Travel was a significant part of many students' experience at Harding. The vice presidents of Delta Gamma Rho, juniors Ashleigh Arthurs and Emily Spencer, made travel an over-arching theme of their second round mixer called "All Aboard the DGR Train."

Arthurs and Spencer studied abroad at Harding University in Latin America the previous semester and were inspired to plan a mixer around the theme of travel. When brainstorming ideas for mixers, they could not stop thinking about travel because it was something almost everyone could relate to.

"We thought travel is something that everyone has an opinion about," Arthurs said. "The way the conversations were set up, we tried to avoid having the standard five minute conversation you have with everyone: what's your name, what's your major, what dorm do you live in."

The mixer took place Sept. 19 in the Ganus Athletic Center and featured different stations representing the process of traveling. The members were split into groups which were responsible for different conversation topics, including "Where you're going," "Who you would take with you," and "Where have you been?" There were also groups that discussed obstacles in traveling and in life, one group that made postcards for people on campus, and one group that played the "shoe game."

As part of the "shoe game," members brought shoes from their closet and potential members

picked a shoe from the pile that they thought best described them. Senior Courtney Ralston, who was assigned to this group, said she picked a running shoe.

"Picking different shoes was a great way to get to know the girls," Ralston said. "Some people went with a sparkly shoe, others a running shoe, and some picked Chacos. It was neat to see what people chose and how they described themselves with it."

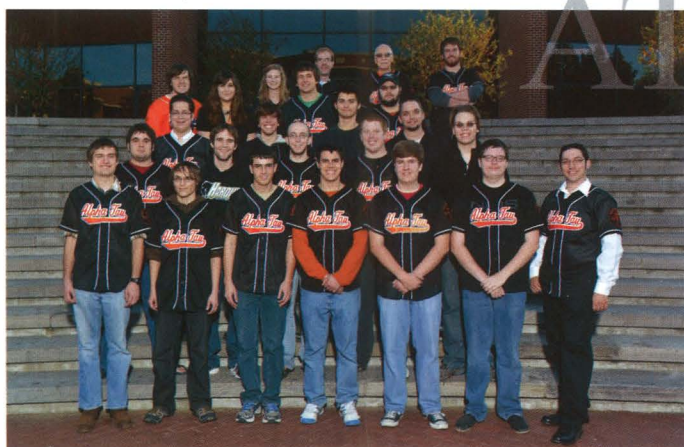

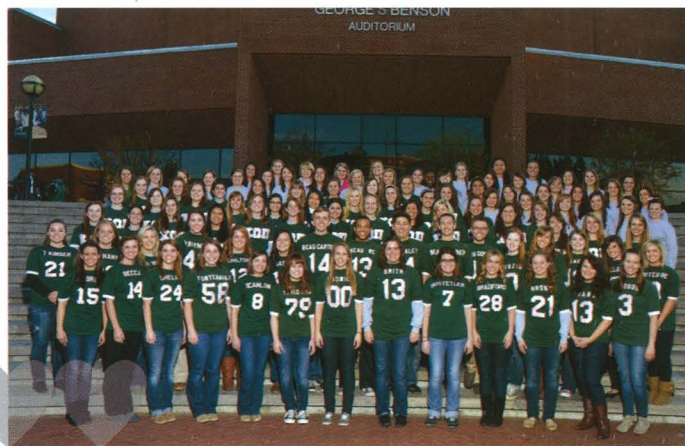

Harding rallies for 12 hours at third annual Relay for Life

A fundraiser established in 1986 by Dr. Gordy Klatt, a surgeon in Tacoma, Wash., Relay for Life was held annually to raise money and to spread awareness for the American Cancer Society. The event took place in thousands of locations across the globe, and Harding hosted its own event Oct. 12. There were 23 teams, which included 350 students who fundraised from 5 p.m. to 5 a.m. The night was a time to celebrate the many birthdays that cancer survivors had after their battle with cancer and to remember those who lost their fight.

Social clubs played a large part in the success of Relay for Life. Service directors from clubs planned for months for the fundraisers they held that night. TNT and Zeta Rho sold hot dogs and chili, Iota Chi sold tie-dyed T-shirts, Pi Theta Phi let people paint plates and Delta Nu took photo booth pictures for \$2 a picture.

The service directors of Delta Gamma Rho, seniors Annalyse Faulk and Brooke Durgin, could not think of any idea more appealing than giving students the opportunity to play with puppies.

