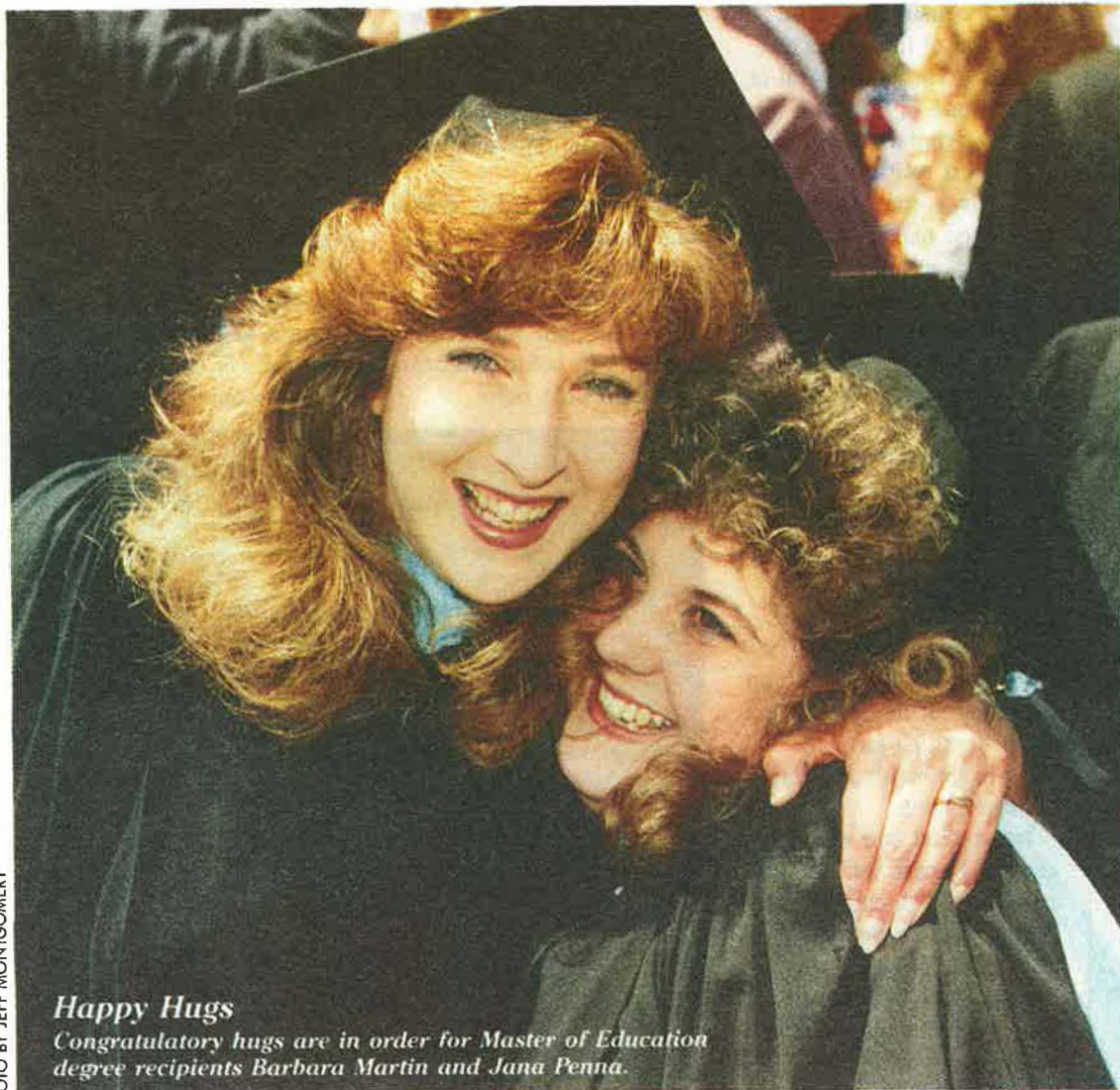

Largest Class Ever Graduates in May

If, like the Chinese, Harding University had year designations, surely 1992 would have to be "The Year Of The Graduate." The spring commencement on May 9 was far and above the largest, both in number of graduates and number of family and guests, in school history.

The 408 graduating seniors made up the largest listing for degree candidates. A total of 19 master's degrees were included in the number. Despite having the 175-member faculty seated on stage, Benson Auditorium's 3,400 seats were filled, with about 200 people sitting on the stairs in the balcony. Others stood at the back, while still others listened

from the foyer. Some parents began arriving shortly after 8 o'clock for the 10 a.m. ceremony. Parking spaces were at a premium in the area with many otherwise non-parking spaces brought into service for the occasion.

Wal-Mart Vice President and Harding board member Paul R. Carter of Bentonville addressed the graduates. He quoted from two recently-deceased world-class leaders, George Benson and Sam Walton, as examples in challenging the graduates. President David Burks presented Carter with the university's Trustee Award for 1992 and Board Chairman James Cone of Little Rock spoke briefly.

College of Bible and Religion Two New Degree Programs Announced Beginning 1993

The College of Bible and Religion has announced two new degree programs, a master of arts in religion and a master in family therapy, that are targeted to begin in the fall semester of 1993.

The master of arts in religion (M.A.R) degree will be a replica of the 36 semester hour M.A.R. degree offered at the Harding University Graduate School of Religion in Memphis. It is a professional rather than a research-oriented degree, designed especially for workers in Christian service who can spend two years or less in graduate training.

The master in family therapy (M.F.T.) degree will be a two-year, 60-hour degree program which will satisfy requirements for licensure with the exception of clinical hours required by the state in which the student chooses to practice.

"We've had a repeated effort the past few years to initiate

the M.F.T. degree. It finally seemed feasible, and so the board granted their approval," said Dr. Carl Mitchell, dean of the College of Bible and Religion.

"In a time when society is taking its toll on the family unit, I feel Harding can help play a role in training men and women to readily deal with the issues facing today's families," said President David Burks.

The M.F.T. degree will be organized according to the guidelines of the American Association of Marriage and Family Therapists (AAMFT). "After the degree program has been established for two years, we will then be able to seek accreditation from AAMFT," Mitchell said.

When the new curriculum is in place, students pursuing the new graduate degrees will not have mixed classes with undergraduate students.

Sam Walton Dies at 74

Involvement with Harding spans two decades

Arkansan Sam Walton, 74, retailer, entrepreneur and philanthropist, died April 5 after a long bout with bone cancer.

