Multi-Year Campaign Announced At November Trustees' Meeting

Harding University's trustees at their Nov. 4 meeting formally announced the administration's five-year Beyond Excellence campaign to position the university for expanded areas of service during the approaching decade.

The multi-year campaign (1988-1992) designated a \$25 million goal for current and capital projects and identified \$40 million in endowment needs. The \$65 million campaign is the largest ever undertaken by Harding.

President David Burks announced at the trustees' meeting that more than \$9

million in advance gifts and pledges had already been secured in the campaign.

The Beyond Excellence campaign follows an intensive year-long strategic planning period involving all Harding's faculty and staff. In the strategic planning, priorities were established and opportunities were identified which have the greatest potential for success in the future.

Among the major recommendations and goals of the Beyond Excellence campaign are:

 intensive recruiting to increase the number of Bible majors by providing additional scholarships;

- greater emphasis on developing outreach programs for the Church using Harding students and faculty;

 increased resources for Bible instruction;

 setting faculty salaries at the national average of all church-related schools;

- raising the percentage of terminal degrees held by faculty members from 50 to 70 percent by 1992;

 providing innovative faculty enrichment projects during the summer months through the creation of a faculty develop-

Telecommunications System Scheduled for Fall

In the fall of 1969, there was one pay phone in the stairwell of each floor in Harding University residence halls.

Next fall, barring unforeseen difficulty in laying cable and preparing lines, every room will have its own telephone as part of the standard furnishings for students living on campus.

The new campus-wide telecommunications system will have 1,800 stations, "twice the size of Kensett's," said John Nunnally, director of the Department of Information Services. Local service will be provided as a part of the student's room and board expense.

"It is quite rare that we can

provide an important service like this to our students at a cost lower than they were paying before and still benefit the university," Nunnally said. "That was our first priority. As soon as we were told to look into the possibilities of a campus telecommunications system, Dr. Burks said, 'we don't want to do this unless it's good for the students."

Details for long distance service have not been finalized, but students will be able to subscribe to long distance service individually. Each student who subscribes will be issued a phone card and billed for calls charged to his personal card number. "In-

dividual bills should be a great improvement over the present system where roommates have to determine who owes what from a single bill," Nunnally said.

The system is estimated to save a student 25 percent of the current cost for telephone service. Charges for local service will be eliminated by including telephone service in the room rates along with other utilities. A moderate increase in room rent will be charged.

Harding's benefit will be long term. "Combining the volume of university administrative long distance with the volume of student long distance greatly reduces the rate per minute of the service," Nunnally said. "Through this means, we are able to provide the student long distance at a price which is competitive with any long distance provider and still offset the majority of the university's telecommunications expense," he added. "The student wins twice in lower telephone costs at present and in lower college cost in the future as university expenses are offset."

The telecommunications system will operate through a PBX located in the basement of the administration building. An office manager will oversee operations, and a full-time technician will eventually be a part of the staff.

The system will also provide a four-digit direct inward dial

phone number for every office on campus.

"We will still have a general number for Harding University from which calls can be transferred to other numbers, but each phone will also have individual numbers which do not require transfer from a main number," Nunnally explained.

At the November trustees' meeting, Burks gave a report summarizing activity on the Beyond Excellence campaign. He reported on the completion of the expansion of the American Heritage Center Cafeteria and the renovation of Pattie Cobb Hall.

During the meeting, the trustees approved another part of the campaign, a \$600,000 telecommunications program to provide telephone service to the campus.

The advance gifts and pledges reported to the trustees included totals from two successful fund raising projects - an alumni phonathon and a faculty/staff fund drive (See page 8).

Altman Resigns Position To Return to the Classroom

Dr. Ted Altman, vice president for student affairs, has resigned from that position to teach in the department of health and physical education and to serve as assistant athletic director. The resignation becomes effective May 8 following spring commencement exercises.

Altman has directed the student affairs area at Harding for 17 years, serving first as dean of students, and then as vice president since 1979.

In his resignation statement, Altman cited his reasons for leaving. "I've directed the student personnel area longer than anyone in Harding's history. I believe it is time for me to serve in other areas. I'm going back to my first love. Physical education and athletics is really where I want to be," he said.

Altman joined the Harding faculty in 1963. He attended Southwestern

Oklahoma State University for his undergraduate degree. He earned the master's degree from Western State College in Colorado and the doctorate from North Texas State University.

