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
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National Advisory Board Appointed

Sam Walton and Jack Stephens Head List Of 20 Selected To Serve on ASI Board

Two prominent national businessmen will direct Harding's newly formed National Advisory Board for the American Studies Institute.

Little Rock investment banker, Jack Stephens and Wal-Mart founder Sam Walton will co-chair an advisory board of 20 national business, government and educational leaders.

Stephens and Walton will direct the National Advisory Board of Harding's American Studies Institute. Dr. David Burks, Harding's president, announced the creation of the board in July. The first meeting will be September 24.

to strengthen and enhance the effectiveness of the American Studies Institute," said Burks. The American Studies Institute was established in 1953.



NASA Awards \$100,000 Grant For Joint Venture Program

Harding University is one of nine schools nationwide chosen for a \$100,000 National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) JOVE Grant, according to an announcement made in June by Arkansas Senator Dale Bumpers. The grant, a NASA-university Joint Venture program, will enable three Harding University professors to analyze data from space science missions.

Dr. James Mackey and Dr. Lambert Murray, professors of physics, and Dr. Steve Baber, associate professor of mathematics and computer science, have been chosen for the JOVE program, which will be directed by Dr. James Dowdy, a 1971 graduate, in Huntsville.

"I am pleased that Harding University has been selected for this prestigious program," Senator Bumprs said. "It will be both stimulating and beneficial for students and professors, not only at Harding, but throughout the nation."

Mackey spent the entire summer at NASA's Douglass Space Flight Center in Huntsville, Ala. Baber spent ten days at the facility and Murray received his training during July.

The three will work for the next two years through electronic links with NASA researchers to analyze images of the sun's magnetic field taken from Skylab in 1973 and 1974.

Though the data is 17 years old, the Harding teachers will use new computer analysis techniques trying to yield new information.

Through electronic links with its own research teams, NASA will work with the professors to improve data collection from solar images taken above the earth's atmosphere. The grant will fund the research, allow the selected professors to attend a 10-week summer research

orientation at a NASA facility, and pay for equipment and travel.

In exchange, Harding will be involve undergraduate and graduate students in the research, and conduct an outreach program in space science for nearby secondary and elementary schools.

"We are delighted to be a part of the NASA-JOVE initiative project to involve colleges and universities in space research," Harding President David Burks said. "I know it will be meaningful to Harding, particularly to the faculty and students involved. We have had excellent relations with NASA in the past and I am looking forward to this renewed opportunity to work with them."

The JOVE program was begun in 1989 with six participating universities. By 1992, NASA plans to further expand the program to involve all agency facilities.

Certificate Program Begun in Counseling

The Harding Graduate Schoo of Religion will begin this fall offering a certificate in ministerial counseling designed especially for preachers, elders. A college degree will be required for admission. Courses must be taken for credit and completed with at least a grade of C in each course. 
Economics Team Wins Regional Contest

President and Mrs. David Burks, Mr. and Mrs. James Cone of Little Rock and Dr. and Mrs. Carl Mitchell of Searcy participated in the anniversary program. Cone is chairman of Harding's board of trustees and Mitchell is dean of the College of Bible and Religion.

At the anniversary celebration, Italian officials in the Ministry of Education announced that Harding has been granted status as "an American university in Italy." Harding's administrators

During the trip, Burks spoke in Oelsnitz at the only congregation of the Church of Christ in East Germany and also spoke in West Berlin and Regensburg.

Aaron is a 1981 graduate of Harding who holds the Master of Social Work and is licensed by the State of Arkansas. Formerly a social worker with Arkansas Children's Hospital in Little

Rock, she will be an assistant professor of behavioral sciences.

Barden, a graduate of Harding Academy in Searcy, received the B.S. in chemistry from Harding University in 1989. He is currently pursuing a master's degree and will be an associate instructor of physical science.

Custer is a 1975 graduate of Harding who holds the Master of Theology from Harding Graduate School of Religion in Memphis. He and his wife, the former Suzanne Groover, have been working as missionaries in Brazil. He will be the visiting professor of missions.