He was co-chairman of Harding's American Studies Institute's National Advisory Board and together with his wife, Helen, established the Walton Scholarship Program in 1985.

During his 30-year retailing career Walton built the nation's leading retail chain. Wal-Mart operates or has announced plans for 1,735 Wal-Mart stores, 212 Sam's Clubs, four Hypermarts and at least 18 Supercenter stores. The company's goal of 1992 is \$54 billion in sales.



Walton was known for his high standards of management excellence, his enthusiastic support of free enterprise, his "Buy American" emphasis and his personal charisma and integrity.

His involvement with Harding spanned more than two decades, reaching a high point in 1985 with the establishment of the Walton Scholarship Program. He called the scholarship fund "a real investment in democracy."

Walton's goal was to provide Central American students with a spirit of entrepreneurship, democracy and free enterprise. He targeted his scholarship assistance to students from Belize, Guatemala, El Salvador, Honduras, Costa Rica and Panama.

In addition to Harding, the scholarship program was also initiated at John Brown University and the University of the Ozarks. Walton took pride in the fact that three Arkansas liberal arts schools were taking the lead in bringing free enterprise and democracy to Central Arkansas.

Even while struggling with cancer Walton assumed a leadership role in Harding's American Studies Institute. Under Walton's direction the ASI's National Advisory Board made suggestions for expanding the program. In February three of those suggestions were adopted and will be implemented in 1992.

He is survived by his wife, Helen; a brother J. L. Walton of Bentonville, Ark.; three sons S. Robson Walton and James Walton of Bentonville, and John Walton of National City, Calif.; a daughter, Alice Walton of Lowell, Ark.; and 10 grandchildren.

Walton Scholar Hernan Riverol Successfully Contributes to Belize

Sam Walton's legacy continues through scholarship program

Sam Walton's legacy at Harding lives on in the success stories unfolding in the lives of the Walton Scholars who have benefited from the scholarship program.

Typical of those success stories is Hernan Riverol of Belize, one of the first Walton Scholars to enroll in 1985. Just south of Yucatan, Belize is a small and underpopulated nation of 170,000 people. Much of it is covered by dense uninhabited jungle. Belize is the only English-speaking country south of the United States.

Hernan heard a wealthy American businessman's unique offer to provide an all expenses paid education for Central American students in a place called Arkansas. At 25, Hernan was older than most Walton Scholars but his age did not quell his thirst for knowledge or his goal for a college degree.

He applied and was accepted. Hernan left his parents and three brothers and a sister in Belize and made the 3000-mile trek to Searcy, Ark., little more than a dot on the globe to him.

He came with an obvious determination to receive his degree. Classroom preparation and course work were

a passion for Hernan and it showed in his grades.

After four years and almost 200 hours of courses Hernan had a 3.85 grade point average and not one degree, but two. In May, 1988 he received the B.B.A. in management and one year later he received the M.S.E.

Hernan returned to Belize with an education and his wife, Norvi, also a Walton Scholar. He was ready to prove that Sam Walton's investment in Latin American scholars would help

stabilize Central America.

Today, Hernan is part of the management team of the Bank of Nova Scotia in Belize City. He is still demonstrating that same determination and ambition that took him to the foothills of the Ozarks for an education provided by "Mr. Sam."

Sam Walton's dream of eventually having an impact on the economy and governments of Central America is alive and well in the hearts of Hernan and 179 other Walton Scholars.

American Studies Institute Adds Three New Programs

Harding is in the process of adding three new programs to the American Studies Institute (ASI). A yearlong study by the ASI's National Advisory Board and university administrators resulted in the recommendation of the new additions.

The new programs, which members of the National Advisory Board are funding, include a Central American seminar series, an economics institute for teachers and the distribution of a national newsletter.

The ASI Central American seminar series will begin in September with two presentations, one in Costa Rica and another in either El Salvador or Guatemala. Harding alumni who live in Central America and who were Walton Scholars

at the university will serve as the hosts of the seminars which are for government officials and leaders in the business and professional sectors.

In cooperation with Harding's Schools of Education and business, the ASI will begin an economic institute for teachers this summer. Initially, 35 teachers will be participating in the institute. Plans are to expand the program in the future enabling more teachers to take part.

This unique "teach the teacher" program will be held July 20-31 on the Harding campus. Dr. David Tucker, professor of economics, and Dr. Jim Nichols, professor of

education, will serve as institute faculty. They, along with a host of guest speakers, will discuss "Economics Education for Teachers". Panel discussions, group activities, and the development of classroom material will be part of the institute's schedule.

The distribution of the ASI newsletter, *Libertas*, will also begin later this year. *Libertas*, which will be mailed tri-annually, will expose readers to the ideas and principles of free enterprise and traditional values. The publication will be mailed to almost 50,000 individuals who hold leadership positions in government, education and the private sector.

Harding Repeats in Peterson's Guide

Harding has received notification of re-listing in the 1992-93 *Peterson's Competitive Colleges*, a publication of the nations' top colleges.

Citing top choices for top students, the *Peterson* volume includes 11 directories, with tuition costs, comparative profiles, and explanation of competitive institutions listed, as well as details of other pertinent information. The book also contains a full listing of specific information about each college selected.

Harding also remained among schools listed in the 1992 *Honor Roll for Free Enterprise Teaching* as compiled by The Foundation for Economic Education in New York, and the Templeton Foundation's listing of Character Building Institutions, announced earlier.

"This is a distinct honor for Harding to be named along with other prestigious institutions," Dr. Jim Carr, executive vice president, said. "We are pleased that we can send Har-

ding's availability through this medium."

Harding Admissions Services offices are continuing to process applications for the fall semester, with acceptances

currently ranking about 8 percent above last year's comparable date. The university recently awarded diplomas to more than 400 graduates in the largest class of the school.

Yingling, Young Honorees of Associated Women for Harding

Two long-time volunteers of the Searcy chapter of Associated Women for Harding have been honored for their efforts. Mrs. Marie Yingling and Miss Pat Young received 1992 Distinguished Service awards during the AWH general meeting.

Yingling, retired from the Harding Academy faculty, has served the organization as an officer and through committees. She has been responsible for numerous projects and their successful completion through the years.

Young is an assistant to the university's vice president for finance and has overseen AWH

funds since the organization was started in 1965.

