"It is good to see an example of someone who is sharing their wealth with others," sophomore April Goodwin said.

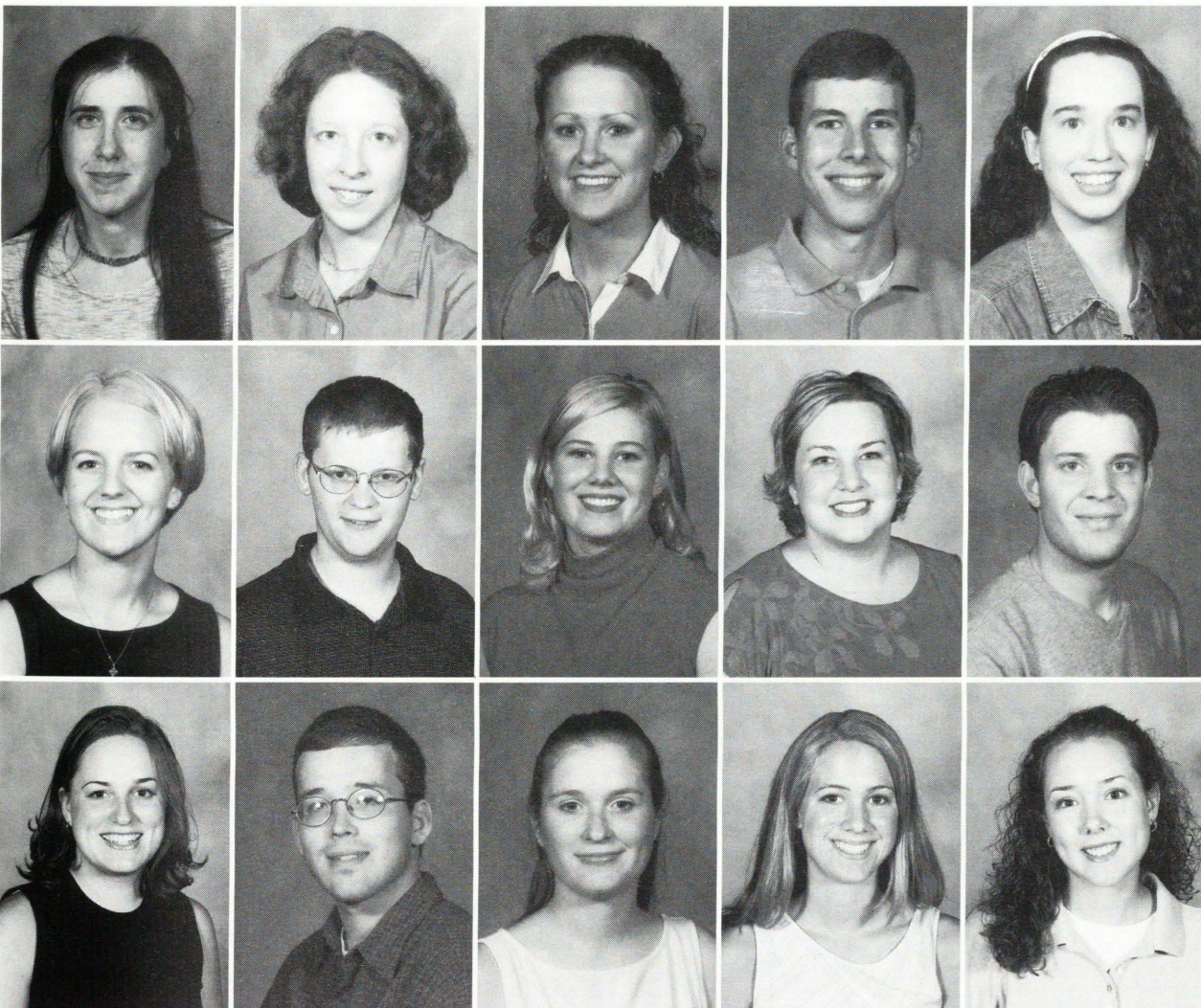
The Osbornes also put on a fire-works show after the football game for all the Bison fans.

Focus on the FACE

Professor helps in the NYC relief

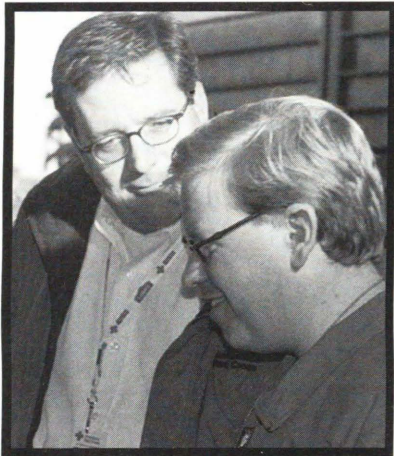

In wake of the tragic events of Sept. 11, Dr. Jack Shock, associate professor of communication, traveled to New York City in early October to aid the American Red Cross with public affairs.

Shock went without knowing what to expect. While he was waiting for his connecting flight in Atlanta, U.S. air strikes began against Afghanistan, adding tension to the already emotional atmosphere.

The area surrounding what used to be the World Trade Center was closed to media, so it was left to the Red Cross's public affairs division to coordinate media connections. Shock made connections for *USA Today*, The History Channel and WNYC radio station.

"I worked with the national media on a level that I never had attempted," Shock said. "I fine-tuned skills that I had for searching out the real story."

While in New York, he was required to wear a helmet when outside a dangerous building, as well as a badge designating that he was a Red Cross volunteer. Respirators were part of the attire because of the compromised air quality in which debris was still heavily present. Gloves decorated with messages of love and support from area churches, donated in a glove drive, were given to all workers and volunteers.

"This experience strengthened my faith in God because I heard so many people ask where was God, and I knew that God was at Ground Zero on Sept. 11," Shock said. "He certainly was on Ground Zero afterwards because I saw Him in the paramedics, the firemen, the policemen and everyone who helped in the recovery."

Residents of New York City called him a hero. His work, along with that of the other volunteers, was treasured. The tone of New York City was of such appreciation that those aiding in the relief were really viewed as heroes.

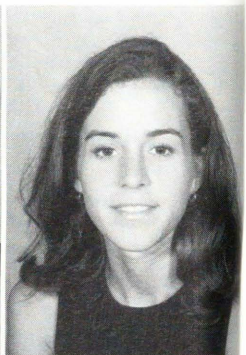
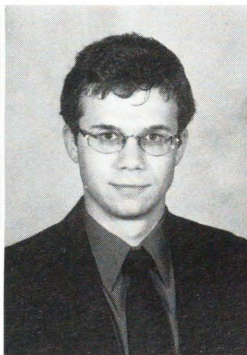
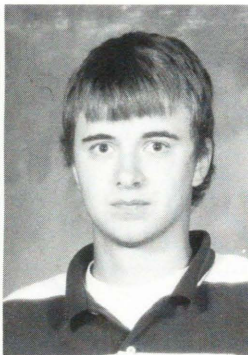
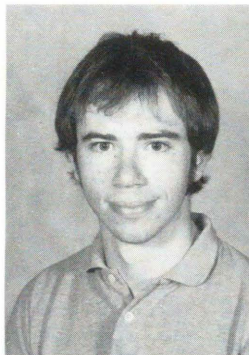

