A Preacher's Forum for ministers in Arkansas and surrounding areas has been planned for March 10 by the Bible department, according to Dr. W. Joe Hacker, Jr., chairman. A similar meeting last spring attracted more than 100 for the day of lectures and forums.

"Faith in Conflict" will be the theme of the series which will open at 9 a.m., following registration, with an address on "Christian Liberty" by Dr. Hacker, "Christian Fellowship" by Dr. Neale Pryor, and "Holy Spirit Controversy" by Jerry Jones, assistant professors of Bible. An open forum will follow.

President Clifton L. Ganus will address the group at lunch.

In the afternoon session, Dr. J. D. Bales, professor of Christian doctrine, will speak on "Modern Trends in Interpretation" and Jimmy Allen, as-

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Dedicated to the Pursuit of Excellence in Christian Education

Faculty, Staff Pledge \$217,714

Sacrifice has always been fundamental for those who look at Christian education as offering one of the few bright spots to a better tomorrow, not only for the church but also for the world.

Proponents of Christian education have long been dedicated to the belief that Christian education is worth what it costs — in expenditure of energy, denial of self and dedication to duty.

As Harding College plans for a multimillion dollar capital campaign, the administration, faculty and staff have reflected again this spirit of willingness by being first to contribute to Harding's future. From 1966-68, pledges from 72 faculty and staff to the Decade of Development totaled \$43,540. In 1969 faculty and staff numbering 214 pledged \$217,714 for the campaign, thus presenting a challenge to other alumni and friends of the school.

Several faculty and staff members have made observations concerning the gifts. Dr. Kenneth Davis, Jr., associate professor of music, said, "Pioneer educators in Christian education such as James A. Harding, J. N. Armstrong, B. F. Rhodes, L. E. Pryor and S. A. Bell set the pace for sacrifice. Theirs was a day of great sacrifice, but no sacrifice is too great for Christian education. As a result of the sacrifice on the part of all those connected with Harding through the years, the good influence is being felt around the entire globe."

Raymond Muncy, chairman of the history department, touched on the key to the involvement. "The sacrificial giving on the part of the faculty and staff is indicative of their faith in Harding's future. This campaign necessitates sacrifice and we sacrifice for that in which we strongly believe. We could not conscientiously call on others to sacrifice to perpetuate a system in which we did not firmly believe. Ours is more than a labor of

love; ours is a labor of faith," he said.

Dr. Joseph E. Pryor, dean of the college, said, "The extent of the faculty and staff participation indicates their keen interest and genuine commitment to the aims and ideals of Harding College. This is a continuation of the spirit that has characterized the faculty since its establishment. It is most important that our young people today obtain the best education possible both academically and spiritually so that they can fill roles of leadership in the church, in their professions and in their communities. I do not know of any group of faculty members who have evidenced a more sacrificial spirit, or who have accomplished more with their students than the Harding faculty. This spirit of service has a profound influence on the students. It exemplifies the spirit of service taught and demonstrated by Christ."

As enrollment rises, Harding seeks to keep pace with growing needs. "Unless we continue to improve the facilities," said Dr. Jack Wood Sears, chairman of biological sciences, "we will not be able to continue to provide the quality education that our students should have."

The proportion of giving among the Harding faculty and staff has been impressive through the years. The school has survived years when sacrifice constituted merely serving.

Why are Harding's faculty and staff willing to do this? "Because," said Lott Tucker, business manager, "they are here and can see the needs. They are willing to give liberally to see those needs accomplished. This is a vivid portrayal of the continued dedication of those men and women who have spent their lives in Christian education. Their example will make others want to give equally as liberal for the purpose of providing a Christian education for our young people."

In 1965 a Harding Hundred Club, designed to recognize alumni who contributed \$100 annually to the operating fund of their Alma Mater, was begun. At the inception of the program certificates were given by the school in acknowledgment of these gifts.

Beginning in 1970 a new program is being inaugurated. Any one who contributes a minimum of \$100 to the school will receive a dinner plate decorated with a distinctive scene of Harding College. The imprinted scenes will be changed each year so that the donors may accumulate a set of the dinnerware.

