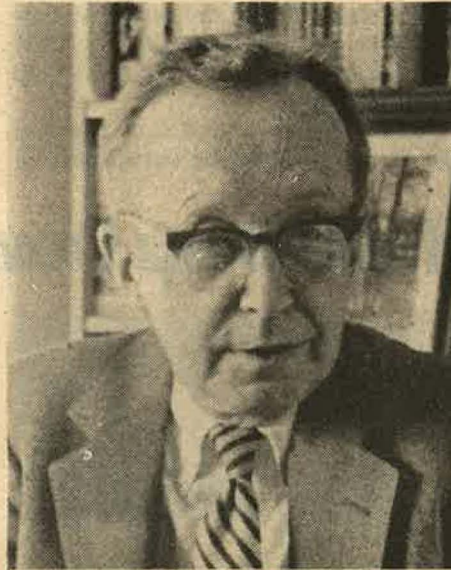

Speakers Set for American Studies Lectures

Four prominent speakers are scheduled for the fall American Studies Lecture Series at Harding. Included for the presentations are Michael Novak, theologian, author and diplomat; Robert Ferrell, author and distinguished professor at Indiana University; J. Peter Grace, chairman of the Private Sector Survey on Cost Control in the Federal Government; and William Stevens, chairman of Triad Systems Corporation.

Novak will open the series on Sept. 22, Ferrell will speak on Oct. 14, Grace will follow on Nov. 10 and Stevens will close the fall lectures on Dec. 2. “We have an excellent line-up of speakers for our fall series,” said Dr. David Burks, director of the Harding American Studies Program. “We believe their presentations will be very timely, informative and authoritative.”

Novak will speak Sept. 22 at 7:30 p.m. in the American Heritage Auditorium. He holds the George Frederick Jewett Chair in Religion and

Public Policy at the American Enterprise Institute in Washington, D.C.

Novak is head of the U.S. Delegation to the Experts’ Meeting on Human Contacts of the Conference on Security and Cooperation in Europe. The meetings are a continuation of the Helsinki Accord negotiations. He has served the United States in three administrations.

Novak has written over 20 books in the areas of philosophy, theology, politics, economics and culture. He is also the author and editor of numerous monographs and over 200 articles and reviews. His articles and essays have been published in popular journals including *The New Republic*, *Commentary*, *Harpers*, *The Atlantic* and *National Review*. Novak’s writings have appeared in every major western language, and in Bengali, Korean and Japanese.

“Illusions and Realities,” his twice-weekly column was syndicated nationally from

1976-1980. He took leave of the column in 1980 to complete three books and resumed publication weekly in 1984. His column “Tomorrow and Tomorrow” is published monthly in *National Review*.

He has received numerous awards including the George Washington Honor Medal from the Freedoms Foundation; the Award of Excellence, Religion in Media, Eighth Annual Angel Awards; first U.S. member to the Argentina National Academy of Sciences, Morals and Politics; and ten honorary degrees.

Novak was appointed to the Presidential Task Force on Project Economic Justice and to the Board for International Broadcasting. He has served as the head of the United States Delegation to the United Nations Human Rights Commission in Geneva.

Ferrell will speak on Oct. 14 at 7:30 p.m. in the American Heritage Auditorium. He has

served as an instructor in history at Michigan State University and as a visiting teacher at Yale University, University of South Carolina, University of Wisconsin, American University at Cairo, University of Nebraska, Ripon College in Wisconsin, University of Notre Dame, University of Massachusetts, Columbia University, University of Connecticut, Catholic University of Louvain, Naval War College in Rhode Island and Eastern Illinois University.

He was a lecturer at the Salzburg Seminar in American Studies at Salzburg, Austria. He is now a distinguished professor at Indiana University.

Ferrell has written numerous books on American diplomacy and American presidents, especially Harry S. Truman.

Ferrell has received several distinctions and fellowships including the John Addison Porter prize from Yale University, Carnegie Corporation, Social Science Research Council, Smith-Mundt Act, Fulbright award to Belgium and the distinguished teaching award in 1969, 1980 and 1983 from Indiana University.

He is a member of the American Historical Association, Organization of American Historians, Society for Historians of American Foreign Relations, Society of American Historians, Conference on European Problems, and the Harry S. Truman Library Institute.

Grace will speak on Nov. 10 at 7:30 p.m. in the Benson Auditorium. He has been chief ex-

Tucker Awarded International Prize

Harding Assistant Professor of Economics David Tucker has received second prize in the Olive W. Garvey Fellowship International Essay Contest by the Mont Pelerin Society.

The award for the essay titled, "The Economics and Philosophy of Liberty," includes a \$1,500 cash grant plus a \$1,000 travel grant to present the paper to the September, 1986 general meeting of the Mont Pelerin Society in St. Vincent, Italy. Tucker's essay competed with more than 40 entries in the contest.

The Mont Pelerin Society is an international group of scholars and others who believe in the free society. The society was founded by Friedrich von Hayek (Nobel Laureate in economics) at Mont Pelerin, Switzerland in 1947.

