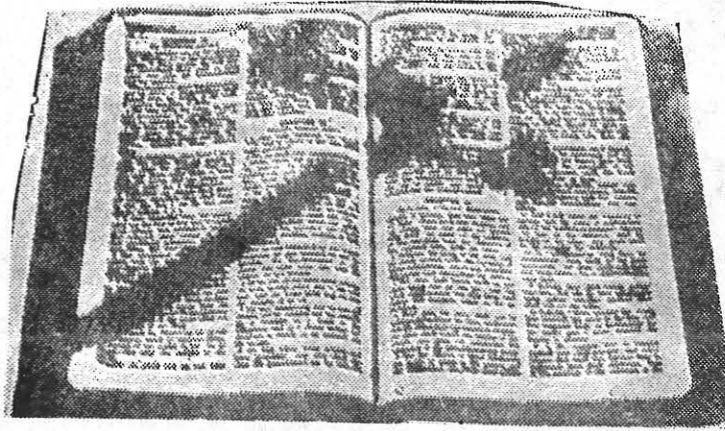
I pray that your work will continue to progress and culminate in the bringing of many lost and confused souls to Jesus Christ.

The Congregation in Monrovia continues to grow in number and in maturity. There are three American families who place membership with this congregation after seen our determination to do right. They are ~~the~~ wonderful people. One of them Dr. Arnold, of Arkansas, is in complete charge of our Sunday School. They are not sent from U. S. as missionaries.
