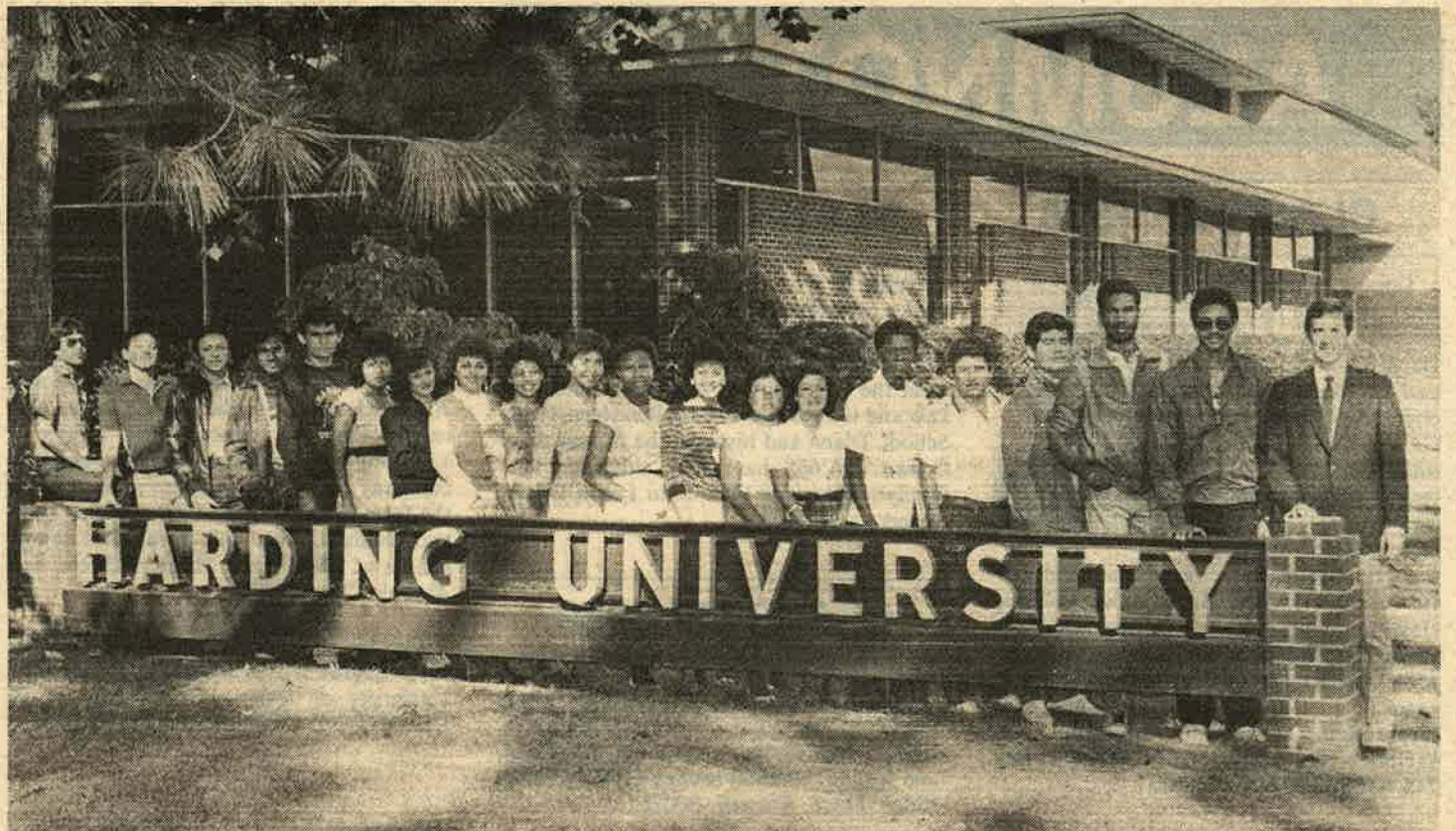

Walton Students Adjust to Harding Life

Among the 800 new students on the campus this fall are many who have anticipated coming to Harding for several years.

There is also a group of 18 who knew very little if anything about the school until they were recruited and chosen in the summer months a few weeks before their arrival.

The newcomers from Central America, specifically Belize, Honduras, Panama and Costa Rica, are benefactors of a \$1.2 million grant from Helen and Sam Walton of Bentonville, Ark., together with matching funds from the United States Agency for International Development. The Waltons, founders of the Wal-Mart chain, had made funds available to three Arkansas colleges — Harding, College of the Ozarks in Clarksville and John Brown University in Siloam Springs.

Recruiting was and will continue to be a crucial factor in the development of the program, according to David Tucker, assistant professor of economics who is also director of the Harding Walton Program.