The essay by Tucker was judged by an international panel of three judges — one each from Europe, America, and Latin America. Tucker's essay emphasized three systems which must support liberty in society for a free society to function — the economic system, the political system, and the moral-cultural system.

"This singular honor for David is a wonderful reminder of the bright and shining example he is for those who would seek a better understanding of the idea of freedom applied to the marketplace," said Dr. Don Diffine, director of the economics program at Harding.

Tucker is married to the former Renee East and they have two children, Peyton and Kinsey. He has taught at Harding for four years and is also director of the Walton Scholarship Program for Central American students.

Harding Has Lowest Default Record

Harding ranks first among the colleges and universities in Arkansas with the lowest default rate in the National Direct Student Loan Program (NDSL).

Harding's rate of 1.45 percent was the lowest default rate 32 schools listed for the fiscal year 1984-85 by the federal Department of Education. With the national average at 8.25, in Arkansas 19 schools exceed that figure.

"The NDSL program has been instrumental in making a college education available to students," said Byron Rowan, assistant to the vice president for finance. "Thousands of our students have participated in the program."

As of the end of June, more than \$6 million dollars in loans are currently active, Rowan said. Harding has been a participant in the program since it was begun under the National Defense Education Act of 1958.

The program is administered by Harding personnel with 90 percent of the funds coming from the federal government and 10 percent from the

Ganus Endowed Scholarship Raising Funds

The campaign to establish a \$1 million endowed academic scholarship fund in honor of Dr. and Mrs. Clifton L. Ganus Jr., is off to a rapid start, according to Floyd Daniel, vice president for University Relations.

"We've had a great response from a number of alumni and friends who have expressed their support of the decision by the Board of Trustees to establish the program," Daniel said. "They are well aware of the great work, the service and the commitment of Cliff and Louise and they want to have a part in this effort."

The Board of Trustees on May 9 announced a campaign to establish an endowed scholarship to recognize Dr. and Mrs. Ganus. To fuel the campaign, six members of the Board of Trustees have already committed more than \$169,000 to the effort, Daniel said.

The "Clifton L. and Louise Ganus Scholarship Fund" will be the largest endowed scholar-

ship fund in the school's history. Interest earned in the principal of the fund will provide scholarship assistance to at least 100 or more students each school year when fully funded.

"A significant response has come from two former classmates of the Ganuses," Daniel said. "George Tipps of Dallas and Jim Bill McInteer of Nashville, Tenn., have agreed to take on volunteer leadership roles among people they know because they want to have a part in honoring Cliff and Louise.

Tipps, a classmate of Dr. and Mrs. Ganus, said, "This endowed scholarship is probably the greatest kind of tribute that could have been established. I've known Cliff and Louise for 45 years and they have been a source of continued strength to me.

"No school is any better than the head man and his zeal for academic and spiritual ex-

cellence has made its imprint on the school, the student body and the faculty."

McInteer echoed Tipps' remarks. "Scholarships are awarded because of the excellency of the individual. This endowed scholarship will be a double barreled program. The students selected will be very able; they will be blessed because great people are being honored by it."

Following the lead of the Board of Trustees, alumni and friends will be contacted concerning gift opportunities, Daniel said. Information describing the scholarship will be distributed in August to Harding alumni.

"It is our hope to secure as much of the \$1 million as possible by the end of the 1986, but I feel sure we will still have some contacts to make in early 1987," Daniel said. "We will announce our results at the May, 1987 commencement which will mark the conclusion of Dr. Ganus' presidency."

Alexander, Hatfield Step Down From Board

Two longtime members of the Harding Board of Trustees, Flanoy Alexander and W.C. (Bill) Hatfield, have announced their retirement from the policy making group.

Alexander, publisher of the *Gospel Light* in Delight, Ark., completed 33 years of service and Hatfield, a banking consultant in Dallas, served eight years as an active trustee.

"We appreciate very much the many years of dedicated service Flanoy Alexander has given to the Board of Trustees of Harding," said President Clifton L. Ganus. "He is much loved by his colleagues and will be missed."

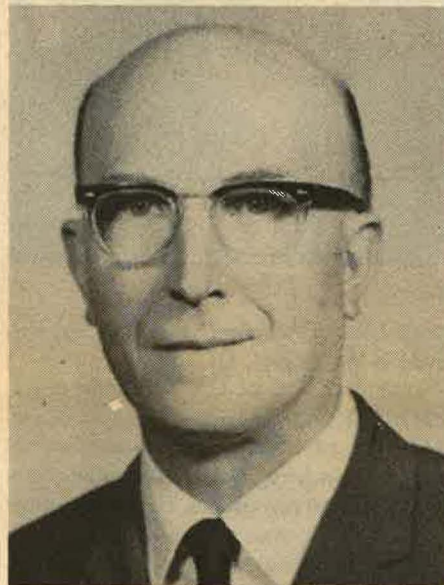
Concerning his years on the Board, Alexander said, "It's been one of the highlights of my life, a very pleasant time. We've had some hills and valleys but the future looks very bright. Harding is doing a wonderful work.