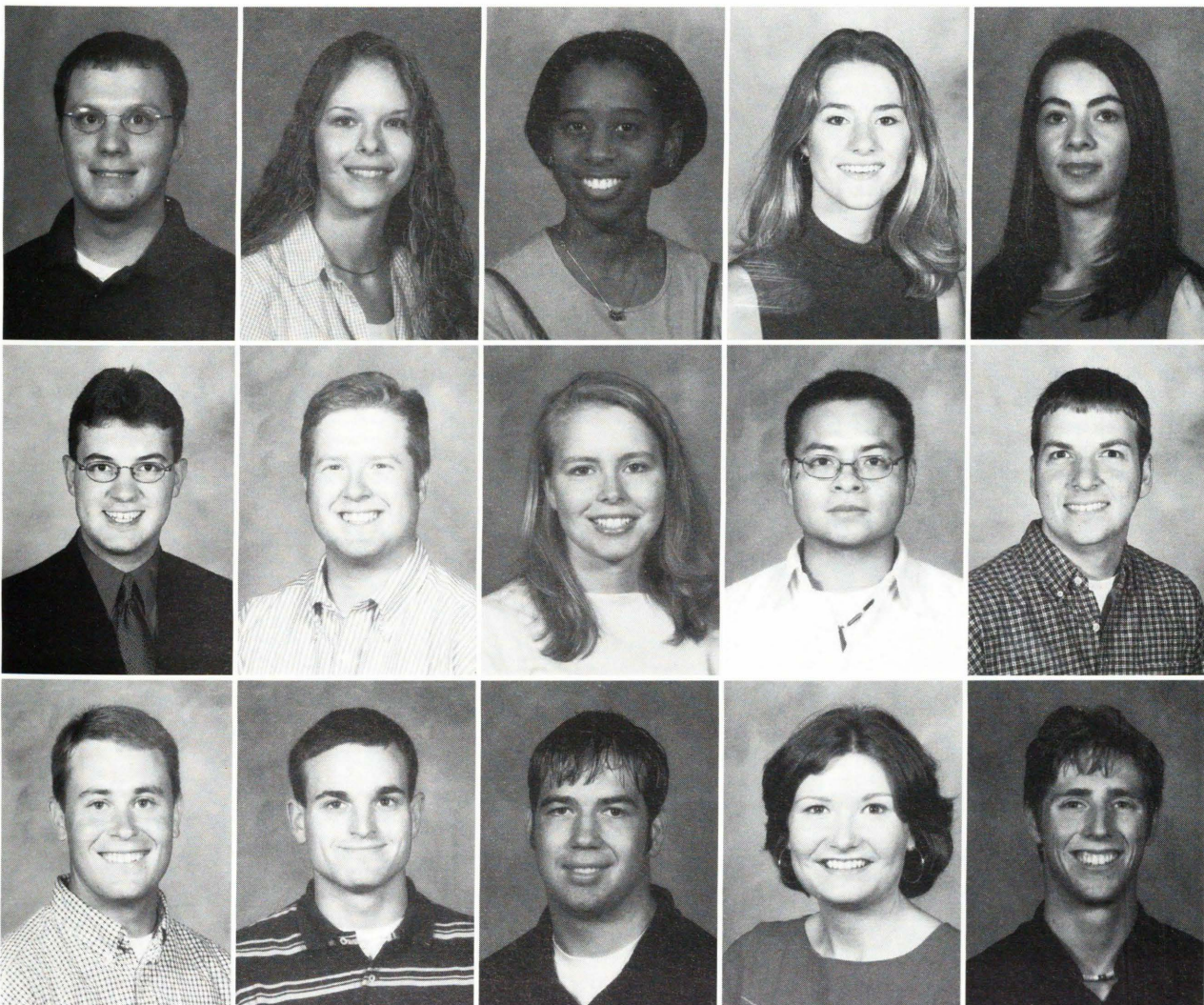

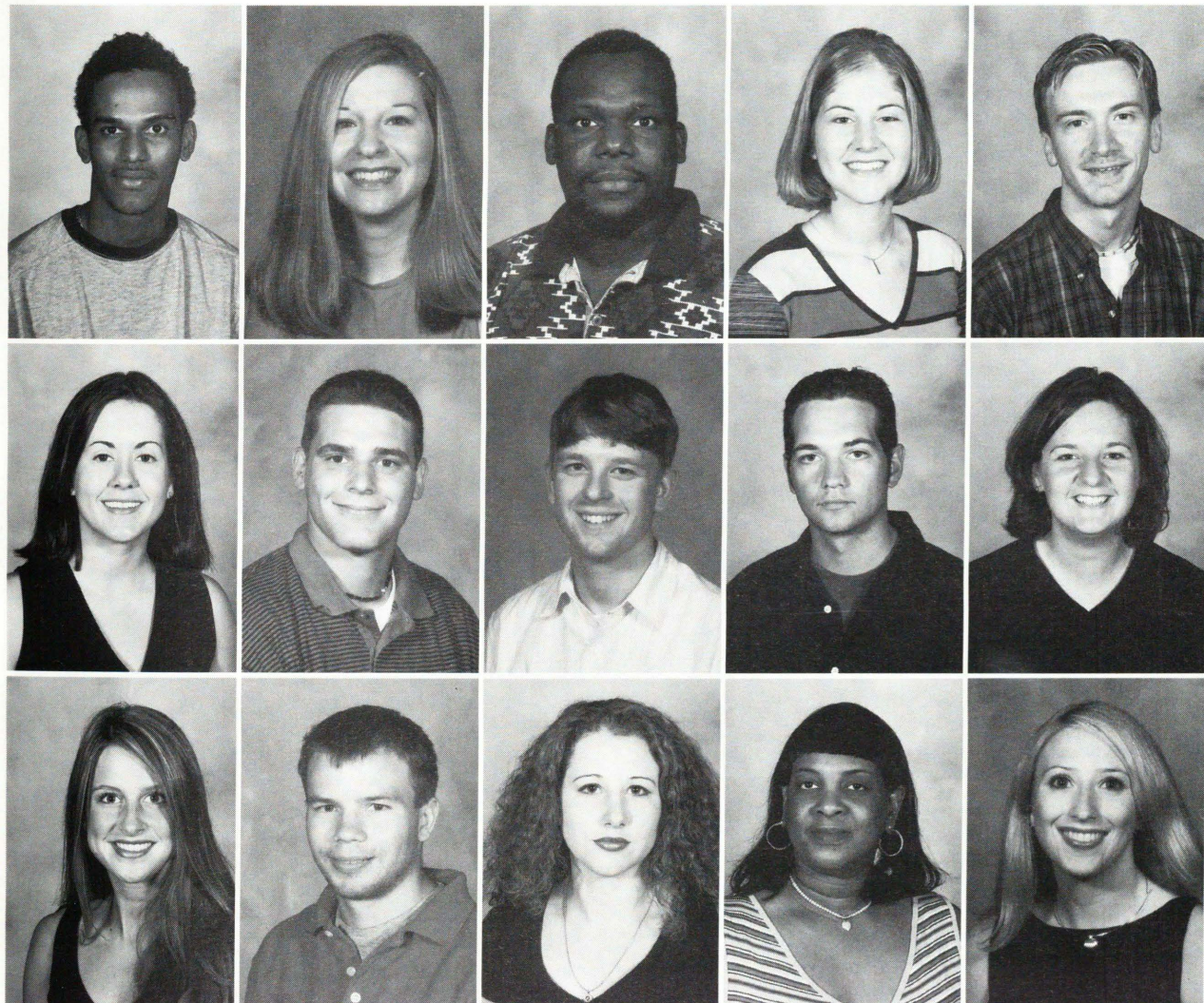
"Slip-and-slide night is the best; it's great time to be spent with the guys," sophomore Stephen Smith said.

Junior called a "modern-day scribe"

Bible professors tell their students of past centuries when ancient scribes meticulously translated the Bible, word-for-word, letter-by-letter, into many languages.

Junior Nataliia Hristova, a youth and family ministry major from Bulgaria, could be called a modern-day scribe. When she is not in school, Hristova spends her afternoons at Truth For Today, an organization that publishes and distributes religious print material in 13 languages, translating text into her native Bulgarian language.

"There is a great need for Christian material in Bulgaria," Hristova said. "There are a lot of denominations in Bulgaria, but the Church of Christ is not well-known."

Hristova graduated in 1996 from college in Bulgaria, but because jobs in her homeland were scarce, she decided to move to Athens, Greece to find work. While working in Athens and learning Greek, Hristova went back to school to master another foreign language: English.

"For our translators, it is not enough to have a literal translation," said Eddie Cloer, director of Truth For Today. "Our translators must be very knowledgeable of English, their receptive language and the Bible."

Hristova's knowledge of Harding developed as she came in contact with students and staff who were visiting the Athens Church of Christ. Each semester, students and staff who were with the Harding University Greece program would visit the Athens church.

Upon her expected graduation in May 2003, Hristova hopes to return to Bulgaria and start a translation center. She also looks forward to working with the youth in her home congregation. Until then, she will continue to translate while attending school.

To help the long lines, the HUB offered a new program this spring. Students who had a credit card could pre-order their books by giving the HUB their class schedule before the start of the new semester. Their books were ready for them to pick up the day of registration.

"This year the lines were surprisingly short due to the new pre-ordering program," senior print journalism major **Chrissy Ingram** said. "I was quite pleased."

The HUB was dedicated to serving not only students but faculty, staff and visitors by offering items such as class rings, computer software, Bibles and children's books.

Special promotions were held throughout the year. In December the HUB held its annual Appreciation Day Sale when all items, except sale items, were 20% off. Also, seniors were offered the chance to attend a graduation fair and ring day hosted by the bookstore.

To help students save money, the bookstore had an "in-store" courtesy discount of 10%. This discount was off of the supplier's suggested list price and was offered on most books except textbooks. For art students, a 20% discount was offered on all Liquitex and Grumbacher Art supplies.

This year the bookstore was accredited by the National Association of College Stores, the Christian Bookstore Association and the Southwest College Bookstore Association.

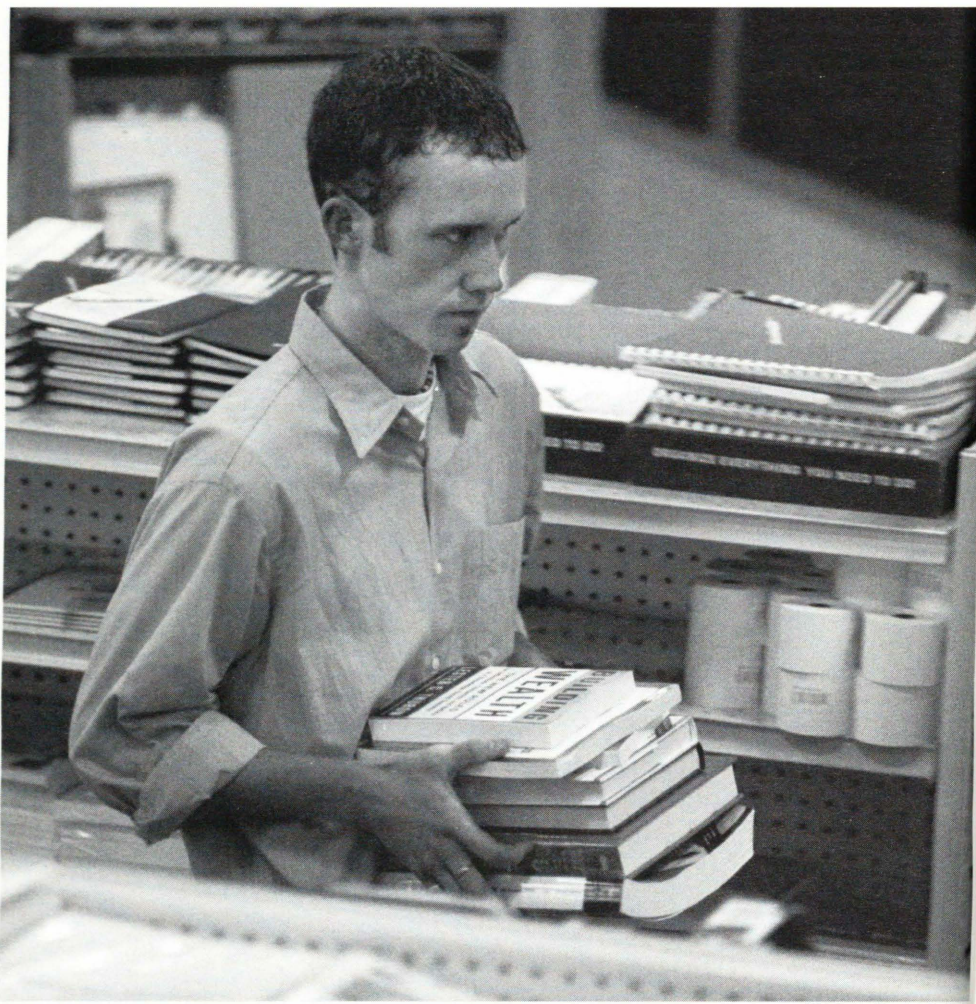

"RHODES ROWDIES" KNOWN AS THE best fans IN THE STATE OF ARKANSAS

Henderson State University referred to the Rhodes Field House as "a hostile environment" before they played the Bisons in January, reflecting the reputation of Harding's student body.

Harding fans, known as the "Rhodes Rowdies" because of their enthusiastic support at home games, have earned a reputation as some of the best basketball fans in the state of Arkansas.

Head coach Jeff Morgan has been leading the men's basketball team for nine years. According to Morgan, the games were held in the Ganus Athletic Center when he began his coaching career at Harding.

