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FREED-HARDEMAN COLLEGE SUMMER SESSION

June 6 - August 19, 1966

There will be two terms of 5 1/2 weeks. The first begins June 6, and the second begins July 13. A student may attend either or both sessions. National Defense and other loans will be available during the summer. There will be some part time work on the campus, also.

Financial Aids Available

Scholarships, student work, and loan funds available for the regular session will also be available during the summer semester on the same basis. For example, the "Outstanding Ability" scholarship for "B" average in high school will pay \$75 each semester, summer included.

Room For September

The order for a choice of rooms for September will be: first, students attending the spring semester; second, those who reserve a room early (more than one year before starting date). The earliest ones come up first; third, summer school students; fourth, others according to date of room deposit.

Advantages of Attending Summer School

- * By attending summer school, you can finish college a year sooner and get to work a year earlier. This extra year gained by finishing college in three years may be worth \$6,000 to you, or enough to pay your way through college.
- You may make up to 14 semester hours credit in 11 weeks. This would save 7 weeks on room and board over the regular 18 week semester. You may make a year's credit in English, social science, speech, Bible, education, biology, chemistry, business, and other subjects during the summer.
- * A good student may attend summer, fall, spring, and summer again, and finish two years of college work by the second September after high school graduation.
- * A good recreation program including swimming will be provided. There will be a summer school chorus, and the social clubs will meet. The Student Council will function, as well as the Evangelistic Forum, Girls' Religious Training Class, and Preachers' Club.
- * Air-conditioned dormitories will be available for both men and women. The library, auditorium, Student Center, Administration Building, and most of the class rooms are also air-conditioned.
- * You can get a head start in your academic program before the freshman crowd starts in September. This is a fine time to learn how to make good grades.
- * You can learn about college life while attendance is relatively small, and also get special personal attention to your needs. This is a great advantage to freshmen.

TOP 25% OF H. S. JUNIOR CLASS MAY ATTEND SUMMER SCHOOL

The Southern Association of Colleges and Schools has granted Freed-Hardeman College permission to admit superior students to the college courses during the <u>summer</u> following the <u>junior year</u> in high school. <u>Juniors</u> will be admitted to the summer school program upon the recommendation of the high school principal or counselor. The student must be in the top <u>twenty-five per cent</u> of his class, and he should have a high Standardized Test score. After the student has spent the summer in college, he will return to his high school for his senior year of work. The college credit can then be transferred to any college of his choice.

The early admission program should prove to be a great advantage to academically talented young people. The student can take up to fourteen semester hours the summer before the senior year, fourteen semester hours following the senior year, and eighteen semester hours each in the fall and spring, and graduate from junior college one year after his high school graduation.

Scholarship Offered

Those who have a "B" average in high school will be awarded a \$75 scholarship for the <u>summer</u> as well as for the other <u>three</u> semesters that they may choose to attend Freed-Hardeman College later. (The A.C.T. examination is not required of juniors.)