Our purpose in providing these plates is simply to show our appreciation to our alumni and friends who make Harding College possible. The administration and Board of Trustees know the value of these gifts. Without the host of men and women who have sacrificed and contributed so much throughout the years, Harding's doors would be closed. We must have adequate support for Harding to continue to grow into a more excellent institution.

Harding exists for the sake of the student; to help him understand the environment in which he lives and to live harmoniously with it, to enjoy life and to make it more meaningful, to develop his mental ability to the fullest capacity, to help him to be a good citizen and to fulfill his responsibility to his fellowmen, to develop a proper and pleasant relationship with his neighbors, to develop strong bodies and good habits, and to render service to humanity. Its purpose is not an earthbound materialistic one that takes us to the grave and then leaves us cold and alone. It is not a philosophy of "eat, drink and be merry for tomorrow you may die," but rather "it is appointed unto man once to die and after that cometh the judgment." It is an eternal responsible philosophy that recognizes God as the Creator, Father and Judge of us all and seeks to live in harmony with His will and His world.

Harding's students do achieve. Among the most significant honors won in the last year are the following: A business team won the Emory University executive games in Atlanta, Ga., and another team placed second in the Michigan State University games. In the past five years, competing with some of the larger colleges and universities, our teams have won three championships, placed second twice and 18th once. The **Petit Jean** received a tenth consecutive All-American rating from the Associated Collegiate Press. Debate teams have had a field day in winning awards and trophies at some of the leading colleges and universities in the South. A Harding student has held the presidency of the Arkansas Student National Education Association for the past three years. A home economics major was elected president of the Arkansas Home Economics Association. Harding students won the top prizes at the State Art Festival in the church-related college division. In athletics, Harding was the only Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference member to win three championships, taking the title in cross-country, bowling and tennis.

Also, we are proud of our alumni who have taken places of leadership in the church, the community and the business world. The alumni have used the tools provided them in college to build happy and useful lives. Many have supported the school in many ways. Some contribute liberally of their means. Others recruit students to attend Harding. Others answer questions about the school in their own localities, and assist the administration, faculty and staff in visits to the communities.

The administration and Board of Trustees are planning for the largest capital campaign of Harding's history. The challenge of providing a college which can meet the demands of the future is great. Continued support and sacrifice by the Board, administration, faculty, staff, alumni and friends will be necessary to meet this great challenge. If the past and present are any indication of the prospects for the future, Harding College is assured of surpassing its goal.

Pryor Awarded Th.D. In New Orleans

Neale T. Pryor, assistant professor of Bible, received the Doctor of Theology degree in ceremonies Dec. 20 at New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary. The 34-year-old native of Kentucky received a B.A. in English in 1956, the M.A. in Bible in 1958 and the Master of Theology degree in Bible in 1960, all from Harding. He has been on the faculty since 1962, and currently serves as coordinator of the annual Bible lectureship.

Pryor went to the seminary in 1966 to complete work toward the doctorate. His dissertation is entitled "Concept of the Knowledge of God in the book of Hosea."

The native of Kentucky received the Outstanding Young Teacher Award at Harding in 1966.

Pryor is married to the former Treva Lou Terrell and they are the parents of two children, Alan, 7, and Lori, 5.

\$300,000 McCaleb Endowment Started

The establishment of the J. M. McCaleb Chair of Missions, a \$300,000 endowment fund whose income will pay the salary of Harding's visiting professor of missions, has been announced by Dr. Clifton L. Ganus Jr., president of Harding College.

Each year, as a part of Harding's Mission/Prepare program, a missionary is brought direct from the field to teach Bible courses and motivate programs on the campus. Joe Cannon from Okinawa, author of **For Missionaries Only**, was the first in the series and this year Keith Robinson from Rome is spending the year on campus.

"We are establishing this Chair as a memorial to Bro. McCaleb, a pioneer missionary in the Far East. The Chair of Missions will provide a permanent and living tribute to this beloved brother who encouraged many young people to the mission field," Dr. W. Joe Hacker Jr., chairman of the Bible department, said.