Graduate School Offers New Degree

Harding University Graduate School of Religion in Memphis will begin the fall semester offering the Master of Arts in Religion degree on a new schedule.

The M.A.R. Track II degree is designed to be completed by attending school in the evenings and on Saturdays, avoiding most job conflicts.

The new degree program is especially designed for three groups: church leaders, ministers, teachers and others who cannot enroll during the regular daytime schedule of classes; those interested in ministry as a second career; and those interested in personal spiritual enrichment. The M.A.R. Track II degree program consists of 42 graduate credit hours. Included in these credit hours is a Supervised Ministry Experience within a local congregational setting where the student applies his or her studies in situations that benefit the local congregation. No undergraduate course work in religion is required as a prerequisite for this degree.

Armstrong Scholarship Fund Established

An endowed fund honoring J. N. Armstrong, Harding's first president, and his wife, Woodson Harding Armstrong, has been established by the couple's niece.

Mrs. Gertrude Paine Deese, granddaughter of James A. Harding, made the initial contribution to the fund. She is a retired school teacher now living in Winter Park, Fla. The university is named for her grandfather.

Born in 1870 on a little farm near Gadsden, Tenn., Armstrong was the third of eight children. He attended quished the presidency, but pioneer administrator and he remained as a teacher of Greek and chairman of the Bible department until his death in 1944. Mrs. Deese taught for 22 years at David Lipscomb High School in Nashville, Tenn., prior to her retirement. She is a 1936 graduate of Harding. Her association with the school began in 1930 when she enrolled as a junior in Harding Academy.

She will help build the Armstrong Fund through annual gifts and through a deferred gift in her estate. The annual income earned by the Armstrong Fund will be spent to strengthen the university's entire program, with priority being given to faculty

Librarian Retires After 30 Years

Winnie Bell, director of Beaumont Memorial Library, always claimed she'd work for Harding for nothing provided she could figure out a way to survive. After more than 30 years on the payroll, she was faced with that very opportunity at the end of only one week of her official retirement date from the university, June 30.

So what did she do? "I decided I better prove it," Bell said. By July 10 she became the first volunteer worker on hand at Brackett Library, staying on the job faithfully as the 345,000 volumes of books were moved from temporary quarters back to the new \$1.6 million library which will be ready for use in the fall.

How could she not be interested in the project! It was Bell who had engineered the complicated job of directing some of the volumes to the Administration Auditorium and the remainder of the library's stacks to a warehouse on campus without the help of professional movers and with minimal delays in May of 1989 when the renovation and expansion started.

Also, it was Bell, according to all knowledgeable sources, who had steered the collection toward computerization during a period when many other libaries and librarians were nowhere close to that direction. Self-taught, in the last five years she has beome proficient in LOTUS and d-Base as well as word processing. "Her enthusiasm for information deivery via computers has propelled the library into its commitment to state-of-the-art electronic information delivery," said Suzanne Spurrier, Bell's assistant for several years who has now been named Harding's library director.

"Now we feel that she's somewhat like Moses," said Spurrier. "She's been the one so vitally responsible for all this — and now it's hard to imagine she doesn't even get to have an office in this beautiful new 'promised land." But Bell only laughs, saying, "This is the best of both worlds. I can come to work at my convenience and leave the problems with you when I go home!" As an unwed lady with four daughters, 10 grandchildren and three great grandchildren, however, skirting the usual would seem nothing unusual for Winnie Bell. Her decision to become legal guardian for four young girls at a time when single parent adoptions were not "fashionable" was only one of the progressive turns her life has taken from its beginning on a farm back in Waxahachie, Texas.

Winnie was a very young child when the Depression hit, but she joined the rest of the tenant farmer family in chopping cotton, hoeing corn and doing all the other tasks, including driving the mules, required to survive.

When she finished high school, she got a job at Kress Five and Dime store, earning \$8 a week ("...but I'd worked up to \$13 a week by the time I quit," she recalls). Her older sister, Mildred, taking advantage of the jobs available as a result of the start of World War II, had landed a job in Dallas at a whopping \$1 per hour wages. "We thought that was something," Winnie says.

