Dear John,

Your letter came a few days ago, and I appreciated hearing from you. I hear your program occasionally on Sunday mornings. It comes on here at 8:30, and I'm most generally already at the office. I think that your lessons directed to the ever-growing problems of the American home have been most timely.

With reference to the remarks made at the F-H C lectures re. the Dallas activities, I was not present. In fact, I was not aware of it until I get your letter. Due to so many other things that conflicted, I did not get to attend very many of the sessions.

I visited with Malcolm Hill a few minutes one day during the lectures. As you probably know, he is hard at work getting some sort of school underway in the tri-cities area. He spoke of you, and how very much he appreciated your relationship. I believe that he mentioned that fact that you two roomed together, or perhaps were especially close while at Freed-Hardeman.

All in all, I felt that Freed-Hardeman had a real good lectureship. It could have been that my having been away made it so; but it appeared that the overall spirit was most gratifying. As I indicated, I did not attend many of the sessions, other than my own classes. So I suppose that I wouldn't be the best judge. However, the attendance was quite good, and the general tenor seemed to be good also.

We continue to enjoy our work here. I appreciate working with the eldership. They are exceptionally fine men, and are easy to work with--"big" men and really interested in doing something for the cause. Bill and the other recently-installed elder are both doing real well. It is source of personal satisfaction to work so closely with Bill.