Barney Morehead, who was inspired to do mission work through McCaleb, has given his home in Nashville, Tenn., to kick off the \$300,000 drive.

Mrs. McCaleb, in a recent letter to Dr. Hacker, said, "Bro. McCaleb was faithful to the end and I pray that his memory may inspire many more to be faithful and to carry the blood-stained Banner of the Cross to souls in darkness all over the world."

Initial response to the announcement has been gratifying, according to the administration. "We are encouraged by the response of those who remember the pioneering work of Bro. McCaleb and who are interested in providing the salary for a visiting missionary professor on the Harding Campus through this endowment fund," Dr. Hacker said.

Jerusalem Missionary To Fill Bible Position

Evertt Huffard, missionary in Jerusalem, has been selected to serve as visiting professor of missions at Harding College for 1970-71, according to Dr. Joe Hacker, Jr., chairman of the Bible department.

Huffard attended Harding during 1942-44 and was graduated from Abilene Christian College in 1946. He completed the M.A. degree at Eastern New Mexico University in Portales in 1963 and has been in Jerusalem since that time.

He will succeed Keith Robinson, missionary from Rome who is teaching this year in the college's program of undergraduate missionary training. Joe Cannon of Okinawa was the first in the program.

In announcing the appointment, Dr. Hacker said that a Near Eastern worker was chosen to provide for students a broad background of world cultures. Various areas of the world will be represented from year to year, Hacker said.

Huffard, a native of Michigan, is married to the former Elsie Gross. They are supported by the East Gadsden, Ala., church of Christ. He is a brother of Elza Huffard, president of Northeastern Christian College, and Elvis Huffard, a member of the faculty of Freed-Hardeman College. A son, Evertt Jr., is a junior at Harding.

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Trustee Combines Business, Politics

It could have been a crushing and final blow to 20-year-old Olen Hendrix that day when he stood watching the smoking remains of what once was his grocery business.

His parents were poor farmers, so he knew that he would not be able to get any help from them. He had to face alone the staggering loss of the \$1700 borrowed money that he had just watched go up in smoke.

But Olen Hendrix, a member of Harding's Board of Trustees for the past five years, was a man who would not give up.

"I found a job at a salary of \$50 a month. On this I was to live and pay my obligation," he said. "This took six years, at the end of which I had also accumulated \$200 with which to get on my own again."

Hendrix began working for the International Paper Company in 1938 as assistant woods superintendent for all mills west of the Mississippi River.

But in 1940 he decided to go on his own again.

"I bought and sold land and timber, had a general merchandise business, operated a hardwood sawmill and made lumber merchandise for the Army and Navy during World War II," he said.

Today he is president of the Bank of Prescott, Prescott, Arkansas. Its deposits total over \$8 million.

However, Olen Hendrix is now known for other accomplishments than being a bank president. He, perhaps, is better known to Arkansans for his work with the rebuilding of the State Hospital and for establishing the Department of Corrections for the State Penitentiary.

"I was always interested in politics and the welfare of our country," he began. "And after working with the governor's race in the late forties and early fifties, I was appointed by Governor Sid McMath as Highway Commissioner for my district during the tenure of his office," he said.

In 1955 he was appointed to the State Hospital Board by Governor Orval Faubus and was elected chairman of this board by his fellow board members. He served ten years as chairman.

"I saw the dire need of this institution, but could not get any help from the legislature," he said. "So I ran

for the Senate so I could help the State Hospital out of its financial dilemma."

Olen Hendrix became Senator Hendrix in 1959 and still serves in that position.

But more important — he got the job done that he set out to do. He did get a \$14 million appropriation for the State Hospital. With these funds it was rebuilt and operations were improved to such an extent that the patient load has dropped from 5500 in 1955 to a present total of about 1400 people.

Yet it was not for this work that he received national recognition in 1968.

Sponsoring a bill to establish the Department of Corrections for the State Penitentiary, he made a tour of the Southern states' penal systems and made a report of this to the Arkansas Legislature. This report won national recognition by the National Legislative Leaders Conference in Honolulu, Hawaii, in December, 1968. The award that he was presented there is now on display at the State Capitol Building in Little Rock.