The 18 were recruited through several means. President Clifton L. Ganus went to the area during the summer. Alumnus Bill Searcy, a missionary in Belize, was helpful in finding qualified students and in handling details of their travel.

"Recruiting for next year is already underway," Tucker said, "and we are open to any names of prospects." Tucker suggested that churches supporting missionaries in Central America make the program known there. Students who apply

must have a high school diploma and must speak English.

No current students are from Guatemala or El Salvador, although citizens of those countries are eligible, he pointed out. The scholarship includes tuition, fees, room, board and transportation.

Adjustment to the Harding procedures and policies has been relatively smooth, since most speak English well. One problem in language, however, has involved accents, according to 25-year-old Hernan Riverol of Belize, a management major. "I've had some problems with accents," he smiled.

Riverol, who heard about the program through a newspaper advertisement, had worked in a bank ever since he completed two years of college.

He was quick to take advantage of the opportunity to complete a degree, "And it has been so much more, so much better than I even imagined it would be," he beamed in describing his recent weeks on the Searcy campus. "I am so happy I came," he said. Riverol will return to the banking field when he goes back to Belize.

Santos Castro, the first of the students to arrive in Little Rock, had no previous knowledge of Harding before his arrival Aug. 24. In the intervening weeks, however, he has decided that "this is a special university to me."

A native of LaCeiba, Atlantida, Honduras, Castro was attending the Baxter Institute in Tegucigalpa when told of the scholarship program by Harris Lee Goodwin, president of the school.

"This is a fine opportunity for me to work on my education," Castro said. "I hope to go back to my home and country and teach."

A 25-year-old, Castro is majoring in communication and he, too, indicated some problems with the language. "The English is different. So is the food and the people. But everyone is very helpful," he said.

Tucker, who was appointed during the summer to direct the program, has assisted in helping the students to acclimate themselves to their new surroundings. He has counseled them, advised them in their

academic procedures, and he and his wife Renee have invited them to their home regularly to ease their social adjustment as well.

Another faculty member, Ava Conley, and husband Bill, who have served as missionaries in Central and South America, have been helpful to the Latin Americans by sharing their home and time. The Conleys sponsor a Spanish-speaking worship service each Wednesday night for anyone who desires to 'practice' conversational Spanish. The time has proved beneficial as well as enjoyable, according to Mrs. Conley. "The Latin Americans seem to enjoy having a session totally in Spanish, and the Spanish majors and those who use the language easily benefit from sharing in the session," she pointed out.

Some of the visitors have celebrated birthdays since arriving in the States. "We've had some lively parties, singing songs to which they are accustomed, and generally trying to make them feel 'at home,'" she said.

From the students' standpoint, the biggest complaint of the transition has been the weather. "We're cold," they shiver in unison, even in the mild late September climate typical of the Searcy area.

But all in all, the visitors are well into college life and times, and are gaining confidence daily in their Arkansas home away from home.

