- 5. Poor reputation and record of the church the track record of the church is one of division disgruntled members and deadness.

SERVANT OR STUDENT

Harold Hazelip, Dean of the Harding Graduate School, recently revealed information from a study conducted by the Association of Theological Schools in the United States and Canada. It was funded by the Lilly Foundation and entitled "Readiness For Ministry." Through an elaborate gathering system, 4,895 questionnaires were collected from randomly selected people in 47 religious groups, with the purpose of identifying the significant characteristics people look for in young ministers.

The people gave top rank to "service without regard to acclaim," based upon belief in the gospel. Their second highest factor was "personal integrity" and the third was "Christian example." "Skills" were placed fourth and leadership ability was fifth. The sixth-ranked dimension was counseling, followed by the minister as a thinker and student. Most severe criticism was directed toward self-serving characteristics, followed by undisciplined living by immaturity.

It is interesting to observe that these people wanted a humble servant rather than a powerful preacher. They were looking for an "example" rather than an "exegete". All of which emphasizes that men trust their eyes rather than their ears. Sermons are many times preached more effectively by lives than by lips. Most assuredly our proclamations with out our exemplifications are "love's labor lost." (W.F.W.)

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This is not a "call" for preachers or a blueprint of procedure just for clergymen. This fact becomes quite clear as we observe what happened to and with the eleven friends of Jesus when he gave them final directions just before his ascension. Look at them. There is not a Levite, a scribe, a rabbi, a priest, or an ordained minister among them. They are not professionals in the area of religion. Four are fishermen. One is a tax collector. They are laymen; there is not a preacher in the group.

"As a man thinketh in his heart, so is he," It is said that big men think big and little men do not think at all. Jesus had big plans. With his help, you can do what you think you can do.

Whatever you plan, whatever you inviison for tomorrow, next week, next year, change it, enlarge it. No one ever did what he did not plan to do and he never planned what he did not dream. The fulfilment of the Great Commission in our generation is a possibility, but it will take big men with big dreams, willing to do a big job for a big God.

The Communists dreamed of conquering the world in 1907. In less than sevenly years they are half way there. In two thousand years the Christian church only dreams and seems to be farther behind than when it started. Henry Ford dreamed of an automobile and built an empire. Campus Crusade's founder Bill Bright dreamed of taking the gospel to the world in one generation and is well on the way to its accomplishment. Jack Hyles dreamed of baptizing ten thousand converts and is well on the way. What is your dream? God is in a hurry. The world is on fire and billions are in the valley of decision. 



History teaches us to hope. When Robert E. Lee walked out of the farmhouse parlor at Appomattox, having surrendered the remnant of his army and accepted total defeat, it was to face a new and entirely different kind of life. The South was crushed and embittered. Men faced the terrible burdens of rebuilding everything they had cherished. It was a time when the slightest word would have fanned the embers of revolt and kept alive the spirit of the Confederacy. But through these times, more bitter and disheartening than the war itself, moved a man in faith, humility, courage, and justice, who said over and over to his people, "We failed. But in the good providence of God apparent failure often proves a blessing. It is History that teaches us to hope."

A friend of mine has two sons, one fifteen years old and the other nine. Recently the three of them were talking, and the fifteen-year-old said to his father, "Dad, you've got it made. You don't have anything to worry about." Now that boy has a lot to learn about people past thirty, but he did seem to have some logic on his side as he went on to explain, "You don't have to study for exams or worry about getting into college. Girls are not your problem, nor do you have to decide who to marry. You don't have to worry about drugs, or going into the army, or getting a job. You've really got it made." At that point the nine-year-old broke into the conversation with this comment, "Well, look at it this way, he don't have nothing to look forward to neither."

Dr. Victor Frankl, a psychologist known throughout the world for his work in Logantherapy, was imprisoned in Nazi concentration camps during World War II. Day after day he and his fellow prisoners watched as some of their number were chosen to go to the gas chambers and then to cremation in the ovens. They watched their bodies wither away due to semi-starvation as they put in hard labor on 10-1/2 ounces of bread and 1-3/4 pints of thin soup per day. They lived in freezing cold with no heat and only rags for clothing. Their feet swelled with edema so badly they could hardly march to work. Their shoesleft unlaced because of the swelling filled with snow and ice and every step was torture.

Frankl and the other prisoners became so weak they could not climb the two six-inch steps back into their prison barracks each night without stopping to grasp the door jamb with their hands and pull themselves through it.

In those hopeless conditions many men lost hope. Once without faith in their own future, they were doomed. It usually happened suddenly--a prisoner refusing to get up and report to the parade grounds for work detail. Pleas, threats and blows would not move him. He simply gave up and lay there in his own filth until he died or was executed.