"The Ganus is so big that it is hard to generate the kind of atmosphere that we wanted," Morgan said. "In our fifth season, we moved to the Rhodes. Ever since then, there has been a really special connection between the Rowdies and the players."

On January 10, 2002, the Bisons recorded the sixth largest crowd in Gulf South Conference history and third largest in Harding history, playing nationally-ranked Henderson

State University with 3,065 Rowdies cheering them on. Henderson State graduate David Gatling of North Little Rock attended the game.

"As an HSU alumnus I am extremely jealous," Gatling said January 21, 2002, in a letter to the *Arkansas Democrat-Gazette*. "I wish our fans were only half as good as Harding's, and I am sure other Gulf South coaches are jealous as well."

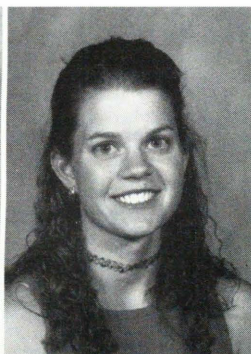
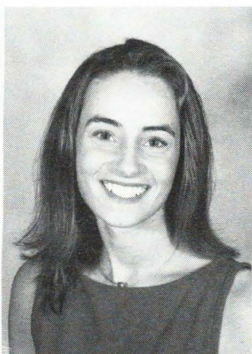
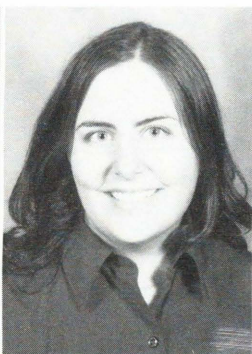
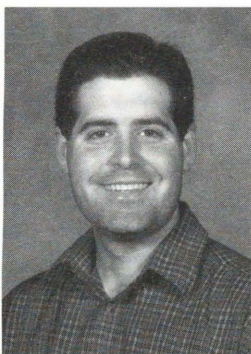
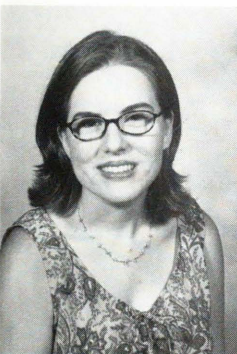
Sophomore Jessica Mosley believes that Harding students enjoy the basketball games because students are unified through chants and cheers for the team.

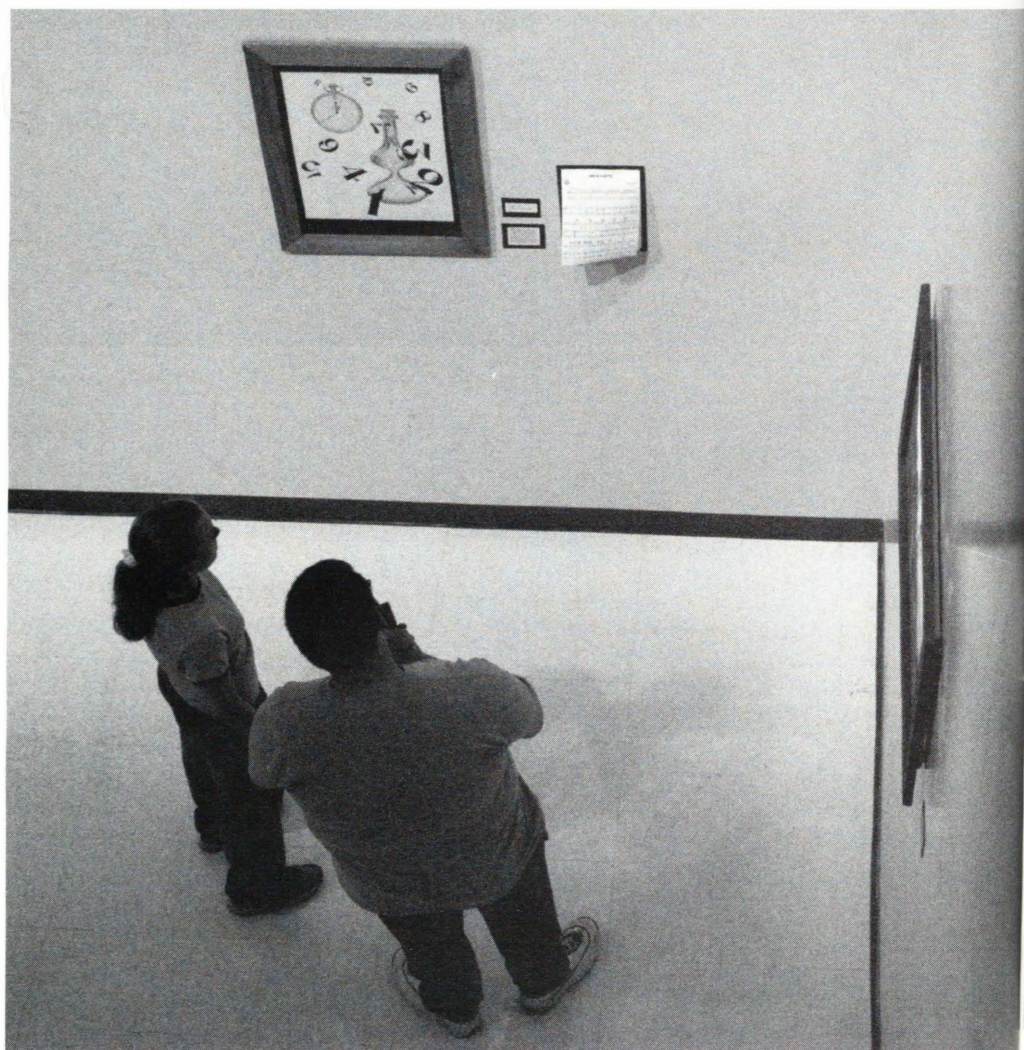

FEEDING AND MINISTERING TO THE homeless BENEFITS GROUP OF STUDENTS

On a typical Friday night at Harding, many students were on their way to Little Rock for a visit to the mall or to watch a movie. But for a few people, the trip to Little Rock was not a typical night out.

Early in the fall semester, junior Adam Kirkland and sophomore Jennifer Driggers were looking for something to do in Arkansas' capital. Kirkland remembered an experience he and junior Suzi Murrie had while on free travel in London in the fall of 2000. Kirkland and Murrie bought a few flapjacks and decided to distribute them to homeless people on the subway; Driggers and Kirkland did the same thing in Little Rock with granola bars.

What started out with two people grew to 40 people during the course of the year. Every Friday night, students met in the McInteer Bible building to travel to Markham Avenue in downtown Little Rock. Not only did students give physical nourishment, but they were also able to share God's Word with many people who needed to hear it.

"This experience was taking us out

of the bubble that we have created around ourselves and put us into a world where there is such a need for Christ," freshman Cammy Strickler said.

A number of people who helped with this work found that they would often get filled spiritually without even thinking they would. "We say often times that you get more than you put in, but it's so true," freshman Dave Pritchett said. "I see Christ in these people despite the spiritual raggedness; I see something in them that we all need to have."

Junior Mike Culpepper referred to it as a win-win situation. The people they met were fed both physically and spiritually, and the students involved got fed spiritually also.

"It made me realize how strong of a faith you still can have when you don't have anything," Culpepper said.

This weekly trip was definitely a blessing for Strickler. "Each time I went, God blessed me more and more," he said. "It's amazing because people thank us for helping them, but actually I'm the one who is blessed."

"But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus, his Son, purifies us from all sin." 1 John 1:7

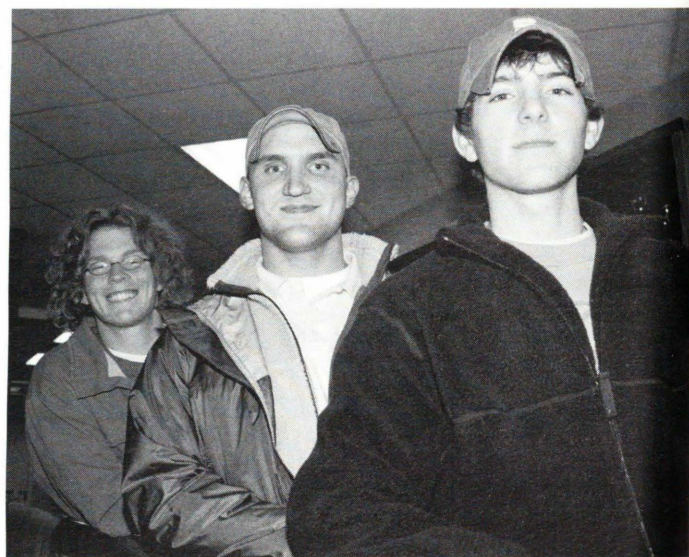
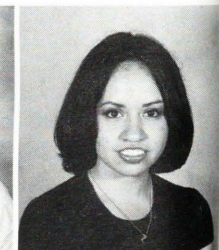
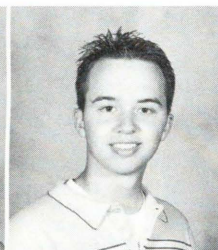
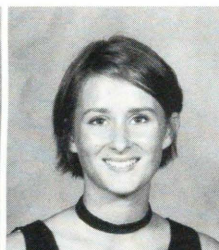
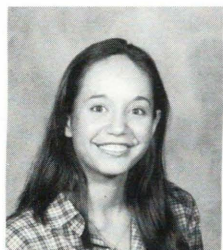
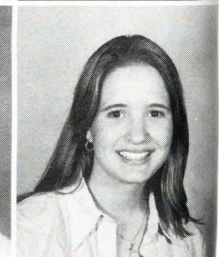
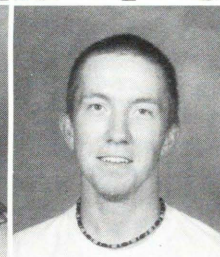
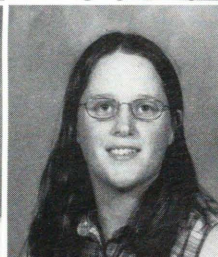
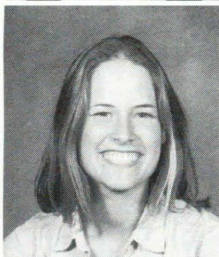
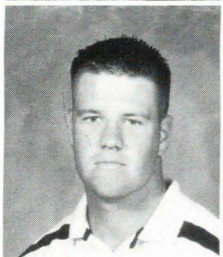