Dr. Harry Olree, athletic director and chairman of the health and physical education department, said Altman will be assisting in the administration of the university's athletic program and teaching half time in the department.

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Nursing School Reaccredited

The School of Nursing has received continuing accreditation for eight years following extensive review and on-site studies by the National League for Nursing.

Following submission of a self-study review, Dr. Nancy Langston of the University of North Carolina and Dr. Jean Paletta of Seton Hall spent a week on the campus in February reviewing the program, personnel and documents. The approval is indicative that the School has met state and national criteria for bac-

calaureate nursing education.

"We are pleased that this full accreditation has been granted because the first goal of our faculty was toward this end," said Dr. Cathleen Shultz, dean. "Our aim is to have a quality program for students who come to Harding."

Other goals of the School include attaining optimum student enrollment while continuing to pursue excellence within the curriculum; supporting the university's total goals and mission; enhancing faculty, student and staff relationships by maximizing individual self worth and personal and professional development; and obtaining the necessary resources for faculty and staff to meet the responsibilities of their positions.

The Arkansas State Board of Nursing review is scheduled for the fall of 1989 and the faculty has begun its work on the review report.

Shultz is one of 12 full time and five adjunct professors in the School. Currently, 142 Harding students are majoring in nursing.

The system will provide some calling features which are not currently available to students, without additional charge. These include call waiting, distinctive ringing and limited call transfer.

"We hope to test a voice mail system for future availability to everyone on the system," Nunnally said. "This would be like a big, shared answering machine on which users could leave messages, transfer messages from phone to phone or reply to a voice mailbox," he added. The voice mail system would require an additional fee, "probably about \$2 a month," Nunnally estimated.

New Men's Residence Hall Slated for Use in August

A new dormitory for men is under construction on the lots just went of Harbin Hall where rock houses were formerly located. The \$2 million project is being constructed using modified blueprints from Harbin Hall.

When completed, the 206-capacity facility will form a quadrangle with Harbin. A parking lot to the west of the residence hall will accommodate 100 cars, leaving three large oak trees on the lot intact.

With remodeling of the housing area in the American Heritage Center to begin in May, students who lived in that facility will be housed in the new residence hall. An additional 65 students can also be housed in the new dormitory.

According to Bill Ryan,

physical plant engineer, the new residence hall will have an outside appearance like Harbin, but will be carpeted and pre-wired for computers and television. Provision has also been made for accommodating handicapped students.

Construction is scheduled for completion August 1, 1989.

American Studies Institute To Expand Present Programs

The American Studies Institute was established at Harding this fall to expand the university's emphasis on free enterprise and citizenship education. Dr. James W. Carr, vice president for educational services, is executive director of the Institute and Dr. Bob Reely, director of the Center for Management Excellence, is associate executive director.

The American Studies Institute (ASI) will expand the services and programs currently being offered by Harding's award-winning American Studies Program, which began in 1953. Numerous honor medals from Freedoms Foundation in Valley Forge, Pa., have been awarded to the program during its 35-year history.

ASI will conduct seminars and conferences nationwide for national opinion leaders. This new thrust for Harding will utilize the school's American Heritage Conference Center when it is renovated in 1989.

Other new ASI programs will include small business entrepreneurial development, management consulting services, multi-media programs and the publishing of a periodic newsletter from the Institute.

A major part of ASI's program will continue to be the Distinguished Lecture Series which brings leaders in business, government and education to the Harding campus for presentations. ASI will also continue the educational tours for Harding's honor students and the summer Youth Citizenship Seminars for high school students.

Dr. Don Diffine, director of the Belden Center for Private Enterprise Education, and Dr. David Tucker, director of the Walton Program, will assist with specific functional programs of the ASI.

Harding Education Students Honored with State Scholarships

Seven Harding students were awarded Paul Douglas Teacher scholarships totaling \$29,194 for the 1988-89 academic year.

Among the criteria for acceptance, applicants must be Arkansas residents, have ranked in the top 10 percent of their high school graduating class or have a GED standard score of 62 or higher, and have a cumulative college grade point average of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale and a minimum of a 3.0 grade point average in their major subject area.