The prisoners who somehow survived the horrors of concentration camps like Auschwitz were those who held on to hope and meaning for the R lives by the slenderest of threads. Somehow, someday they hoped to get back to their families. Somehow, someday their suffering would be worth it. Those who believed in God ... usually found extra strength for their ordeal. As long as a prisoner could see some "why" for his terrible existence, he was able to bear almost any "how."

Lord, What's Really Important? by Fritz Ridenour, pp179-80,

Someone once remarked that Christians talk a lot about living forever when most of them do not know what to do with themselves on a rainy afternoon. If our present life is just a succession of meaningless days, there is not too much to look forward to in eternity. But Jesus showed us a quality of life worthy of eternity. His was a life worth lasting forever.

One of the finest passages in "The Last Days of Pompell" is that in which Olinthus, lying in the dungeon at the amphitheater, tells his fellow-prisoner, Glaucus, about Christ and the hope of the life to come:

There was something in this sudden burst of human affection which struck a kindred chord in the soul of the Greek. He felt, for the first time, a sympathy greater than mere affliction between him and his companion. He crept nearer towards Olinthus; for the Italians, fierce in some points, were not unnecessarily cruel in others; they spared the separate cell and the superfluous chain, and allowed the victims of the arena the sad comfort of such freedom and such companionship as the prison would afford.

"Yes," continued the Christian with holy fervor, "the immortality of the soul--the resurrection, the reunion of the dead-is the great principle of our creed, the great truth a God suffered death itself to attest and proclaim. No fabled Elysium, no poetic Orcus, but a pure and radiant heritage of heaven itself, is the portion of the good."

"Tell me, then, thy doctrine, and expound to me thy hopes," said Glaucus earnestly.

Olinthus was not slow to obey that prayer; and there, as oftentimes in the early ages of the Christian creed, it was in the darkness of the dungeon, and over the approach of death, that the dawning Gospel shed its soft and consecrating rays.


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In a time of death, desolation, smashed hopes, bitter defeat, and emotional and physical slavery, God spoke through the prophet Ezekial, "I will cause breath to enter you, and you shall live."

Here in dramatic fashion God broke into human history through the vision of Ezekiel when the Lord set him down in the middle of an accumulation of dry bones--lifeless, useless, seemingly forgotten, but not forgotten by God. Israel, God's special people--the dry bones--were in exile far from home. Their defeat by the Babylonian army had been complete and their humiliation had plunged them into a deadly and soul-bleaching despair. But into this desolate scene stepped The Miracle of Easter, compiled and edited by Floyd Thatcher, p. 89.

The present situation might be described as "bedlam." Do you know where this word comes from? It was the name applied in eithteenth century England to an insane asylum outside London. 

Solzhenitsyn was a Communist, an atheist, but despite all of that because of some suspicion All attached to him he was thrown into prison and remained a prisoner for 12 years. I suppose most of you know that he is in America today exiled from Russia. In one of those pages, he told of lying in his prison cell, dark, dreary, received only 13 ounces of black bread a day, carried to the bathroom only one time a day, and there were some visitors passing by and he heard them talking. Quite a large arowd, they were being shown through the prison. Then he noticed the things they were saying. One woman was complaining about the fact that the children came in onto the carpet with unwiped feet. Another man was complaining about his mother-in-law, and first one thing and another he heard from his prison cell.

And so he wrote these words, "But you have the right to arrange your own lives under the blue sky and the hot sun, to get a drink of water, to stretch, to travel wherever you like without a convoy, so what's this all about unwiped feet, and what's this about a mother-in-law. What about the main thing in life, all its riddles. If you want, I'll spell it out for you right now. Do not pursue what is illusory. Property and position, all that is gained at the expense of your nerves decade after decade and is confiscated in one fell night. Live with a steady superiority over life. Don't be afraid of misfortune and do not yearn after happiness. It is after all all the same. The bitter doesn't last forever and the sweet never fills the cup to overflowing. It is enough if you don't freeze in the cold and if thirst and hunger don't claw at your insides. If your back isn't broken, if your feet can walk, if both arms can bend, if both eyes see, if both ears hear, then whom should you envy and why. Our envy of others devour: us most of all. Rub your eyes and purify your heart and prize above all else in the world those who love you and wish you well. Do not hurt them ar scald them and never part from them in anger. After all, you simply do not know, it might be the last act before your arrest and that will be how you are imprinted on their memory."

A marvelous reflection for a man who was denied the common necessary **things** of life. I want to read another statement from him. As you know, he gave up his atheism and became a **believer**. As a result of that prison experience and the reflection that he passed through in thinking through the problems of life and here is a paragraph:

"And it was only when I lay there on rotting prison straw that I sensed within myself the first stirrings of the good, gradually it was disposed to me that the line separating good and evil passes not between states nor between classes, nor between political parties either, but right through every human heart and through all human hearts. All the writers who wrote about prison did not themselves serve time there, considered it their duty to express sympathy for prisoners and to curse the prisons. I have served time there. I nourished my soul there and I say without hesitation bless **you**, prison, for having been my light."