RADIO SHOW DURING THE YEAR

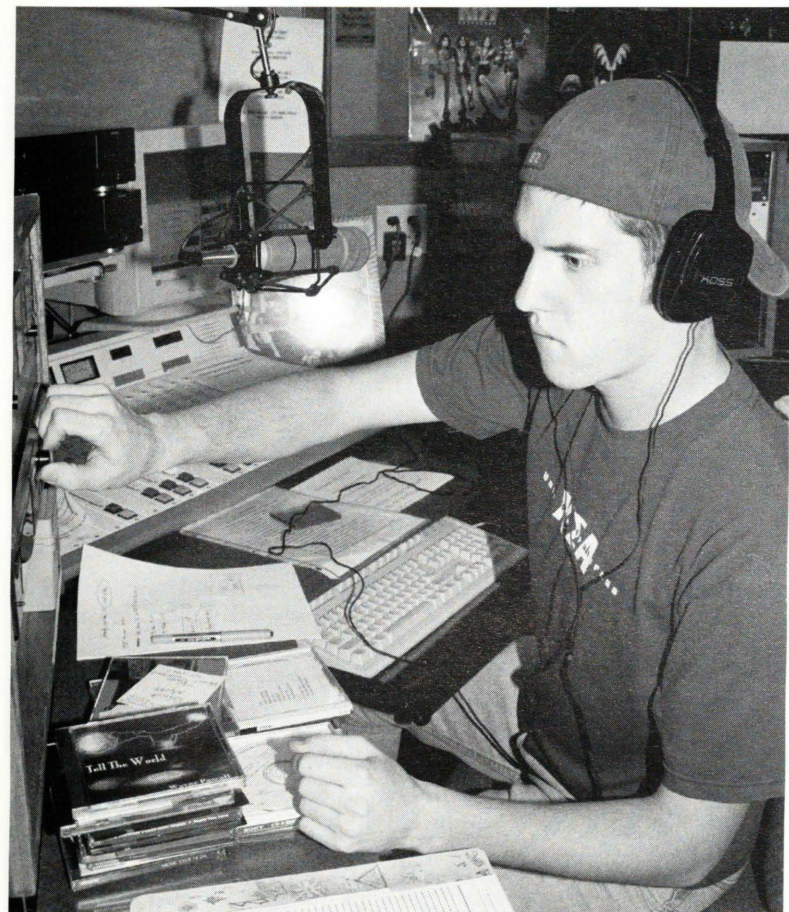

many fans out there."

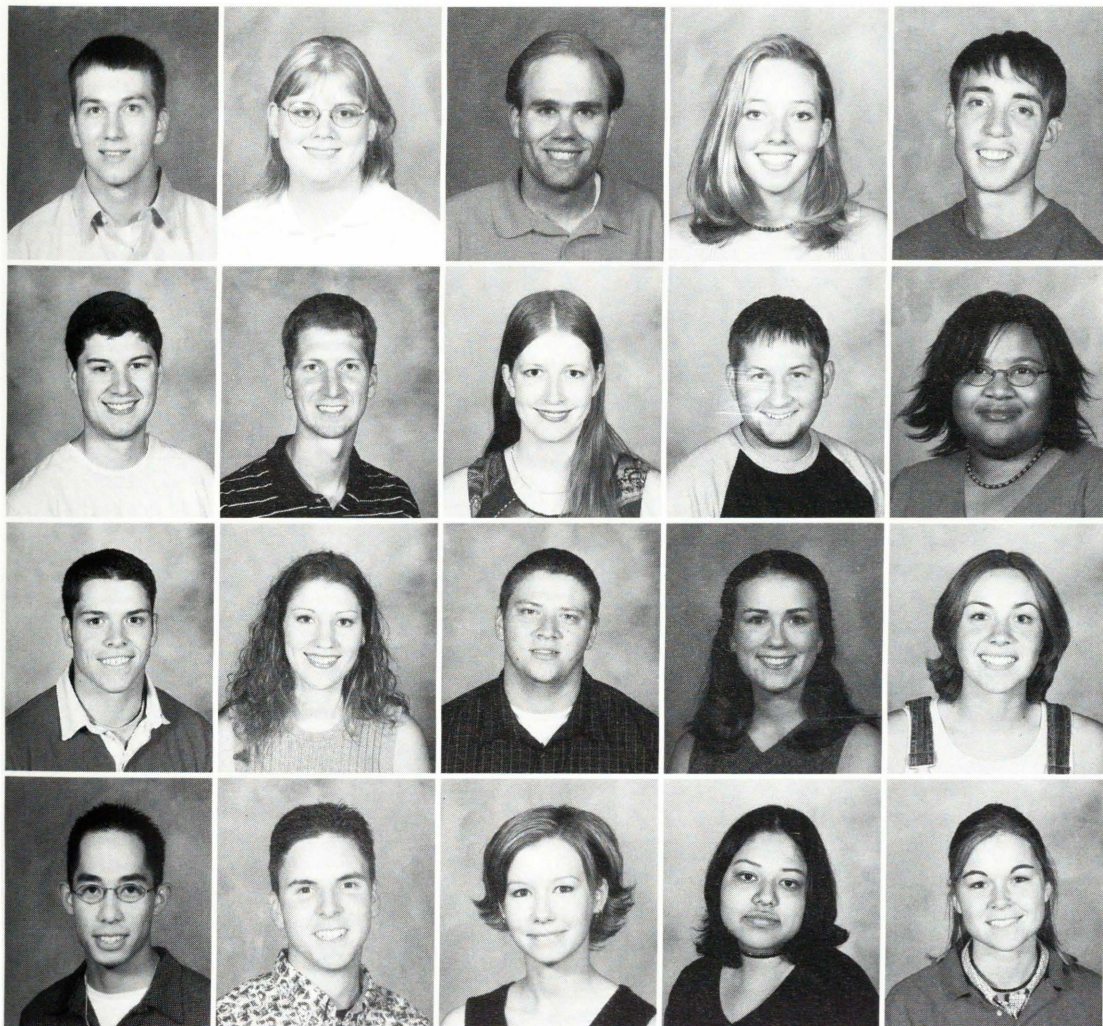

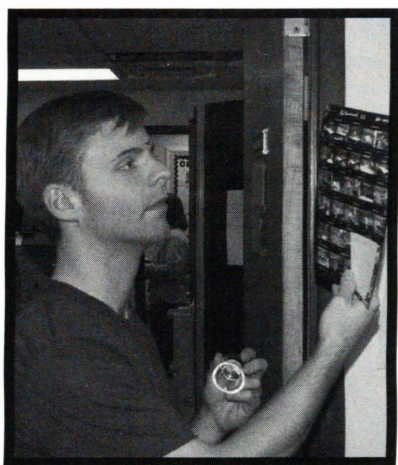

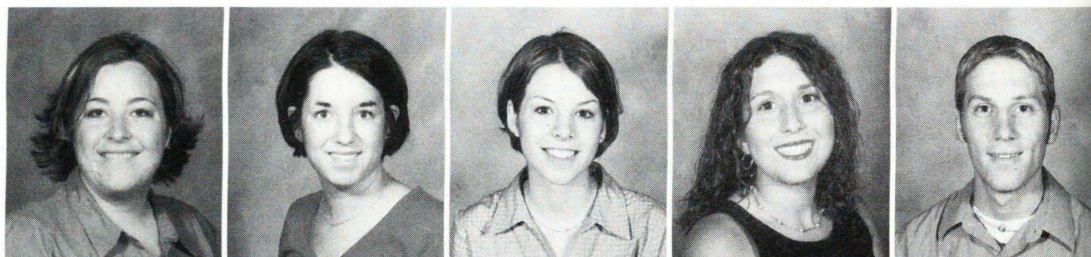

The Dubois' also won a 2002 Isuzu Axiom. While his mother was the official winner, Dubois said his father will be driving the vehicle.

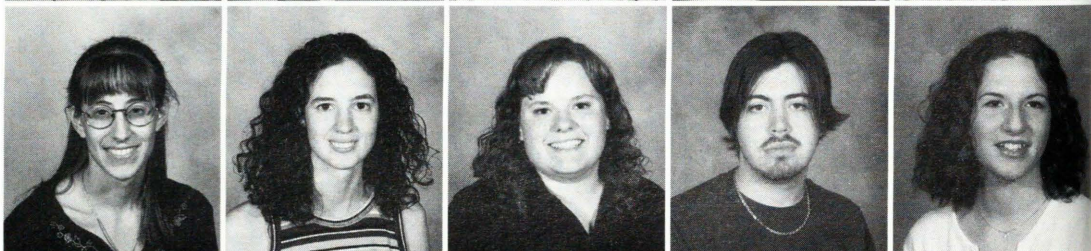
"It's an awesome car," Dubois said. "It came fully loaded from the factory with leather, a six-disc changer, a sunroof and four-wheel drive."

If you lived on campus last fall, you numbered among those affected by the Internet outage caused by the Nimda virus.

Nimda was a new virus that spread through e-mail messages like many viruses in the past, but it also used network shares, web pages, instant messaging and file infections.

The virus spread throughout the world in a matter of hours.

Once it was on the Harding campus, it brought the entire network to its knees quickly, due to the network traffic it generated trying to spread itself to other machines.

Fortunately, Nimda was not a destructive virus.