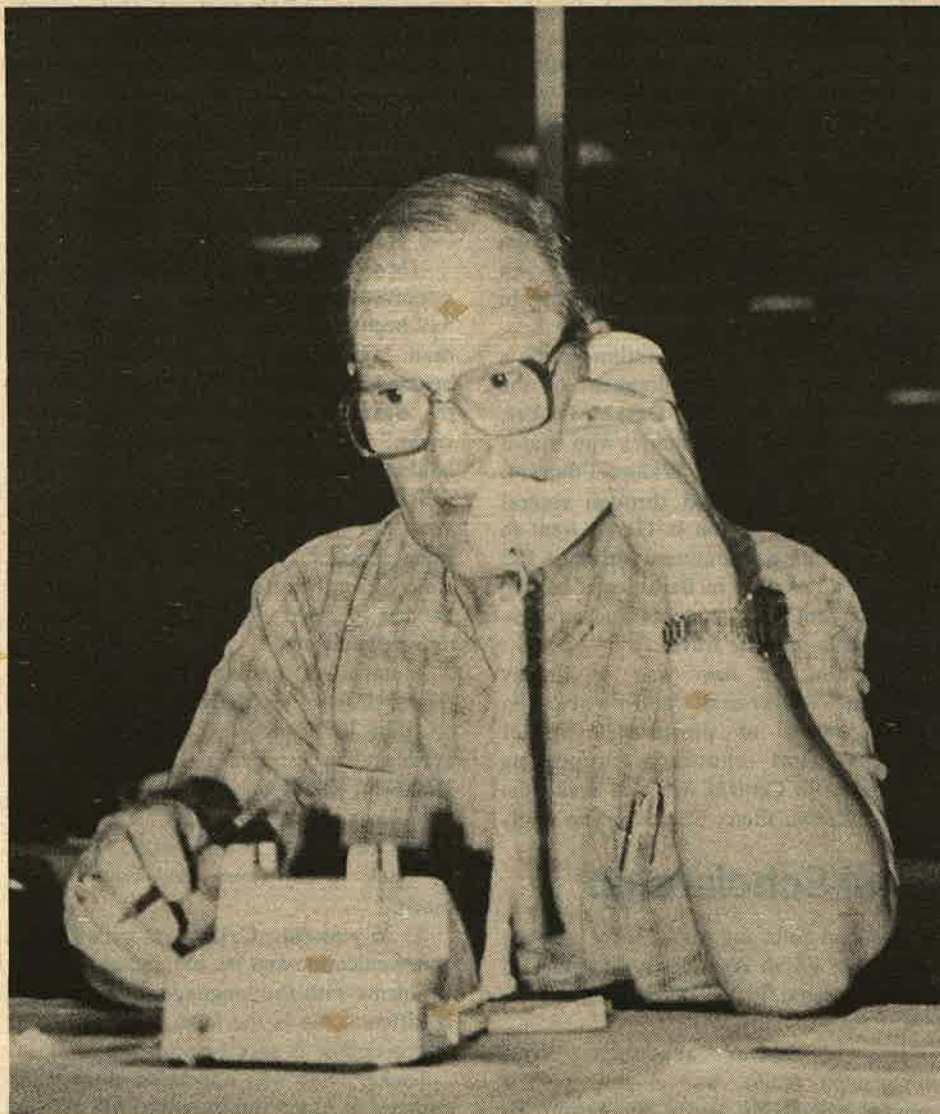

Alumnus Enjoys Working With Children

"Coachie is fun . . . She is loveable . . . She is happy all the time . . . We pretend she's our mommy . . . She loves to play with children . . . She is better than normal!"

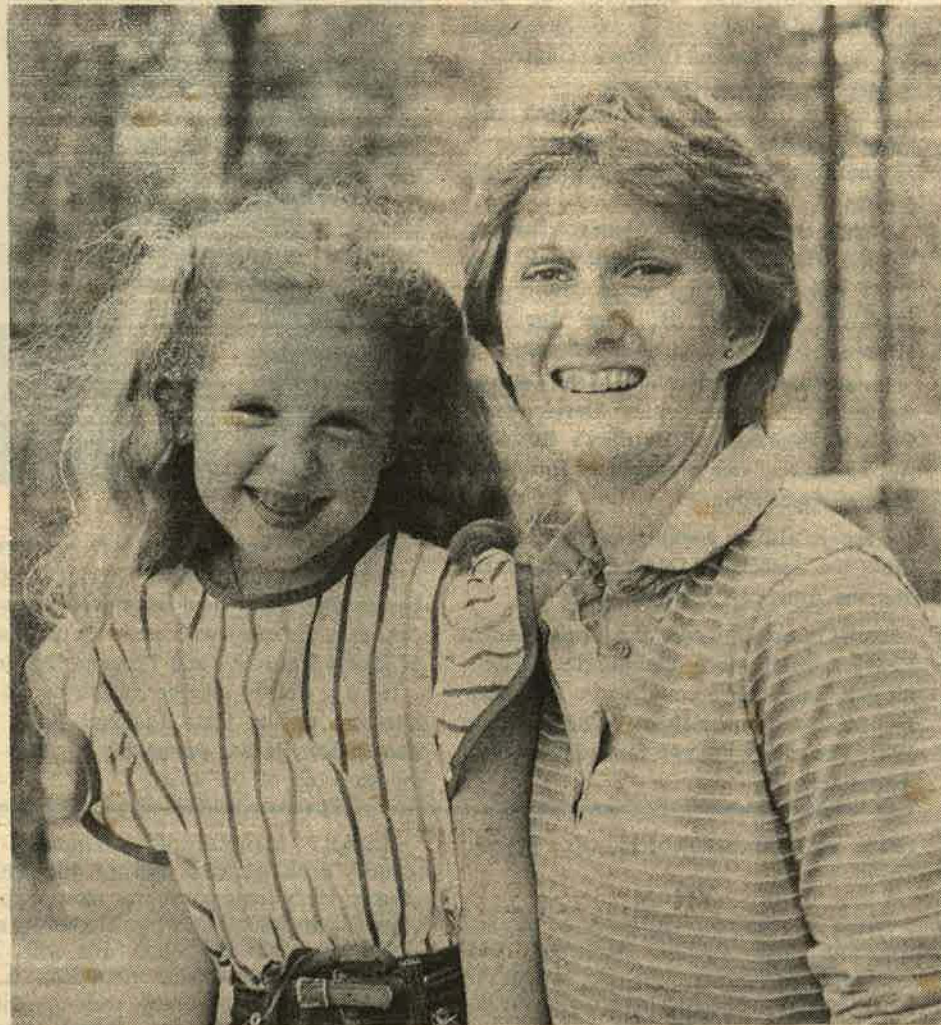
These are the ways first graders at Greater Atlanta Christian School describe Kristy Shelton ('80), who has completed her third year as coordinator of all elementary physical education activities for the school.