"Serving with the other members of the Board has been very gratifying to me as well," he said.

A solid supporter of Christian education, Alexander's three children, Wallace, Lynn (Mrs. Don England) and Harold are graduates of Harding. Two grandchildren also have graduated and two are currently enrolled.

"I believe there's been only one year since I came on the Board that we didn't have either a child or a grandchild enrolled."

Hatfield resigned from the Board because "at this time I'm not able to make the commitment of time and energy that is necessary.

"Serving on the Board has been one of the most fulfilling things I've ever done," he said. "The school has made great progress in its physical facilities and in developing significant cost control practices.

"Academically Harding has a strong program, but one of the things that has impressed me the most is the continued spiritual development,

which is so vital to what Harding is all about."

"We are grateful to him for all he has done to help us," President Ganus said. "He has contributed freely of his expertise and ability to the growth of Harding."

With the loss of Alexander and Hatfield, there are now 18 individuals serving on the Harding University Board.

Registration Dates Scheduled Aug. 25-27

Registration dates at Harding have been set for Aug. 25-27 with the final date to enroll on Sept. 15, according to Virgil Beckett, registrar.

Pre-registration was held at the end of the 1985 school year with 2,053 students registering for classes. Two academic orientation days were held this summer in which 395 freshmen attended in order to be advised concerning classes and pre-registration and to make dorm room assignments.

The first Student Impact will be held at Harding Aug. 18-22 for freshmen to get acquainted with faculty, classes, majors, and building locations, as well as to participate in a variety of fun activities. Approximately 400 students have registered to attend Student Impact.

Intersession had a record enrollment of 577 this summer compared to 551 last year. The first session of summer school had 561 students enrolled and 497 attended the second summer session of classes.

Sears to Address Commencement

Dr. Jack Wood Sears, Harding University retiring professor of biology, will speak at graduation ceremonies at Harding Aug. 15.

A member of the faculty since 1945, Sears was chairman of the biology department, retiring as chairman in 1983. Also, he has taught for many years in the Bible department.

Sears began his education at Harding Elementary School in Morrilton at age six in 1924 and received the Bachelor of Science in biology in 1940. In 1943, while attending the University of Texas, where he received the M.A. and Ph.D. degrees, he was married to Miss Mattie Sue Speck. They have three children, James David, Pattie Sue and Martha Ann.

A native of Cordell, Okla., he is the son of Dr. L.C. Sears, retired dean of Harding, and the late Pattaway Armstrong Sears.

He is past president of the Arkansas Academy of Science and is a member of a number of other scientific societies. He has been a pulpit minister since 1940 and is an elder at the Downtown Church of Christ in Searcy.

In 1969 he published a book, *Conflict and Harmony Between Science and Religion*. He is a past president of the Searcy Lions Club.

Jones Joins Faculty as Visiting Missionary

For James (Buddy) Jones and his wife, Maurine, being the visiting missionary family at Harding this year meant more than coming home to the United States from France; it meant coming home to their roots.

Buddy grew up in Searcy and graduated from Harding in 1972 with a degree in Bible. His parents are Jimmy and Dorothy Jones.

For the next year, Buddy will teach Bible courses at Harding, giving first-hand insight into mission work. He will teach Acts and one missions course in the fall and will probably add another missions course to his schedule in the spring.

Maurine is nearly as close to home in Searcy as her husband. The daughter of Claude and Madge Lewis, she is a native of Little Rock where her father is the minister for the Sandstone church of Christ. She also finished Harding in 1972 with a major in elementary education.

The road from Searcy and back home again took the Joneses through St. Louis where Buddy completed an intern program with the McKnight Rd. church. Their daughter, Anna, now 11, was born in St. Louis. She was the first child in what has now become a truly international family.

Buddy, Maurine and Anna moved to Geneva, Switzerland in August of 1977. They lived and worked there for two and one-half years. During that time a son, Daniel, was born. He is now nine-years-old.

The four Joneses moved to Nantes, France in April of 1980. There the family added two more members, David and Sarah, now six and two, respectively.

The emphasis of the work in France has been sharing the gospel through personal contact, the

Joneses indicated. One of the ways they have established personal contact, Maurine said, is through seminars which deal with aspects of everyday life. "We advertise subjects such as death and loneliness," she said.

"The main thrust of missions," Buddy said, "should be to reach people who have not heard the gospel and communicate to them the message of Jesus through personal contact.

"That's a whole lot harder than I thought it was."

At Harding, Buddy and Maurine will try to show students the need and the challenge of being a missionary for the gospel.

"I'm convinced there are a lot of people who will rise to that challenge," Buddy said. "And the more that go, the quicker we can get the work done."

ecutive officer of W.R. Grace and Co. since 1945.

The President's Private Sector Survey on Cost Control, popularly known as the Grace Commission after its chairman J. Peter Grace, was given the task in June 1982 to find ways the federal government could cut spending without raising taxes or adversely affecting social programs.