He not only has been an active leader in politics, but also in church work.

"I was baptized in 1924 by the late Brother Jeff Reese," he said. "And

since then I served as deacon of the Antoine Church of Christ from 1950 until I moved to Prescott in 1960.

"I attended the Democratic National Convention in Los Angeles in 1960 and the one in Chicago in 1968.

"Both conventions convinced me even more that the very basis of our democracy can be preserved only through Christian leadership throughout the nation," he said.

Hendrix's tenacity can even be seen in his recreation.

Off in a corner of the home-styled bank in Prescott—in front of a fireplace and mantle—there is a bearskin rug. To be more exact, a Kodiak bear—one of the largest bears in the world.

Hendrix explained that it took four shots to down the monster when it charged him while on a recent hunting trip in Alaska. He admits that this time he had no choice: he had to finish that job at hand — but fast.

In addition to the above occupations, Hendrix serves in other capacities.

"I am presently also on the Board of Directors of the Arkansas Cement Corporation; the American Foundation Life Insurance Company; vice president of the Bank of Delight, Delight, Ark.; as well as the President and Director of the Bank of Prescott," he said.

Harding Students Study Mission Site

Five seniors, who forfeited their Christmas holidays at home to make a 24-day survey trip in the area of Sao Paulo, Brazil, have returned to classes convinced that the work of the church has great potential in South America. They are John Curtis of Madison, Tenn.; Bill Mitchusson of Jackson, Tenn.; Boyd Pate of Winfield, Ala.; Larry Smith of Vernon, Tex.; and Bob Watson of Bowling Green, Ky.

The quintet, through Dr. Joe Hacker and Keith Robinson of the MISSION/PREPARE program, arranged the trip as a fact-finding tour to investigate cultural, historical, economical and educational areas of the country where they plan to make their home. They secured their own travel funds, much of the money coming from their own pocket, and set out Dec. 17.

The men spent the time visiting in the homes of missionaries and gathering firsthand information on the historical background and educational development of congregations in the Sao Paulo area. Executing a schedule prepared by Sao Paulo missionaries to acquaint them with all areas of the work, the students spent three days attending orientation classes. They were briefed on the history, culture, and customs of the country and progress of the church.

The group visited the church building in Nove de Julho, which will become the center for a leadership training school. Howard Norton, Glen Looper and Ted Stewart plan to start teaching daily classes beginning in February. The school will be initially a two-year program to train mature male Christians to preach the gospel in the interior of Brazil. Enrollees will be given a scholarship commensurate with the average wage paid in the area. Following graduation the trainees will be expected to furnish their own support from native congregations.

The students visited a youth Bible camp also. Recently constructed to accommodate 50 students, the camp will be expanded to handle 1,000.

The missionaries there are not content just to baptize people, but to train them for responsible leadership, the students concluded. The goal at Sao Paulo is to turn responsibility completely to the native Christians then

move to another area, using Sao Paulo as a base of operations.

Through courtesy of World Radio, a program sponsored by White's Ferry Road Church of Christ in West Monroe, La., the Harding students were flown by Administrator Glen Owen to Londrina, Presidents and Prudente Passos, three cities in the interior of Brazil.

"We were amazed at the size of the cities and how modern they were," one said. "Nearly all of the buildings were long lines of concrete, rectangular in shape with red tile tops. There were no wooden buildings to be seen. A fire-prevention law prohibited the use of wood in construction. Even the telephone poles were concrete."

Since their return, the five have scheduled in-depth meetings to study information gathered. The results will help them prepare details for graduate work and for future plans as missionaries to Brazil.

Business Team Leads MSU Executive Game

Through four rounds of competition, Harding's business team is in first place in the American Marketing Association's National Intercollegiate Marketing Competition, sponsored by Michigan State University.

Team members are Rick Venable of Bartlesville, Okla., Barry Milton of St. Louis, Mo., David Sain of Memphis, Tenn., and Rodney Waller of Shreveport, La. Recent additions to the team are Diana Dooley of Bartlesville, Okla., and Suzanne Holland of Lake City, Ark.