Mrs. Barbara Barnes, AWH coordinator, said, "These two ladies represent all that AWH has attempted to be to the university — an example of assistance in all ways through a beautiful spirit of service."

Representatives of AWH chapters presented President David Burks with more than \$35,000 during the meeting, which was sponsored by members of the Hot Springs chapter. Delegates from Searcy, Little Rock, Harrison, Newport, Jonesboro, and Bartlesville, Okla. attended the session.

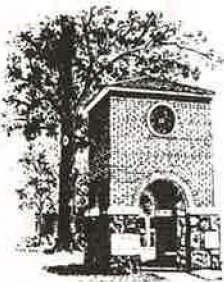

Three Distinguished Teachers Named

Nichols, Suit and Thompson receive honor

Dr. Sherry Pollard (counseling) wrote a chapter entitled "Referral" for *Personal Counseling: A Guide for Christian Counselors* published in a new book edited by **Dr. Bill Flatt** (HGSR).

Dr. Bill Oldham (math) served on an education panel in St. Louis concerning math knowledge for America's children. Determining the math knowledge expectation of children at grades 4, 8, and 12 was the basis for the discussion conducted by the National Assessment Governing Board (NAGB). The intent aimed at setting nationwide achievement standards in mathematics skills.

Standards are being set in conjunction with an assessment of math skills of America's young people being carried out this year by the National Assessment of Educational Progress.

Known as "the nation's report card," NAEP was created by congress to track the academic progress of elementary and secondary students. More than a million youngsters have been tested in a variety of subject areas.

Oldham was one of 68 persons from 32 states. Included were teachers and educators, along with representatives of government, business, and the general public.

Kathy Howard (behavioral science), **Betty Watson** (education), **Deborah Duke** (math), and **Richard Peck** (education) have received their doctorates. Howard, Watson, and Duke attended Memphis State University; Peck's is from Mississippi State University.

Distinguished teachers for 1992 were announced in April following student evaluation and approval of the university selection committee. Selected were Dr. Jim Nichols, professor of education; Dr. Louise Truex Suit, professor of nursing; and Dr. Travis Thompson, associate professor of mathematics. Each professor received a \$1,000 cash award for the honor.

Nichols, who is also director of field experiences for the School of Education, has been a member of the faculty since 1977. He holds the Ed.D. from the University of Arkansas. Dr. Bobby Coker, dean of the School of Education, said Nichols has great ability both in the classroom and in field placement. "He's highly deserving of the honor, and I'm happy he's been chosen to receive this," Coker said.

A member of the faculty

since the university's nursing program began in 1975, Suit also serves as the curriculum coordinator. She received the Ed.D. from Memphis State. Suit has performed extensive research in the field of psychiatry and has worked with the Veterans Administration Hospital in Little Rock. Dr. Cathleen Shultz, dean of the School of Nursing, praised Suit both as a friend and colleague. "We are fortunate to have Louise as a member of the university faculty," she said.

Thompson is a 1971 graduate of Harding who joined the faculty in 1985. He was named assistant to Dr. Dean Priest, dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, in 1987. He holds the Ph.D. in mathematics from the University of Arkansas. Priest said, "Travis is a multi-talented

teacher and administrator who has been effective not only in the classroom but also in securing grants to further enhance our teaching program. He's been a wonderful addition

to our staff." Many of Thompson's writings have been published and he will become editor of a math journal. Thompson's wife, Linda, is also a member of the faculty.

They were selected by a committee upon recommendation from their peers.

President David Burks, in announcing the awards, praised the entire university staff for contributions to the operation of the university. "We are delighted to honor these four who are exemplary of the Harding spirit," he said.

Mrs. Smith, who joined the finance department in 1978, has three children — Tim Smith of Searcy; Cindy Peyton of Nashville, Tenn.; and Andrea Smith. Tim and Cindy are

Harding alumni and Andrea is a recent graduate of Harding Academy. Ann's late husband, Don, was the university's pilot.

Ward, who serves as an elder at the Downtown Church of Christ, joined the Harding information systems offices in 1975 after retiring from a 20-year career in the U.S. Air

Force. He and his wife, Jo, have four children and three grandchildren.

Woodroof is a 1982 alumnus who was already working in the media center prior to graduation. He and his wife, the former Debbie Heffington, have three daughters, Elizabeth, Emily, and Erica.

Harding Graduate School Of Religion

Graduate Program Expands; Will Offer Ph.D. in Religion

A long anticipated announcement was made May 13 at the Harding University Graduate School of Religion. President David Burks announced that the school's board of directors had voted to not only continue the graduate program in Memphis, but also to expand it.

The accepted proposal includes expanding the curriculum by adding a Ph.D. in religion program by the fall of 1993.

With enrollment higher than it has been at any time since 1985 and fund raising efforts surpassing recent years, the future of Harding University's graduate Bible program is being highlighted by the new Ph.D. program.

Spring enrollment at the school stood at 196 students. Not included in that figure are the 114 individuals who are auditing courses this spring. Applications for the fall

semester are running ahead of last year's total at this same time.

Donations to the school for the current fiscal year are approaching the \$300,000 mark, which will set a record for the institution.

"We've formulated a strategy that will provide for the long-term development of a very strong graduate Bible program at Harding University on both campuses. The curriculum has been restudied to be certain that we're offering courses that today's preachers and church leaders need, and we're now poised to make a significant step forward," said Burks.

The formation of the Memphis Advisory Council, a group of local businessmen and church leaders, has had significant positive effects on the school's fundraising efforts. The council presently has 108 members. "This group of individuals is interested in the

work of this school, and we hope they'll be helpful to us in obtaining additional support from the Memphis area," said Lott Tucker, executive director of the school.

The school's new Ph.D. degree will be the only such program in the brotherhood of the churches of Christ. "We feel there is a need for this program, and we expect many students to choose this route for their course of study," said Burks.

The announcement comes as the school is searching for a new dean/executive director. Dr. Phil Slate resigned earlier this year so that he could return to full-time teaching. Slate was honored at a special luncheon prior to Burks' announcement, and was commended by Burks for his 20 years of service to the school. Six of those 20 years he served as dean.

Harding Elementary School Selects Alexander Principal

Blaine Alexander, sixth grade teacher of math and science at Harding Academy since 1987, has been named principal of Harding Elementary School. An alumnus of Harding, he taught a year at Cutter-Morning Star near Hot Springs before joining the Academy faculty.