When the War ended Mildred had managed to save \$598. She made a bold suggestion to Winnie. "Why don't we go to college!" was Mildred's thought.

Encouraged by a letter from the late L. C. Sears, Dean of Harding, assuring them they could get a job, the sisters set out for Searcy and Harding, their first venture outside the state of Texas. Their arrival on campus provided another couple of firsts — a taxi ride from Kensett and dinner in a cafeteria. The two worked their way to graduation in 1949. (Dr. Mildred Bell is retired as chairman of Harding's department of Home Economics.)

After graduation, Winnie moved to Wewoka, Okla., to use her business degree working in a bank.

In 1959, at the suggestion of Harding Librarian Annie May Alston Lewis, Winnie came back to Searcy. She attacked library science with the same enthusaism she'd always known, and found another true calling. She was named head librarian in 1975.

Winnie started hearing about

characteristic pioneer spirit, Winnie investigated the new field, learned there were grants available, made application, and received a grant. Some others had done so, but made no progress toward implementation. "I decided I wasn't going to let that happen, so I started digging in the manuals. I had no one to help me understand what I was doing, and I made a lot of mistakes. At least I learned a lot of what not to do," she said. Not giving up, she continued to learn and even advanced as she went along, increasing not only her skills but the equipment as well. Currently the library isn't totally computerized, but it's well on its way, thanks to Winnie Bell.

In the meantime, her daughters were growing up, and her widowed mother — Mrs. Ineeta Bell, who died last year — had moved to Searcy to live with Winnie and Mildred. So life was becoming routine for Winnie Bell? Not so.

Word via the late Jimmie Lovell of California regarding World Bible School materials sounded appealing to Winnie. She quietly began working on enrolling students and grading lessons at the Downtown Church of Christ in Searcy. But soon the influx of mail became such that she needed help.

Comfortable now with her expertise in computerization, she purchased a computer for her home and applied her d-Base expertise to tame unwieldy WBS lists, make progress. Over the last 15 years, she has been instrumental in teaching more than 37,000 students. During the time, she has enlisted the assistance of others and currently has a volunteer coming to her home two hours each day to work on the WBS materials.

"Sometimes I stop and ask myself "What am I doing?"," she says, "but then I think, 'God has decided I can do this and I'm just going to do my best at whatever I attempt." Maybe I couldn't speak publicly, but I could **show** others the Gospel through World Bible School."

And Winnie Bell moves along. She and Mildred have some plans for travel. With her daughters living in Tennessee, Arkansas, Oklahoma and Hawaii, no doubt she'll have occasion to do some visiting with them. "But I'll probably continue to come to the library a couple of days a week," she says.

Spurrier described what may best sum up the reason for Winnie Bell's thinking about the continued connection with the library. "Her quiet manner and frequent giggle belie her wisdom, foresight, creativity and initiative," Spurrier said. "She is committed to Harding University and the Library's vital role in Harding's mission to Educate for Eternity. Her managerial choices have emphasized her conviction that students are our raison d'etre."

and lectures are planned on the Harding campus and in major metropolitan cities nationwide.

Members of the advisory board will assist the American Studies Institute in the selection of speakers, topics to be discussed, the location of programs, audiences to be reached, and materials to be developed and distributed.

Harding's American Studies Institute has a 37-year record of achievement. Faculty, administrators and students have been recognized with more honor medals from the Freedoms Foundation of Valley Forge than any other university in the nation. The American Studies program has been recognized as the outstanding campus program in American on three different occasions.

Professors Attend Lilly Endowment Workshop

Four of Harding's College of Arts and Sciences professors were among participants invited from 25 colleges and universities to the 1990 Lilly Endowment Workshop on Liberal Arts at Colorado College in June.

Dr. Dean Priest, Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, was accompanied by Dr. Dennis Organ and Dr. Larry Long, professors of English; and Dr. Travis Thompson, associate professor of math and computer science, for the prestigious workshop.