"As soon as we thought of the idea, I just knew we had to do it," Durgin said. "Most students don't have pets since they live in the dorms, so I knew they would be willing to pay for an opportunity to pet the puppies."

An important part of the event was the survivors who spoke about their battle with cancer and gave hope to those who had lost loved ones. The speakers were Becky

Boaz, instructor of Family and Consumer Sciences, and her daughter, freshman Whitney Putska.

The co-chairs of the Relay for Life committee, seniors Hannah Stone and Kelsey Deshazo, said that the presence of the survivors at the event showed people the importance of relaying and how people could benefit from the money raised that night.

"I think it brings it to reality and puts a face to the cause," Deshazo said. "Instead of raising money for whoever, it's like we're raising money for these people."

Deshazo and Stone worked diligently for months to make certain everything went smoothly the night of the event. They agreed that it was completely worth it because the event raised about \$10,000, and they had a lot of fun along the way.

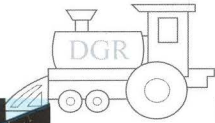
"It's so much fun to be on the committee," Stone said. "You get to talk to people and hear their stories. I would encourage everyone to get involved, even if they don't know what it is because it's a lot of fun."

Most Relay for Life events did not have a Christian foundation, but Harding students were able to bring their faith to the cause by praying during the event and talking about what God had done in the lives of the survivors.

At the end of night, everyone was exhausted, but the students were thrilled they had made an impact by supporting the fight against cancer and having fun at the same time.

Many girls enjoyed the informal atmosphere of the function. Junior Zoë Growald said it was more "low-key" than many other Delta Nu functions.

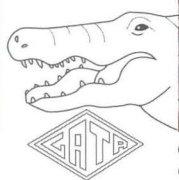
"It was fun to just hang out with friends on a special night, somewhere we don't normally go," Growald said. "It was less involved than some of our other functions, but sometimes simple is better."

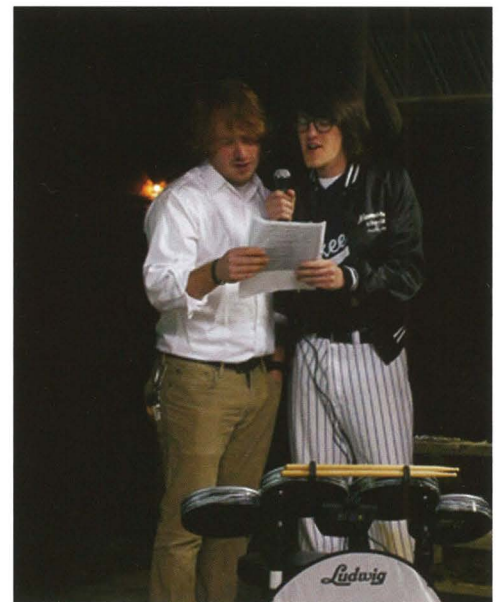

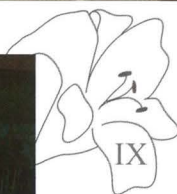

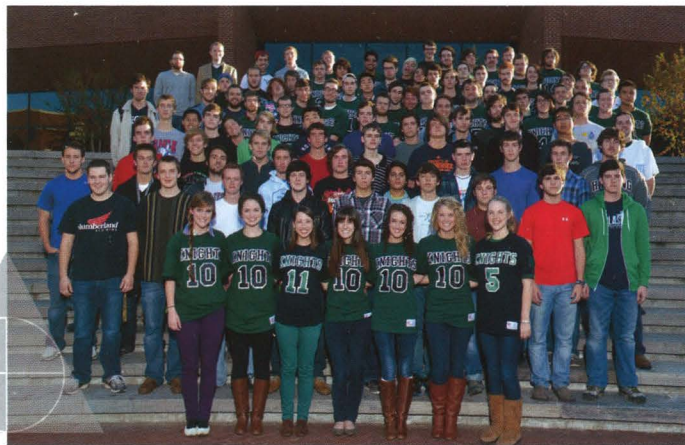

HELP A SISTER OUT

"Iota Chi Pledge Class of 2012" Facebook page unites "sisters" across the world

What began as a Facebook page for the Iota Chi pledge class became an epidemic that grew to more than 50,000 members in less than a week. Students who were not members of the club gained access to the page and invited all of their friends. The number of group members exploded overnight.