Alexander, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wallace Alexander of Delight, Ark., received the Master of Education in last summer's commencement. His wife, the former Stephanie Boeckman, is currently pursuing a degree in the School of Nursing.

Academy Superintendent Randy Lambeth praised Alexander at the announcement. "Blaine did a good job with his practice teaching with us as a student, and we were delighted to have him back on the faculty," Lambeth said. "He does a super job, the kids like him, he makes learning fun, and other teachers respect him and are looking forward to his being the new principal." Lambeth did express one regret. "We hate to lose him in the classroom," he said.

Alexander has also been an assistant in the Academy's basketball program.

1992 *Petit Jean* Theme Centers on 'Fire'

Volume dedicated to Dr. John Ryan

Petit Jean editor Anissa Campbell introduced the 1992 yearbook and presented Dr. John H. Ryan the dedicatory copy during special chapel ceremonies in late April. The

320-page volume centered on the theme "We didn't start the fire," as the basis for the photographs, cutlines and copy throughout the book. The embossed black on black cover

also had applied colors of red orange and yellow gold to produce the torch of knowledge used as the "i" of the word "fire."

Ryan, chairman of the

department of communication who has completed 31 years with the university, was chosen by the senior class to receive the honor.

Representing Knights men's social club, Beth Heffington of Pine Bluff was crowned as the 1992 *Petit Jean* Queen. Heffington is a junior majoring in psychology. She was attended by Julie Burdge, a senior nursing major from Ulysses, Kan., and Monica Chapman, a senior English major from Panama City, Fla.

Desmond Peterson, a social work major from Detroit, and Debbie Biting, a special education major from Santa Paula, Calif., received the Regina Spirit Award.

Among the highlights of the book were a 14-page full color section in Student Life, thematic copy and art on both front and back endsheets, and a historical section tracing the flame that has become Harding today.

Campbell, an English major from Texarkana who was among the spring graduates, was assisted by a staff that included Amy Johnson, Scott Busby, Leah Mangrum, Vicki Jackson, Nita Campbell, Kristy Dalton, Trina Shaw, Jeff Cash, Jerry Cutshall, and David Hickman. As many as 70 individuals contributed to the production through photographs, writing copy, designing pages, typing, and indexing. Mrs. Kay Gowen, assistant professor of communication, was faculty adviser.

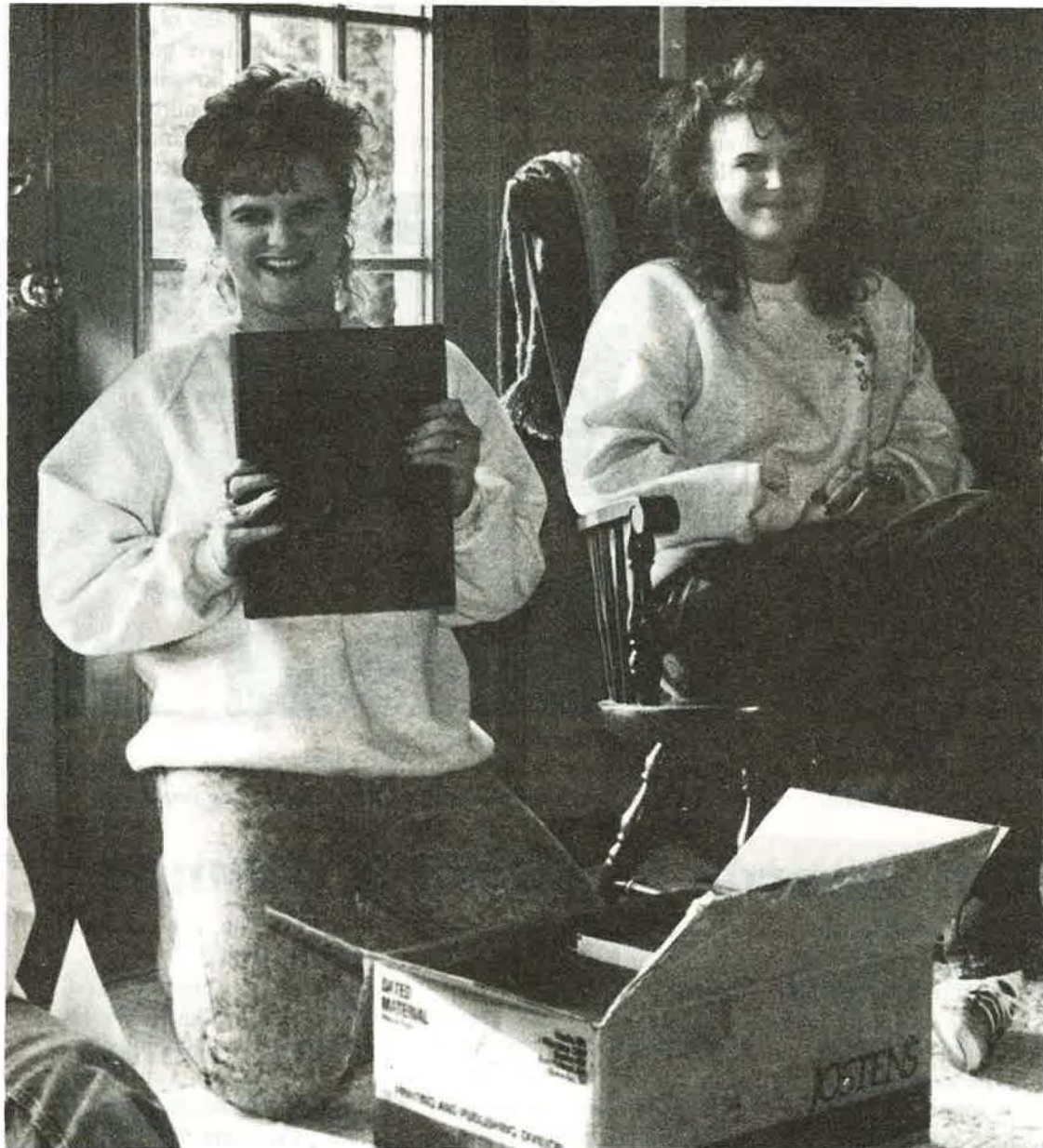

Close Election Results in Revote for SA President

A tally of the ballots in the election for Student Association president proves the point that politicians have repeated for years, "Your vote does matter." The two students running for the office had a single vote separating their respective totals. The close count, and

the fact that a discrepancy occurred with six misnumbered ballots, led to a revote the following week.