Each school day Kristy teaches physical education classes for students in kindergarten through sixth grade. In addition to these class assignments, she is assistant girls' softball coach and junior high boy's and girls' track coach.

It is a busy schedule, but as she explains, "I love my work. Teaching is just natural for me. When I was in high school, I was a counselor at several Christian camps because I wanted to be with young people and to teach them some of the things I could do. That's why I went into physical education. Children enjoy sports, which, I believe, are such an important part of their daily activities."

Kristy's progression from her native Bartlesville, Okla. to Atlanta had a few Arkansas stops. Harding was home from 1976 until 1980. There she met and married her husband, Cliff ('79). Both earned Master's degrees from the University of Arkansas, where both received graduate assistantships. Now they are both teaching at Greater Atlanta Christian School.

Kristy is one of a growing number of second generation Harding families. Her parents, Kent ('53) and Norma Lou ('53) Rollmann left it up to her as to where she would attend college. "There was really no deciding. By the time I could talk, I was telling everyone I was going to Harding," she explains. "My parents had so much fun at Harding that all I heard were stories about the school and campus life. I could have had scholarships to play volleyball at

other schools, but it was just natural to make Harding my alma mater too.

"Especially during my senior high years I could not wait to get to a Christian college. When you attend a Christian school, the majority of the students will be doing the right thing, and you can join with the majority and be right at home. I looked

forward to that type of situation because it was important to me."

Like so many Harding alumni, Kristy's fondest memories are of the friendships that began at Harding. "I remember best my closest friends in my social club. Many of them were physical education majors, and we called the gym our home. Everytime I

look back to Harding I think of my best friends there."

Her memories of Harding are not limited to her relationships with her peers. Kristy has some very fond memories of her classes and teachers. "Academically, Harding taught me about child development and how to teach various sports and recreational activities. More importantly, my teachers taught me how to teach as a Christian. I had more good examples than I could find anywhere else. If I wanted to model after any one of them, I could. When you're preparing to teach, it helps to have teachers that can serve as good models. That's what I found at Harding."

Kristy serves as a role model not only at school, but also in a similar capacity at the Campus Church of Christ, where she and Cliff worship. The two are huddle group leaders for high school students, and teach a class Sunday mornings for this age group. "The youth minister can't serve the needs of all of the students in the congregation, so we assist in this work. Our role in the local congregation was always emphasized to us, even in our physical education classes. It was not so much a direct statement telling what to do as it was the example of those teachers helping us to see that we needed to be strong, faithful leaders in the local congregation," she recalls.

All components of the Harding experience helped Kristy to formulate her own philosophy of teaching: "people are always more important than the games they play." This philosophy came to life during the 1983-84 school year as each day ended exactly the same way.

Following her final class, but prior to returning to their regular teacher, a majority of her first graders (boys and girls alike) lined up to hug and kiss the "coach." It was a nice way for a "peach of a teacher" to end her day.

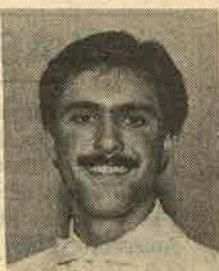

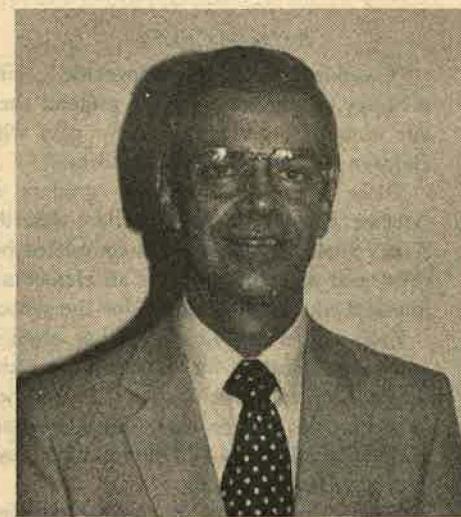

A quartet of returning athletes, led by All-NAIA District 17 selection Kim Wilkins, should keynote a more competitive Harding University Lady Bisons basketball team.

"We're definitely going to be a more competitive, aggressive team," Lady Bisons coach Phil Watkins said. "We have more solid players coming back and we feel we've added some talented new players who will be able to play for us."

