Pierce family returns from Africa

Henry E. Pierce ('35) and his family returned to this country January 1, 1957, after seven years as missionaries in Northern Rhodesia, Africa.

The Pierces are now living in Searcy, where their three children are attending Harding. Durden and Janet are college freshmen, and Elaine is a junior in the Academy. Mrs. Pierce is the former Ethel Fowler, a member of the class of '37.

The Pierces went to Africa in January of 1950 after they had spent several years teaching and engaging in church work near Conway. When they arrived at Namwanga Mission at Kalomo, the Pierces went right into school work.

He supervised the educational program of ten native schools and did evangelistic work, preaching from village to village. One of these

schools, the Livingston school, was recognized by the British government as one of the best in the province. Mrs. Pierce was in charge of the educational program for girls at the mission.

In 1953 the Pierces moved to Lusaka, the capital of, and largest city in Northern Rhodesia, and devoted full time to evangelistic work among the natives. Pierce stated that out of the city's population of 75,000, the Africans number 60,000. Although 199 people were baptized during their work in Lusaka, he explained that the congregation now numbers only 71 since most of the natives are migratory workers and do not remain at any location very long. Pierce was responsible for training three native preachers who worked with him.

The Pierces plan to return to Lusaka when their furlough is up.

'32 class to note 25th anniversary

The class of '32 will have the spotlight as the featured 25-year class Alumni Day, May 29. In keeping with tradition the 25-year class will have charge of chapel that day, and if the '32 class comes up to the standards of previous classes, the program will be well worth attending.

Last year J. Lewis Foster, Wichita Falls, Texas, presided over the Alumni Day chapel for the class of '31. The program featured films Foster had made on the campus from his school days to Alumni Day, 1951.

Records in the Alumni Office indicate that there are 22 members of the '32 class, and an all-out effort is being made for 100 percent representation May 29. A. B. Henderson, Floral, is president of the class and has charge of arrangements for the chapel program.

Five classes in addition to the 25-year class of '32 will hold reunions on the campus during Commencement Week this year. The classes of '27, '37, '42, '47, and '52 will meet together with the '32 class for a luncheon at Roberson's Rendezvous, Alumni Day, May 29.

Members of these classes are asked to contact the class presidents and make reservations for the luncheon. Last year 45 persons, representing each of the five-year classes, attended the reunion.

President's Corner

So the Joe Pryors drove over to hear an excellent lesson on Christian evidences and to enjoy the fellowship of a number of Harding alumni—Alexine Hankins, Clifford Huddleston, Gene Boyce, Louise Terry Hester, Sally Croom Morris, Albert and Frances Stroop, and the Clarks and McInteers. Each of these alumni is rendering a distinct and outstanding service, a characteristic of Harding alumni.

Within the last two years I have had the privilege of traveling some, and almost everywhere I have been it has been my pleasure to find Harding alumni. Graduates suggest dollar-month plan

Recently letters have been received from John Croom ('44) and James Etheridge ('45) suggesting a contribution plan whereby every alumnus could have a part. The plan calls for each alumnus to contribute \$1.00 each month and would be known as the Dollar-A-Month-Plan. Everyone could have a part on this basis, for it is within the financial ability of all.

Sometimes an alumnus feels that unless he can make a big contribution, he will do nothing. Many small contributions add up to an impressive total—impressive because of the percentage of participation. Outside contributions come in more readily when the alumni are loyal in their support of an institution.

The plan is impressive on the monetary side also. The Alumni Office records show 4,404 active alumni members. Here is what 100 percent participation in this plan would mean: in three months, \$13,212; in six months, \$26,424; and in twelve months, \$52,848.

This is only what actually can be measured. The influence exerted by 100 percent participation cannot be measured. An outsider considering a donation or planning to become a permanent endowment member cannot fail to be impressed by such figures.

We are anxious to hear the opinions of other alumni on this proposal. When two separate letters come in suggesting the same idea, we feel it is worth attention. John and James have already donated their dollars; other alumni can express their approval of the plan by following suit.
