

Nine hundred chariots of iron, and all the people that were with him—all the forces which king Jabin could bring together—were summoned at Harosheth, and marched from thence "unto the river of Kishon," * where the chariots would be in the best possible position for action, on the flat alluvial plain.

/ Let us pause to contemplate the two armies, each now in position, and awaiting the battle. There, on the summit of Tabor, "a level, oval shaped area, about a mile in circuit," + stand Barak's ten thousand, waiting till the eagle-eyed prophetess, watching Sisera in the plain below, gives the signal of attack. Around them lay that wonderful panorama, which, once seen, can never be obliterated from the memory, and every point of which, notwithstanding their apparently hopeless inferiority, might serve to enkindle their faith, and to animate their hope. On the north, the brown peaks of their own Naphtali running in a serried ridge across the glowing sky, a corner of the sea of Galilee in its deep bed, and the glittering top of Hermon towering over it like a guardian angel. On the east, the long purple ridge of Gilead, rising like a colossal wall from the Jordan valley. On the south, the battle-field of the enemy, the plain sweeping round the base of the mount upon whose top the men



of Israel stood, and extending like a sea of verdure across to the hills of Samaria. On the west, the wooded heights of Galilee, extending to the dark ridge of Carmel and the distant Mediterranean. The steep sides of mount Tabor, probably less entangled at that time with brambles and brushwood than they are at the present day, afford a ready path for a rapid descent upon the enemy occupying the plain. But, once descended from the summit, how fearful the venture! How could a small company of wretchedly equipped footmen withstand, even for an instant, the onward rush of the enemy's swift chariots, supported by column after column of his well-armed and impetuous legions. To descend the mountain-side was like rushing into the jaws of destruction. With so great a disparity of force, nothing could prompt the movement, but either faith, or the wild and reckless courage of despair.

But despair finds no place in the heart of Barak so long as he has the Lord's prophetess at his side. A true man of faith, he is as humble and docile as he is swift and courageous. When commanded, he moves as the lightning, or as the "angels that excel in strength," those "ministers" of Jehovah, who "do His pleasure;" * but until commanded, teachable and quiet, his "soul is even as a weaned child:" † a wonderful example, for the Church in all ages, of that phase or manifestation of faith which unites the most

Women

Despite the persistence of occupational segregation, women's representation in several areas is growing rapidly. The September issue of American Demographics reports that since 1970:

...women now make up over 20 percent of all lawyers--an increase of 400 percent;

crease of 400 percent;
...now comprise 18 percent of all doctors—up 80 percent; and
...women now constitute 28 percent of all computer scientists—a 100 percent in-

crease.

Women workers became a majority of professional employees in the United States. While this reflects the resurgence of schoolteacher hirings, it also indicates the growing number of women entering traditionally male-

dominated occupations.

The proportion of women managers was only 27 percent in 1972. Today it's 36 percent, an increase of one-third in less than one generation.

U.S. Men and Women: Some Comparisons

Health: Women have a marked advantage in longevity over men-77.1 versus 69.3 years in the United States. In any given year, twice as many men as women die of heart disease, 50 percent more die of cancer. However, the average American woman pays two more visits to the doctor than a man does every year, and as a group, females undergo 5 million more operations annually than do males. Throughout the industrial world, women evidence a far higher recorded incidence of depressive psychoses and psychoneuroses. But more alcoholics are men, and males have a 290 percent higher suicide rate than females.

Education: There are currently more women than men in college (5.9 versus 5.7 million), but somewhat more men than women in graduate or professional school (862,000 versus 709,000). While women stay numerically abreast of men through the master's degree level, males earn about 70 percent of all Ph.D.'s. Less than 13 percent of doctoral degrees awarded in 1980 in the fields of mathematics or the physical sciences were granted to women.

Crime: For all races, ages and income levels, men are far more likely to commit a criminal act than are women (except for prostitution); only one out of five serious crimes—murder, robbery, arson—is committed by women. In 1979, some 8 million arrests were made for

various offenses; women accounted for 1.3 million of them. But women's arrest rates are growing in virtually all nonviolent categories and, overall, are rising faster than men's. Some of women's gains reflect increased employment opportunities—for instance, the 24 percent increase in embezzlement by females in 1979.

Employment: Of 98.8 million working Americans, 38.9 million are women. Men and women are represented in every occupational category, but the percentages vary. Only 1 percent of the nation's 48.000 kindergarten teachers are men: only 0.01 percent of the 554,000 auto mechanics are women. Contrary to popular belief, the earnings gap between men and women is greatest in the traditionally male jobs such as law and medicine, and smallest in the traditionally female jobs such as teaching and nursing.

Politics: Men were more likely to go to the polls than women until the 1980 election, when women cast slightly more than their share of the 86.5 million votes for President. On balance, women lean more toward the Democratic Party than do men and are more likely to consider themselves liberals. The margin, however, is slight. Whether a political candidate is a woman does not seem to affect the way men or women cast their ballots. This was not always so. Through the 1950s and '60s, women tended, disproportionately, to shun candidates of their own sex, for reasons that remain unclear

Even as the new woman has "charged onto the tube," so has she charged into the everyday of life. There is so little any more of the genteel, truly feminine woman who knows, because of the sheer wonder of being a

woman, that she is equal, okay, even special. It is heartbreaking to me to see many of the young women with whom I work bulldozing their way into a situation, putting down the men in their lives, and arguing for their "rights." They vow not marry, have children, and tie themselves down, ignoring the joy and fulfillment of family life and seeing only the loss of individual freedoms. And all the while, the young men not only do not seem to mind all that, but see themselves as contemporary, liberal, "liberated"—as they applaud the new woman.

If you studied under women professors in college, you're probably one of the go-getters today. A study done by Elizabeth Tidball found that women who graduated from a school with a large female faculty were more likely to become high achievers.