"[Feelings] were kind of mixed," Iota Chi member sophomore Antasia Lewis said. "Initially, I was mad anyways because I thought that everyone was just making fun of us. We did not really know what to do in the situation because this has never really happened before."

Junior Jared Dryden, a member of Knights, was one of the first people to be added to the group. He said after the club reached more than 5,000 members that first night, he and a few of his friends in Knights decided to make a rap music video called IX (Til I Die). The video mentioned the creation and expansion of the group, as well as the importance of unity. Sophomore Nick Ray said the video "totally represents the pink and black sisterhood."

According to Dryden, who was an administrator of the page, Iota Chi club members decided to use the page for a good cause. They realized that what began as a prank could be used for a good cause because so many people could be reached.

Iota Chi member senior Autumn Dixon texted Dryden and told him about senior Meagan Burkhead, a club member who had recently won a battle with breast cancer. She told him about buttons the club would be selling to raise money for Burkhead at the upcoming tailgate and

wanted him to get the word out on the page.

"When that post happened, I think everyone just kind of sat there for a second; we can actually do something with this," Dryden said. "After that one post, people not from Harding started messaging or commenting 'How can we get one? Even if we don't get a button, can we send money?'"

After the word was out about Burkhead, fundraising ideas sprung up all over the page. Dryden and his friends made another video and posted it on a website where people could make donations. Another man who did not attend Harding, Jay Brownlow, had the idea to create Iota Chi T-shirts to sell for the cause. More than 500 people purchased the T-shirts, raising more than \$1,500 for Burkhead.

Freshman Danny Jackson said he requested to be in the group after he watched the rap video. He had heard about the page, but knowing that the page was about more than a club caused him to request to join the group.

Dryden believed that the Iota Chi Facebook page would be a catalyst for the growth of the club. Because more people knew about it, more would want to join the actual "sisterhood." The Facebook page of the 2012 Iota Chi pledge class represented Iota Chi, but it came to represent more than that. It represented the power of unity and the power of communication. Though it was initially a joke, the page unified 50,000 people, causing many of them to join a cause beyond the Facebook page.

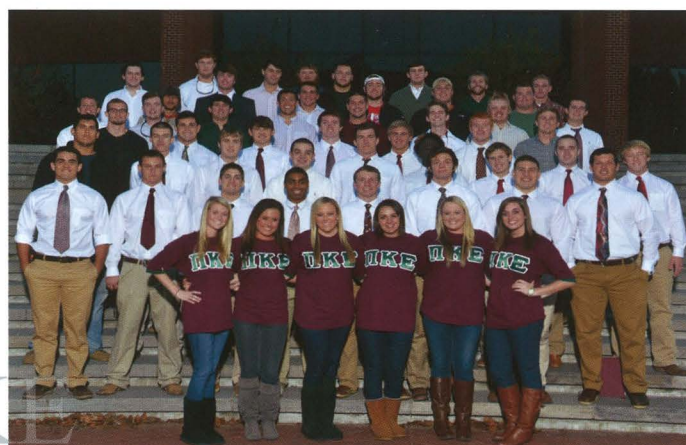

SOCIAL CLUB GOES CYBER

Chi Sigma Alpha takes a step into the future with the creation of a club website

Typical club participation included creating Club Week books, paying dues at meetings and signing up for functions on the club sheet in the student center. The men's social club Chi Sigma Alpha took a leap into the future by creating its new website, chisigmaalpha.com, which enabled prospective members to find out more information on the club and gave current members access to calendars and online options to pay for dues and functions.

Chair of the club's induction committee senior Josh Stafford conceived the idea for the website as a way to save money during Club Week. Sophomore Adam Jackson said he came up with the idea to avoid printing induction books, which cost between \$460-\$500 the previous year, by putting the content online.

"Adam thought it would be a great resource for Club Week, and it would be an advertisement for the club, and it could also be used for sign ups," Stafford said. "It would really streamline the club."

With club information provided by Stafford, Jackson began to design the website late in the summer. Jackson, an information systems major, designed a website for his high school band and served as the school's main website editor for one year. Jackson estimated he worked about 75 hours to build the site, which he designed from scratch with the help of limited open-source coding.

"The basic functionality that we wanted the website

for, and really the original purpose that it was made for, was to show potential members, 'here's what Chi Sigs is about, here's what we do, here's pictures, here's what's going on,' stuff like that," Jackson said. "But then it turned into something for current members too."

Within weeks of its launch, the website expanded to include features such as a club directory; a Google calendar page for club events; and a PayPal link for members to pay club dues and functions.