With the runoff for S.A. president decided, four juniors were chosen to hold the various S.A. positions for next year: Charlie Jarrett, a history

major from Memphis, Tenn., president; Kristy Dawdy, an elementary education major from Honey Grove, Texas, vice president; Monica Kimbrell, a social work major from Huntsville, Ala., secretary; and John Mark Hayes, an accounting major from Sardis, Miss., treasurer.

The four officers already have many ideas for the coming year. Areas they plan to emphasize are student involvement and working together. Jarrett commented on the stereotype that places students against the administration, and said that at Harding it is a misconception.

"People seem to think that the students want this or that, and the administration stands in their way. It just isn't true," said Jarrett. "I want to find the common ground and focus on it. That way, everything the Student Association does will go through the roof."

Jarrett added, "I have a lot of ideas for next year. The biggest thing I'm interested in starting is a student missions training program."

This program would involve the student body in supporting a missionary-in-training for a year. The money would be raised by the student body and

given to a student who is planning on pursuing mission work.

Every semester, classes spend time evaluating each of their teachers. Another of Jarrett's ideas involves incorporating teacher evaluations with a one-day vacation from classes. All classes would be cancelled and various activities would occur on campus throughout the day, such as volleyball on the lawn and movies in Benson Auditorium. Students' only responsibility for the day would be to fill out and turn in teacher evaluation forms for each of their classes.

Other ideas concern getting students more involved in chapel and all other areas of student life. Tapping the potential that already exists is also an area which the new officers feel will be vital to next year's success.

"There are so many great ideas, but people don't do anything about them," said Monica Kimbrell. The new officers plan on not just trying to come up with more new ideas but actually putting them into action.

All of the new officers echoed Hayes words, "Basically, I want to see people more involved."

Homecoming Plans Underway; Scheduled for October 29-31

With the heat of summer in full force, it might seem like a difficult task to begin planning events for Homecoming next fall. Plans, though, are well underway. The departments of music and communication, who jointly produce the Homecoming musical, and the Alumni Office have already finalized some events and are still planning others.

Beginning with the induction of the class of 1942 into the Golden Circle on Thursday, October 29, the Harding campus is expected to be alive with club and class reunions, dinners, informal gatherings and other scheduled events through Saturday night. The Bison football team will take on the University of Arkansas at Monticello Saturday afternoon at Alumni Field.

Morris Ellis, professor of

communication, recently announced that the Homecoming musical will be *Fiddler on the Roof*. Cast as the two main characters of Teyve and Golda are Bob Ritchie and Kim Scott, respectively.

Scott is a senior music education major from Arlington, Texas, who most recently performed on the Benson stage as a Spring Sing '92 hostess. Ritchie is a 1984 Harding alumnus living in Searcy. He played the same role in 1983 when he was a senior at Harding.

Even though *Fiddler on the Roof* has been performed at Harding before, "there were several characteristics of the play that enticed us over some other options," Ellis said.

The play and all other related Homecoming activities will take place October 29-31.

Spring Sing '92 started off with a bang

Hard Work, Entertainment

In its completed form, Spring Sing '92 featured more than 700 students in eight club shows, along with a variety of entertainment from the hosts and hostesses, ensemble, and the Jazz Band. It did not all fall into place overnight though. Countless hours of planning and practice sessions began many months before the curtain rose to reveal the final production.

Club practices began the end of January, and the weeks that followed included deadlines of all varieties. Music and lyric selections, making costumes, painting the huge backdrops, set construction, lighting and staging the video production of the show were all just a portion of the "behind-the-scenes" events that eventually fell into place for the creation of the 19th Spring Sing show.

Making the 42' x 16' backdrops creates some interesting obstacles. Sewing 672 square feet of material together takes several people. "We hired a woman who lives in Searcy to sew ours together," said Kim Keisling, who was in charge of Chi Omega Pi's and Pi Kappa Epsilon's backdrop, and it took three other girls and me to help the lady turn the material and feed it through the sewing machine."

Once the backdrops were sewn together, club members began the painting process. Finding an indoor place on campus with enough floor space to accommodate a

backdrop creates yet another challenge. Some clubs used space in the balcony of the Old Gym, while others used pavilion space at the White County Fair Grounds.

To prevent the backdrops from shrinking, they must first be painted with an all-white base. After that process is completed, the painting of the actual backdrop scene begins.

"After we finally got our scene drawn onto the material, we had about 15 people painting it over a period of about four days," said Tracy Halbert, who was in charge of the Ko Jo Kai and Sub T-16 backdrop.

Another group of students who spent a great deal of time on Spring Sing preparations was the advanced television production class of Dr. Lou Butterfield, associate professor of communication. They were in charge of providing video footage and graphics to the two large screens that hung at the top of stage left and right.

"We had six cameras placed throughout the auditorium. Some were in the balcony, one was on the catwalk, and several students with shoulder cameras moved around the stage," said Butterfield. He and his entire class attended each dress rehearsal of Spring Sing. "Attending the rehearsals enabled us to plan our shots. When it came time for the show, we already knew when we could get good close-up shots and areas we needed to avoid to prevent dark shots,"

he said.

Wide ranges of video special effects were available for this year's performances due to some new equipment bought for Harding's television studio. "Hours of programming work were done beforehand so that all we had to do the night of the show was press the right button," Butterfield said.

When all the work was completed and the performances were done, the 20 different judges gave the sweepstakes honors to "Born in a Field of Hay," produced by Ko Jo Kai and Sub T-16. The show received top awards in the categories of originality, costume and choreography. Club members were dressed as scarecrows, ears of corn, farm workers and black field crows.

Other sweepstakes winners included the head-hunters of "In Business To Get A Head," by Regina and Chi Sigma Alpha, first runner-up; the pirates of "Mast Hysteria," by Tri-Delta Epsilon, Delta Chi Delta, OEGE, AGO, Shantih, Knights, Chi Alpha Rho, and King's Men, second runner-up; the cops and convicts of "Stealing The Show," by Chi Omega Pi and Pi Kappa Epsilon, third runner-up; and the pigs of "What's The Pig Deal?" by Zeta Rho and TNT, fourth runner-up.

Spring Sing will mark its 20-year anniversary next year with the 1993 production to be presented April 8-10.

"This year we also began tutoring the children four days a week," said Karen Munch, Regina president.

The junior class began working with the youths at the beginning of the spring semester. Terry Davis, who was president of the junior class, is also a member of Chi Sigma Alpha social club. When Davis became junior class president, one of his ideas was to get the juniors involved in a service project.