Finalists will be selected from more than 40 schools across the nation entered in the competition. Teams in the final competition will submit a written and an oral presentation before a board of corporate executives.

Harding has won the contest twice and placed second two times in five years of participation. The trophy will be retired when any team wins the competition three times.

Dream Becomes Reality for Biafran Student

A longtime dream and a sudden nightmare — both coming to life at the same time.

That is the story of Harding student Jonathan Nwokeh. His dream is being in America attending college; his nightmare is the tragedy that has struck his homeland Biafra and engulfed his people in one of the bloodiest civil wars of this century.

Jonathan, since grade school, has had his "impossible dream" — to go abroad to college to study business administration.

"People would tell me how foolish I was," he said. "They wanted to know where I was going to get the money."

But Jonathan did not know that "it couldn't be done."

"I firmly believed that if I planned for something worthwhile, God would help."

But by the time he was in high school, the situation did not look so encouraging. He was no longer able to be helped by his parents and he had to become self-sufficient. Eventually even his part-time job was not enough.

"Mr. Chukwu Obeka, the headmaster of my high school, called me into his office one day," Jonathan said, "and I thought — 'This is it.'"

But that was not the case.

"Instead of telling me I had to leave, he told me that I could stay," Jonathan said. "He said that he had arranged for a full scholarship for my soccer playing and that I was welcome to live with him and his family."

And so Jonathan was able to finish high school.

His next hurdle was passing the Royal Society of Arts examination so that he could begin teaching, which he did.

Not only was he able to teach but Jonathan was able eventually to start his own school — the Urban Commercial Academy in Aba, Biafra. There he was able to teach business administration techniques in his areas of concentration. This school grew to a student body of 300 with a faculty of seven teachers before he left for America.

During this time while he was working with his academy, Jonathan was elected secretary of the Business Teachers Union in Aba as well as

serving as divisional secretary of the Nigerian Red Cross Society.

And it was also the time he met his wife-to-be, Ruth, who was attending the academy at that time. One of their attractions for each other was that each had a strong interest in business subjects.

This was the time for important decisions for Jonathan Nwokeh. After much diligent study, he was baptized into the Lord's church.

"People were surprised at the apparent abrupt change of my religious beliefs," he said. "But for a long time I had been reading my Bible every day. And when I learned what the Church of Christ stood for, I believed that these people were really taking the Bible for what it was. And that was what I wanted."

This decision, as well as his job with the academy, had a direct bearing on his eventual coming to Harding College.

Jonathan's close friend Charles Okem, a graduate of the Christian Bible College in Nigeria, was a minister of the Church of Christ. And Charles decided to go to America to attend Crowley's Ridge College.

This became Jonathan's decision also.

Jonathan and his wife Ruth had been married only four months but they agreed that it would probably be best for him to go on ahead to America alone. He would become adjusted to the new country, find a place to live, and when the time was right, send for her.

Jonathan left Biafra in 1966—and that was the last time he saw Ruth. For war broke out shortly after Jonathan arrived in America and all communications were cut off between

those living in Biafra and the outside world.

And for what was to be a difficult job in itself—adjusting to a new country and a new educational system—became a long, lonesome road for Jonathan Nwokeh.

Keeping up with his studies and working part-time to stay in school were hard; but what made it especially difficult was carrying the extra burden—the burden of worry and concern for his wife, his parents, and his people. For at that time he had no way of knowing whether any of them were alive or dead, or sick or injured by the war.

And even at this writing, John has not heard any word from his parents. But this past summer, to his great joy and relief, he learned from a fellow Biafran who had recently come to this country that Ruth was alive and well.

And what was more wonderful for Jonathan, he also learned that if he could raise the funds, Ruth could come to America.

But to raise the seemingly astronomical sum of \$1100 for her trip, John is now working on another seemingly "impossible dream."

And now in his second year at Harding, Jonathan's plight is not unknown to Harding students. Already they have raised \$400 for him among themselves and Ruth's passport has already been secured.