After 18 months of study, the commission presented President Reagan with 2,478 recommendations which, over three years, could save \$424 billion. The proposals were contained in a two-volume summary which was gleaned from 47 separate reports and supported by 1.5 million pages of documentation.

Subsequently, Grace has pressed the issue of cutting government waste in several ways.

Under Grace's leadership W.R. Grace and Co. has changed from a Latin American and steamship line heritage into an international company with world wide interests in chemicals, natural resources and selected consumer services. Today the company operates 268 plants, 245 offices, 446 sales units, 131 warehouses, 693 retail outlets and 857 restaurants in 47 states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico, and 45 countries of North and South America, Europe, Africa, Asia and Australia.

Grace graduated from Yale University. For several years he has been speaking to various business and education groups about the need to reduce federal government spending and waste. President Reagan appointed him as Chairman of the Private Sector Survey on Cost Control in the Federal Government in March 1982. He is also a member of President Reagan's National Productivity Advisory Committee.

Stevens will speak Dec. 2 at 7:30 p.m. in the American Heritage Auditorium. He was introduced to electronics while attending the U.S. Navy Electronics School in San Francisco, Calif. After leaving the Navy, he attended City College of San Francisco where he studied electrical engineering. He was employed by Stanford Research Institute as a research associate in the Computer Techniques Laboratory where he was involved in early computer research.

Stevens joined a start-up company, Data Disc, and over the next eight years rose from engineer to president of the company. He then organized Triad Systems Corporation in 1971 where he has served as chairman to date.

Triad Systems Corporation is a computer company that employs approximately 1,400 and has 150 offices in the United States, Canada, Great Britain and Australia. Triad is headquartered in Sunnyvale, Calif.

Stevens is a member of Pepperdine Board of Regents and a board member of Anderson Jacobson Inc., Covalent Systems Inc., and Silver-Lisco Inc.

The American Studies Program also includes Youth Citizenship Seminars and Management Seminars. Harding's program has been honored by the Freedoms Foundation of Valley Forge, Pa., for contributing special programs and quality lectures to the community of Searcy and the students of Harding University.

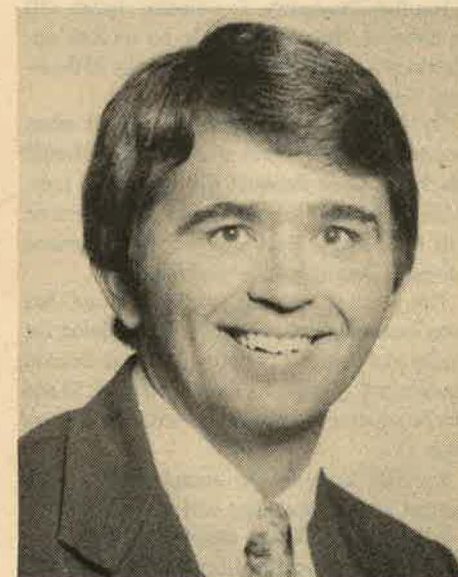

Henderson's appointment concluded a month-long search and interview period. Extensive interviews have been conducted with all members of the business faculty, the deans and vice presidents of the University before the selection was made, Dr. Burks said.

"Of course I feel this is a great honor," Dr. Henderson said. "I came to Harding because I wanted to work with students. The School of Business has made great progress in recent years and I want to see us continue to grow and excel."

Dr. Burks, who will become president of Har-

Terry Edwards

There's a faculty member who has made it to campus only a day or two in the last 18 months. Most of his colleagues wouldn't recognize him if he walked into their offices.

Yet he teaches full time, manages a dormitory and food service for 35 students and is on call 24 hours a day. And the few colleagues who know him well could pick out him and his battered blue van in the busiest rush-hour traffic.

He is Terry Edwards, who is completing his second year as field director at Harding University in Florence, Italy. To the students and Searcy faculty families who have enjoyed his hospitality, he is fondly remembered as translator, tour guide, stimulating teacher and tireless friend who gives new meaning to the term "Christian servant."

Bearded and rail-thin, he has the zeal and energy of an Old Testament prophet or maybe John the Baptist, but also the quiet voice of a humble contemplative.

Edwards, 30, was a perfect choice when someone was needed to live year-round in Florence so that the Italian-speaking Searcy faculty, Dr. Don Shackelford — the director — and L. V. Pfeifer, would not have to be in the faculty rotation each year.

The son of missionaries to Italy, he had spent his teen years in Florence, learning to speak the language fluently. After having earned a Harding degree in music education in 1980, he had

taught at Indianapolis Christian School and completed a master's degree in music at Butler University. He has also worked toward a degree in Biblical languages.

When the call from Florence came, he says, he jumped at the chance to return to the country he loves. With his wife, the former Kim Klein, and three young children — Katie, Brandon and Jon-Michael — he moved to Florence and oversaw the preparation of the sixteenth-century villa for the program to move there in the fall of 1984. Last November a second daughter, Chelsea, was born.