Harding recipients of the scholarships were Mary Crittenden of West Memphis, receiving \$3,774; Shirley Denney of Judsonia, \$3,507; Renee Gentry of Searcy, \$4,475; Sharla Hastings of Rosston, \$3,297; Tambra Herman of Searcy, \$5,000; Karla Olree of Searcy, \$4,141; and Debra Pierce of Pine Bluff, \$5,000.

Recipients are outstanding students who have demonstrated interest in a teaching career at the preschool, elementary or secondary school level. A promise to serve as a teacher after graduation is also required.

"I am extremely pleased with the quality of students we have at Harding," said Dr. Bobby Coker, dean of the School of Education. "This is one indication of that fact. Having such good students challenges us to provide the very best learning opportunities possible to help them achieve their potential."


Harding students received 16 percent of the teacher scholarships, or one of every six awarded. Students from 30 Arkansas colleges and universities were eligible to receive the awards.

Best known for his 18 years as an NFL quarter-back, Tarkenton is heavily involved in business administration. He is chairman of a number of companies, including KnowledgeWare, Tarkenton & Conn, Tarkenton & Watkins Insurance Group, Tarkenton & Addams, and Tarkenton Speakers' Bureau.

Tarkenton is also a writer. His book, *Playing to Win — Strategies for Business Success*, enjoyed brisk sales and has been made into a provocative film by NFL films. His newest book, *How to Motivate People*, is a step-by-step guide to greater productivity. He serves on the Boards of Directors of Coca-Cola

Crosby is the author of the international best seller, Quality is Free. He is chief executive of Philip Crosby Associates, a quality management consulting and teaching firm in Winter Park, Fla.



Schubert, an Oklahoma native, is the founder of the Center for Church Growth in Houston, Texas, and director of research for the Eastern European Mission, which prints and distributes Bibles behind the Iron Curtain. He holds the B.A. and M.A. degrees from Abilene Christian University and the Ed.D. from the University of Southern California in Los Angeles.

Lewis is a scholar, author and educator. He has taught at Harding Graduate School of Religion in Memphis since 1958 and at Harding College from 1954-58. He has made 28 trips to the Holy Land and was a fellow at the American Schools of Oriental Research and the Albright Institute of Archaeological Research in 1967-68 and 1983-84, respectively. He holds doctorate degrees from Harvard University and Hebrew Union College.

Rogers has been minister of the Centerville Church of Christ in Centerville, Tenn., for 32 years. He has traveled extensively - to Israel, London, England and India, behind the Iron Curtain and three times to the Holy Land. He has written several booklets and is a speaker at many lectureships throughout the nation. He received the B.A. degree from David Lipscomb College and the M.A. from Harding Graduate School of Religion.

Each received a framed certificate designating his honor from the university, presented by President David Burks.


Katie Wesche organizations. She and her



















Limited Edition Print Commissioned for Donors

Beginning in 1988 Harding gave special recognition to donors of \$250 or more. The previous recognition level was \$200.



Harding Family Supports Campaign

Members of Harding's faculty and staff have pledged \$702,297 thus far in the five-year Beyond Excellence campaign.

During the six-week fund raising project, 426 faculty and staff members in Searcy responded positively to the appeal for financial assistance. Ninety-six per cent of the salaried faculty and administrative staff responded with a pledge and approximately 67 per

cent of the hourly wage employees made a pledge.

In the project, 83 per cent of all those contacted were able to make a pledge. The average gift was approximately \$1,650. Most of those making a pledge will give through the university's payroll deduction plan.

The totals for the faculty and staff will increase when the gifts and pledges from the faculty and staff on the Memphis campus are combined with the totals from the Searcy campus. The entire project among faculty and staff members is expected to be completed early in 1989.

The solicitation of the faculty and staff is a single part of the Beyond Excellence campaign.

Members of the Board of Trustees and President's Council and alumni and friends of the school will also be asked to be a part of the five-year campaign.

Alumni Phonathon Raises \$582,000

Administrators, faculty, staff, students and friends of Harding spent a busy 11 nights during September dialing for dollars.

Calling each of the evenings between 6 and 10 p.m., the volunteers contacted 3,116 alumni households in a nationwide phonathon raising \$582,653 in gifts and pledges. An additional \$89,000 is expected to be received in matching gifts from employers of alumni.

The phonathon came as the result of a \$1.25 million challenge from the Mabee Foundation of Tulsa. To meet the conditions of the grant, Harding must secure \$2.5 million in gifts and pledges by Dec. 31.