Wilkins, a 5-8 low post, led the Lady Bisons with a 14 point scoring and a 6.7 rebounding average last year. Watkins described her as the "kind of athlete every

A pair of junior college signees, 5-7 1/2 Wendy Ellis from Arkansas State University at Beebe and 5-10 post Andrea Bledsoe from Garland (Ark.) Community College, are expected to play a big role in the upcoming season.

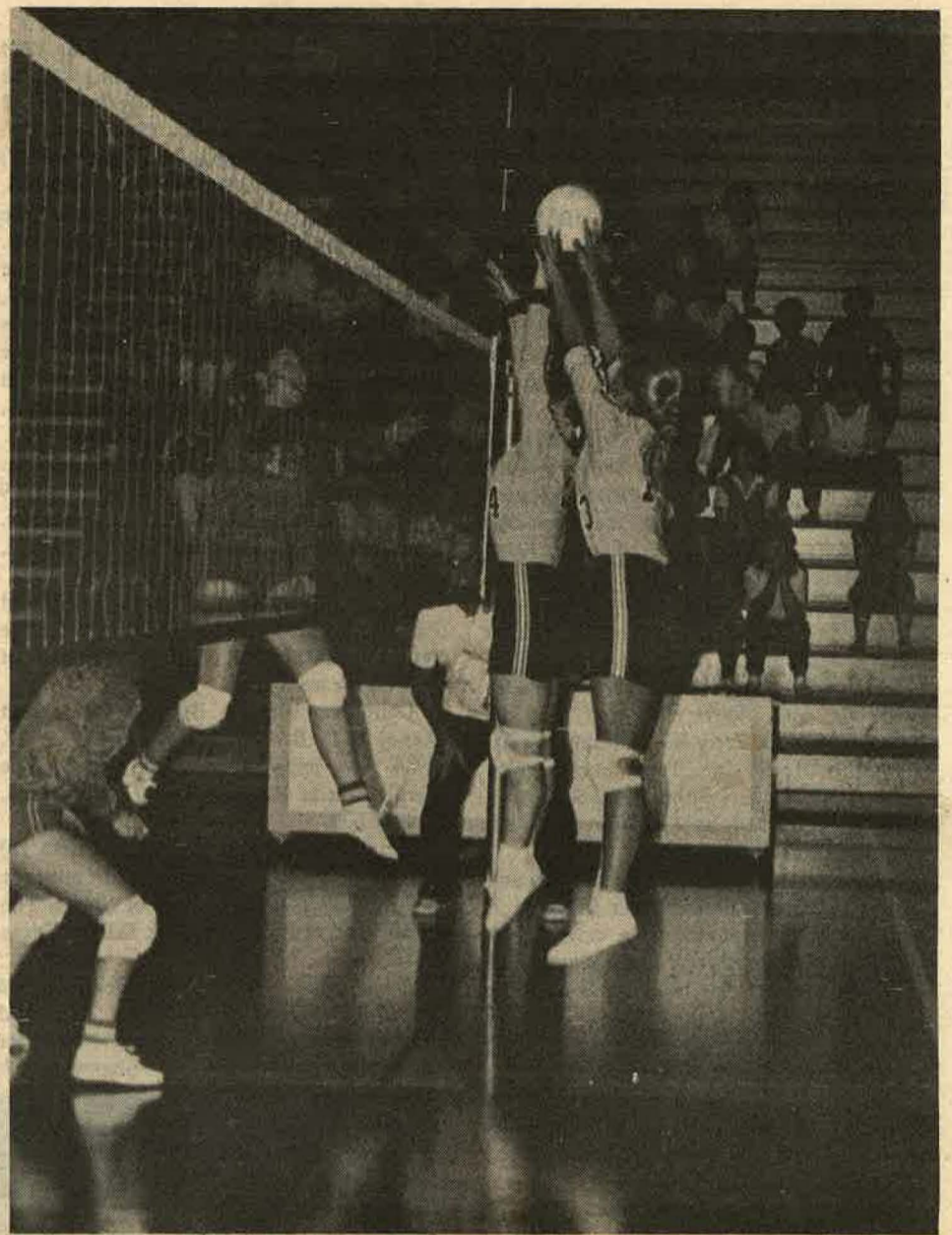
"Both of these athletes have a lot of playing experience and should help us early," Watkins said. "Ellis is a fine, aggressive ball handler and Bledsoe will strengthen our inside game considerably."

Now in its third year, the Lady Bisons program is beginning to develop, Watkins said. He indicated the quality of the new recruits was good and that the team should be much more competitive in the nationally recognized Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference.

"We have more height, much better team speed and better rebounding ability. Our whole quality of play should be improved," he said. "From a competitive aspect, we are already ahead of last year."