According to Ralph Lundgren, education program director for Lilly, the Endowment's long-standing commitment to supporting liberal arts programs and teaching at the undergraduate level is based on the belief that the overall success of colleges and universities depends on the vitality of their undergraduate program.

The Endowment invites a different group each summer to send a team of four to the workshop essentially to share information. Formerly sponsored by the Danforth Foundation, Lilly assumed sponsorship of the

Each institution selects a liberal arts problem or issue that its team will address during the two-week workshop. "The workshop," Lundgren said, "makes possible rich connections among individuals, disciplines and institutions that produce creative solutions to compelling liberal arts issues."

The Harding group chose faculty development as its issue, basing the decision on the university's recentlycompleted new evaluation program and a study of the general education curriculum.

"It seemed natural," Priest said, "that we should have a faculty development program to help faculty members develop in light of their evaluations and also to develop new course content relative to the new general education program. Larry, Dennis, Travis and I were delighted to work on the program." For years Harding has encouraged and assisted faculty to achieve the Ph.D. A more broadly based faculty development program will help faculty do a better job in the classroom.

During the workshop, each of the four faculty members lead two seminnars which addressed major issues concerning undergraduate education from the perspectives of curricula, legal, ethical, administrative, historical and developmental. Priest said the team returned with a model "which we think will be of great help to the Harding faculty in keeping current."


"The seminars themselves were very interesting and helpful," Organ said. "One I attended on "The International Curriculum" was especially helpful to me in getting concepts for our general education curriculum in addressing global literacy."

Priest pronounced the col-

NAIA Honors **Prock**



Former Bison head football coach John Prock has been elected for membership to the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) Hall of Fame. The announcement came from NAIA Executive Director Dr. Jefferson Farris.

Prock, who retired as Harding's head coach in 1987 after 24 years, will be inducted in the Hall's Football Coach category. Formal induction ceremonies will take place at the NAIA Football Coaches Association meeting next January at the New Orleans Hilton Hotel in New Orleans, La.

Prock led the Bisons to Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference championships in 1972 and 1976. He was named NAIA District 17 Coach of the Year in 1969, 1972 and 1976, and NAIA Area V Coach of the Year in 1976. His 1972 squad finished the season 10-1, including a 30-27 win over Langston University in the Cowboy Bowl in Lawton, Okla., and ranked sixth in the final NAIA poll.

"I have admired him both on and off the field for a long time," former Central Arkansas head coach Harold Horton said of Prock. "He has projected the qualities of honesty, passion, leadership and care. He received from his players the best that they had, and regardless of what profession one is in, this is what we all are seeking ... He is very deserving of this honor."

The Hollis, Okla., native, who serves as professor of health, physical education and recreation, was a light weight, hardnosed guard for Southwestern (Okla.) State University, graduating in 1955. He served as an assistant coach under former University of Oklahoma great Carl Allison at Clinton, Okla. High School until Allison came to Harding in 1959 as head coach. A year later, Prock joined Allison at Harding as an assistant, and served in that capacity until 1964, when Allison stepped down.

When Prock retired, he was the sixth winningest active head coach in the NAIA with 114 wins. During his tenure, he coached 10 NAIA All-Americans, four Academic All-Americans and 63 All-AIC honorees.

"I'm proud to consider Coach Prock as one of my best personal friends," said Ouachita Baptist head coach Buddy Bob Benson, who is a member of the Hall. "Perhaps the greatest legacy he left was the many Bisons who today are making substantial contributions to their communities and cities. John Prock always emphasized sportsmanship, high character and integrity in his players, and he touched many young lives in a most positive way."

Prock is married to the former Charlene Knight, and they have three children, Mrs. Ronnie Peacock, Mrs. Lee Daniel and Mr. Cam Prock, and eight grandchildren.

Prock, who is a charter member of the Harding Athletic Hall of Fame, is the eighth individual from Harding to be named to the NAIA Hall.