When HUF is in session, Edwards teaches Italian and The Life of Paul, required courses for all students, and gladly will present units on music history in the required humanities class. But that only begins his duties: he manages the villa staff of three, does most household repairs, buys groceries, sometimes shuttles riders to the bus stop, cashes checks, pays bills, delivers photographic orders, translates for Italian doctors when medical needs arise and answers countless questions from his American guests.

When a rare spare moment arrives, he'll often pull out his guitar and improvise a John Denver tune or whatever requests come from the students who gather around.

"I'm here to serve you and help you enjoy your time in Italy," he tells each group when they arrive. It's not a message he needs to repeat, for his actions speak it every day. Ask anyone who has been to Florence.

The group will tour Indianapolis, Ind., with lodging in St. Clairsville, Ohio and will visit Niagara Falls on the third day. After viewing the American and Canadian Falls from the Minolta Tower, the group will spend a night in Niagara Falls, Canada.

Traveling the New York State Thruway to Syracuse, the tour will arrive at Thousand Islands of the St. Lawrence Seaway at the Eastern end of Lake Ontario and will cruise through the islands. The group will drive through the Adirondack Mountains, stopping in Lake Placid, the site of the 500 million year old Ausable Chasm.

A circle tour of the Green Mountains will include stops at the 150-year-old covered bridge at Waitsfield, the state capitol at Montpelier and other historic sites.

The tour will continue across the Connecticut River into New Hampshire to the White Mountains and Franconia Notch including an aerial tramway ride to Cannon Mountain. After a trip

to the "Old Man of the Mountain" phenomenon at Profile Lake, the night's lodging will be in Littleton, N.H.

In Boston, the group will visit places such as the Boston Common, USS Constitution, Old North Church, Beacon Hill and Back Bay before stopping for the night.

A drive through Rhode Island and Connecticut will end in New York City, where free time will be a part of the fare. The next day a sight-seeing tour of Times Square, the United Nations Building, the Statue of Liberty and other significant points of interest will be made.

The return route will travel through West Virginia, with the final night at Bardstown, Ky., the site of Stephen Foster's "Old Kentucky Home."

After travel through "Music City, USA" Nashville, Tenn., the group will return to Searcy.