Jonathan has dropped out of school for the spring semester to work full-time in an automobile factory.

But for Jonathan Nwokeh, a small person in stature, it will not be too long before his undaunted determination will bring another impossible dream into reality.

Academy Americanism Program Grows

"I wanted to become associated with Christian education. Harding Academy wanted to have an American Studies program in Memphis. Since their motto is 'Building Better Christians and Citizens,' they felt they needed to put a citizenship program into action. We agreed to work together toward this goal," said Shelton M. Blythe, Memphis businessman.

With approval of the above agreement by Dr. Clifton Ganus, president of Harding College, Harding Academy of Memphis began an American Studies program with Blythe as its director. The program is self-supporting as is its Director, Blythe and its Assistant Director J. L. Taylor. The school furnishes office space and permits the use of its auditorium facilities for public meetings.

Blythe was born at Lake Cormorant, Miss., August 15, 1926. He attended school there through the eighth grade and then entered Battleground Academy in Franklin, Tenn. After his graduation from the Academy, he enrolled at the University of Mississippi in Oxford where he graduated four years later. Following a two-year hitch in the U. S. Navy, having served in the Pacific, he rented his father's farm near Lake Cormorant, in the Mississippi River delta, and began farming. "Dad was a rural mail carrier and farmed a little buckshot farm on the side. After the first two years I became disheartened and wanted to quit, but my father talked me into farming it just one more year," he said.

The next year things began to fall into place for him. After nearly starving the first two years, he married Betty Mason, rented some additional ground from his uncle and ploughed his way into a successful enterprise. "That was 1949," he recalled, "then about every three years I either rented or bought some additional land and my operation just kept growing and expanding." In 1956 he and Mrs. T. P. Howard formed a partnership presently known as the Howard and Blythe Planning Company. The company has expanded and doubled in size since its formation.

Besides managing the Planning Co., he is Director of the 1st National Bank of South Haven, Miss., a member of the Board of Trustees of the Namwiana Christian Secondary

School (formerly Zambia Christian College), Vice-Chairman of the Board of Directors of the National Education Program and a member of the Advisory Council of Harding Academy in Memphis. He also has business interests in the building and development of commercial property in Memphis.

The American Studies Program at the Harding Academy in Memphis began in the summer of 1968. "Dr. Fred Schwartz, Director of the Anti-Communism Crusade, came to conduct a public rally for the purpose of raising funds to build and equip an office," said Blythe. After a very successful rally and the completion of the office facilities, the first project undertaken was the establishment of a film library. These films on Americanism and Communism are made available to schools, churches and civic clubs without rental cost — a free service to the community. "We get orders from schools from Ohio to Florida to Pennsylvania," said Blythe.

Public meetings began with a six-week program on "The Nature of Communism." It dealt with its doctrines, organization, tactics and goals. To balance the program with positive Americanism as well as teaching against Communism, Dr. George S. Benson, President of the N.E.P., spoke to a public gathering on "The Promise of America." "For further balance," he said, "Jerry Jones, assistant professor of Bible at Harding College, came over on a Sunday afternoon to speak on the 'Crisis of Morality.' There were more than 1200 people in

attendance to that program," he said. Later Gladys Guma, recently escaped from Castro's Cuba, and now a professor at Memphis State University, spoke on her experiences in that Communist dominated country.

Since its inception at the Memphis Academy, the American Studies Program has greatly expanded under Blythe's directorship. He and his assistant, J. L. Taylor, have spoken to students across the nation from Berkeley, Calif., to Washington, D. C., and from Hattisburg, Miss., to Chicago, Ill. "Last year we spoke to at least 50 per cent of the high schools in the Memphis area," he added.