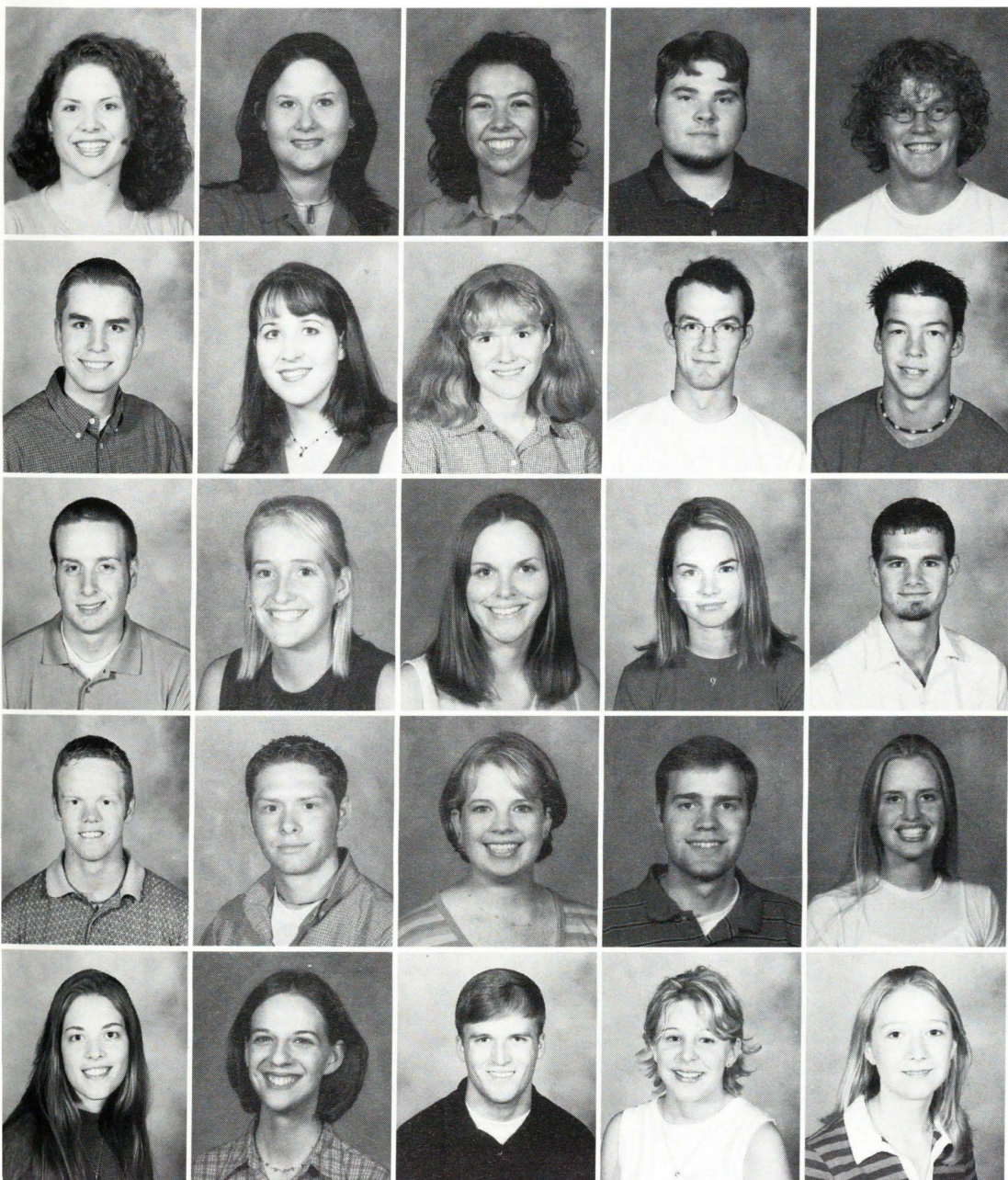
"For several years now, Harding has depended heavily on e-mail filters to protect the campus from virus outbreaks," said John Nunnally, director of network operations. "Thankfully, this approach has allowed us to

avoid many of the virus attacks suffered by others. This filtering will remain in place because, in many instances, we are able to stop new viruses even before they have been identified by the virus protection software companies."

Nunnally also said the DormNet staff, DormNet Assistants and the Information Technology Academic Support staff worked 24-hour days in order to get the network running again for the students and faculty.

"Faced with the task of 'disinfecting' nearly 3,000 campus computers, we decided to take an aggressive approach to the problem," he said. "And, because of the threat of future, more destructive attacks, we decided to implement a campus-wide virus protection plan. Hopefully, this will protect all machines on campus in the future."

Besides staff members, other groups that were shown appreciation throughout the week included Servicemaster, Resident Assistants, faculty and Aramark staff members.

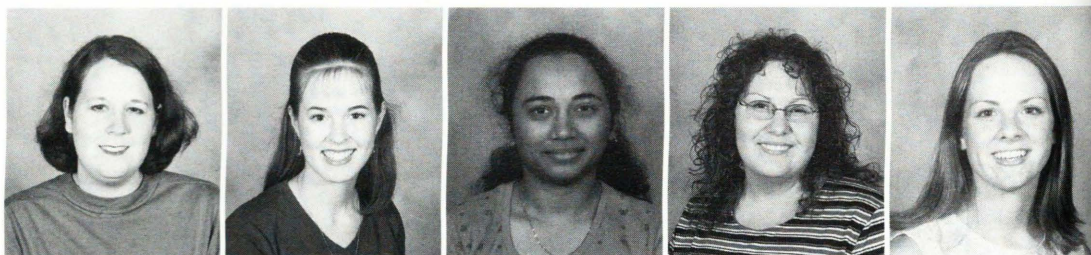

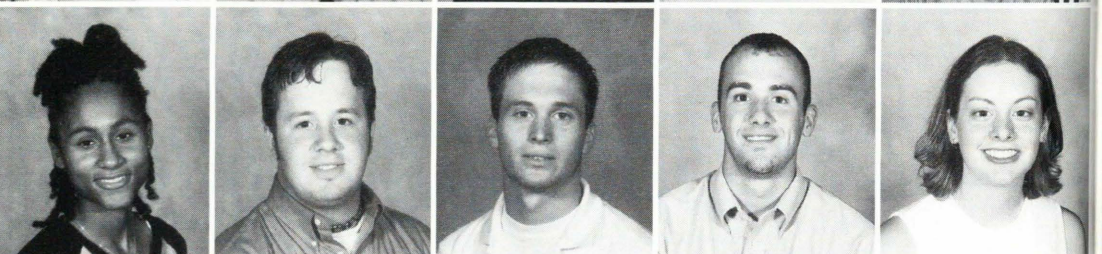

WOMEN ALLOWED IN MEN'S

dorm lobbies

FOR FIRST TIME AT HARDING

Rule changes including the admission of women to men's dorm lobbies were put in place this year by the Student Services Office, reflecting the increased willingness of the administration to accommodate legitimate student requests.

"It's long overdue," said Roddy Mote, assistant dean of students.

Beginning at noon and ending at 10:30 p.m., men and women could socialize inside men's housing.

For women to be allowed in men's lobbies, the administration required the use of an alarm system on the side doors in the men's dorms. Because the installation of an alarm system on side doors is a new development, student opinion varied. Some students were thankful for the change.

"I like the change because it's more convenient," sophomore Sara Gregerson said. "If

you need to talk to a guy or need his help, girls can now get a hold of them easier."

"The new lobby rules should definitely continue," junior resident assistant Bob Moloney said. "It's nice to finally have the option of having a girl in the lobby."

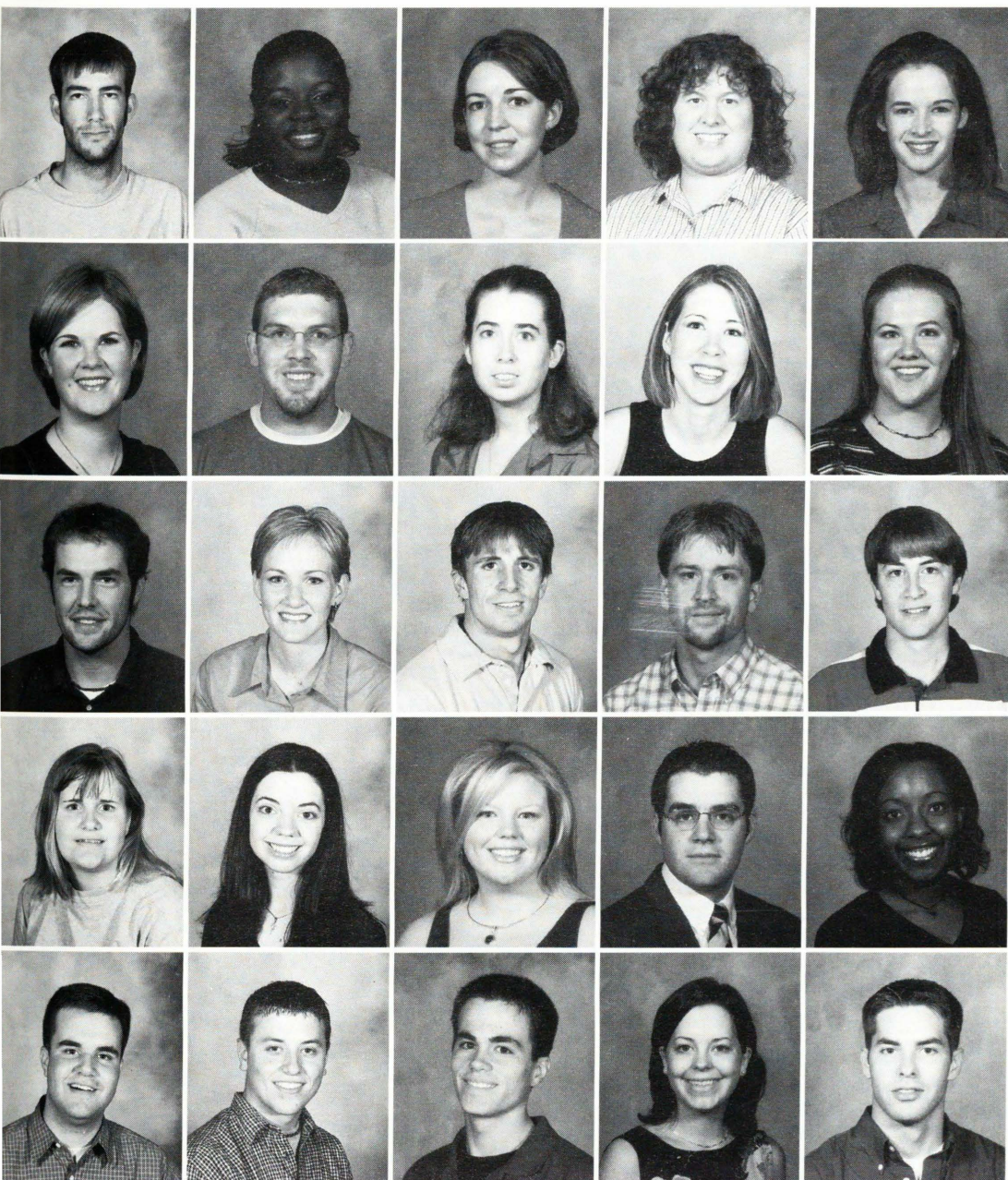
Some men, however, didn't think having women in the dorms was worth the inconvenience.

"Having girls come to the lobby is no compensation for the use of an alarm system," sophomore Sidney Green said.