Through his work with his social club, Davis knew about the children; and he decided to start a program involving the college students with the youth of the housing projects.

"We tried to think what we could do for the kids," said

Davis. "Regina and Chi Sigs had assisted in showing them movies on Saturdays at the Housing Authority. I thought, we have campus movies every weekend, instead of taking the movies to the kids, why not bring the kids to the movies?"

Three times during the spring semester, Harding students were given the chance to sign up and take the children to the movies. The response was positive from both groups and hopefully a tradition has begun.

"My vision now is that the junior class will continue the tradition, get really behind it and do more than we did," said Davis.

Both Regina and Chi Sigma Alpha plan to continue working with the children, as well.

Kent Baker, a member of Chi Sigma Alpha said, "We have a lot of fun at the parties and the carnival, but we also really enjoy just going to the park and playing ball. Just spending time with the kids is fun."

IMPACT on Romanian Student

The word *impact* has real meaning for sophomore Raluca Eliescu. Because of the *impact* Harding University has had on her life, the 17-year-old Romanian will return from a summer in her hometown of Bucharest in August to participate in the 1992 Harding Student Impact sessions. This time she'll serve as an 'energy leader' in the orientation program for incoming freshmen, a different role from her participation last August.

Two years ago her goal of even coming to the United States was merely a dream. Through the foreign exchange student program, she was permitted to come to high school in North Little Rock. Then through the interest and outreach of two Little Rock women interested in Christian education, and with the help of some others, she enrolled as a Harding freshman last fall.

"The Student Impact workers were so very helpful to me," she said, "and now I want to help others. I feel that I have matured so much and am a better person through the experience."

The rapid development of events was approached rather routinely for the dark-haired teen, who plans to become a cardiologist and return to Romania to assist folks in her native country. Her brother is studying medicine there now.

Raluca has wanted to be a doctor as long as she can remember, citing family as inspiration. She has two uncles who are doctors in Romania. As the daughter of nuclear engineers, Raluca had always been encouraged to get a good education.

Ann Hewitt of Little Rock, whose children are Harding alumni, was touched when she read an account of Raluca's experiences at the high school. Hewitt and Suzy Patton threw all caution to the winds and set about to arrange for Raluca to attend Harding. Their efforts were successful, and Raluca came to the Searcy campus in time for Student Impact.

With Jo and Gene Ward of Searcy agreeing to serve as sponsors, she was set for both

semesters. Raluca compiled a grade point average while accumulating 49 hours of credit. Her six-year study of English and command of French was helpful for her, also.

During the year, she was invited to spend spring break with another student and her family in West Virginia. "I got to go to Tennessee, Kentucky, West Virginia, and even Ohio," she said. "It was wonderful."

Stephens of Little Rock and a bevy of other top executives from across the nation. "I was the only woman in the room," she said, "and I was pretty nervous. But I think I did all right," she added, speaking with confidence.

She had also been employed on campus throughout the year. During the first semester she worked in the custodial staff; in the spring she worked for ARA in the student center to earn money for her plane fare home for the summer.

Raluca spent a week in New Jersey and New York prior to her departure for her homeland. She plans to take the MCAT medical entrance exams in the fall and is looking toward a semester at Harding University in Florence in 1994. But for the moment, she was eager to see her family—and give them the Harding shirt and other souvenirs she collected during the year.

First Lyles' Trustee Award Goes to Freshman Waide

The recipient of the first "Cleon and Maxie Lyles Trustee Award" has been decided with an incoming freshman from New Mexico as the honoree. Gregory Waide of Albuquerque will receive the initial scholarship, established following the death of Cleon Lyles in 1989.

Harding's Chancellor, Clifton L. Ganus, Jr., said, "We are pleased to have reached the point of presenting this award, because it so fittingly carries out the wishes of the donors." Friends of the family and the university planned the tuition scholarship for a student majoring in Bible. Lyles was a prominent Arkansas evangelist and author whose legacy of ministry and service has been a springboard for young ministers. Lyles' preaching career spanned 58 years, beginning when he was only

17. His 23-year tenure at the Sixth and Izard Church of Christ in Little Rock was one of the longest at any congregation in Arkansas. He also spent from 1968-74 in evangelistic preaching throughout the nation. Following his retirement from full-time preaching in 1979, he continued to work with the Southern Christian Home in Morrilton, preaching at the Northside Church of Christ, until his death. He credited his wife, the former Maxie Coats whom he married in 1933, with his successes. Their goal was in teaching young people.

Lyles wrote seven books, including *Bigger Men for Better Churches*, which is a national text for leadership training. He conducted weekly television and radio programs in addition to filling speaking engagements nationwide.

Waide is a senior at Manzano High in Albuquerque, where he is a member of National Honor Society and active in the DECA program. He plans to get a double major in Bible and accounting. He is the son of James and Clara Waide.

Ganus said the Lyles Scholarship would continue to receive contributions and add to the principal in order to "honor Cleon and Maxie Lyles in assisting a Harding student to prepare to follow their ministry example." Ganus chaired the committee, with John Gipson, Ted Knight, Joe Spaulding, Carroll Trent and Leroy Wood also serving. Funds may be sent to the Lyles Scholarship fund.

Mitchell Receives Gaston Scholarship

Brian Mitchell has received the \$1,000 Edwin W. Gaston Jr. Scholarship given by Region II of Alpha Chi, the national honor scholarship society, at its meeting April 4 in Shreveport, La.

Thompson, Hutchison Named Top Athletes

The M. E. Berryhill Awards to the outstanding male and female athletes at Harding University were awarded to Matt Thompson and Kelsie Hutchison.

Thompson is a psychology major from Huntsville, Ala. He is a two time NAIA All-American Scholar Athlete, NAIA All-American Honorable Mention and an All-AIC football player for the Bisons. The four-year letterman and two-year starter at defensive end recorded 48 solo tackles and 156 assists as a starter for the past two years.

Thompson, through seven semesters, has a 3.64 grade point average. He is a member of the Seminoles social club.

Hutchison is an elementary education major from Joplin, Mo.

She is a NAIA Track All-American and school record holder in the indoor mile run. She is a three-time NAIA All-American Scholar Athlete — twice in cross country and once in track with the 1992 track awards yet to be announced.