Harriers Show Team Strength; Ranked 14th

Just a few of the names are different, but the story is practically the same this fall for the cross-country team as it was in the pre-season of 1984; six out of seven top runners for the Bisons are back, looking to claim the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference crown for the 15th consecutive time.

Cautiously optimistic at the start of the 1984 season because of his young team and the relative strength of some AIC opponents, Harding's Coach Ted Lloyd sounds more confident now. It's not that his AIC opponents are any weaker (in fact, two other teams return about as many lettermen as the Bisons), it's that Harding is stronger.

"I think we'll perform very well," Lloyd predicted. "If somebody beats us they'll have to have a good team."

Heading the list of talent for the Bisons are two seniors, Al Bates of Nashville, Tenn. and Larry Wayne of Fairhope, Ala. Bates has earned the mantle of team leader over the past three years. Three times named All-AIC and NAIA All-District, Bates finished third in the AIC last year as Harding's top finisher.

Coming in just two seconds behind Bates in the AIC, Wayne took fourth. He, too, has been named three times to the All-AIC and All-District teams.

A major strength for Harding comes in the form of the next three runners for the team. The three — Jon Partlow of Portland, Ore., Eddie Neal of Griffithville and Darryl Halbert of Lakewood, Colo. — have shown a tendency to run in a group, almost like one person gathering the points of three. In last year's AIC the trio placed 10th through 12th

respectively. This year, Lloyd indicated, each appears stronger and will probably run closer to Bates and Wayne than before.

For good measure, the Bisons can also look to returning letterman Jim Baird of Rolla, Mo., along with new talent on the team. Leading the new prospects is sophomore Sean Prince of Greenville, Miss., who transferred from Delta State (Miss.) after the school dropped its cross-country program. Freshman Richard Lockhart of Grand Blanc, Mich., adds more potential to the team.

With such a talent-rich team, Lloyd admits he believes the team is capable of finishing in the top 10 of the NAIA, but, he says, that is not his main concern. "Our primary goal is to win the conference," Lloyd said.

In Lloyd's estimation his team cannot look beyond the conference meet before it is run. Not only are the Bisons better, but so are other teams in the conference.

"This year we have the strongest teams the conference has produced," Lloyd said.

Still, Harding appears to have the strongest men's team in the AIC and the Lady Bisons have shown strength early in the season. Both teams took first in Harding's own Bison Booster Invitational, the first meet of the season. For the women it was a most pleasing improvement in their team effort. For the men the win preceded an NAIA national poll ranking of 14th.

In the meet Al Bates led the way for the Bisons, capturing first place over the five-mile course in a time of 25:54. Other Harding runners followed in fourth through

sixth place, coming just one place short of a perfect score of 15.

The top Lady Bisons finisher was Beverly Gardner in fifth. Other Harding runners showed solid team effort and placed seventh, eighth, 11th and 17th to give the Lady Bisons a team score of 47. The score was good enough to edge out Arkansas State University by one point and give Harding the win.

Sharp Elected; Will Lead TAC In Arkansas

Cliff Sharp of Harding University has been elected president of The Athletics Congress (TAC) of Arkansas for 1985-86.

Sharp, the head women's track coach, will direct the track and field activities of the 23 organizations and nearly 1,000 individual members in the state.

As the head of the group, Sharp will represent Arkansas at the national convention in Houston in December. He will also coordinate the appointment of the committee chairmen for the various events sponsored by TAC.

Sharp serves on the national TAC officials Committee and is the TAC representative on the Executive Committee of the National Sports Festival.

A native of Mountain Home, Sharp is a 1961 alumnus of Harding. He joined the University staff in 1964.

Bisons Post 4-0 Record; Rank No. 4 In NAIA

Boasting a perfect 4-0 record, the Harding University Bisons have earned a fourth place national ranking in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) football poll.

The announcement was made by Charlie Eppler, NAIA director of communications.

"We're excited and the kids are excited," said Bison head coach John Prock. "The big thing now is to keep it going. This is good for Harding and having three teams in the rankings is good for the AIC. Most of all it's a reward for the kids."

(The University of Central Arkansas was ranked third and Henderson State was 16th in the poll.)