This year's American Studies Program theme is: "Marxism, Man's Deadly Enemy." An impressive lineup of speakers and films has been scheduled. The program has already featured Dick and Trudy from the Hunt Speaker's Bureau of Dallas, Tex. and Dr. Schwartz speaking on "The New Left." "For the coming year," said Blythe, "Bill R. Cox, Director of the American Studies Program at Harding College, has arranged for Dr. Hans Senholz, of Grove City College in Pennsylvania, to speak to the students. Also, Paul Voronaeff will speak on 'The Communist Persecution of Religions.' He spent three years in a Siberian prison camp. His mother spent 20 years in one, and his father died in one." Voronaeff, who returned from a tour of the Iron Curtain countries this summer, will show his films and slides on February 12th at 7:30 p.m. Dr. Walter H. Judd, former U. S. Congressman from Minnesota, will also appear in the spring.

Blythe is directing an extremely successful American Studies Program at the Harding Academy in Memphis. He is very active in church, school and community life. He is a deacon at the White Haven church of Christ. In 1969 he received the Civitan Americanism Award in Memphis. His recreation is centered around his family. They all enjoy bass fishing on the lakes in the Mississippi delta.

With all of his many duties and responsibilities, he takes time to serve on the President's Development Council of Harding College. Blythe wanted to be associated with Christian education and, when provided the opportunity, has dedicated himself to its advancement.

DR. JACK WOOD SEARS

The fall semester is history. It was a good semester. We have a fine student body and an excellent faculty, all working together in harmony and with good will. Our students are working hard and winning in competition with students of other institutions in our state and in the nation. Our college is superior. Our faculty is strong and the spiritual quality of our campus is vibrant.

Many of you have been concerned about Harding. Some of you have been most critical of the administration, of the Board and of certain members of the Harding faculty. You have drawn conclusions concerning events and motives based on partial information, part truths and considerable misinformation. It is my considered judgment that Harding is better and spiritually stronger than in recent years. "God moves in mysterious ways." I am not attempting to rationalize or spread a coat of white-wash. There were influences and persons attempting to modify the purposes and ideals for which Harding was established. An effort was definitely being made to change the emphasis in numerous ways. This has been stopped, at least for the present. Few institutions maintain their original purposes for very many generations. Those that do must be constantly on the alert.

Academic standards have not been lowered, nor has academic freedom been injured. In fact, because of the events that have occurred these areas have also been re-examined and strengthened through action by the faculty, administration and the board. I am looking forward with greater confidence to the decade that is before us. I believe that Harding and the cause of Christian education have been strengthened. Harding is not adverse to change as some have charged. Changes will and should come in curriculum, in teaching methods, in educational programs and in various activities, but these must all be in harmony with the basic principles for which the institution exists. I believe in these principles and am interested in Harding only as she adheres to them. I believe you feel as I do.

The world is becoming more secular, more materialistic. You and I must see that we and our Alma Mater are true to the principles taught by Christ. It is not enough to give lip service to Christ, to God and the Bible. We must live for Christ. We must actively exalt and defend the Bible as God's inspired word, for it is. We must love and serve His church, imperfect as it is, for Christ gave himself for His "bride." I am happy that at Harding we have those, students and teachers alike, who, while pursuing academic excellence, have found that the Way of the Lord enhances learning and understanding.

There is one thing of which I am somewhat ashamed. Though we, the alumni of Harding, gave more to support Harding's program last year than during the previous years, the percentage of alumni giving dropped. In the year just past we gave \$113,585.00 with approximately \$30,000 of this coming from the faculty and staff. This is more than in previous years, as you can see from the statistical tables shown elsewhere in this publication. But the percentage of alumni giving dropped to 16.5. As your president I feel keenly that I have somehow failed you and Harding. Surely if I had done my job more efficiently your response would have been greater. Perhaps I have not really communicated to you the importance of your support. If Christian education is to continue to render the important service it has rendered in the past, those who have benefited by this education, you and I, must assume the responsibility for a greater share of the financial support. The Lord has blessed all of us bountifully with material things. I know there is never enough money for all we want, but there is an abundance for our necessities and enough to support His work if we will but sacrifice some of the luxuries. As stewards of the Grace of God and as those who have been so blessed, doesn't it behoove us all to give something? If you gave last year, God bless you. I am sure you plan to do so again this year. If you did not give last year, won't you sit down right now and make out that check to support your Alma Mater?