She has been a four-time All-AIC and All-District 17 in cross country with finishes in the top three every year. She is a three time All-AIC track performer. Hutchison has won numerous individual championships in AIC and District 17 track, cross country, and indoor track. Through seven semesters, she has a 3.71 grade point average. She is a member of the Ko Jo Kai social club.

Hardballers Qualify for District Tourney

After a two-year absence from the NAIA District 17 baseball tournament, the 1992 Bison baseball team qualified for the post-season tournament with a fourth place finish in the AIC at 11-13 and an overall record of 19-31-1.

In the District 17 Tournament at Russellville, Ark., the Bisons drew top seeded Arkansas Tech. Behind the pitching of freshman Kevin Burton, Harding pulled the upset over the Wonder Boys, 5-2. Harding then faced Southern Arkansas and Henderson State dropping both games by scores of 13-3 and 12-10, ending the year for the Bisons.

Burton, from Garland, Texas, paced the Bisons on the mound the entire year. He posted a record of 7-5 and had an ERA of 2.49. Outfielder Jeff Phillips, from Memphis, lead starters with a .356 batting average.

Bison and Lady Bison athletic teams for the third consecutive year have won the All-Sports Championship of the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference. For the fifth time since the award was instituted in 1964, Harding was the recipient of the trophy.

To determine the All-Sports winner, points are earned in each sport relative to the order of finish in the conference race. Harding totaled 77 points to 63.5 points for runner-up Southern Arkansas University and 62.5 points for third place University of Central Arkansas.

"The All Sports Championship is significant in that it indicates a balanced program and that is what we want at Harding," commented Dr. Harry Olree, athletic director. "I am pleased with the effort



of all the coaches and athletes who have worked hard and achieved this year."

The 13.5 victory margin is one of the widest in the history of the conference. Nine out of 12 Harding intercollegiate athletic teams finished in the top three in the AIC standings. Championships were won in volleyball (third consecutive), women's cross country (sixth consecutive) and men's cross country.

Second place finishes came in women's tennis, football, men's track and women's track. The men's tennis and golf teams garnered third places while women's basketball and the baseball team came in fourth. The only sport to complete the season in the "bottom half" of conference play was men's basketball.

Chris Byrd put together one of the most solid years in Bison history. The center fielder from Newport hit .351 with 13 doubles, two triples and three home runs, two of them coming in district tournament play. Byrd also lead the team in RBI's with 25. He broke the school single season stolen base mark by stealing 31 bases and was one hit shy of breaking the single season hit mark with 60.

Men and Lady Bison Tracksters Both Take Second Place in AIC

The Bison and Lady Bison track teams both claimed runners-up honors at the AIC track championships held May 2 at Harding.

Eight schools participated in both the men's and women's divisions. In the men's com-

petition the University of Central Arkansas (154), Harding (128), Southern Arkansas University (95) and Ouachita Baptist University (71) were the top four finishers.

In the women's division the top three schools were Southern Arkansas (201), Harding (140) and Hendrix College (65).

Harding had three double winners: Nathan Mills - 5,000M (15:49.34) and 10,000M (34:56.7); Shauna Queen — 800M (2:23.1) and 3,000M (10:42.6), the 3000M is a new AIC record for Queen; Lori Wright in the 100 hurdles (15.3) and 400 Hurdles (64.4).

Other winners for Harding included: Tquan Moore - triple jump (48'6"); Damon Work - 1500M (4:01.3); Kelsie Hutchison - 1500M (4:49.1); Carrie Blodgett - Discus (119'7"); Penny Mayberry - high jump

(5'4"); and the 1600M Relay with Hutchison, Wright, Queen, and Keri Hutchison. All event winners are recognized as All-AIC.

In addition, five athletes have qualified for the NAIA Championships, May 21-23, in Vancouver, British Columbia. The qualifiers are: Tquan Moore - triple jump (48'6"), Shauna Queen - 800M (2:15.1) 1500M (4:41.1), Jon Newby - 400 hurdles (52.79), David Rubio - pole vault (15'5"), and Lori Wright - 100 hurdles (14.8) and 400 hurdles (63.5).

Besides a good team performance in the outdoor conference, the men's team won the District 17 indoor championship and Jason Koch was named NAIA All-American on the strength of his fourth place finish in the 600 at the Indoor Nationals. The Lady Bisons placed tenth in the nationals.

Golfers Finish Third Paced by McFarland

Harding's golf team finished third in Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference competition behind defending champion Arkansas Tech University and Henderson State University.

Junior Bart McFarland of Searcy ranked 12th in the AIC with an 80.4 per round average. Todd Rhinehart of Silver Spring, Md., was 13th at 80.6 and Darrell Welch of Searcy was 17th at 81.4.

Nine AIC teams competed in the six 18-hole rounds played at various sites around the state.

Men's Tennis Third in Rebuilding Year

The Harding University's men's tennis team finished what Coach David Elliott termed a "rebuilding year" in third place in the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference.

The Bisons had a conference record of 6-2, with losses coming to champion Ouachita Baptist University and runner-up Southern Arkansas University. Harding ended the year with a season record of 17-8 and ranked number 22 in the NAIA.

"I'm really impressed with the effort and hard work of the men's team," Elliott said. "We stayed ranked in the top 25 in the nation all year. That's quite an accomplishment for a rebuilding year after losing six of our top seven players from last season."

Three Bisons received AIC awards. Freshmen Oscar Andrade and Ruben Gonzalez and senior Leo Bravo were named to the All-AIC team.

Women Netters Take Second Place Finish

The Harding women's tennis team established itself as a leader in the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference in the inaugural year of the university's program.

The Lady Bisons took second in the conference with a 10-2 record. Harding breezed through its conference schedule until meeting up with eventual champion University of Central Arkansas. UCA won the final two conference matches from the Lady Bisons to take the AIC title outright.

The Lady Bisons had several outstanding individual performances. Amy Whittle of Marble Falls, Texas, a freshman who played number one singles, and Farah Mackey of Searcy, a sophomore who played in the number two singles position, were named to the All-AIC team. Tracy Crouch of Judsonia, Ark., and Brooke Manasco of Haleyville, Ala., won the number two doubles at the NAIA District 17 Tournament.

The Lady Bisons had an overall record of 12-8, with many of the losses coming against NCAA Division 1 opponents.

David Burks on May 11 completed his first five years at the helm of Harding University. In a recent report to the President's Council and the Board of Trustees, he reviewed the overall operation of the university during that half decade, citing past accomplishments and future plans as well.

