Dear Bro. Chalk,

Over a period of years I have tried to collect material on divorce. From this I have worked up two lessons: "Divorce: A Modern Tragedy" and "Divorce: What Does the Bible Say." But this, to me, only presents the problem, not the solution. As all of us are aware, practically every church is filled with people who have been divorced and more and more of the people that we try to teach have been divorced. And the situation is getting worse all the time.

I would like therefore to work up a third lesson: "DIVORCE: WHAT CAN WE DO." Accordingly, I am writing to some of the best thinkers in the brotherhood for their suggestions.
