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

PROPOSED CONSTITUTION FOR ASSOCIATED WOMEN FOR HARDING

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this association shall be the Associated Women For Harding.

ARTICLE II

Purposes:

- 1. To support Harding College in all her needs.
- 2. To help promote the highest advantages in physical, social, intellectual and spiritual education for every student of Harding College.
- 3. To promote a clear understanding of Christian education.
- 4. To foster a spirit of friendship among the women who are interested in the development of Christian education.

ARTICLE III

Policies:

- 1. This association shall be non-commercial and non-partisan. No commercial enterprise and no candidate shall be endorsed by it.
- 2. All dues collected shall be deposited with the general fund of the college for its use and are not to be used to defray expenses for projects, programs or for any other reason.
- 3. As initial organization and because of its location, this association shall serve as advisor for other similar groups organized.

ARTICLE IV


Membership and dues:

- Section 1. Any woman interested in the purposes of the Associated Women for Harding and willing to uphold its policies and subscribe to its by-laws may become a regular life or patron member upon payment of dues.
- Section 2. (a) Dues for regular members will be \$12.00 per year, payable annually or monthly.
 - (b) Life membership shall be conferred upon any member or approved applicant upon receipt of her contribution of \$100.00 within a 12-month period.
 - (c) Patron Life membership shall be conferred upon any member or approved applicant upon receipt of her contribution of \$500.00 or more.
 - (d) The Executive Committee may confer by unanimous vote honorary membership upon any woman who has rendered outstanding and distinguished service to Christian Education.
 - (e) Annual membership shall terminate automatically when contributions are delinquent for a period of six months or upon request of the member.
 - (f) Any member in good standing shall be privileged to vote and hold office.

ARTICLE V

Officers and their Election:

- Section 1. (a) The officers of this association shall be a president, 1st vice-president, 2nd vice-president, 3rd vice-president, secretary, treasurer, reporter and historian.
 - (b) Officers shall be elected by ballot annually in the month of April. If there is but one (1) nominee for any office, it shall be in order to move that the secretary cast the elective ballot of the association for the nominee.

Twenty-eight women from Searcy, Newport and Little Rock meet January 12 on the Harding College campus with Dr. George S. Benson and two guest speakers from Oklahoma City to discuss the organization of a state women's association for Christian education.

Mrs. Helen Wright and Mrs. Raymond Vaughn were the guest speakers. Both are leaders in "Stepping Stones for Oklahoma Christian College" in Oklahoma City. Stepping Stones is a tri-state women's organization for Christian education. Mrs. Wright and Mrs. Vaughn spoke to the group concerning the organization and efforts of their association.

The group met from 11:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. and were guests of the college at a noon luncheon in the Empire Room on campus.

After discussing the matter for this period, the women of the state who were present voted to organize such an association. Dr. Benson appointed a committee to write a constitution and bylaws, and a nominating committee for state and local officers. Those selected for the former committee were Mrs. Wayne Kellar, chairman, Mrs. T. A. Formby, Mrs. Clifton Ganus Jr. of Searcy, and Mrs. Cleon Lyles of Little Rock. 
Women's Group Elects Mrs. Tucker As Head

Mrs. Lott R. Tucker Jr. was elected president of the Associated Women for Harding at the organizational meeting of this association held last night in the small auditorium of the college. Dr. C.L. Ganus, vice-president of the school, and who will act as liaison advisor between the group and the administration, served as chairman and explained the purposes of the organization.

Each year he said, more and more students are seeking admittance to colleges. Harding is operating at near capacity now and if additional students are to be accepted, academic requirements for education and adequate facilities must be met. He pointed out that in a very few years it is possible that 800 additional students will be attending Harding College.

Similar women's groups have been organized for colleges a-cross the nation and have made specific and invaluable contributions by providing the 'woman's touch' in matters of decorating and landscaping as well as special projects such as providing a washer-dry er combination for a field house, the chairman noted.

The slate of officers as presented by the nominating committee was elected, including Mrs. Raymond Muncy, first vice president; Mrs. Ganus, second vice president; Mrs. T. A. Formby, third vice president; Mrs. Vol B. Rowlett, secretary; Mrs. Loren Nichols, treasurer, Mrs. Wayne Kellar, reporter and Mrs. Russell Simmons, historian. A constitution for the association was read and accepted by the 120 attending.

"Membership to the group is open to any woman in the city and further, information concerning membership will be made available. Interested persons may contact Mrs. Tucker or any of the other officers listed," Dr. Ganus said.

The first group in Searcy began with 150 members and has about 165 now. There are eleven such groups, ten in Arkansas and one in Monroe, La., which already has sixty members.

Pine Bluff's club with the first project gave music equipment to the school. The Little Rock chapter furnished a room in the American Heritage Center, and the Searcy club plans to finance professional landscaping on the American Heritage grounds.

AWH organization increases to fen Chapters

A new organization of ladies who have banded together in the interest of Harding College at Searcy, is already working in support of the school. Associated Women for Harding, with approximately 600 members at present, was organized in Sear-

ey earlier this year.