The Mabee grant will be used in a \$5 million renovation and expansion project involving three buildings on the Harding campus. The three structures are the John Mabee American Heritage Center, Pattie Cobb Residence Hall and Beaumont Memorial Library.

During the phonathon 1,661 (53.3 percent) of those contacted made a three-year pledge or a one-time gift to the project. The actual calling was done by 104 different volunteers.

The average pledge was \$525 and the average one-time gift was \$59. Each alumnus contacted was asked to consider making a three-year pledge totaling \$1,000.

Dr. Dean Priest, dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, raised the highest total in pledges at \$58,000. Searcy insurance agent and President's Council member Bill Harris completed the most calls (170). Dr. Clifton L. Ganus III, professor of music, had the highest percentage of positive response with 98 percent of his calls resulting in gifts or pledges.

The phonathon was conducted by Rowan McLeod and Brett Kirkman of Harding's Development Office.

'Arkansas Times' Features Harding Alumnus

It's typical of Bill Dempsey that he credits most of his considerable achievements as a science teacher to his students.

"Kid power, that's what I call it," he says. "I see just a world of untapped resources with these high school kids. They can do anything."

That may be a slight exaggeration, but the students at Texarkana's Arkansas High, under Dempsey's tutelage, certainly have done a lot. The school has dominated its regional Science and Engineering Fair competition, sending students to the international meet almost every year, and for six years in a row Arkansas High has won first place in the Physics Olympics at North Texas State University.

Along the way, Dempsey has collected a few honors himself. In recent years he was selected for America's Teacher-in-Space Project, he received the Presidential Award for Science Teaching, and he was named "technology-using teacher of the year" by *Electronic Learning* magazine, which ran a cover story on him.

Slender, bearded, 41-yearold Dempsey returned to his hometown of Texarkana to teach 20 years ago, after earning a degree in chemistry from Harding College in Searcy. (He also has a master's degree in interdisciplinary studies from East Texas State University in Texarkana.) Three years later he took his first students to an International Science Fair. One student that year made a state-ofthe-art liquid-crystal readout, beginning a long string of "kid power" successes.

One of Dempsey's students used photocells to invent a grading machine. Another, now a pharmacist, grew crystals and photographed their progress on a film loop. "You can see from nothing to the growth of a crystal about a quarter of an inch long," Dempsey says. "High school kid!" His enthusiasm seems boundless when he describes his students' triumphs.

One student decided to study bats. "She was interested in their sonar navigational systems. She turned her little bats loose in a room-sized box, and with a special device she photographed them dodging threads of string. I'll never forget a photograph produced by this high school girl of a bat approaching a target, and you can see the thread is right in his wing's path. He knows right where that string is, so he's pulling that wing in. That was just one photograph that was so marvelous. You could learn so much from that, and she did it."

Arkansas High first entered the Physics Olympics seven years ago, and won second place, competing with about 50 top schools in Texas. Since that initial try, the Razorbacks, the only Arkansas school entered, have come in first every year.

Ingenuity pays off in the 11 events of the Physics Olympics. Take, for example, the egg drop. An egg, dropped 40 feet, must reach the ground without damage — and ahead of competing eggs. Parachuting the egg down is too slow. The first year, Dempsey's crew packed the egg in foam rubber inside an aluminum can. The egg made it intact, but the large mass of foam rubber slowed its descent.

"One of the girls came up with the idea of airbags," Dempsey says. "If you print

40 feet to concrete and survive with no other padding, they believe in car airbags. The point is, the relationship between physics and something that is protecting you in a car can be made by this little event that we participate in."

Dempsey was one of 11,000 applicants for the Teacher-in-Space Project,

convention in Little Rock and I said, 'Those people getting on that space shuttle are courageous, because they may die. And you better believe me,' I said, 'I don't think they will. The technology is sound; we've had 25 successful flights; but they're going to be human beings flying in a machine at five miles per second. That's faster than a thirty-aught-six bullet.'

Dempsey was in the classroom on the memorable morning of the January, 1986, Challenger launch, watching the event on a television fed by a satellite dish his students had built. "I saw the explosion. I don't know how many minutes passed, but I just turned to the kids and I said, 'They're gone. They're gone.' Well, when I told them that, they were just stunned. I guess we sat there for 45 minutes, just

the suspension bridge to the tension in the cables to the vector forces at the top, which have to act downward on the pole. We were worried about the dimensions, because the cable had to be constructed away from the site, from models. But there was no excess cable. And the kids went, 'It worked!' I was just as amazed as they were."