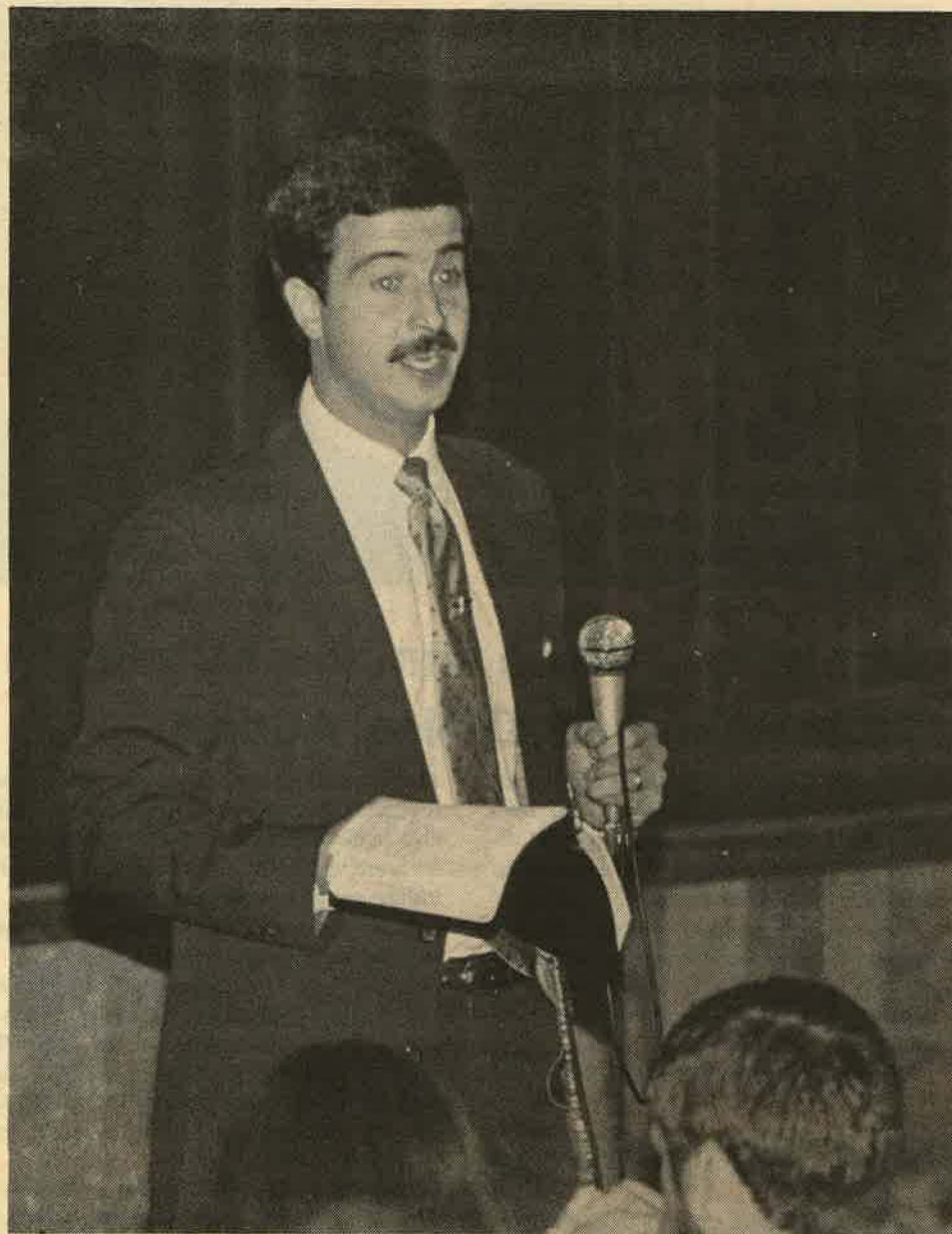
Tahkodah Music Camp

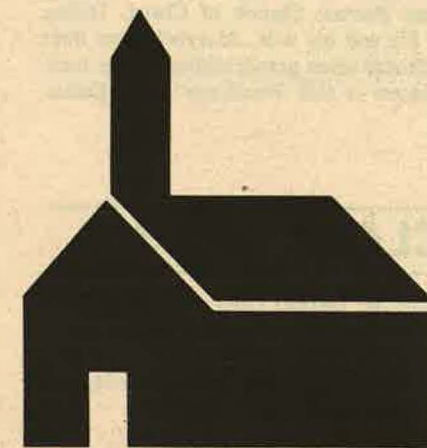

Bison Gridders Open Drills Aug. 18; Key Veterans Return

High hopes and a brilliant 5-0 start went down the tube last fall as the Harding Bisons fell victim to key injuries and the "near miss" syndrome to finish 5-5.

Uppermost on the mind of coach John Prock will be the return to form of top running back Glenn Segars. Loss of Segars to a knee injury coincided with the turnaround of Harding's 1985 fortunes.

Key returnees among the six offensive starters will include quarterback Mannie Lowery of Little Rock and running back Daron Cathey of Coldwater, Miss. Lowery amassed 1,081 yards of total offense as the chief engineer of the Bisons' return to the wishbone offense. Cathey, a super-quick 5-10, 162 lb. athlete, picked up the rushing load when Segars was hurt and gained 465 yards. He was an all-the-way threat as a receiver as well, pulling in 10 passes for 343 yards.

Junior-to-be Jack Moore, an Academic All-American at split end, is a talent to be watched. The Huntsville, Ala. native, came up with a half dozen "miracle" type catches among his 16 receptions for 208 yards, including three for TD's.

Up front offensively only co-captain John Collins, a competitive 5-11, 235 lb. guard from Uniontown, Ohio, returns with solid experience. Junior college transfer Tim Spencer, 6-3, 215 lbs. from Alexandria, Ind., is expected to improve the tight end situation but sophomores with limited playing time are found in the other spots, tackle to tackle.

Defensively, the loss of NAIA All-America honorable mention noseguard Fanasial "Dump" Quinn will hurt. Little Rock junior Kenneth Forte, a 6-0, 240 lb. starter at tackle last year,

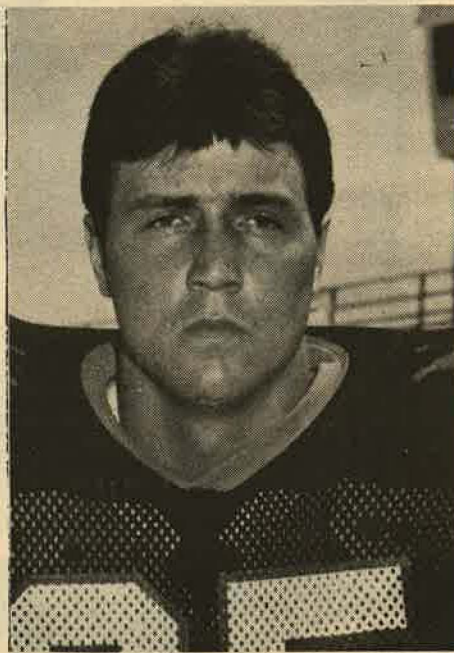

was moved to noseguard in spring drills and did an impressive job. Starter Kevin Hunt, 6-0, 225 lbs., of Denison, Texas, returns at left tackle and co-captain John Fox, 5-10, 195 lbs., of Searcy returns at one defensive end position.

At linebacker Steve Dudley, a 6-1, 210 lb. fire-eater returns on the right side and ranks as one of the finest in the area. He is an all-conference talent and should be one of the senior leaders for the Bisons.