Senior Track Athletes Receive Scholar Awards

Seniors Sharon Coleman and Jon Murray have been named the recipients of the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference's Downing-Swift-Wallace and Cliff Shaw Scholar-Athlete Awards. AIC Commissioner Harry Hall made the announcement.

Coleman, a three-year letterman on the Lady Bison track and field team, graduated summa cum laude in May with a Bachelor of Business Administration degree in management. She achieved a perfect 4.00 grade point average on 130 hours of college work.

A member of Alpha Chi National College Honor Society and Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities, Coleman was awarded the school's Wall Street Journal Award. presented annually to the student in the School of Business with the highest grade point average. She was honored as the first recipient of the Baldor Scholar-Athlete Award in women's outdoor track.

Coleman served as vicepresident for Delta Mu Delta business honor society, and was a member of the school's Marketing Research Team that placed nationally. She was also a member of College Republicans, Harding's Future Alumni Communication Team, American Studies, Campus Ministry and the school's athletic committee.

As a member of the Lady Bison track team, Coleman excelled in the sprint events and was named All-AIC as a senior. She finished second in both the 100-meter and 200-meter dashes and was a pionship in Stephenville.

Murray, a four-year letterman on the Bison cross country and track and field teams, graduated magna cum laude in May with a Bachelor of Business Administration degree in management. He achieved a 3.79 grade point average on 135 hours of college work.

A member of Alpha Chi National College Honor Society and Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities, Murray received the senior management award for his work in the classroom. For his athletic endeavors, he earned NAIA All-American honors in indoor and outdoor track, and was a fourtime All-AIC/NAIA District 17 selection in cross country, and three-time All-AIC Outdoor Track and Field Championship. In 1990, he became the first runner ever to win the 10,000 meter, 5,000 meter and 1,500 meter runs in the same AIC championship meet. He holds the AIC record in the 10,000 meter run, with a time of 31:03.3.

At the 1990 NAIA Outdoor Track and Field Cham-

Murray capped off his collegiate career by being named the winner of the first-ever Baldor Scholar-Athlete Award for men's cross country, indoor track and field and outdoor track and field.

The prestigious Cliff Shaw and Downing-Swift-Wallace Scholar-Athlete Awards are given annually to the senior AIC male and female athletes posting the highest academic grade point average who have earned at least two athletic letters in AIC-sponsored sports. Twenty-two Harding men and women have won the award since the men's award was first presented in 1957 and the women's in 1984.

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Returning Lettermen Provide Optimistic Outlook

Sports historians will remember the fall of 1989 as the season of "Bison Mania." For Harding University football fans, their team had finally defied the odds and reached the summer of the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference.

Relegated to either last or next to last in most of the AIC's preseason polls, the Bisons fought through a schedule that included eight nationally ranked teams to post a 7-4 record. The highlight came in the regular season finale when Harding upset top-ranked Central Arkansas to gain a share of the conference title with the Bears and earn the league's automatic berth to the NAIA Division I playoffs.

If predictions hold true to form, the Bisons should be near the top again as 19 starters and 37 lettermen return. Only four seniors graduated from last year's team.

"When you start discussing last year, you have to center much of the attention on the UCA game," recalled Larry Richmond, who was selected the AIC and NAIA Region VI Coach of the Year. "It's rare that the conference championship and playoff bid comes down, to the last game of the season. It was truly the highlight of the year."

The cinderella story ended in the first round of the playoffs when the Bisons fell to a seasoned Emporia State (Kan.) team, 38-6. The Hornets went on to finish runner-up in the playoffs. The Bisons wrapped up the banner campaign with their highest season-ending ranking in 17 years, at 9th in the nation.

"It was a tremendous

achievement that we accomplished last year, but it's even harder to repeat," the coach said. "There are a lot of positive things that come out of that kind of season. We had a banner recruiting year, it boosted school spirit, and it put our program in the limelight. Hopefully, the winning will be contagious."

Defense, Richmond says, will be the squad's strength with 10 starters returning. Tradition should play a part as Harding usually ranks among the national leaders defensively, but experience

at virtually every position and great depth in the secondary will contribute.