Among the students' other efforts have been a hovercraft, which is used at football rallies, a planetarium dome, and a sound system for a lecture hall. And now Dempsey has a new project under way: building sailboats.

"And then teach the kids how to sail 'em, maybe have a little regatta at the end of the year," he says. "Sailing is pure physics. Kids working on something meaningful, they kind of forget they're 'doing school.'

this, it'll give away a secret that I've never told anybody. But I'd love for this to get out. It can only improve the competition. All you have is a little plastic bag in front of the egg; you don't have to have all of this foam, so you can keep weight to a minimum.

"And those students, when they see an egg fall and one of 114 selected.
After Christa McAuliffe and her backup Barbara Morgan were chosen, Dempsey and the others were named Space Ambassadors. From the beginning, both he and his wife, Sherry, accepted the risks.

glued to the screen. It was a black day. I'll tell you."

He and his wife have three children. If he had the opportunity to go into space today, he's not sure how he would respond. "I would have to say to myself, 'I've got a six-year-old girl. We've got to think about this.' "

Of all his students' group projects, a campus suspension bridge was one of the most outstanding.

"Everything about a bridge is physics," Dempsey says, "from the catenary curve of

Cross Country Teams Win District Championship

Chasing after yet another pair of Arkansas Inter-collegiate Conference/NAIA District 17 cross country championships, both the Bison and Lady Bison harriers successfully defended their titles in fine form Nov. 8 on their home course.

Harding runners also won individual honors and a total of 10 Black and Gold competitors earned all conference and district awards. The team wins were an unprecedented 19th in a row for the Bisons and the third straight for the Lady Bisons.

"It was a team effort for both teams," head coach Ted Lloyd said of the wins. "The men were pushed, but our middlemen moved up well and proved to be the difference. Our ladies dominated their race, but they pulled for each other. This has to be one of the more gratifying wins because of the way we won."

The Bisons followed the lead of junior Jon Murray to score 39 points. Murray won the men's race with a time of 25:46 over the five-mile course. The Carthage, Mo., native finished second behind teammate Rich Lockhart in last year's race.

Chasing Murray were sophomores Mark Halbert and Ken Edwards, and seniors Eric VanMatre and Marty Koonce. Halbert, of Lakewood, Colo., finished eighth in 26:43, while Carthage native Edwards ran a time of 26:54 for 10th place. Just ahead of him, in ninth, was VanMatre, who is from Rolla, Mo. His time was 26:50. Koonce, a North Little Rock, Ark., native, wrapped up the Harding scorers with an 11th place time of 27:00.

The Bisons were hard pressed for the first time in several seasons. Central Arkansas put three runners in the top 10, and Henderson State challenged with two runners in the elite group. UCA finished second with 47 points, followed by HSU with 59, UA-Monticello with 89, Ouachita Baptist with 127 and Southern Arkansas with 165.

"There is a lot of pressure on us (to win the AIC title)," Murray said of the Bisons' cross country dynasty. "The alumni came back (for Homecoming the previous weekend) and were asking us how it looked for the conference meet. They put a lot of pride in keeping the streak alive."

"I knew there were two or three other teams that would push us," Lloyd said. "Our guys ran their races to perfection."

Defending champion Cheryl Bednosky, a senior from Shelter Island, N.Y., outdistanced the field in the women's competition to break the course record. Her time of 17:26 over the five kilometer course was more than a minute better than second-place Melynda Davis' 18:44. Davis, a junior from Gresham, Ore., also finished second in 1987 after winning the individual title the year before.

Sophomore Tracy Parks of Pensacola, Fla., was third in 18:53, and freshman Kelsie Hutchison of Webb City, Mo., was fourth in 19:18.

Other Lady Bisons and their times and places were Margaret Eoff of Rogers, Ark., eighth in 20:12; Carrie Crider of Ft. Collins, Colo., 10th in 20:20; and Shirley Pollard of Lee's Summit, Mo., 11th in 20:51.

The Lady Bisons scored 17 points for first place, followed by Arkansas College with 72, Central Arkansas with 92, Hendrix College with 101, Arkansas Tech with 112, University of the Ozarks with 123 and UA-Monticello with 203.