"If having girls in the lobby is going to cause the alarm junk, we don't want the girls," freshman Brad McCormick said.

While the changes brought mixed reactions from students, Mote said they were made to heighten responsibility for the students and to make campus life more enjoyable.

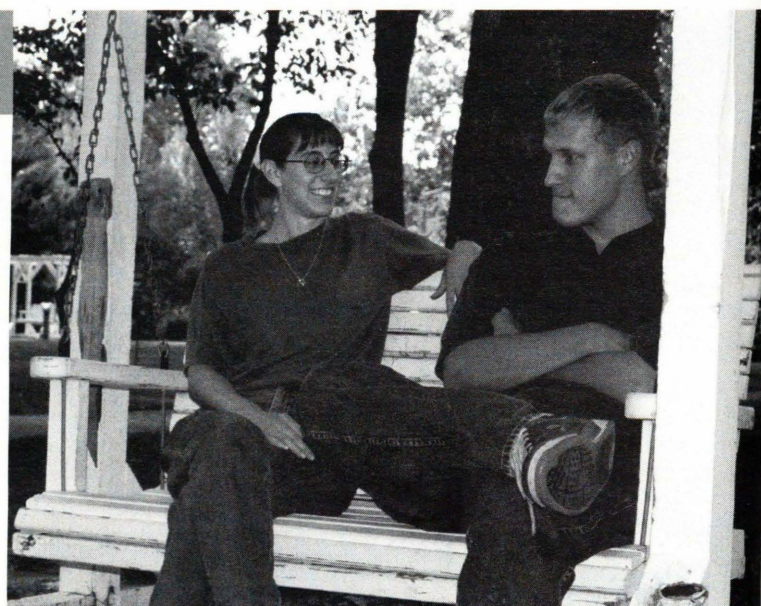

"This is a benefit to me so we can find justice," he said. "This is what I can do for my country."

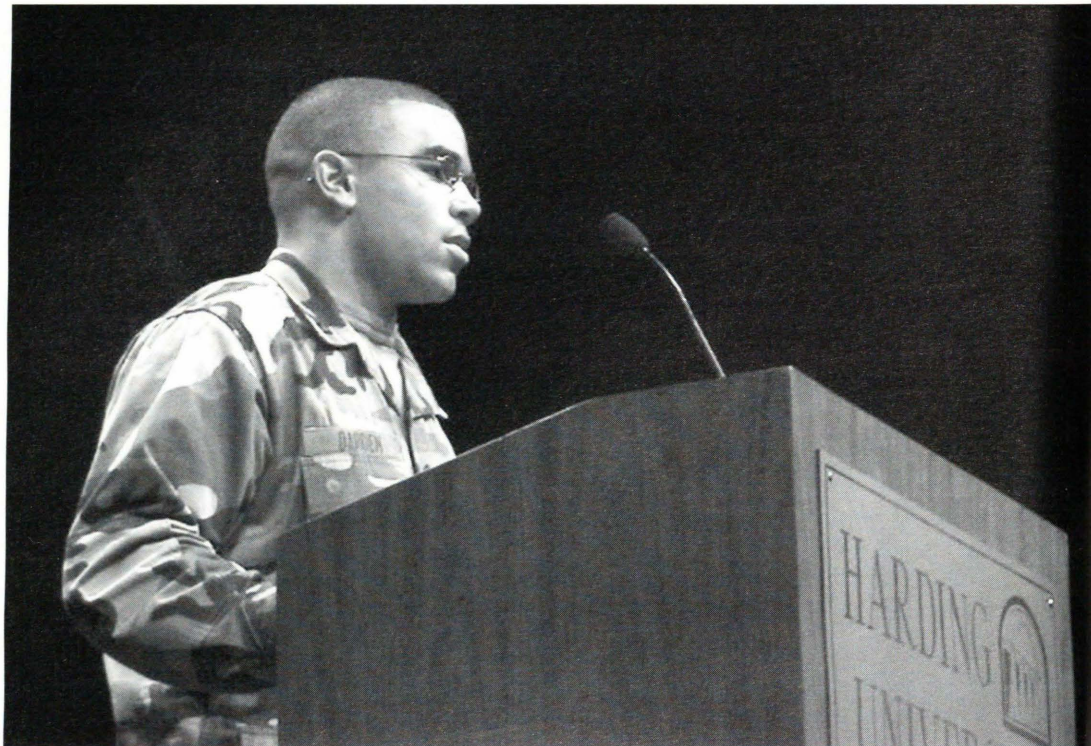
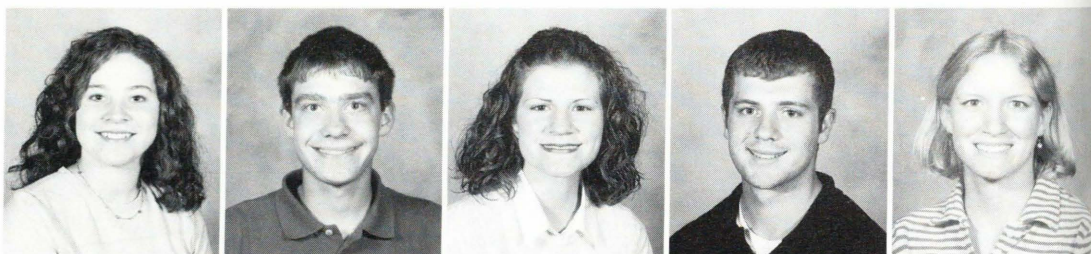
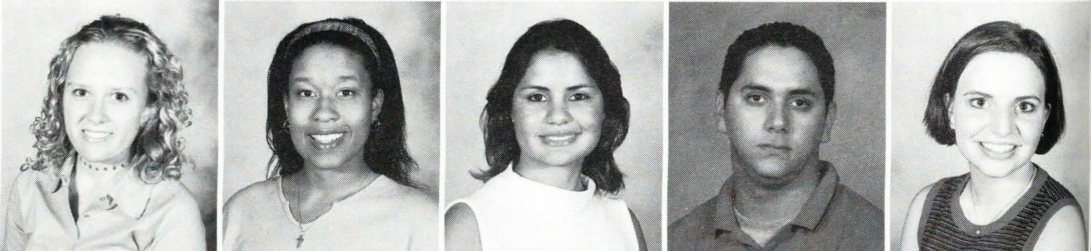

TOPPING 5,000 STUDENTS

Harding experienced record enrollment again in 2001, topping 5,000 students for the first time in university history.

"The growth is particularly in the education and business graduate programs," president David Burks said. "We have a new graduate professional center in North Little Rock with more than 300 students enrolled this fall, and our [Searcy] education programs continue to grow as well."

Burks said the administration, along with the admissions office, has targeted a three percent growth rate at the undergraduate level.

"When it gets beyond that," he said, "we cut it off."

Mike Williams, assistant vice president for admissions and student financial services, complies with the university's enrollment strategy, but he says that it's a difficult decision.

"This year we've bumped up our academic requirements, somewhat narrowing the funnel at the bottom," Williams said. "I'm struggling with that because I always ask myself the same

questions. Who do I not want to come? Who do I not want to have this experience?"

Williams and Burks share the sentiment that the larger Harding's enrollment gets, the greater the risk of losing the family-like atmosphere that currently exists on campus.

"The current rate of growth has been manageable because we are able to keep class sizes down by adding new faculty and larger facilities," Burks said. "But as the numbers get higher, we definitely risk losing the appearance of our close-knit family atmosphere."

With enrollment numbers on the rise year after year, students and faculty question if an enrollment cap will be enforced in the near future.

"This issue has been discussed since I was a student here," Burks said. "It was discussed when we hit 1,000 students, and there was serious discussion that we should never let it get past that number. It's been discussed to some degree ever since. The one thing I can promise is this: It will surely continue to be discussed."

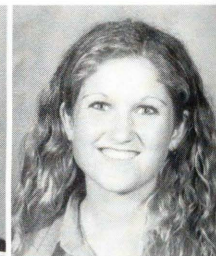
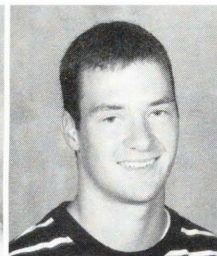
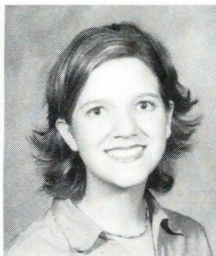
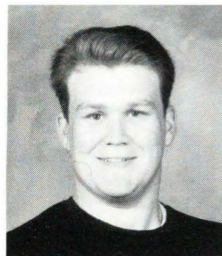
"Cloer knows what tasks to take on and which ones are too big," Etheridge said. "It is important for the SA president to be able to delegate, and Steve is great at that."

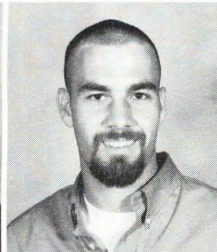
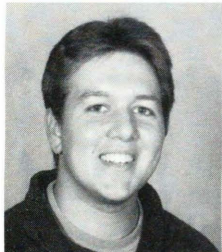
"Steve has a great love for the lost, for evangelism and for missions," Burks said. "His commitment to the spiritual mission will make a great impact on this university."

"I looked forward to seeing all the gross and just outright weird things that the people would do every week on 'Survivor'," said senior Chris Rich.