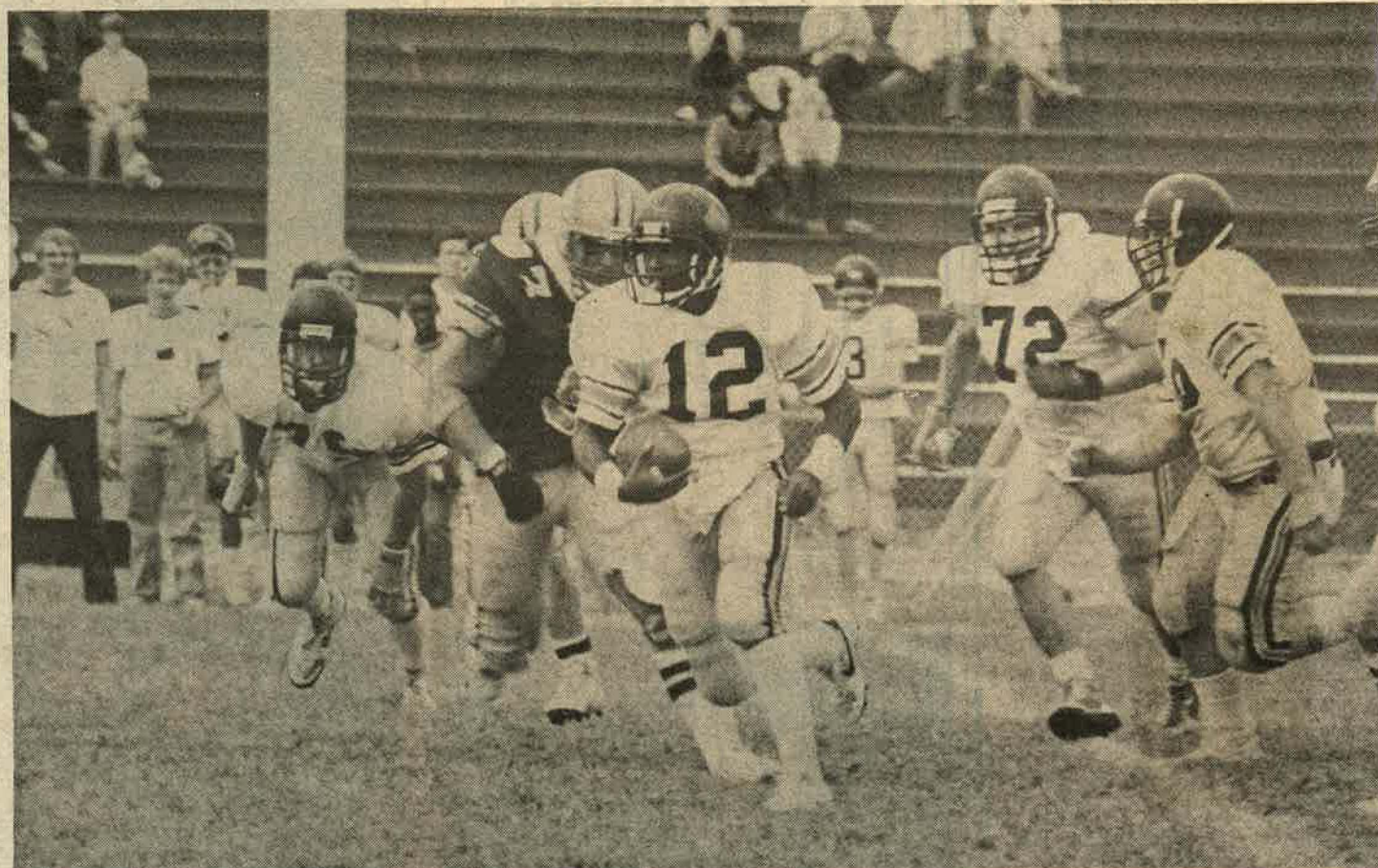
Prock's squad has reeled off consecutive victories, over Lane College (Tenn.) 21-14, Evangel College 44-16 and Southeastern Oklahoma 24-17. Southeastern was rated 15th in the NAIA when Harding handed the Savages their first loss of the year.

The Bisons' new wishbone offense has produced a nationally ranked 302 yards per game and has been triggered by a talented array of backs. Quarterback Mannie Lowery of Little Rock and Roddy Mote of St. Mary's, W.Va., have relied on the skills of senior fullback Z.C.O. Uhatafe of St. Petersburg, Fla., and halfbacks Glenn Segars of Lithonia, Ga., and Daron Cathey of Coldwater, Miss.

Segars, a bona fide All-America candidate, is averaging 106 yards per game and has upped his career rushing total to 1,369 yards.

Defensively, the Bisons have rallied around the senior leadership of noseguard Fanasial "Dump" Quinn of West Point, Miss., and linebacker Franz Patterson of Killeen, Texas. A relatively young defensive line has earned national recognition by limiting opponents to only 76.7 yards rushing in the first three games.

Harding had an open date on Oct. 5 but opened the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference race against Arkansas Tech at home Oct. 12. Homecoming for the Bisons will be Nov. 2 with the University of Arkansas-Monticello providing the opposition. The final home game will be Nov. 16 against Ouachita Baptist University.