Bailey said he was pleased with his team's performance, despite its sixth place finish in the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference standings.

"We were so close to the top, but we lost some critical matches by very close scores. Had the breaks gone our way a few times, we would have been one of the top teams in the conference," he said.

The play of five seniors kept the Lady Bisons within striking distance in all of their matches. Bailey lauded the play of Stephanie Alsup of Missoula, Mont., Sheryl Green of Arrington, Tenn., Laura Shifflet of Newberry, Mich., Onetta Gardner of Wichita, Kan., and Lisa Phillippi of Cincinnati. Ohio.

"All four have been great players for us. They've seen this program come from

Football Bisons Finish Season With a 4-6 Overall Record

A string of late-season bad luck proved fatal for the Bison football team's hopes for a berth in the NAIA playoffs. Despite a stretch of eight-weeks in which they were ranked in the nation's elite 25, the Bisons' postseason hopes were washed away with a 4-6 record.

"We played one of the toughest schedules of any team in the nation, and it finally caught up with us," said first-year head coach Larry Richmond. "When you play six top-20 teams, it's hard to keep your head above water."

The Bisons fared 1-5 against those squads that were ranked. Three of the teams are among the 16 invited to the NAIA playoffs. Two are undefeated and ranked in the nation's top five. The six national headliners combined for an outstanding 45-14-1 record in the regular season.

"We may hold the honor of having the best won-lost record for our opponents in the country," Richmond said. "I think that's one of the reasons we were ranked until the very end."

Harding entered the poll in the second week of the schedule after defeating Lane College 22-7 in Jackson, Tenn. That followed with a 21-16 victory

over NCAA Division II University of Missouri-Rolla on Alumni Field. Following the UMR win, Harding climbed to 12th in the nation.

A 35-6 setback to Southeastern Oklahoma in week three dropped the Bisons' ranking but they made it up with an impressive 27-14 home win over highly ranked Northwestern Oklahoma. Three consecutive losses followed against Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference foes Arkansas Tech (13-10), Henderson State (34-17) and UA-Monticello (27-0). All three were ranked at the

After a 34-6 Homecoming win-over Southern Arkansas, the Bisons slipped and slopped through the mud at Ouachita Baptist in a 28-14 loss. Still ranked 24th in the nation, Harding ended the season on a sour note by falling to top-ranked and undefeated Central Arkansas, 28-0, in an unusual Thursday night battle. UCA, Southeastern Oklahoma and UA-Monticello competed in the playoffs.


Several Bisons accumulated outstanding statistics during the year. Running backs Anthony Lowery and Chris Hill opened the season as the numbers one and two

rushers in the NAIA, but their pace slowed considerably after the middle of the schedule. Hill ended as the Bisons' top ballcarrier with 546 yards and seven touchdowns. Lowery added 522 yards and a score.

Quarterbacks Greg Cox and Tad Niblett combined for well over 1,000 yards passing. Cox, the junior incumbent, threw for 595 yards before succumbing to a rib injury midway through the year. Niblett, an able freshman, stepped in and passed for 719 yards and five scores. Their favorite receiver was Mike Alexander, the speedster who led the team in 1987. Alexander caught 36 passes for 549 yards and four TDs. Punter Mark Thomas ranked fifth in the conference with a 36.5 yard average. Sophomore free safety Pete Phillis pulled down four interceptions.

Hill was second in the AIC in kickoff returns, with a 23.2-yard average, and among the top 10 in scoring with 42 points. Freshman placekicker Pete Daniell proved to be the most efficient kicker in the AIC, booting 17 of 17 extra points and six of 10 field goals, for 35 points.


Defensively, linebackers John Spann, Brooks Davis and Joe Phillips topped the

Bison tackle charts. Spann led with 47 solo tackles and 92 assists, followed by Davis with 38 solos and 86 assists, and Phillips with 41 solos and 77 assists. Ends Alvin Henry and Kenwick Thompson shared the sacks and tackles for loss lead with eight sacks and seven lostyardage tackles each. Cornerback Eric Cook's seven broken up passes led the team.

Richmond and his staff are already hot on the recruiting trail, preparing for next year. "We're expecting big things with the men we have coming back," he said. "Our goals will again be high, but we think we'll be able to accomplish them. We have an outstanding group of individuals who are dedicated to the school and team."