The PayPal feature, which was also Jackson's idea, created the most interest in the website by other club members. For only a small convenience fee, members could pay their routine dues. Senior Daniel Schliffka, the club's treasurer, said the ability to pay online was a huge advantage of the website that reduced liability issues that came with his position.

"For a college student who isn't always carrying around \$40-\$50 in cash, the website is a really nice thing to have," Schliffka said. "It also makes my job as treasurer a lot easier because even after one meeting you might be carrying \$200 in cash, and that's a huge liability."

The new Chi Sigma Alpha website was an advancement in club administration. While social media sites such as Facebook and Twitter were useful, the addition of an official club website helped streamline the flow of information within the club.

New traditions for Omega Phi, the new men's club on campus

Thirty men had the opportunity to leave their mark on campus by forming a new social club called Omega Phi. 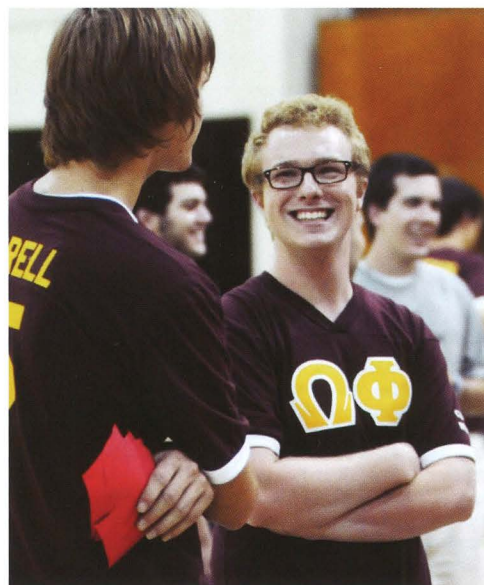

SCRAPBOOK ARCHIVES

Brckett Library challenges historians to help preserve club history by creating a scrapbook for digital archives

Faculty and staff worked to unify the alumni and current students. When the library staff brainstormed what to include in the project of digitally archiving documents, “club scrapbooks were at the top of our list,” E-Learning & Instruction Librarian Lisa Burley said.

Brckett librarians worked with club historians to digitize the scrapbooks. The librarians got word out about the project via Facebook, asking Harding alumni for their club scrapbooks.

The librarians first digitized the scrapbooks of disbanded clubs and then worked with the scrapbooks of existing clubs. To convert the physical scrapbooks to digital scrapbooks, the librarians used a free software program called Flipping Book Publisher, which made the scrapbooks interactive, allowing for activities such as digitally flipping through the pages of a scrapbook.

“My colleague Lisa Burley and I spoke to the club historians recently to encourage them and to stress the importance of preserving their legacy to their clubs,” Circulation Librarian and Instructor Hannah Wood said. “It’s a record of their time in the club that is then woven into the greater history of the club through the years. Each scrapbook will look different for each club. We aren’t giving them a template; we’re providing a place where we help them preserve and share their club’s histories.”

Club historians were excited to be a part of the process of meticulously recording their club history.

“I love taking pictures, but I am looking forward to

getting to learn more about our club’s history and to be able to post it online where anyone can see,” TNT historian senior Brent Simmons said. “My parents are really excited about getting to see old pictures of themselves and not have to flip through a bunch of yearbooks to find them.”

Students were also excited about the digital archiving of social club scrapbooks. They realized that the records of club history preserved the character, purpose and memories of social clubs.

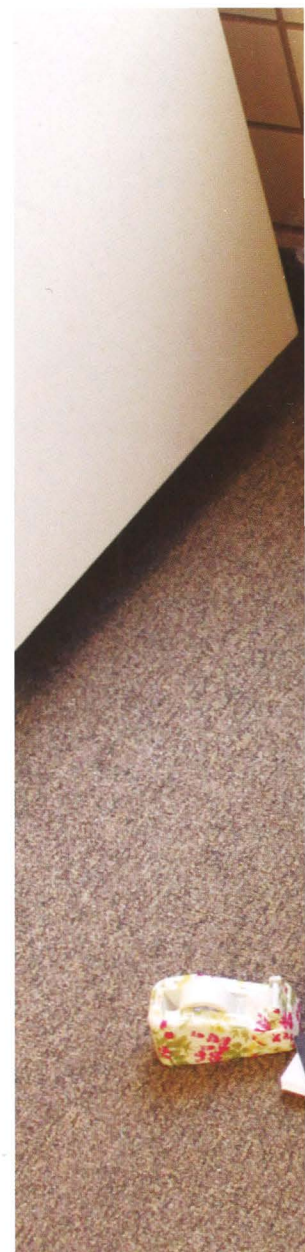
“I love looking at old club photos, but I wasn’t ever sure where to find them, except in my parents’ yearbooks,” Knights member junior Justin Dority said. “It’s always interesting to look back and see what your club looked like 10 or 20 years ago and how much things have changed.”