"If you win championships, you win them on defense," he said. "We relied on our defense in every game last year, and there were a couple that we won with our defensive play." He pointed to the UCA game, in which the Bison defenders intercepted six Bear passes.

Leading the defense is junior linebacker Patrick Gill (5-9, 225), who paced the team and possibly the nation in tackles with 198 takedowns on his way to first-team All-American laurels. Richmond says Gill "works hard to improve every game. He plays such an important role for us."

Joining Gill on the All-AIC squad was senior defensive end Kenwick Thompson (6-0, 225), half of the "Thompson Twins" bookends. Opposite of him is junior Matt Thompson (5-11, 210). Kenwick led the team in sacks with 12, while Matt led the front line in tackles with 74.

The front line may be young, but it is experienced. Sophomore Troy Foster (6-1, 235) and Kyle Eubanks (5-9, 240) started throughout their freshman campaigns and played like veterans. A third sophomore, Richard Proctor (5-11, 240) logged extensive duty and will provide support.

Gill will be joined by freshman Brooks Harrell (6-3, 215) at linebacker. Harrell will fill the void left by the graduation of four-year starter John Spann. Weakside linebacker Tommy Shoemaker (6-1, 205) was the defensive star against UCA after intercepting three passes. He'll be supported by senior veteran Lee White (5-9, 181), who'll also see playing time at cornerback.

Richmond calls the secondary "the strength of the team". Six of the top eight defensive backs are seniors who have earned 16 letters between them.

Leading the group is cornerback Lance Rodgers (6-1, 180), a first-team allconference selection who pulled down five interceptions a year ago. On the opposite side, Detric Cathey (6-1, 190) broke into the starting lineup late in the season. Strong safety Eric Cook (5-10, 185) is starting his third straight year, as is free safety Pete Phillis (5-10, 185).

Richmond fully expects his offense to pick up where it left off last fall. After starting slowly, the Bison attack gained momentum and was among the league's best by season's end.

"Last year we were fairly

young in several positions, so that experience will help us," he said. "With (quarterback) Tad (Niblett) going into his junior year as a twoyear starter, we feel that the offense is in good hands."

Niblett (5-10, 180) completed 44 percent of his passes for 1,447 yards, third best in school history. Already he's sixth on the school's career passing list, and he would break the record with another season like 1989.

Senior veteran Chris Hill (5-10, 205) is set to start his fourth year in the backfield, moving from tailback to fullback. Junior Darrell Biggers (5-11, 190) takes over at tailback and will receive help from sophomore Richard Holmes (5-8, 180). Hill and Biggers both rushed for 462 yards to lead the team, while Holmes added 303 yards. Hill will be backed by burly junior Wayne Shorter (6-1, 225). The graduation of allconference flanker Mike Alexander has left a void in the Bison receiving corps, but split end Barry Bowens (5-8, 160) should take up the slack. Bowens caught 31 passes for 536 yards last year. Sophomore Tommy Brown (5-11, 180) will fill in

for Alexander at flanker.

In the line, the big question mark is at center where four-year stalwart Fred Wiley graduated. Eric Peters (6-2, 255), a redshirt freshman, earned the top spot in the spring, but incoming freshman Brian Wansley (6-1, 255) will see considerable playing time.

A quartet of veteran juniors will fill the remaining line slots. Tackles Terry Clay (6-5, 290) and Lance Proctor (5-11, 275) join guards Chico Ford (6-0, 260) and Jay Johnson (6-3, 270) to give the Bisons their inost experienced line in three years. Senior tight end Kris Citty (6-2, 210) is a three-year starter who has 21 receptions the last two seasons.

Junior punter Mark Thomas (6-2, 220) averaged 36 yards on 77 punts last year. In two years, he's never had a kick blocked. Sophomore placekicker Brent Goodwin (6-2, 180) was good on 10 of 15 field goals and led the team in scoring with 40 points. Biggers topped the team in kickoff returns with a 29.7-yard average, including a 77-yard touchdown return. Cook and Rodgers will likely return punts.