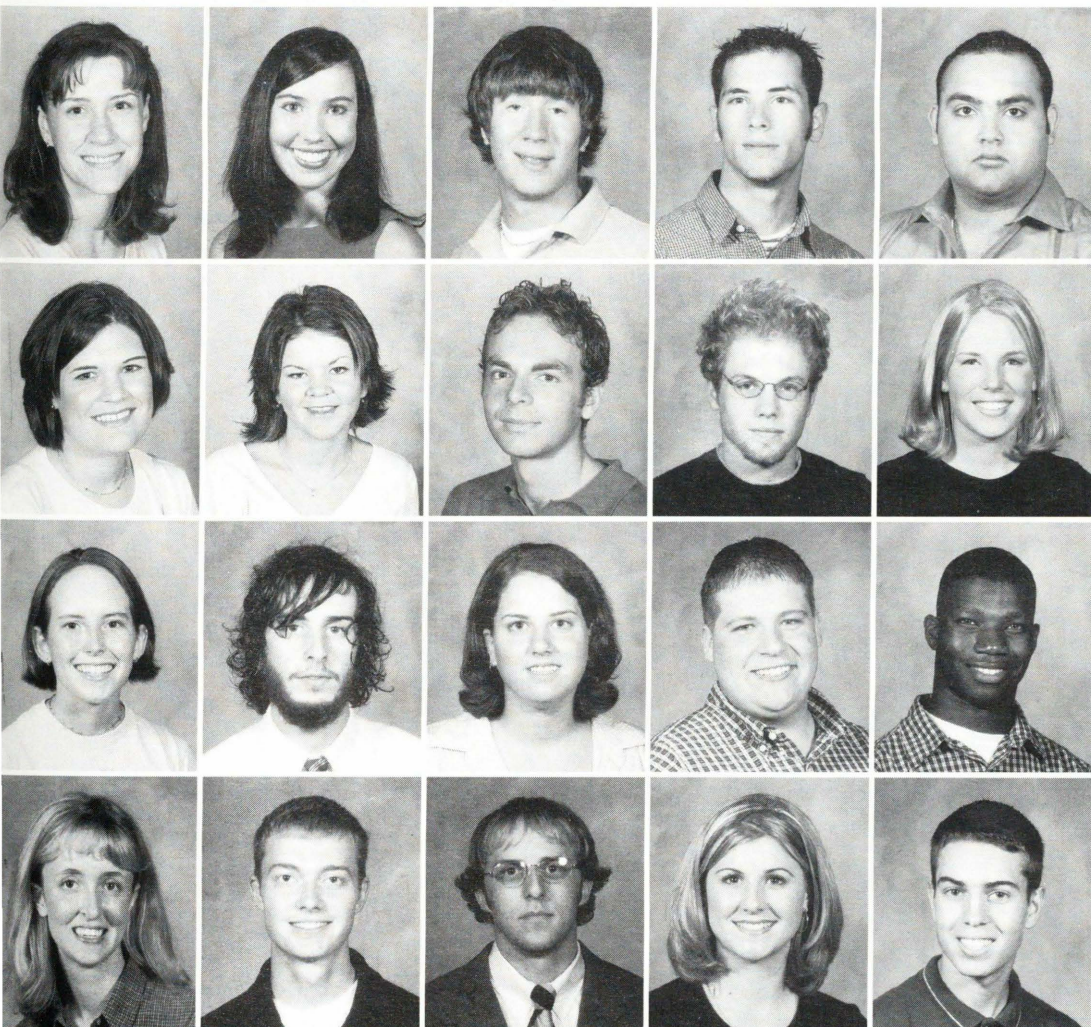
Many students shared this view and even had "Survivor" parties on Thursday nights.

Ryan Travis was the Bison Bike mechanic this year. Bike City provided many parts for these repairs.

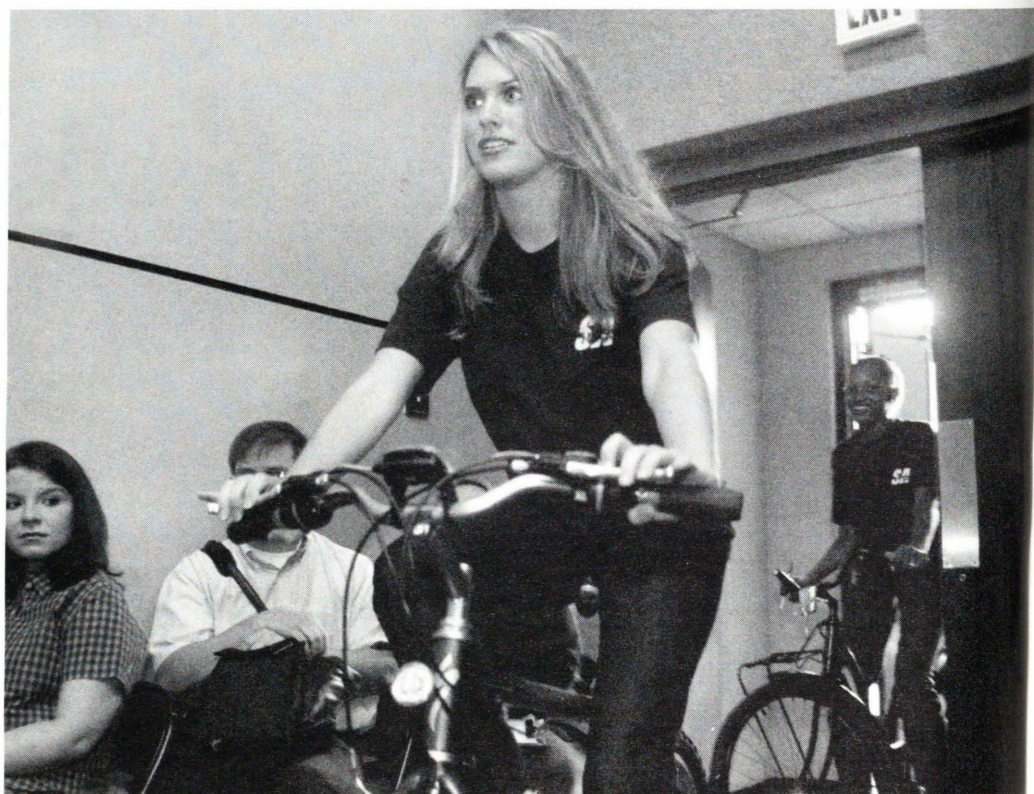

Other students seemed to have an even dimmer opinion of the devices.

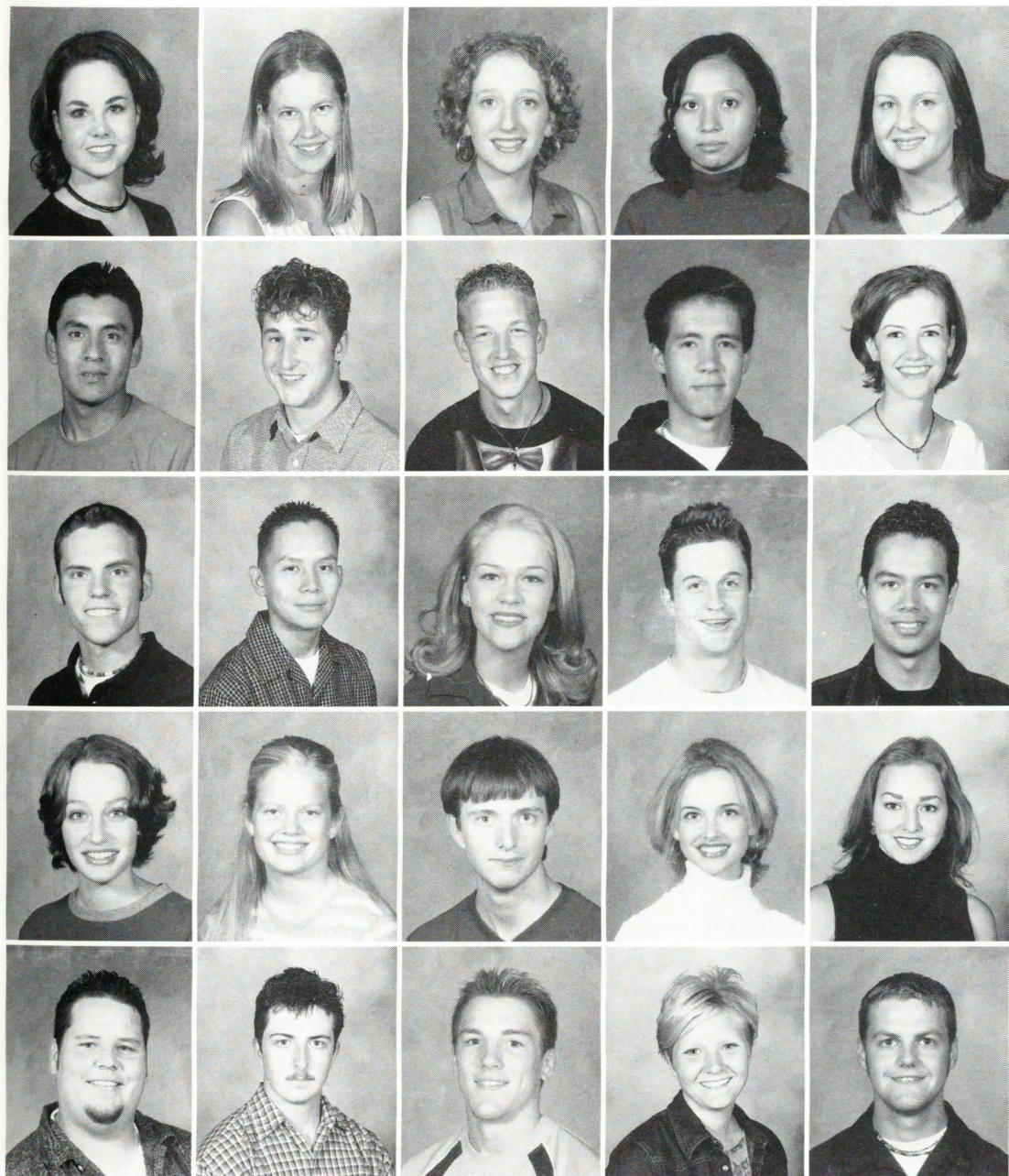
"Actually, I hate cell phones; I just own one," freshman Scott Walters said.

thon in Huntsville, Ala. and the 10K Gum Tree Race in Tupelo, Miss.