His five-year comprehensive Strategic Plan adopted by the faculty and board soon after his inauguration has been updated twice to now extend through 1995. "My presentation was not to brag," he said firmly to open the interview, "but we can't be timid in acknowledging the way God has blessed the work."

Burks summarized the highlights from several standpoints. Always eager to start with the spiritual aspect, "... because we must never digress from our mission," he mentioned the establishment of a College of Bible and Religion with a dean over the total program. During the five years, the number of Bible majors has increased from 143 to 245, and a new major in vocational ministry is being offered for non-Bible majors.

"Our students must be better prepared to work for the church wherever they are or whatever their academic field."

"This is exciting to me," Burks said. "Our students must be better prepared to work for the church wherever they are or whatever their academic field."

In an effort to provide outreach to churches, he has also named a director of church relations to be responsible for lectureships, workshops and service to congregations. Four have been added to the Bible faculty to lower class size and give greater emphasis to the department.

Plans have been announced for a master's degree in family therapy and a master of arts on the Searcy campus, as well as a doctorate in Biblical studies at the Graduate School of Religion in Memphis.

In the area of academics, the percentage of faculty with doctoral/terminal degrees has been increased from 50 to 70 percent, and a faculty development program was established and funded to assist current faculty members. A nine-month contract program was established for faculty members with salary increases accordingly. Retirement benefits were increased from 5 to 10 percent.

An Honors Program for incoming freshmen has been established, and continued emphasis has been placed on the program for academic success (PASS) with a learning assistance center being established as well.

The completion and computerization of the new Brackett Library marked a major facet of the five years, and the more than \$1 million addition of computer equipment, together with a new telecommunications systems, are hailed as major developments. An American Studies Advisory Board was named in the expansion of the American Studies Institute.

In the student services area, housing has been greatly upgraded with the complete renovation of Pattie Cobb women's hall, completion of a new men's dorm, and remodeling and air-conditioning of four older dormitories. The American Heritage Cafeteria has been expanded and remodeled, with ARA selected to provide food service and operate the Student Inn. The registration procedures have been

streamlined. Hammon Student Center is currently undergoing renovation and expansion.

Enrollment increased each year, with 3,564 in the fall of 1991 as a new record. Scholarships and grants increased from \$3.3 million in 1987 to \$5.9 million for 1991-92. Admissions standards expanded with the average ACT for entering freshmen increasing from 19.9 to 22.6. University-administered financial aid increased from \$12.2 million to \$18 million, and Harding scholarships increased from \$1.8 million to \$3.8 million. Last fall, 15 National Merit Scholars were students at Harding.

As a result of the university-wide comprehensive study, intercollegiate athletics were reaffirmed. Scholarships were added for women's volleyball, and a women's tennis program has been added. Harding teams have been successful in winning the All-Sports Trophy of the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference for the past three years, with individual teams taking 18 championships in the past five years.

Funds raised from 1988-92 were \$28.3 million as compared with \$19 million in the preceding five-year period. The \$25 million beyond excellence campaign is almost completed with total funds pledged reaching \$23 million to date. Searcy and White County residents pledged \$1,039,850.

Harding's operating budget increased from \$25.7 million in 1987 to \$40.3 million in 1992, with assets increasing from \$95.2 million to \$127 million. Endowment increased from \$19.1 to \$21.2 and capital improvements totaled \$25 million. "What I'm proudest of," Burks said, "is that we have been able to reduce the operating budget deficit by \$2 million, also."

As work on the student center continues and remodeling of the American Studies building begins, plans are developing for the design and construction of a new Bible building to be erected across from Benson Auditorium at the corner of Center and Cross. The building is expected to be under construction by next May, with completion set for the fall of 1994. "The process never stops," Burks says, "and it's definitely a partnership effort. The faculty, students, President's Council, Board, and alumni — all must work together."

Burks is always quick to express gratitude to everyone who has helped make the accomplishments possible. "There are many who have been heavily involved in the total process. Our total constituency has been involved, and I express thanks to all of these partners who are so important in making our work possible," he said.

The reporting of highlights in summary admittedly does not include the inevitable disappointments, problems, crises, and heartaches that are a part of the job. Burks has known that aspect as well, but his goals and dreams have been strengthened as a result. He is a dreamer, never content with the status quo or mediocrity in providing services for students and looks forward to helping Harding progress spiritually and academically through the coming year.

Parish Selected for Arkansas Nursing Award

Kathy Parish may be a supervisor at White County Memorial Hospital, but she views herself as a nurse first.

Parish, 41, director of nursing at the 124-bed hospital since August 1989, recently was chosen by 16,000 peers in Arkansas as the state's recipient of the American Nurses Associates' Search for Excellence Award.

"I'm not an administrator at heart; I'm a nurse at heart," Parish, a Judsonia (White County) native, said in an interview at the hospital. "I am 100 percent nurse and hope to be forever and ever."

The award means even more to her because it comes from other registered nurses, said Parish, the mother of three.

"We are looking for someone who has new ideas, someone doing something to promote nursing," Jan Hoskins, president of the Arkansas Nurse Association and a member of the selection committee, said Monday. The award, given annually, is in its third year.

The selection committee was impressed with Parish's leadership style.

"She includes her peers and subordinates in a new managerial style. ... She relies on people under her to help make decisions," Hoskins said.

When Parish became nursing director, there was a "drastic" nursing shortage, but she was able to double the professional staff at her institution,

something "very, very hard to do," Hoskins said.

The hospital has a daily census of 65, Parish said. More than 160 are employed in the nursing department.

Parish works as a staff nurse once a month, Hoskins said. "Trust me, no one in administration these days does this," she said.

"The thing I like about her, she's willing to work on the floors, she keeps in touch with her people and she has built trust. ... They know she understands what nurses go through," Hospital Administrator Bob Burton said.

Parish, who calls herself a late bloomer, said, "I was in my mid-20s when I decided to be a nurse, and it was the right decision. I have never regretted it. ... I know this is what I was meant to do."

Parish will be honored at a luncheon in October at a state convention.

"I have a lot of fun with nursing. It's a great profession and has really been a positive thing for my life. Nursing has changed how I relate as a parent and friend and has helped me to become a better person," she said.

Parish, a graduate of Harding University School of Nursing, is certified in advanced cardiac life support and pediatric and neonatal advanced life support. She is pursuing a master's degree at the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences.
