Juniors May Attend Summer School

The Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools has granted Freed-Hardeman permission to admit superior students to college courses during the summer following the junior year in high school. Juniors will be admitted to the Summer School Program upon the recommendation of the high school principal or counselor. The student must be in the top twenty-five per cent of his class, and he should have a high Standardized Test Score. After the student has spent the summer in college, he will return to his high school for the senior year of work. The early admission program should prove to be a great advantage to academically talented young people.
