I regret that my schedule has kept me out of town and on the run so much this summer that I haven't had a chance to write since the Lake Geneva encampment. I have thought, however, many times about our opportunity to be together and about the excellent addresses you gave during the encampment. More rewarding, however, to me was the opportunity to spend some time with you personally and privately. I deeply respect your faith and genuinely admire your commitment and contributions to the cause of Christ.

I still want us to co-author the book about the church and race, but I simply have not had any time to work on a suggested outline. You already have some excellent material that if you are not going to publish in any other form ought to be published. My suggestion is a book of sermons, actually, wherein you could speak directly to the situation regarding race, and I could speak especially in the area of the nature of the church and therefore, its responsibility to this question. But possibly you have suggestions you could share with me and out of it in the next several months we may both be able to find the time to actually work on the problem.