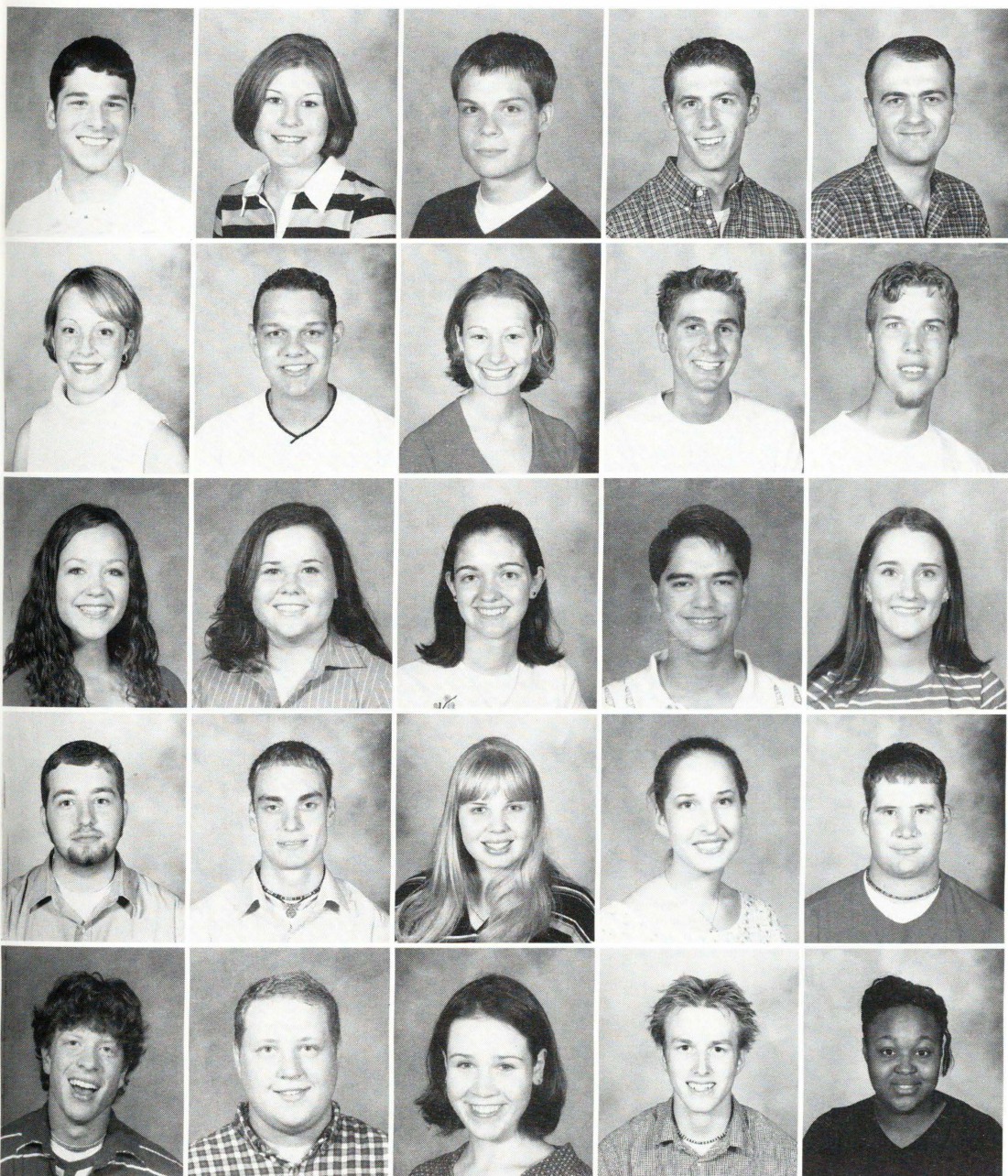
With the increasing emphasis on fitness, as well as the need for more classroom space, an addition was built on the southeast corner of the Ganus Athletic Center.

Elrod, political science professor.

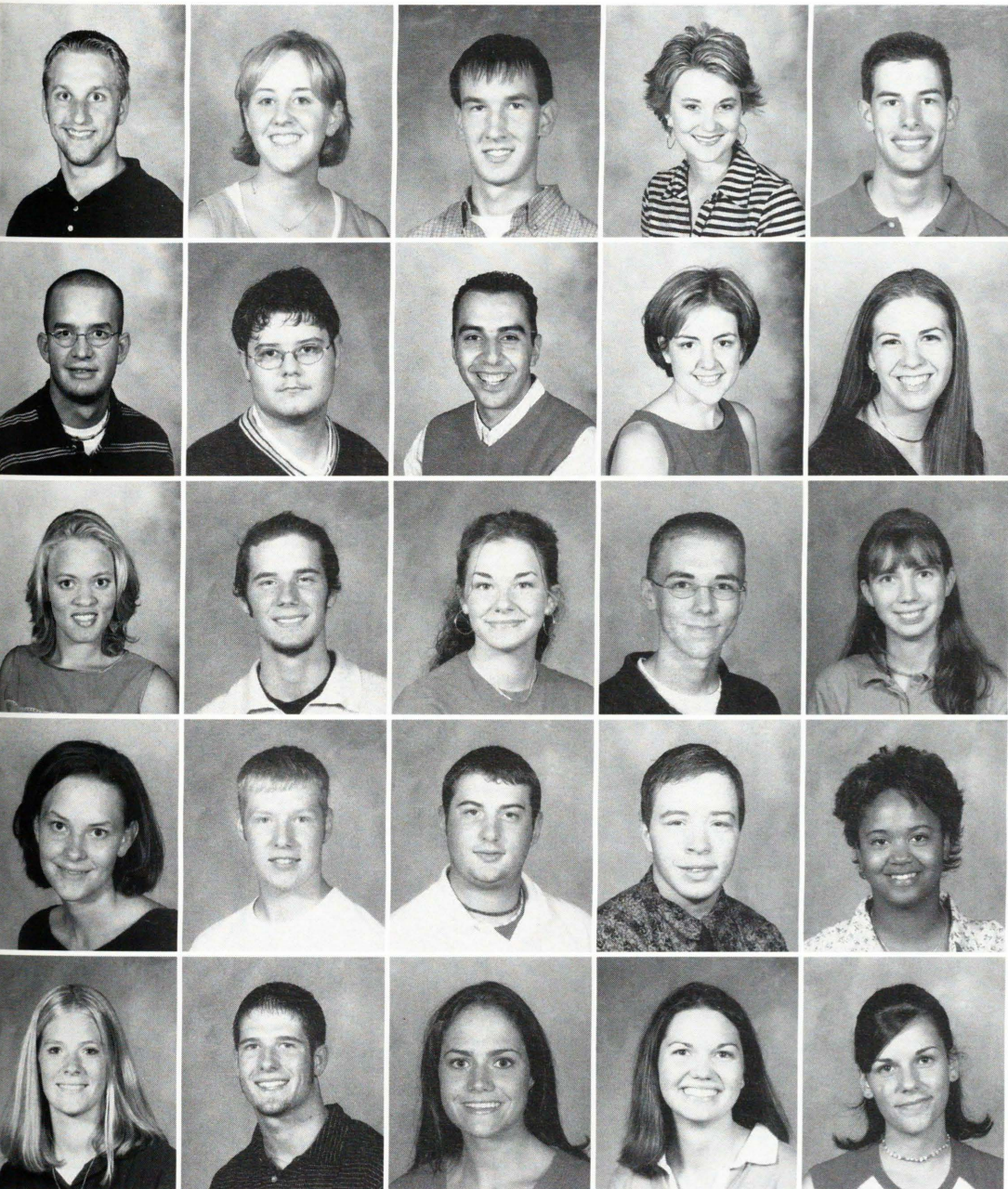

The White County Fair provided students a fun, memorable night that everyone could enjoy.

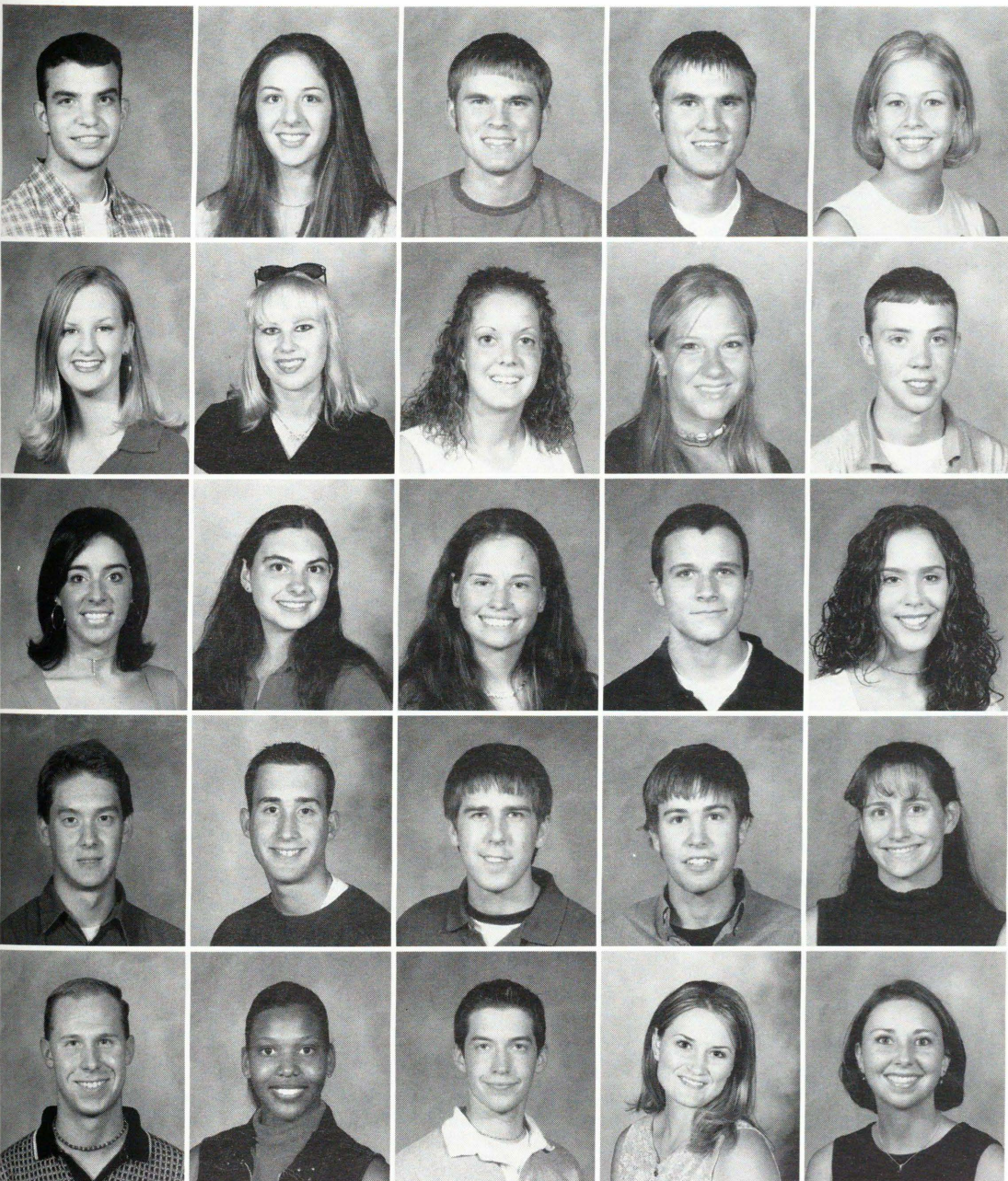