Burley said the ease of sharing photos on social networking sites caused a decline in the creation of physical club scrapbooks, which were essential in maintaining club memory.

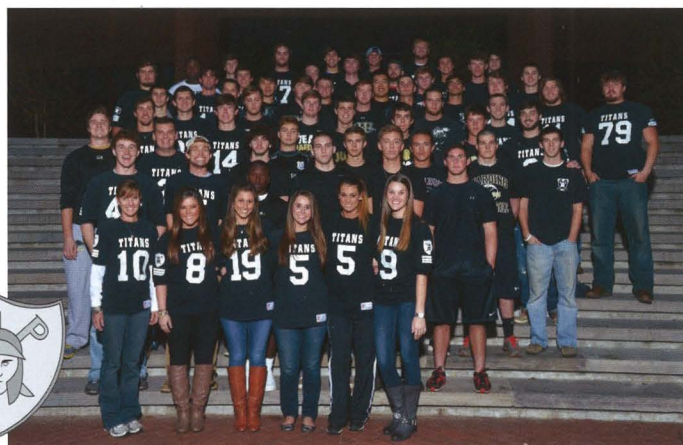
“College campuses have short memories,” Burley said. “In five years, there is a complete turnover of members in a club, and the names, faces and activities that are very easy for you to recall will not be remembered.”

Through the work of social club historians, the Brckett Library was able to preserve the records of social club memories by digitizing club scrapbooks. This digital timeline of social club histories reinforced the unity of Harding alumni and current students.

ONE WELL AT A TIME

GATA raises \$1,400 for Global Handwashing Day to help fund the construction of wells

As a fall service project, the GATA social club partnered with Ghana West Africa Missions and the Rural Water Development Project to fund the building of wells in the Sudan and Ghana. GATA wanted to do its part to alleviate the need for clean water in developing countries.

The Center for Disease Control and Prevention and World Bank's Water & Sanitation Program partnered with several other organizations in 2001 to form the Global Public-Private Partnership for Handwashing. The coalition intended to spread awareness about sanitation and resources such as clean water and soap. The steering committee established World Water Week in 2008 and celebrated Global Handwashing Day Oct. 15, 2008.

To join the effort, GATA club members held a fundraiser and celebrated Global Handwashing Day. Gata service director sophomore Holly Jones said the day was a reminder of the privilege of having fresh water and the needs of people in developing countries.

Instructor of Biology and GATA club sponsor Amber Hug pitched the idea to the club. Hug learned of the opportunity from Dr. Steve Moore, associate professor of biology and an acquaintance of Josiah Tilton, the Searcy-based Executive Director of Ghana West Africa Missions and sponsor of the Rural Water Development Project. Moore returned from his summer trip to Africa with a desire to contribute to Tilton's work.

"[Dr. Moore] came back wanting to participate in

Global Handwashing Day to celebrate our ability to have clean water to spread the disease while other countries still struggle with poor water sources," Hug said.

He presented the idea to Hug, who arranged for him to meet with GATA to provide information about the project. Jones said when she heard about the project, she knew GATA needed to get involved.

"Some people in the world don't have clean water to wash their hands, and we kind of take that for granted," Jones said.

Sophomore Ginger Smith designed T-shirts with a world surrounded by a drop of water. Athletes' Choice provided the shirts at a discounted rate because the owners were in support of the project and wanted to contribute. GATA sold T-shirts for \$10 and took up donations the week prior to Global Handwashing Day, Oct. 8-12, and the day of Oct. 15. The club raised \$1,400, one third of the cost of drilling of a well.

Club member junior Aulora Fay said GATA would continue to raise money in hopes of collecting the funding for one well. They recognized that involvement in the Rural Water Development Project made students aware of international needs and of their own blessings.

"I am glad I got to be a part of [the fundraiser] to help give back to those who do not have the access to clean water that I take for granted," Fay said, expressing her appreciation for GATA's service project.