Harding returns its most experienced group in the secondary where junior Mickey Adkison, 5-10, 176 lbs., of Tulsa, Chris East 5-8, 152 lbs., of St. Petersburg, Fla., and co-captain Chris

McDavid, 5-10, 195 lbs. of Dallas return.

Adkison at free safety is a big play type who has the knack of being in the right place at the right time. A daring and resourceful punt returner, he has All-America possibilities. East at right cornerback gets a lot of mileage out of his speed and quickness and McDavid is the solid, dependable tackler you just can't do without.

The Bisons' kicking game will return intact. Stu Varner, a 5-11, 170 lb. junior-to-be from Marietta, Ohio, booted three field goals last season to become a solid offensive threat. Punter Paul Golden, whose slender 6-1, 150 lb. frame

believes his kicking power, returns for his senior year. He carried a 36.7 yard average last fall. He is a senior from Caddo Gap, Ark.

A fruitful recruiting season could have a significant effect on 1986 possibilities. A number of big, talented offensive linemen are signed as well as at least a couple of junior college athletes who are counted on to step in and produce.

Prock's move to the wishbone last fall was not a disappointment as an exciting and explosive offense was the result. With a year of the "new" system under their belts, the Bisons could easily surprise some unsuspecting opponents.

Cross Country Prospects Appear Exceptional

A high degree of optimism is apparent in the forecast by Harding coach Ted Lloyd for the fall cross country season.

"A good looking bunch of newcomers gives our men opportunity for a 16th consecutive trip to the NAIA nationals, and the women's team could perhaps be the best we've had," Lloyd said.

Three all-district performers will headline the men's contingent, which won the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference and NAIA District 17 titles last year. Harding finished 14th in the national championship in Kenosha, Wis.

Seniors Darryl Halbert of Lakewood, Colo. and Eddie Neal of Griffithville, Ark., will team with junior Jon Partlow of Portland, Ore., to give the Bisons a solid nucleus to build on. An experienced letterman counted on to contend for the top will be Richard Lockhart of Grand Blanc, Mich.

Lady Bisons Open Fourth Season With Optimistic Outlook

Despite the loss of three starters, the Harding Lady Bisons volleyball team has the chance to field an even stronger lineup this year, according to head coach Karyl Bailey.

"Our program is still getting off the ground and every year we're making good progress," he said. "Our returning players are more experienced and our recruits are stronger with good high school backgrounds."

Two seniors headline the seven returning letter winners. Beth Shanklin, a three-year starter from Montgomery, Ala., will give solid leadership as a setter and Sherri Clements, a starter last year after transferring from Northeastern Christian, is a strong middle hitter and blocker. She is from Landover, Md.

Five talented sophomores make up the core of the Lady Bisons. They are Onetta Gardner, a hitter from Andover, Kan., Sheryl Green, a hitter and blocker from Brentwood, Tenn., Tracy Hinton, hitter from Jonesboro, Ark., Stephanie McAfee, a hitter from Missoula, Mont., and Laura Shifflet, a hitter from Newberry, Mich.

In addition to the regular Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference competition, the Lady Bisons will compete in tournaments at Arkansas State University, Christian Brothers College (Tenn.) and Ouachita Baptist University.

Last season, the Lady Bisons compiled a 13-21 team record and earned their first berth in the NAIA District 17 Playoff.

"This is only our fourth year of competition but our program is definitely moving up," Bailey said.

Three Tracksters Named Academic All-America

Academic All-America honors have been won by a trio of Harding track athletes.

Earning national recognition from the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) were Dawn Mason, Doug Ogburn and Ed van der Kaaij.

In addition, van der Kaaij was named to the College Division Academic All-America Second Team selected by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA).

"We're proud of these young people and the achievements they've made, on and off the field," Bison track coach Ted Lloyd said.

Mason was recognized with the Outstanding

Senior Woman Athlete Award after completing a three-sport career for the Lady Bisons. A native of Tabernacle, N.J. she lettered in softball and track. In track she set a conference record of 1:05.93 in the 400 meter intermediate hurdles and won the 100 meter hurdles in 15.53.

A physical education major, she compiled a 3.73 grade point average

Ogburn, a four year letterman in track, was the 1985 Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference shot put champion with a throw of 155-103/4. He also was selected as an NAIA Academic All-American in 1985. Ogburn was an All-AIC honoree in 1985 and 1986.

A native of Warren, Mich., he recorded a 3.32 grade point average as a marketing major.

