
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



REACHING OUT . . .

from Harding University . . .

Harding University is known for its vision of "Rescuing the Perishing" around the world. This past summer faculty and students traveled around the world working with churches on nearly every continent. We have a strong training program to prepare our students to preach the gospel to the whole world.

Here are some of the ways we train to serve:


- Campaigns: They offer a "taste" of other cultures where many find their first challenge for greater involvement in missions.
- Summer workers: Some choose to spend the summer working with a church in order to improve their own talents while assisting young churches.
- Vocational: A growing challenge is to use one's secular training for support while locating in a place to establish a church or strengthen weak churches. There are many opportunities to do this. Typical jobs are teaching, nursing, technical assistance, etc.
- Full-time: The most complete and direct way to serve is to spend full-time in the tasks of evangelizing, planting, and maturing churches.
- Apprentice programs: These offer a longer period of work, usually about two years, so that one can get deeply involved in some aspect of service. A variety of tasks are performed by the apprentice who often shifts to long-term service after the two-year period. Our program is called HOPE.

Our objectives are:

- To give training and direction for practical Christian service.
- To provide a flexible program to fit apprentice and field needs.
- To help career missionaries by providing apprentice helpers.
- To provide on-the-field training under experienced missionaries.
- To increase the number of long-term missionaries.
- To provide an authentic experience in cross-cultural communication.

Here is our HOPE (Harding's Outreach Program for Evangelism):

HOPE . . . for the millions of lost—Hindu, Buddhist, Muslim, and Animist along with the multitudes of secular, worldly people . . .



HOPE . . . for student involvement, away from a world of materialism to service . . .

HOPE . . . for open doors where we may be welcomed to share the reason for our own hope . . .

HOPE . . . for cooperating hands and hearts across the continents . . .

HOPE . . . for the establishment of new churches in megacities and villages across the world . . .

HOPE . . . for maturing of newly emerging churches so they may reach out to the lost . . .

HOPE . . . that every tribe and tongue may know the reality of the "new song": "You are worthy to take the scroll, and to open its seals, because you were slain, and with your blood you purchased men for God from **every tribe and language and people and nation**. You have made them to be a kingdom and priests to serve our God, and they will reign on the earth." (Rev. 5:9, 10)

A missionary on the field writes: "Give us your teachers, your social workers, your mechanics, your preachers, your scholars, your nurses for our medical program, your printers to help with our press, your willing workers who love the Lord and want to serve Him. We will do our best to help anyone who is sincere and wants to come. . . ."



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

To initiate the aid process all applicants must complete the Family Financial Statement (FFS), which can be obtained from the Student Services Office. Write or call the Director of Student Financial Services for further information.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS: Fifteen (15) high school units with a minimum of three (3) units in English and nine (9) units from other academic courses such as mathematics, science, social studies, and foreign language are required. A "C" average or better is required and a score of 17 on the ACT or 750 on the SAT is recommended. Transfer students need to have an overall "C" average or better on all work attempted at other colleges or universities.

SCHOLARSHIPS: Each year Harding selects from among its most outstanding applicant candidates for academic scholarships. Included are:

Harding Academic Scholarships — Students must send the ACT or SAT test results to Harding. Those with ACT scores of 20-24 or SAT scores of 840-1000, or above, will receive scholarships.


Valedictorian or Salutatorian Scholarships — Students must have their high school officially notify the Harding Director of Admissions of their award to be considered.

Harding University School of Religion

The Harding University School of Religion serves all students through the required Bible courses in the liberal arts curriculum.

Many students are served more specifically by this academic division as they major in biblical areas of study and participate in student groups that are a part of the School of Religion.

The School of Religion seeks to equip each student with a knowledge of the Bible so that the student's life will be firmly founded upon a personal Christian faith. It seeks to help the student integrate biblical truth and life experience in whatever field of study he has chosen.

The twenty faculty members include a visiting professor of missions who comes directly from a mission area to share his experience and firsthand knowledge with students. Many students participate in mission campaigns each year.

Harding University confers the Bachelor of Arts degree or the Bachelor of Science degree on students who complete the required curriculum in Bible. During the 1985-86 school year, 104 students declared majors in Bible and biblical languages.

The School of Biblical Studies, located on the Harding campus, is an intense program designed to train men who are over twenty-one years of age in the field of preaching and missions. Students in this program range from high school graduates to those holding graduate degrees. A diploma is conferred upon successful completion of this two-year program.

The Graduate School of Bible and Religion in Memphis, Tennessee, confers the following degrees: Master of Arts, Master of Arts in Religion, Master of Theology, and Doctor of Ministry. Its 1987 graduates include twenty-seven who are working in the United States and eight who plan to minister in four foreign countries.