Optimistic Cagers Prep For '85-86 Campaign

Harding University basketball fortunes will ride heavily on the shoulders of senior Kenny Collins, a bona fide All-American candidate, as the Bisons prepare for the 1985-86 campaign.

Three solid starters were lost to graduation and Collins, an intensely competitive 6-6, 190 lb. All-Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference and NAIA All-District 17 selection, will be counted on to pick up the slack.

"We've got some solid and experienced athletes returning," Bison head coach Jess Bucy said, "and we'll be looking for Kenny to pick up where he left off last season."

Collins, a three-year starter, averaged

14.8 points and 6.9 rebounds per game last year and upped his career scoring mark to 1,076 points. Along the way he was named to the Academic All-America (first team) of the College Sports Information Directors of America.

Graduation cost the Bisons three starters but a nucleus of talented lettermen should be able to step forward to fill the openings. Among the returnees are 6-9 sophomore Bryan Fowler of Cushing, Okla., 6-4 junior guard Shannon Hughes of Tyler, Texas, and 5-8 sophomore Tim Smallwood of Tulsa, Okla.

"They are a very talented group," Bucy said, "and I believe they are capable of

doing the job we need."

Fowler should strengthen the inside game with his rebounding but he will also rank as an offensive threat with a soft shooting touch. Hughes, a lanky shooting guard, gives the Bisons an outside threat and Smallwood is one of the quickest athletes Harding has had in its backcourt in some time. His late season development showed he has scoring skill as well.

Also expected to contend for starting positions are lettermen guards Mike Hall (5-11) of Cushing, Okla., and Shane Parker (6-1 1/2) of St. James, Mo., and a group of talented newcomers.

Three junior college recruits should figure significantly in Bison plans. They are 6-6 post Manual Cook of McCook Junior College (Neb.), 6-5 forward of Michigan Christian College and 6-3 1/2 forward Archie Shaw, also from McCook Junior College.

A talented group of freshmen could play a key role in Bison fortunes. Bucy and assistant coach Nicky Boyd indicated this year's recruits are capable of seeing action early. Signees include 6-6 forward Carl Collins of Valley Springs, Ark., 5-10 guard Keith Richardson of Little Rock, Ark., 6-2 forward Greg Stevenson of Effingham, Ill., and 6-2 guard Barry Thames of St. Louis.

Harding will open the 85-86 campaign against School of the Ozarks at Point Lookout, Mo., Nov. 18.

Prock Records 100th Career Victory

John Prock has 100 reasons to be happy he's at Harding University.

The Bison coach won his 100th game Saturday, Sept. 14, when Harding defeated Lane College in Jackson, Tenn., 21-14. He is one of just six active NAIA Division I coaches to reach the century mark.

"I'm glad I got it. I just hope it's 109 or more when the season is over," Prock said. "To tell you the truth, I didn't think much of it. But the kids kind of got involved and excited about it, and they got me excited, too."

"It really is not such a big deal — if you can survive that long," said Prock with a laugh. "There have been times that I thought I'd never reach 100."

Prock is in his 22nd season as the head coach at Harding. He led the Bisons to shares of the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference title in 1972 and 1976. His overall record stands at 100-109-6.

"The kids gave me the game ball after the win," Prock said. "I'm just glad we won the game. It was more important to win the first game of the season than the 100th. I guess you have to just call it 'stick to it' to get to 100. I've had some good seasons, and I've had some not so good seasons. I really appreciate them for putting up with me for that long."

Prock, a 56-year-old native of Hollis, Okla., came to Harding in 1960, served as an assistant for four years then became head coach in the spring of 1964. He is just the second coach the Bisons have had since reviving their football program in 1959.

"We've had some good kids and some good coaches come through here," Prock said. "Dr. (C.L.) Ganus, our president, has probably been my biggest fan and one of my best friends ever since I've been here. He's backed us in the good times and the bad times. That's always a plus to your program."

Prock said he gets as much pleasure from seeing ex-players become successful as he

does from victories on the field.

"You look back at a time like this and you forget some about the wins and losses. You get to thinking about the kids and what they've become. I'm enjoying looking back and seeing what some of the kids are doing now."

"Some of them were at the game last week, and it was really funny. I've even gotten into second generation players. (Roddy) Mote and David Escue both had their fathers there, and they both played for me. I try to stay in contact with all of my former players."

"It's funny because some of the orneriest kids I've had have become some of the best Christian men around. One of the meanest linebackers I ever had, Dean Kilmer, is a preacher now in Bartlesville, Okla."

"Regardless of how you look at it, just getting to 100 is an achievement. One thing is for sure. It means you've had a bunch of players you can be proud of. That game ball will be one that I will cherish for a long time, I'll guarantee you."