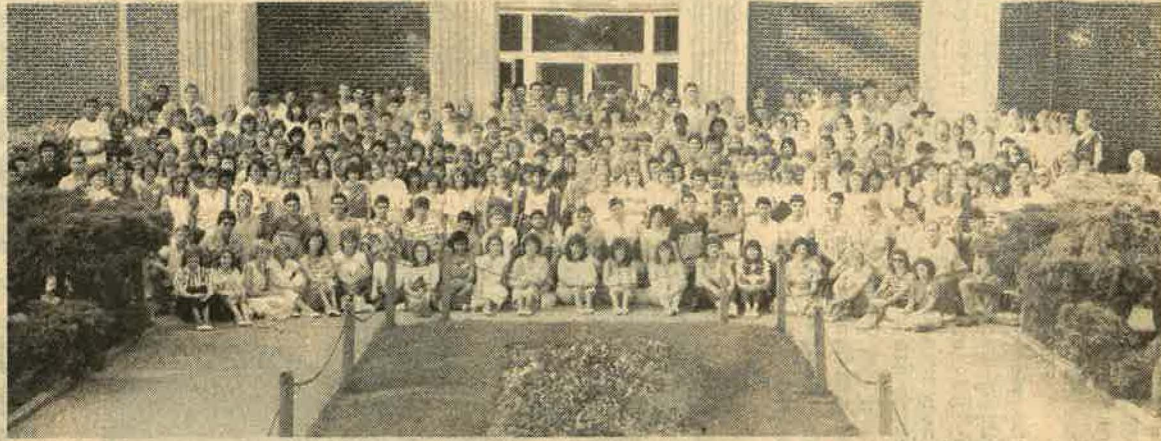

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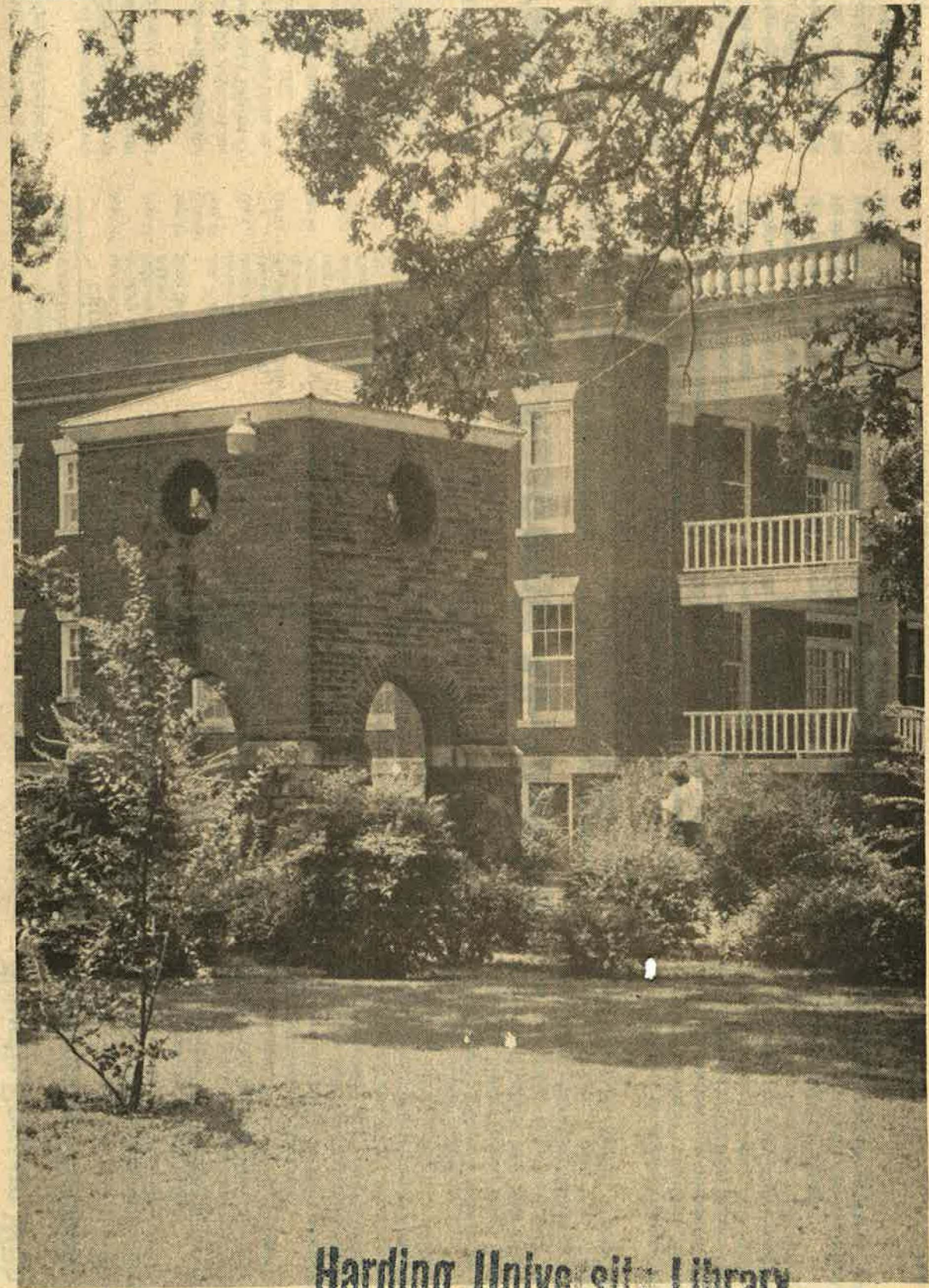
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
